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RYLA

"I LOVED, LOVED, LOVED RYLA!" "When can I come back? This was awesome!" "I didn't want to come to a leadership camp, but I'm so glad I did, RYLA changed my life!" And from a dad of a RYLA student, "I can't believe the difference RYLA made for my son. It was only a few days, but I think he grew up more at RYLA than in the past school year. I'm so impressed with RYLA & especially you Rotarians. Thank you for what you do."

RYLA 2012 was a huge success as the above quotes suggest. Forty-six clubs sponsored 115 students! Thirty clubs took advantage of the early bird registration special of \$395 by sending their checks in by the April 15 deadline. All students arrived on time – perhaps a first!

RYLA is a leadership camp led in a professional, collegiate atmosphere where participants develop leadership skills, increase self-confidence & enhance teamwork through participation, learn proper social & business etiquette, learn about state government & observe how city government operates, expand their civic & patriotic skills in ethics & responsibility learning exercises, learn about the purpose & objectives of Rotary, learn the Rotary Four Way Test, participate in a community service project & participate in a "Service Above Self" exercise called *Promises, Promises*.

At RYLA, we teach through example: After check-in, RYLAians attend the Denton Rotary meeting. On Friday night, we attend another Rotary Meeting & Etiquette Dinner led by Denton South. Each day begins with a meeting in Rotary meeting style. Students see Rotary & Rotarians in action daily.

A program the size and scope of RYLA takes many volunteers and this year was no exception:

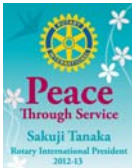
- ◆ 50 clubs participated
- ◆ 15 Rotarian's served as Counselors & staff
- ◆ 13 former RYLarians returned as RYLarian Counselors
- ◆ Over 75 Rotarians from around our district volunteered some portion of their time for the events involved with RYLA.
- ◆ As with other District Committees, a group volunteers to spend time throughout the honing the experience to make next year's camp even better.

It also takes time and effort on the part of the sponsoring Rotary Club to send a student to RYLA. First it takes time to find, interview & select student leaders & help them fill out the application. It takes time to make sure all of the forms are signed by the parents and the Club President. Then, best practice is to conduct an orientation for the student(s) and parents to assure the best RYLA experience. The final step is to arrange for a Rotarian to drive the student(s) to and from RYLA. Yes, it is a lot of trouble to get a kid to leadership camp...but I think our future is worth the trouble.

RYLA is a life changing event for the RYLA students, RYLarian Counselors, and Rotarians that are blessed enough to be able to help shape these lives. Former RYLA students have gone on to become a Youth Exchange students, form & lead Interact & Rotaract Clubs and even become Rotarians. RYLA is a life changing event.

We have 9 inbound student sponsored by the following Rotary Clubs. Two students sponsored by the Eagle Mountain-Saginaw RC. Denton, Wichita Falls North, Flower Mound, Keller and Bowie. HEB and Mid-Cities Pacesetters worked to jointly sponsor a student as are the Abilene Rotary Clubs.

We have 5 year student outbound for this year. They are sponsored by Grapevine, Keller, Western Fort Worth, Flower Mound, and Bowie. This summer we had 4 American students on the program. They were sponsored by Mansfield Sunrise, Decatur, Highland Village, and Flower Mound. Countries include: Finland, Germany, Spain, Japan, Argentina, Brazil, Italy, The Czech Republic, Chile, France, Austria, Switzerland,

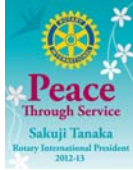
We need your help to promote this wonderful program of Youth Exchange.

- ◆ If you have an outbound student, let he or she come and tell about the experience. (This year one club board sat around and debated if a high school exchange student (outbound) should be given more than 5 minutes in a club meeting to give a program on their experience overseas!)
- ◆ Practically none of our outbound students ever heard of the Rotary Youth Exchange Program from a local Rotary Club! We had to go find a club to sponsor them after we were contacted by them.
- ◆ One Rotarian asked me what members on our district committee were responsible for finding host families.
- ◆ One District Rotarian I met at a wedding in Dallas was totally unaware we had a youth exchange program. He had a child who might participate and they could possibly be a host family. I had previously spoken to the president of his Rotary Club at a meeting explaining our program!
- ◆ We have a number of high schools that teach Chinese, Japanese and Russian, yet no one Rotary Club has talked with any of these schools about the opportunities we have for their students with special language skills! Much less any other language skill such as French, Spanish, German or Italian. Also, none have heard about a great summer program we offer.

Help tell our story in your local schools about the possibilities of their students becoming exchange students for the summer or year. We have several District committee people who can help. All you have to do is ask! We have interviews for outbound students in December.

Can you help find host families for next year? This is the time to begin. I often hear there are no host families. If this is the case, why do schools have limits on the number

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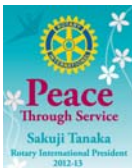

of exchange students they will accept and at the same time we often can't get into a school because other programs have filled their quota!

Oh yes, exchange students both American and International student can give good programs and can tell about our exchange program, too. Call me and we can get you connected. There are other members of our District Committee and some very knowledgeable club committee people who can also help.



"YOUTH EXCHANGE STUDENT - FIRST LETTER"

This is the first letter from one of our students from Keller, who is living in Japan for a year.

Hello all!

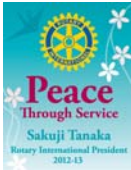
So I have now been in Japan for a whole week and all I can say is it is amazing. Amazing and also amazingly exhausting. I arrived in Narita last Friday after 13 hour flight in which I did not get up the entire time because the guy next to me slept the whole time. Customs, immigration etc took two hours because of the high volume of people coming in. My entire host family met me at the airport and then we were off to Ota. During this past week I have had several of my assumptions about Japan busted.

1. Gunma is cooler than Tokyo. I live at the bottom of Kana-Yama Mountain and it usually gets up to 95* F with 100% humidity. Thus I am hot, sweaty, gross mess the entire day. Also, the Japanese believe in selective air conditioning.
2. You can get everywhere in Japan by public transport. I have not ridden one train since I got here. Gunma has the highest ratio of cars to people in all of Japan, and everywhere I go is by car. Also, being driven on the left side of the road still feels odd.
3. Everything in Japan is small. My room here is bigger than my room in America. I have gone to three American sized malls while here in Japan. The amount of rice I have eaten here deffiently isn't small. The roads are more narrow, the cars more compact, but here in Gunma I'd say things are about the same size.
4. Japanese people are very formal. Except they're not. Being a teenager and spending most of my time with family and friends I rarely use formalities. The changes in behavior depending on the situation are amazing. At school, for example, everyone rises when a teacher enters the room, you must bow and say excuse me before entering any classroom/teacher room. No one breaks dress code. With friends however, personal space is an unknown concept. Everyone speaks very informally.

School starts tomorrow so the procrastination has to stop. Japan is a lot of things but I think the main thing is it is incredibly exhausting. Exchange is just like real life except everything is super exaggerated. For example, when you're doing something fun and you're happy, you're ecstatically over the moon happy. I've been amazed by how natural this all feels. I really haven't experienced culture shock, this just feels like what I always was supposed to do. I'm lucky because I have an amazing host family and a very cute host cat. It actually makes me kinds das because I know in a few months I'm going to have to switch families. They've promised to take me to Tokyo Disney Land in the fall though, I'm super excited!

The food is delicious and I've learned that in fact, yes, everything does go well with rice and dried sea weed. (yum!).

— We are no longer able to give names, addresses or pictures of our exchange students because of child protection. However, if you want to see their pictures and what they write, I can give you their FACEBOOK information and you can follow them. This letter was written by our high school student from Keller who speaks fluent Japanese, learned it here and has passed Japanese fluency exams here! Great Ambassador for our country! The student from Japan in our district is the daughter of our student's first host family! - Jim Aneff



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END POLIO WEEKEND RECAP *"Raising over \$60,000 to End Polio"*

August 24-26, 2012 was a time for celebration of the eradication of polio in all but three countries in the world and also a time to renew our resolve as individual Rotarians, Rotary Clubs, Rotary Districts and as Rotary International in the eradication of polio around the world and most notably in the three remaining endemic countries: Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria.

An EndPolioNow dinner on August 24, 2012 kicked off the weekend long events to raise money for PolioPlus and The Rotary Foundation. The EndPolioNow Dinner at Morton's the Steakhouse in Dallas, Texas was a great success and had more than seventy attendees at \$300 per plate. Additionally, PDG Conrad Heede and AG Christopher J. McLucas pledged an additional \$2,000 to PolioPlus at the conclusion of the dinner. As an added bonus to we had special guests at the dinner, including Ambassador Dr Zahir Tanin from the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan Permanent Mission to the United Nations, Vice Consul Mr. Jagdeep Kapoor representing the Honorable General Consul P. Harish from the India Consulate in Houston, Texas and Mr. David Hall, Regional Major Gift Coordinator for The Rotary Foundation representing Mr. John Osterlund, General Manager of The Rotary Foundation.

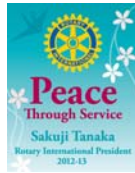
AG Christopher J McLucas from District 5790 was the Master of Ceremony for the event and provided the attendees with a brief presentation about the current state of polio eradication and the role that Rotary International has played in the eradication from 1978 to today. As indicated previously, Ambassador Dr. Zahir Tanin and his wife Mrs. Tanin attended the dinner at Morton's, as not only a Representative of the United Nations, but also as a representative of Afghanistan, one of the three remaining endemic countries. Ambassador Tanin discussed the role of the United Nations in the fight against polio and aptly stated, "We must not think that Polio is an issue only for the developing world, it is a global problem". Additionally, he thanked Rotarians around the world for their support in the eradication efforts of polio from his country.

The attendees were also honored to have Vice Consul Mr. Jagdeep Kapoor, who delivered an inspiring speech that brought an understanding and inspiration to the polio eradication efforts. It was noted that India has, as a result of the efforts of Rotary International and Rotarians worldwide, been polio free since January 13, 2011. Mr. Kapoor expressed gratitude for the work that Rotary has done around the world and in India.

The final speaker of the night was Mr. David Hall representing the Rotary Foundation. Mr. Hall further thanked the Rotarians for their efforts in the eradication of polio and support of The Rotary Foundation.

Following the presentation by the guest speakers AG Christopher J. McLucas, with the assistance of Mr. Hall, presented Ambassador Tanin and Vice Consul Kapoor with a Paul Harris Fellow. The PHF were given to both the Ambassador and Vice Chair as a sign of the dedication and support that they are providing Rotary International and the EndPolioNow Campaigns.

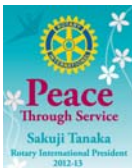
The following day, August 25, 2012, Ambassador Tanin and his wife were treated to a trip to the Fort Worth Stockyards with AG McLucas and Past President of Highland Village Rotary Club Reyna Castillo. Both the Ambassador and his wife noted that it had always been their dream to visit part of the cowboy culture. He further stated that from the Afghan perspective, growing up in the United States was always used synonymously with the State of Texas and that everyone desired to visit Texas. In fact, they both recalled that in Afghanistan, what we refer to as blue jeans, are commonly referred to as "cowboy pants".

After the trip to Fort Worth the Ambassador and his wife attended the PolioPlus tailgate party at Rangers Ball Park where the McKinney Rotary Club of District 5810 brought their giant Rotary Wheel on a trailer. The tailgate party was a huge success with hotdogs, chips and drinks being provided for a modest donation. Mr. Kelly Curnutt, a new Rotarian in the Arlington Sunrise Rotary Club, was the chair of the tailgate party and coordinated the volunteers and food. We owe a huge thank you to Ready Ice that donated a cooler trailer and ice for the event. American National Bank President, Mr. Jake Hardin, of the Arlington Sunrise Rotary Club donated the hotdogs and Mr. Kelly Curnutt donated the buns and chips. Also a thank you is due to Mr. David Berg of the Arlington Sunrise Rotary Club for the donation of the cookies for the event. As Rotarians do, we donated remaining food to the Arlington Life Shelter and Mission Arlington.

The Texas Rangers allowed Ambassador Tanin to throw out the ceremonial first pitch as a result of our selling more than 1100 tickets to the ball game. Ambassador Tanin was on the pitcher's mound while the announcer read the history of polio eradication and the dedication of Rotarians around the world. The Ambassador did a great job of throwing out the pitch for the game. The EndPolioNow Night Committee of District 5790 and 5810 would like to extend a sincere thank you to Mr. Colby Van Sickler, Arlington Sunrise Rotary Club, Mr. Charles Elhoff, Past President of Arlington North Rotary Club and EFC Advisors, LLC for donating their office suite for the Ambassador and his wife to watch the game. Their hospitality was greatly appreciated.

After the game, Ambassador Tanin and his wife joined a few Rotarians in Fort Worth at Capital Grille for a dinner to thank the Ambassador and his wife for attending our events. The dinner proved to be enjoyable and very productive for District 5790 and Rotary International. The Ambassador agreed to assist District 5790 with its Inaugural Peace Symposium to take place in March 2013 as part of the Rotary International Presidential Citation requirements regarding peace. In addition, the Ambassador provided some valuable insight into our current relationship with Afghan Rotary Clubs and agreed to assist District 5790 in chartering a new Rotary Club in Herat, Afghanistan.

Last year, the EndPolioNow Events, resulted in more than \$22,000 being contributed to The Rotary Foundation for PolioPlus. This year's events grossed more than \$60,000. The fundraising efforts were highlighted by a matching PHF points program allowing Rotary Clubs and Rotarians to increase their PHF recognition levels by donating money to the EndPolioNow events.

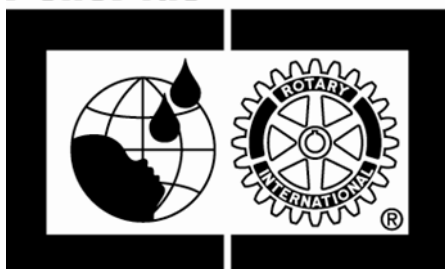

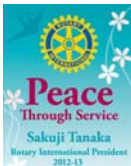

Nigeria - 77 Polio Cases recorded in 2012 compared to 26 on this date in 2011. To address the current upsurge of Polio cases in Nigeria, UNICEF & the CDC is set to join hands with Koranic school teachers. Early in September, the Tsangaya School Strategy will be piloted in 10 high-risk local government areas (LGAs) of Jigawa and Zamfara states, to reduce the number of missed children during polio campaigns. In Nigeria, Koranic school teachers, or Tsangaya teachers, have an important role to play in ensuring each and every child is reached during polio campaigns given the fact that many children can be found in their schools. Engaging religious schools, institutions and leaders will help build community ownership for immunization and help reduce on-going misconceptions and resistance to immunization. This project will also engage Preachers and Imams, especially during Friday Mosque sessions to ensure the community is fully aware of the importance of immunization during every campaign and the risks to children who are not immunized.

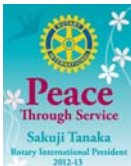

The Lewisville Rotary Club celebrated its 50th birthday on April 25, 2012 at its regular weekly meeting. The Lewisville Rotary Club received its charter on April 24, 1962, and met at the Ship 'n Shore restaurant located near the intersection of Oakridge Blvd and Lake Park Road in Lewisville.

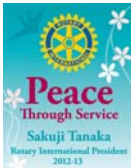
The club meets now at The Grotto Restaurant located at 2100 Highland Village Road in Highland Village. The club celebrated this milestone with a cake and presentations from Denton County Commissioner the Honorable Bobbie Mitchell, Precinct 3, and from City of Lewisville Mayor the Honorable Dean Ueckert, both long-time members of the club. "This club has much to be thankful for given its long-standing history of service to the greater Lewisville area," said current reigning president Mary Jennings. President Jennings commented how she contacted one of our charter members, Mr. Bill Weaver. "Mr. Weaver remembers those early days fondly but local community service was always the focus" says Ms. Jennings. We have so many local community activities that have truly made a difference in our community.

For example, we received a simplified matching grant from the district that allowed up to partner with the Kim Teamer, Executive Director of *Heavenly Supply Depot* who spearheads a back to school health fair. This is the second year of this event and Lewisville Rotary's involvement along with other community sponsors, health officials and social service agencies to provide backpacks and back-to-school supplies to 3,000 needy children from the greater Lewisville area. Member Angie Cox wrote a simplified matching grant for \$1,200 (\$2,400 total) and even encouraged club members to show up at the site to help pass out supplies. The event was held on August 11, 2012 at the Ben E. Harmon 9th and 10th grade high school campus in Lewisville. Lewisville Rotary was one of many sponsors of this event.

In addition to free backpacks, participants received school supplies, school resource information, community resource information, Free ID/Fingerprint Cards, Free haircuts for school age children, Free medical screenings (children & adults), Free Immunizations, Dental information, Health insurance information, Plan for life after high school information, Colleges/University/Trade School Fair, Financial aid information, Free Entertainment and Free Food. "We were extremely happy with

the turnout and feel confident that families will see a good start to the school year," said Kim Teamer, Heavenly Supply Depot Executive Director. 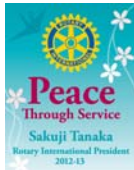
The Rotary Club of Hamlin has been a leader in the Rotary goal of Community Service this past year.

At the request of club member Lonnie Powell, the elementary school principal, the Hamlin Club was able to obtain a District Simplified Grant for the amount of \$1200 to help dig a water well on the back area of the elementary school's playground. Hamlin is such a small community that the school's playground is actually utilized as a practice field for pee-wee football leagues, soccer leagues, and baseball teams as well as a play area for after school and summers. The West Texas drought had caused this multi-use play area to dry out to a hard, dry, cracked, dirt ground. With the Rotary Foundation's matching the \$1200 dollars, \$2400 in funds were now available the Water Well Project to begin with a witching. This was performed by club member Joe Ford, who was able to pin point the best location to begin digging the well. Once the project began it became clear that one well would not provide water for the entire area. The community jumped on board and followed the Rotary Club's lead and was willing to complete what became a three well project by contributing \$20,000. Club members Sandra McCoy, Janice Wade and Alicia Smith also served on the committee and helped to finish up the project by recommending designs to create safe and attractive well houses for the children of the community. With the completion of the project, the grass is beginning to grow back in, and the children of the community now have a place to play and practice.



The Rotary Club of Hamlin continues to support the children of our community through purchasing dictionaries for the third grade students as well as sending a youth to RYLA, giving scholarships to the top ten graduating seniors and recognizing a student of the month. Each Spring the Hamlin Rotary Club recognizes the outstanding boy and girl of the year for freshmen through seniors. Hamlin Rotary Club also actively supports the many Eagle Scouts that the local scouting program has produced. We believe in the future generation!

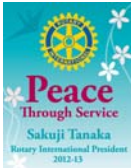

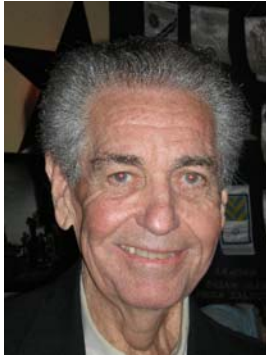


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September 11 *"Fight for your Flag"*
