Akron Rotary Centennial

"Honoring the Past, Driving the Future" was the theme for the Akron Rotary Centennial Celebration Saturday evening. Co-chairs Cheryl Warren and Jack Harig, along with Vice Chair George Rooney, greeted 450 guests as they arrived at the Hilton Akron/Fairlawn to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Rotary Club of Akron.



Emcee Dave Lieberth gave a history of Rotary International, which was started by Attorney Paul P. Harris in Chicago in 1905, and is the oldest service organization in the world. Today there are more than 32,000 clubs in 200 countries around the world.



A dynamic video presentation showed the history of the Rotary Club of Akron, founded by M.E. Harpster and Harry Bauman in 1914, with 31 charter members, who met at the Portage Hotel.

In 1924, Walter Hoyt and Hezzelton Simmons founded the Akron Rotary Camp so kids with polio and cerebral palsy could have a camp experience just like other children. Today the Rotary Camp, located on Rex Lake, serves children and adults with special needs, providing activities for over 1,700 campers in 2013.

Executive Director Dan Reynolds and the camp staff were introduced and received a standing ovation from the crowd.

Summit County Prosecut or Sherri Bevan Walsh thanked Rotary Camp for providing Summer Camp and Respite Programs for children with special needs as she related the camp experiences of her son, Matthew.

Before breaking out the champagne, we should consider that some of the 2,117 members will not be retained on the July 1 SAR. It's certain that some will be lost through death, illness, transfer or dissatisfaction with our organization.

at 7AM and inducted a new member, a young man who appeared to be on the sunny side of 30. He was accompanied by his wife and two grade school children. The induction ceremony was brief but meaningful and the youngsters were well behaved and obviously proud of their Dad. I suspect that they, and their Mother, will be supportive of his participation in the activities of his Rotary Club. Those voungsters may even be motivated to join the next generation of Rotarians. The obvious conclusion-the club is off to a great start toward the retention of their new member!

Another club, the RC of Sarasota, is another one that focuses on retention.

This noon club meets at a seafood bay-front marina perched on the edge of Sarasota Bay. The food is buffet style and features a seafood and non-seafood entree. There is a huge amount of free parking nearby and you can even indulge in valet parking if so inclined. The club meets in a private room and offers a superb environment and outstanding food at a reasonable price. Members would be hard -pressed to complain about the food or the environment in which that food is consumed. Members cannot skip meetings and justify their absence by saying the "food sucks" or the restaurant is "the pits". Although we don't join Rotary for the food or the restaurant's ambiance, these factors can be negatives and interfere with a member's attendance regulari-

I cannot overemphasize the importance of retention. Rotary, as an organization, succeeds in attraction enough new members to grow membership. Getting these new members in the "front door" is essential, and, on the whole, well done by most clubs. But many clubs have NOT done as good a job of activating the new members and integrating them in to the life of the club. In short, the "back door" is frequently left open.

Shoe Boxes Lead to Fire Truck

Recently, PDG Jack Young spoke at the Rotary Club of Stow-Munroe Falls regarding the Shoe Boxes to Nicaragua. For over seven years District 6630 Rotary Clubs have supported sending Christmas Shoe Boxes to the Children of the Dump living in and around the garbage dump in Chinandega, Nicaragua. Over the years clubs have provided around 3,000 shoe boxes in December of each year. This is the only gift that most of these children will receive at Christmas. This only happens when Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and .Friends of Rotary share the Christmas spirit of sharing with the Children in Nicaragua.

It should be noted that our district works with Rotary Districts in Iowa, Indiana and Texas to make this happen. For the first time, this years effort will have the Rotary Club of Atlanta Georgia join Ohio in sponsoring Shoe Boxes to Nicaragua.

One of the off shoots in the annual visit to the Children of the Dump was when Past District Governor Jack Young saw need for fire and rescue equipment needed by the fire fighters in Chinandega. When he made an appeal to the clubs and others in the district to see if used fire equipment was available, the mayor and Rotary Club of Stow stepped forward to make available a fire truck that was being replaced by a new model in the community. Through a fund raiser held by Rotarian Marsha Pappalardo, Past President of the Rotary club of Brunswick and Pam-

pered Chef, PDG Young was able to make the appropriate transactions with the city and send the fire truck to Nicaragua. It took several months for the truck to arrive in Nicaragua by a freighter and meet the necessary paperwork.

In addition, 2 fire fighters from Stow,



Thand Kreject and Bob Dobson were given permission from the city to spend time in Nicaragua to educate the local firefighters on its use and operation. Rotarian Marsha conducted another fund raiser and raised money to cover the travel expenses of the fire fighters. Since that time, the fire fighters from Stow have been in continual contact with the fire fighters in Nicaragua and have helped them with the repairs to the truck when needed. This has turned into a long term relationship between the fire fighters of two countries.

IT SHOULD BE NOTED THAT DURING THE FIRST WEEK OF OPERA-

TION, THE FIRE TRUCK WITH A 500 GALLON WATER TANK ON THE TRUCK IS CREDITED IN SAVING 3 CHILDREN IN A SMALL HOUSE FIRE.

Over the past seven years under the coordination of Marsha Pappalardo and PDG Jack Young, RC of Conneaut, almost 500,000 dollars worth of Fire and Safety Equipment, hospital supplies, school supplies for children, a fire truck, 3 ambulances, clothing from the students at Hiram College and other medical and school equipment have been sent to the Children of the Dup in Nicaragua. In addition over 60 Rotarians, College students and Friends of Rotary from District 6630 have gone on the mission trips to Nicaragua with PDG Young. Work has already begun to involve clubs in the Shoe Box process for 2014.

Online Marketing Grants of up to \$120,000 per year Available

I'm a tech guy, a nationally recognized media expert, and work with companies on the internet every day. Working with a new client recently I discovered something new that EVERY non-profit organization should know about.

> "Google gives grants of up to \$10,000 per month in free AdWords marketing to eligible nonprofits. If your nonprofit's account consistently reaches \$10,000 per month cap, you may be eligible to apply for a \$40,000 per month cap. Currently, approximately 4,000 nonprofits receive Google grants, although many more are eligible." http:// www.googlegrants.org/ how-to-apply

The main requirement is a current 501(c)(3) status that makes organizations eligible for a special Online Advertising/Marketing Grant of up to \$120,000 per year from Google - and if you read the fine print if your group can use that much free marketing, you can even apply to get more! \$480,000! Who do you know that could use FREE marketing? Who couldn't???

Is your Rotary Club registered as a 501(c)(3) yet? This alone

is a great reason to go through the process; to qualify for free advertising and publicity to promote your club's activities, fund raisers, events.....

Google say's that there are approximately 4,000 nonprofits currently receiving grants "although many more are eligible".

I don't know how many nonprofits there are in this country but I'm sure that it is way more than 4,000! This article

when I ran a Google search for "dentist Cleveland". I blurred out some of the details because I am not endorsing any of them, just illustrating this point.

There are two RED boxes around ads 1 and 3 showing the standard 3 line Google ad. The BLUE box around ad 2, shows an enhanced 5 line ad.

You can see how standard 3 line ads have limited impact when compared to enhanced 5

not the only search engine that people use. It is in Google's self interest to give searchers the best information possible to keep internet users coming back to Google to look up information. When one paid ad, or organic listing is repeatedly chosen (clicked on) over another, Google will show that result ahead of others.

2) By displaying your address and phone number, sometimes searchers contact you directly without clicking on your ad. The end result: the bigger ad sometimes costs you NOTHING.

It is a shame that many nonprofit's struggle with too little money to promote their cause when they don't have to just because they don't know about these Google grants.

is my starting point to help as many non-profits as I can who are missing out on this great opportunity to get a grant to help share the word about their organization and cause.

Additionally, many non-profit groups and businesses that are using online advertising, are actually wasting money by not fully utilizing several lesser known features that Google offers.

An example of some of these features can be seen in the attached screenshot that I got

line ad that can be run for the same cost - or even less. The 5 line ad is almost twice as large, shows address plus phone number, AND has 3-4 additional clickable links (in this ad: Emergencies, Locations, 0% Payment Plans, and Free Consultation) that make it more likely to be clicked.

Two additional points about having a bigger more effective

1) Google measures how many times an ad is clicked as Click Through Rate (CTR) as a per-

By April 22, the final REQUEST to provide Christmas Shoe Boxes to the Children living in and around the Garbage Dump in Chinandega Nicaragua will be sent to the Rotary Club in Waterloo Iowa. As most of you know, this is the 8th year our district has participated in this Rotary Multi District supported International Project by providing the only Christmas Gift these children will receive this year.

Again, the objective of Rotary Clubs and Rotarians is to encourage children in Chinandega to go to school and receive acceptable grades so that they can hopefully break the poverty cycle to get away from living around the garbage and do something else than scavenging for food, etc. The process was started by a Rotary Club in Texas to help break the poverty chain in Nicaragua. Over the years, Rotary Districts have been involved from Texas, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania and now Georgia. For the first time this year, the Rotary Club of Atlanta, Georgia has joined our district to help provide Shoe Boxes to Nicaragua. THIS CAN BE A GREAT ROTARY FAMILY POJECT IN-VOLVING YOUR CHILDREN AND **GRAND CHILDREN)**

Several individuals have asked why we need commitments in April when the Shoe Boxes are not given to the Children in December. In response to this very good question, below is an overview of the basic events that take place:

- Estimate Now, the ages of the children that will be in school in December of this year.
- ◆ Prepare the boxes to be printed with our Rotary Logo
- ♦ Assign the sex and age to each box
- ◆ Transport the Boxes to the respective Districts and Rotary Clubs
- Distribute the Shoe Boxes to the appropriate clubs
- ♦ Clubs return the filled boxes to the District Representative
- ◆ Deliver the Shoe Boxes to the Rotary Club of Troy, Michigan where they are shipped

- ◆ To Iowa and on to Houston Texas by Walmart at no cost to Rotary.
- ◆ Then the Shoe Boxes must be loaded in a shipping container
- ◆ The Container must be loaded on a Shipping Freighter to be shipped to either the Port of Honduras or Costa Rico at no cost.
- ◆ Then delivered by land to Nicaragua by the end of November.

Unfortunately the time to process the paperwork, customs documents, land transportation coordination, shipping arrangements from Houston, etc. is very complex and time consuming. The end result, we try and get the Shoes Boxes to the Children by the first week of December of each year. This is the time we send down Rotarians and Friends of Rotary to help distribute nearly 3,000 Shoe Boxes . Most of the time we meet the time schedule but there are times we may be a little late. The International shipping process can be very complex and time consuming in order to meet International Requirements.

It should be noted that our district sent 8 Rotarians and Friends of Rotary to Nicaragua in December of 2013.

When one sees first hand, the faces of the children and their smiles when they receive your Shoe Box, makes the entire effort worthwhile..

I am pleased to announce that as of April 10, the following Rotary Clubs, Interact Clubs and Friends of Rotary in our District and the Rotary Club of Atlanta, Georgia have committed to support 417 Shoe Boxes.
