

Fellow Rotarians,

There are about 125 young people who will agree with that based on the evaluations from our last camp. I've had the privilege of serving as a camp counselor. I have seen the lives of students transformed by that experience. But more importantly...I have also witnessed the transformation of Rotarians who served those students.

The Rotary motto a few years ago was "The Future of Rotary is in Your Hands." Now, more than ever you are determining the destiny of this great organization. It is quite fragile, and we need you---ALL of YOU --to man up, and woman up, and move our district growth in a positive direction.



Have you ever thought you would like to visit another country and have a local person show you around?

Have you ever thought you would like to visit another country and see some Rotary projects?

Have you ever thought you would like to visit another country and observe your occupation?

Well now you can, through Rotary Friendship Exchange.

Here's how it works:

1. Individual Rotarians, who may be accompanied by family members, spend a few days in a Rotarian's home abroad.
2. Rotarian couples (typically four or six) visit several communities in a host district for up to one month.
3. Rotarians of the same occupation observe how their job is done in other countries.

Guidelines:

1. Only Rotarians and their immediate families are eligible.
2. Spouses or children must be accompanied by a Rotarian.
3. Rotarians must apply through their district Friendship Exchange Chair.
4. Exchange Chair will coordinate with a list from around the world.

The 2011 version of the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards camp held June 23-26, 2011 was once again a rockin' success. As is typical, great things were heard about RYLA, "A wonderful opportunity." "A life changing event." "This is one of my favorite things." and that was from the Rotarians and RYLarian Counselors!

116 RYLarians attended Camp RYLA at TWU this year and 50 clubs participated. That's over 80% of our clubs, folks.!!!

48 clubs sent students and 2 clubs provided scholarships for other club participants. There were 12 Rotarian Counselors, 12 RYLarian Counselors, 4 Staff Members, and 7 Rotary Club Event Sponsors. To pull off an event like this takes a lot of hard work. 75 Rotarians from around our district volunteered some portion of their time to make RYLA happen. (Each had to have passed a criminal background check, supply personal references, and complete online training on Youth Protection). Amazing that we have 75 Rotarians that are willing to jump through so many hoops! Several have attended many years. Thanks to you all for going that extra mile!

The RYLA program has always stressed the development of the individual and the group as a whole. Experiential learning exercises reinforce concepts of communication, listening, team building, self esteem, confidence, acceptance and ethics. The focus on leadership skills and exposure to Rotary ideals along with programs featuring local, state, and international arenas provides much to think about for the RYLarians.

The RYLarians begin the day in typical Rotary fashion by opening with the pledge and a prayer. They spend time with Rotarian counselors learning about Rotary and all that RI encompasses which includes a hands-on service project. These young adults arrive from all around the district as strangers and leave after 3 short days as family.



Did You Know?

One third (111) of all Polio cases have occurred in endemic countries & 2/3 in non-endemic. Over 1/2 (175) of all cases have come from just two countries (Chad & the Democratic Republic of the Congo).



METROPORT ROTARY CLUB "ADDRESSING THE GLOBAL HOUSING CRISIS"

The United Nations recently announced their sustainable goals to be accomplished by 2020. Goal No. 7d reads, **"Achieve significant improvement in lives of at least 100 million slum dwellers."** Benefiting 100 million people living in slums is a worthy goal; however, it just begins to address the magnitude of poverty and "houselessness," significant contributing factors to disease, malnourishment, and human-trafficking worldwide. Consider these statistics:

- ◆ 3 billion people (a 3rd of the world's population) live on \$2 a day
- ◆ 1.5 billion people live in inadequate shelters
- ◆ 200 million more are displaced by natural disaster every year
- ◆ The slum is the world's fastest growing neighborhood, growing 25% yearly; a 3rd of the world will live in a slum by 2020.
- ◆ 100,000+ homes would have to be built every day just to keep slums at their current population levels.



Even if the UN achieves its goal, the world's poor will be confronted with terrible problems and dire realities:

- ◆ Somalia – walking 200 miles to find refuge in a safe country, seeking water and shelter
- ◆ India and South Africa – young girls pulled from shacks, molested, and sold into slavery
- ◆ Haiti – living in tents for years following natural disasters
- ◆ Uganda – sleeping on a floor of dirt
- ◆ Guatemala – hoping your family survives seasonal mud slides



Solving the global houselessness problem has been the passion of Richard and Suzan Grabowski, founders of IADDIC Shelters, since 2005. Following a mission trip to Honduras, Rich was struck by the lack of basic housing, and began developing an amazing new housing system that can deliver dignified, energy efficient, affordable homes in just a few hours. Turning the tide on poverty and houselessness requires simultaneously addressing tough issues of job creation, home cost, and overwhelming volume. How can this be done with little money? How do you reach difficult locations? How can sustainable jobs be created? And, how can the massive need for housing be met? Visit their website, www.iaddicshelters.com to learn more about their unique solutions to address the twin challenges of global poverty and houselessness.

The Institute for Leadership is a highly professional, interactive two-day event that enhances the way participants think about and approach leadership. Participants absorb new insight about their "being a leader" and it being essential to the maintaining of high ethical values.

I know that this experience will make positive differences as we carry out our responsibilities as members of the RI Board for the new year."*

"FORT WORTH ROTARY" "INITIATIVE ADDS READING E(XCITEMENT) TO RIVERSIDE MIDDLE SCHOOL

Pat Evan, Rotary Club of Fort Worth past president, has always been interested in finding strategic approaches to solving education and literacy problems. Evans was instrumental in developing the club's program to expand literacy opportunities through its Adopt-a-School partner, Riverside Middle School. The three-year initiative, called "Putting E(xcitement) Books in the Hands of Students," will give Riverside students hundreds of electronic reading devices and thus provide Rotarians a way to directly influence these students' learning success.

E-books, electronically formatted books, have digital text that's the same as a bound paper volume. Because the text resides on e-readers, e-books content can be acquired from the Internet, downloaded and stored in large quantities within a single e-reader.

E-books retain all of a print book's features, but offer enhancements that make for a better learning experience, especially for students struggling with reading and/or language-based challenges. Multiple processes and print styles on e-readers help users understand a text would be more difficult on printed-paper.

For the Rotary e-Reader project, Evan's investigation determined which of the currently available devices would be the best tool for Riverside Middle's students. The choice was Amazon's Kindle because it is less expensive and has no monthly costs because 3G technologies is built in making resources available over the Internet.

Fort Worth Rotary began the project with 55 Kindle e-readers distributed to reading improvement classes for school use only. To stimulate more excitement, the club offered students a chance to win a personal Kindle. A spring/summer reading program at the school at the end of school provided a list of those participants from three grades, 6th, 7th and 8th grades from which Fort Worth club Rotarians drew 15 students from each of the three grades to get a personal computer.

"FORT WORTH ROTARY" "INITIATIVE ADDS READING E(XCITEMENT) TO RIVERSIDE MIDDLE SCHOOL, Con't

Implementing the program at Riverside Middle came with the enthusiastic support of Principal Daniel Scroggins. Development of the project itself came with the generous assistance of Dr. Lotta Larson, Kansas State University Assistant Professor, who teaches literacy and assessment there and is a recognized authority on using e-readers with young students. Her contacts at Amazon proved helpful with logistics and purchasing the Kindles and Rotarians have also benefited from her advice and counsel. The need for independent assessment created a partnership with Texas Wesleyan University to evaluate and measure the program's impact at Riverside.

Rotary Fort Worth's Board has approved start-up money to donate 100 Kindles to Riverside every year for the next three years, established measurement criteria and will have the assessment done by its university partner.

The project won the Rotary club recognition from the Fort Worth Independent School District as Outstanding Adopt-a-School partner for middle schools.

The Rotary Club of Lewisville Noon recently applied for a District Simplified Grant to purchase backpacks for 1300 economically disadvantaged kids K-12 grades. The event was held on August 6th and over 2,000 folks showed up. The event was called and LISD Back to School Fair which featured a family friendly event providing an opportunity to increase awareness and availability of education, health, and social services for parents and children.

Children were not allowed to receive a FREE backpack loaded with school supplies until they visited parts of the fair which included:

- ◆ Vision Screening
- ◆ Dental Screening
- ◆ Information on Colleges
- ◆ Fingerprinting
- ◆ Nutrition
- ◆ Reading
- ◆ Insurance and well checks



Over 1500 backpacks were handed out and over 300 volunteers volunteered their time to make this event happen and send these children back to school healthy and with a fresh start with their backpacks and school supplies.

Several of our Rotarians took part in the project, handing out backpacks to distributing water and crowd control. One of our members cooked over 1,000 hotdogs and was serving folks.




