

Dear Rotarians

What a wonderful month July has been! I have had the opportunity to visit clubs and meet so many wonderful Rotarians. In addition, I have learned the many great works that our clubs do in their community. Our district is continuing to move in a positive direction. Again I thank you for your sharing and your commitment to our fine organization.

On August 1, over 400 Rotarians and friends gathered in true Rotary spirit at the Progressive Field to draw attention to Rotary's commitment to eradicate Polio. What a sight to see most of those attending clad in red "End Polio Now" T-Shirts and marching around the field. A huge thank you to Stew Buchanan and the PI committee for all their hard work and efforts in bringing about such a fun and successful night.

MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The district membership committee is committed to helping our district be the best in net membership increase in our zone. In our eagerness to get started and share with clubs and have clubs share with each other, a number of meetings were scheduled. As I have said to our current presidents, the district is here for you. You told us to hold off until September when vou would be back to attend. You spoke and we listened. Tony and the membership committee will reschedule those meetings for this fall, when you are back in town and ready to go. There will be a note coming out soon with the revised dates.

FOUNDATION EVENT

The Committee has met to plan the event. As more details are available they will be shared with you. Our date is Sunday, November 9 in the afternoon. The Event will be at the Weymouth Country Club in Medina.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS

There have been a number of meetings going on all over the district. The Strategic Plan Committee has met and is in the process of putting together the plan on a single sheet of paper. This is the road map for the district. The Finance committee has met and reviewed last year's budget. The district did continue to stay within its budget. Great job PDG Bob Johnson.

GRANTS COMMITTEE

The grants committee meets the first Monday of every month (except when it falls on a holiday). At the first meeting, the grant requests for this year were reviewed to determine if they met the fundability guidelines. After a review it appears that the clubs are eager to participate in This is super. the process. There is a slight dilemma that did arise; i.e. there is \$39,000 to be award to clubs and the reguests are for \$45.000. The committee decided to award grants up to 85% of the requested amount. That way, all grant requests would be honored. Each club requesting a grant will be invited to attend the grants committee meeting in September or October to present the grant and answer questions. Also the completed application is due by October 31, 2014. After this process, if all the requests remain the same, then the 85% of the requested amount will kick in. If less money is requested, then the 85% could increase.

Next month, there will be updates about other committees. We have very many important committees in the district that do wonderful works for the clubs and for the communities.

It was a dult



The members of the Sunrise Rotary club completed another successful Shoe Box project for the "Children of the Dump" in Chinandega, Nicaragua. The goal of the project is to help make Christmas happy for 70 children 1/2 of a world away. Bill Gaydos coordinated the project and his wife, Jayne,

shopped for 30 of Club boxes and managed things behind the scene. Other Club members shopped for and

packed boxes for individual children.

All the boxes have been already delivered to PDG Jack Young and he will be delivering them to Michigan over labor day weekend. The Shoe Boxes from the Sunrise Club and other clubs in our district will be combined with boxes from districts in Michigan, loaded on a Walmart truck, and sent to Iowa. Districts in Iowa will combine them with their collections and send them to Texas. A Rotarian will have them loaded on a Freighter in Texas, and ship them in a container to Honduras. When they arrive in Honduras, local Rotarians and others will come across the boarder from Nicaragua and take them back to Chinandega. All of this takes time. Jack Young is planning on going down the first Tuesday after Thanksgiving to help deliver them direct to the

Small Ouestions Can Produce Big Results

Has your club reviewed the Membership Application recently? I did, and was struck by several things:

The document was very brief and would definitely be considered "applicant friendly" but of minimum use to the prospective club. For instance, there were no questions concerning spouse or partner, children, their ages and sex. Ideally, a Rotarian's family "buys into the family members' membership". Frankly, retention demands that that the Rotarian's family support and take pride in the Rotarian's activities with the club and that they be involved in appropriate club activities.

Another "missing link " was how the membership prospect learned about Rotary. We need to know the sources of our new member prospects. If most members come to us because of acquaintanceship with Rotarians, we need to broaden our appeal without squelching the "one on one" approach.

A third missing element from the application I reviewed was "what can Rotary do to help me achieve my personal goals". In short, membership should be mainly about them, not us. For instance, what do they expect from Rotary membership and how can that experience help them achieve their personal goals?

A word of warning—the membership application can be a very useful tool in retaining new members but filling it out should not be an experience similar to executing a long tax form.

Grab a shoe box, touch the life of a child, and inspire community kindness

Our Club rallied around a project designed to provide children of Nicaragua, many of whom live near the 80 acre Dump of Chinandega, with Rotary boxes brimming with essentials and supplies we take for granted—things like toothpaste and flip-flops, spiral notebooks and hair Our club donated 20 boxes and our Interact teens are contributing 10 boxes to Nicaraguan children in need. The shoe box project was an ideal way to demonstrate Rotary's commitment to service before self and to encourage residents to get involved with an international service initiative. Three local newspapers agreed to print articles about the project. Because of their kind coverage, community members called and emailed us to find out how to volunteer and to pitch in. Club members and community members alike went out of their way to take their kids, or grandchildren, on shopping sprees to select just the right items and then packed the boxes with care, kindness and much needed supplies and extras. Residents thanked us for allowing them the opportunity to contribute and to fill a box. One grandmother commented that that she and her grandson, "Got so much out of doing the boxes. It made us both realize how much we take for granted here in America."



Rebirth of a Club -- The Rock Creek/Grand Valley Rotary Club

It didn't happen overnight. It came with age. The Club just started dwindling down in size. First established in 1955 the Rock Creek/Grand Valley Club had a strong, rural foundation. There were businesses in the small junction village: retail, doctor's office, banking and manufacturing. At its height, 30+ years ago, there were over 25 members representing various sectors of the village and surrounding area. However, as the Rock Creek Village began to dwindle in size, shops and manufacturers closed, the Club also shrank. The original members passed on or moved away, even the second generation members were lost.

This is not a unique story, it's very common for many of our Rotary clubs – rural, suburban and urban, and every other service or social club.

Finally, the Club faced a decision point in December 2013: to close, merge (which in this case would have been the same as closing), or move. The members contemplated moving down the road, also in the Grand Valley (called this because of the Grand River valley), to the next, and still very active, economic hub to the region, the Village of Orwell. Long-time members were leaving as the decision was being made. However, the few existing members made a very definite last-stand – We Move! They still had a belief in Rotary and a desire of SERVICE ABOVE SELF.

In March the move from Rock Creek Village to the Village of Orwell was complete. Now, as far as economic hubs go, this is no thriving metropolis - it is still a rural village with only 1,660 residents, but it has potential. The daytime population more than doubles as major manufacturers are located there and the K-12 Grand Valley School system has all of its grades located in a single facility. You can find it all in Orwell: car dealers (new and used), restaurants, doctors, dentists, a grocery store, two gas stations, and more - in fact, you would have to travel more than 15 miles to find the next hub. It sounds remote, but it isn't - it's Americana with a single traffic signal. It's what you find at many of the major road junctions across the country.

With the move and the return from wintering snowbirds, the Club, which retained its name out of respect for its historical roots (Rock Creek) and in recognition of its greater regional focus (Grand Valley) took up

roots. The new breakfast location was in a regional, social service center known as Country Neighbor. Country Neighbor provides a myriad of services over a vast area of two counties and now it was to begin serving breakfast to Rotarians.

Of course, the newest member of the Club was the Executive Director of Country Neighbor, Barbara Klingensmith - who has lived a life of SERVICE ABOVE SELF through her work with County Neighbor. The kick-off event for the move was a Scholarship Breakfast in early June. This could not have been a better attended breakfast. There was a member of the press who later gave front page coverage of the move in the weekly paper, the Valley News. U.S. Congressman Joyce's office was represented by his regional person, County Commissioners, County Prosecutor, School Superintendent and the list goes on. County Commissioner, Dan Claypool, who himself was stepping in to lead another Club, Jefferson Rotary, offered to give a "State of the County" address. Rotary District Governorelect Mike Davanzo who, along with his wife Judy, had just returned from the RI Conference in Australia the day before made the nearly two-hour drive to be present for the 7:30 A.M. event. DGE Mike even swore in two new members of Rotary - Barbara Klingensmith and Christina White. There was representation from three Clubs in the Ashtabula Cluster, to include Joe Rodgers, Assistant District Governor. Joe was there with the Club through it all, always offering to help when he could - and he has.

So, how has the move turned out. Well with only five months into it, the RCGV Club is about to increase its membership by 100%. Current President, Jack Nettis, prefers to work with percentages because if you knew the raw numbers, it tells too devastating of a story; but for the sake of the 4-Way test, that means they are about to have their 9th and 10th members inducted into the Club, and 11 and 12 were at breakfast last week!

The new members are bringing new ideas. They are bringing the people to get things done. They are bringing that new energy to a Club that did not want to die, but had a will to live – to continue to SERVE OTHERS.

To paraphrase Charles Darwin's Theory of Evolution, it's not the strong who survive, "it are those most willing to adapt [and change], that will survive."

District 6630 "2015" 4-Way Speech Test Competition

Hello, my name is Scott Pease and I am the District Chair of the Four Way Test Speech Contest.

We conduct the contest yearly; every Rotary Club in 06630 is eligible to enter a contestant from each High School that the club supports or services. This year, we intend to broaden eligibility by allowing young people who are home-schooled to participate.

We hope to achieve the following goals in Rotary year 2014-2015:

- 1. Increase the number of clubs participating from 27 to 37.
- 2. Secure corporate or institutional sponsors to permit them to participate in our efforts to offer a program that has helped high school age youth become better speakers

while enhancing their knowledge of Rotary.

3. Recruit enough Rotarians to handle the judging without relying on Toastmasters. We benefitted from the participation of that fine organization but have struggled with some confusion concerning the appropriate judging criteria since the judges we've used are from two different organizations.

Our purpose in contacting you at this time is to alert you to our goals and to encourage your input on what we need to do to achieve our goals. If your club is not participating in the Four Way Speech Contest, how can we help your club in getting started?

District 6630 "2015" 4-Way Speech Test Competition:

The event will be held on Saturday April 11th 2015 at the Aurora High School in Aurora, OH

The event will open it's doors to allow students, friends and Rotarians to enter the building at 8 a.m. Registration will not officially begin until 8:10 a.m.

Once the students and Rotarians have registered and entered the building, five National Honor Society students will be conducting walk throughs of the classrooms where the speaker will be delivering their speeches. It is the speakers choice to visit the speaking rooms or not.

A continental breakfast will be served as soon as people arrive in the general seating area and

until the event officially begins with opening announcements.

This year the event will be different! First, the judging will be done exclusively by an Rotarian judging pan-Over the past few years there have been a number of questions as to why we do not have an all Rotarian judging The reason is simple. The Toastmasters offered a totally unbiased judging group which looked at each speaker individually and showed no favorites towards one speaker over another, nor did they favor any topic over another. However, it became clear that while the Toastmasters provided an excellent core group to this event they may have missed the true meaning of the 4 Way Test that all Rotarians know in favor of speeches that were technically perfect over speeches that truly captured the essence of our motto.

While we look for perfection in delivering a high quality public presentation such that this event produces, we must not over look the true meaning of our motto and what it really means. To this end I feel that an all Rotarian judging panel will offer a better balance for all the speakers and produce a more unified and balanced event without compromise.

Also new next year will be the introduction of Home Schooled Students to the event. This will open the doors to a new set of students that have not previously had the opportunity to compete. It is my hope that all the clubs in district 6630 will reach out to their high school contacts and inform them of this desire to engage the home schooled students and encourage them to participate. This is a must!

We will also be introducing the official closing of the registration tables at 8:45 a.m. Once the tables close for registration no one will be allowed to register after that time. If a speaker or Rotarian escort is late to the event and can not register their speaker that speaker will fore fit their chance of winning! They will be allowed to present their topic to the judging panel but will not be considered for selection in the finals round.

Finally, all speakers, family and friends of speakers and judges will remain in their respective rooms until we have verified that all the registered speakers in attendance that day have presented their topics. This way there will be no unfair advantages between speakers and all speakers will present to a full audience.

Rotary & Risk Management

An Important update from Scott Miese, Insurance Risk manager at Rotary International regarding insurance changes relating to events with fireworks:

"Going forward, Clubs should not enter into any contract (or any other agreement) with any pyrotechnics company or any other company that detonates fireworks. To be clear, this does not impact any 2014 event with fireworks where the contract has already been signed.

Because of the high risk exposure (possibility of numerous claimants with severe injuries), our insurance companies are no longer comfortable providing coverage to clubs that sign contracts with pyrotechnics companies. However, vicarious liability coverage will continue for clubs that sponsor or are otherwise involved with events that include fireworks, so long as a different party signs the contract with the pyrotechnics company. Please note that insurance didn't and still won't apply to clubs who directly transport, deliver, store, set up, detonate, or clean up fireworks; however, the legal sale of pre-wrapped fireworks supplied by a licensed third party for fund raising purposes has been and remains covered."

RI risk management will be contacting clubs after the 4th of July that are known to have contacts with pyrotechnics companies. Any questions or concerns please feel free to contact me.
