I am most encouraged by our dramatic and, more important, continuing increase in membership. Many of our clubs have inducted one or multiple new members. Several of the smaller clubs, who were experiencing a precipitous drop in membership, have taken the "bull by the horns" and sat down and developed a plan to reverse this trend. Two deserve special mention; The RC of Conneaut and the RC of Garrettsville-Hiram. I could tell during my District Governor club visits, that they had breathed new life and enthusiasm into their They are not alone. clubs. Others have worked equally hard on this problem. If your club has discussed a plan to address membership problems but need a starting point or assistance, please feel free to contact either club as I am sure they would be happy to help.

I also want to thank the incredible number of clubs who stepped up with our call for help to address the recent disaster in the Philippines. I don't know how many Shelter Boxes we were able to purchase but there were many, and I believe we, along with other Rotary districts, will make a dramatic difference in some of the survivor's lives. Again, ENGAGE ROTARY and CHANGE LIVES. I will ask our own PDG Jack Young, a Shelter Box director, to address the situation later in the year as the situation stabilizes.

Our DGE Mike Davanzo, has actively and aggressively begun to plan the training events for his year as DG (2014/2015). These are the President Elect Training Seminar (PETS1) that will take place on Jan. 25<sup>th</sup> 2014 at Windows On The River, at the Powerhouse in the flats. This is where the incoming club presidents will train to take over as club presidents on July 1, 2014. This will be followed by the All Ohio President Elect Training Seminar (AOP) which is held at the Renaissance Hotel in Columbus on Mar. 14 & 15 and will provide further club president training for the presidents elect and also where they will be commissioned as official incoming club presidents. Mike's last training event will be the District Training Assembly

(formerly called the District Assembly) where all club officers and club members are encouraged to take advantage of this Rotary training. This event will be at the Hilton Doubletree in Independence on Mar. 29<sup>th</sup>. Training topics are to be announced at a later date. These three events should prepare all clubs and their incoming presidents for a successful 2014/2015 Rotary year.

This will all be followed by my District Conference on April 25 & 26 at Quail Hollow Resort in Concord Twp. Activities will include the 4-WAY Test finalists, several training opportunities, Youth Exchange events, a " Rotary Club meeting Extraordinaire" to take the place of your regular club meeting that week. We are also planning towards а "celebration" type event to cap a year of hard work by clubs and district personnel. There will be golf, an interactive social and a giant BBQ in the tent (weather permitting), competitions, prizes, music, and much more. Stay tuned for more updates here in the Newsletter.

My fellow Rotarians,

We are in the process of applying for our first Vocational Training Team (VTT) project in District 6630. Please refer to the letter from Rotarian Larry Lallo from the RC of Brunswick that appears later in the newsletter. I feel this is a milestone opportunity for our Rotary district to partner with a fantastic hospital facility right here in our community to develop and spread their incredible knowledge to other parts of the world. Truly EN-GAGING ROTARY AND CHANGING LIVES!

Ken Fogle, a Rotarian in the RC of Chagrin Valley and an officer of G of L NEO, is developing the project along with grant writer Larry Lallo of the RC of Brunswick. A VTT is funded almost exactly like any Global Grant Project. The District Grants Committee has earmarked \$15,000.00 in District Designated Funds towards this project. \$20,000.00 needs to be raised from clubs to apply for

the match. To date the RC of Chagrin Valley has pledged \$6000.00 and the RC of Burton -Middlefield has pledged \$2500. We are on our way but we need your help! We are asking any club that has not yet committed to international service in this 2013/2014 Rotary year to step up and make a pledge and count this as your international service. Also, if your club has not done any grant applications, District or Global, this year, now is the chance to partner in something historic, the district's first VTT. I know we have any number of financial requests throughout the year but I am asking all clubs to give this special consideration as a signature project for 6630. All unused flyers can be picked up on the day of the event after the event has concluded. If you choose not to retrieve unused flyers they will be discarded.

> planning for the future when we can help rebuild homes, schools, and businesses. While Rotary is not an emergency disaster-relief organization, we are in the business of helping people in need. Every one of our six areas of focus is affected when disasters of this size occur.

> I saw first-hand the difference Rotarians can make after one of the deadliest tornadoes on record tore through communities in my home state of Oklahoma. The widespread destruction was heartbreaking. Almost immediately after the storm, Rotarians were out in force cleaning debris, collecting food and water, and comforting families who lost everything. The Rotary clubs in the affected areas showed perseverance and strength. We helped pick up the pieces and build them back up.

What really moved me was the support and compassion from clubs around the world. In the

face of calamity, we were not alone. Rotary's collective spirit is the essence of how we Engage Rotary and Change Lives.

Rotary partner ShelterBox has committed aid for thousands of families in the form of emergency shelter and other relief assistance. They were already in the Philippines when the typhoon hit providing aid to families who lost homes in the 7.1 magnitude earthquake that struck the Philippines in September.

Such disasters are the reason why we entered into our partnership with ShelterBox. On Friday, I visited their website and sponsored a ShelterBox to help a family in need, and I encourage you to do the same if you're able to do so – any level of support will help to change lives for the better. The organization welcomes help from Rotary members to identify need and provide support. You can contact them at rotaryrequest@shelterbox.org.

We have more than 21,000 Rotary members in the Philippines. The hardest hit areas include Districts 3860, 3850, and 3830. We are working with our governors in the affected areas to determine what type of support will be most effective, and we will continue to provide updates on www.rotary.org.

I know I can count on Rotarians around the world to come to the aid of our friends in the Philippines. If you have any questions about how you can help, please write to relief@rotary.org.

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## Upcoming NID Opportunity Announced

#### Dear Governor:

The purpose of this correspondence is to announce that we are in the final planning process to organize a trip of about 35 people to travel to Delhi and Uttar Pradesh, India in February 2014 to participate in the polio eradication program. You are receiving this correspondence because, as Governor, we are inviting you to let the Rotarians in your District know that an announcement for such a trip is coming up in the next few weeks. Even if you are not planning on joining us in February, please share it with anyone in your District who may be interested.

Currently, we do NOT have the final dates of the program, the cost of the trip, and we are not accepting membership. However, we wanted to give you advance notice that we expect to have all of the details in the next few weeks. Now is the time to prepare for the possible trip for anyone who may be interested in such a trip.

Permit me to itemize a few key points:

1. We expect this trip will be held the second half of February 2014. The trip, including travel days, will be approximately 10-12 days. Currently, we are not sure if the polio immunization exercises will be February 16 - 18 or February 23 - 25. The Indian Department of Health is expected to make this decision shortly. Last year, the final February dates were decided by the government in late November and we announced the trip in mid-December

2. Our trip will include hotel accommodations, all transfers, most meals, Rotary meetings and events, project site visits, interaction with local Rotarians, attending the Polio Summit and at least two days dedicated to in-field Rotary immunizations. We will also visit the Taj Mahal, Jaipur and other significant and popular tourists sights in Delhi. Last year, the trip cost approximately \$2400 per person, based on double occupancy. Additionally, the traveler will need to purchase roundtrip airfare and the cost of securing an Indian visa. Many tour members have used frequent flier mileage to secure their air tickets, but for those who purchased their tickets, airfares have been as low as

\$1,250 from many U.S. cities. We can help our members secure their air reservations and tickets, if needed.

3. This year's trip will be unique as we expect to include participation in a Polio Summit. This Summit is being planned by Senior Indian Rotary leaders and the Indian government to recognize and celebrate three years without a case of polio in India. This accomplishment will allow the World Health Organization to designate India as a polio free nation. We expect that this will be an extraordinary event to attend.

4. We have been organizing these trips since 1998, and have taken almost 900 Rotarians, family and friends on these trips. This program will be the 20th such trip we have organized; the sixth to India.

5. Last year, we announced this trip at 5:00 p.m. on a Thursday, and the trip was sold out, with a waiting list by 12:00 p.m. on the following Monday. We expect that this trip will sell out just as fast.

6. If some is interested in joining this trip, this is what they should do to be prepare for this trip:

a. Make sure they have a passport that is valid until AT LEAST August 31, 2014. They SHOULD NOT attempt to secure an Indian visa. They will need instructions and a letter of invitation. We will facilitate that process when they are confirmed on the trip.

b. Make sure their travel vaccinations are up to date.

c. We will send you another e-mail when this trip is ready for membership. We will also post it on our web site – (www.howardtours.net). We will also post an announcement on our Facebook page (http://www.facebook.com/ howardtours). If they "like" Howard Tours, they will receive a notice as soon as the trip is announced.

d. After the announcement is made, we will confirm people on the group first come, first served based on when we receive their completed application that will be a part of the announcement. Please rest assured, we will announce this program as soon as we have received the firm dates from the Indian Government and we have secured all reservations and reservations for the trip so that you have confidence in the cost of travel and the program. We look forward to having members from your District join us.

## VTT Grants Model Offering

This is the first year that our district will be eligible to participate in one of Rotary's new grant models, the Vocational Training Team (VTT). To some extent these grants have replaced the old Group Study Exchanges (GSE) that District 6630 has been active in for many years. The VTT not only is an exchange of participants from culture to culture, but also involves the sharing of training in vocations related to Rotary's six areas of focus.

District Governor Bob Johnson has been anxious for our district to begin one of these VTT projects and feels that partnering with an existing and established organization would be the best way to begin a successful project. We have chosen Gift of Life of Northeast Ohio to partner with in an exchange of hospital personnel from St. Damien's hospital in Port au Prince Haiti. Gift of Life hopes to establish St. Damiens and affiliates in Haiti as the hospitals that will perform child heart surgeries. Some minor surgeries are performed there now, but the more complex cases still have to be brought here to Akron for treatment. This has been difficult logistically and very expensive. The training for doctors and much of the support staff for these surgeries will be done both at Akron Children's Hospital and by a team from Akron, going to St. Damiens. When this training is completed almost all of the surgeries will be done in Haiti at much less cost to Gift of Life and the patients and their families.

The Rotary Club of Chagrin Valley is the international partner for this project. A Rotary club in Port-au-Prince has been chosen as the host club in Haiti and is anxious to work with us. The necessary club funds for the VTT exchange are \$20,000. To date, about \$8500.00 has been pledged. The RC of Chagrin Valley, Governor Bob, Ken Fogle, a Chagrin Rotarian and officer of Gift of Life, and me Larry Lallo from the Brunswick club who is managing the grant application are asking for clubs in our district to step up and be part of this historic and important effort. We are asking for pledges of any amount (actual cash due approximately in February or March) be sent in e-mail form to me, Larry Lallo at the contact below. With the experience and knowledge of Gift of Life and with the generous and humanitarian nature of our fellow Rotarians, we can make our first VTT project a complete and overwhelming success by: Engaging Rotary / Changing Lives.

### More on VTT

Here is another great opportunity for clubs in District 6630 to step up and fulfill their International Service commitment by contributing funds and being a partner in the districts first Vocational Training Team project. This VTT will soon be underway to bring personnel from St. Damien's Hospital in Port au Prince Haiti to the Akron Children's Hospital for training in surgery and support for young children with heart defects. As it stands now, in 2013, children born with heart defects have no chance of survival in Haiti because there currently is no facility there that can do the surgeries that would save them. A precious few have been brought here at great expense by Gift of Life Northeast Ohio for treatment. Gift of Life will partner with Rotary District 6630 to train Haitian doctor's and support staff here in our own community of Akron, OH, to return them to Haiti to perform the surgeries there. This will drastically reduce the cost of bringing the children here, and allow them to get their life saving operations in their home country.

Please discus this opportunity with your club. Any amount of contribution will be gladly accepted and, again, will qualify as your club's International Service for the 2013/2014 Rotary year. Please contact District Governor Bob Johnson if you wish to take part. We just need pledges at this time and will probably need the actual funds around the end of February. The attached forms are provided for the use of any club in District 6630 desiring to recommend a candidate to the Nominating Committee for District Governor for the year 2016-2017.

No club should feel obligated to do so, but any suggestion to the Nominating Committee must be submitted on using the attached official suggestion form and include the 2013 District Governor Nominee Information form.

. A suggested candidate must meet the qualifications in article 15 section 15.070 of the Rotary International Bylaws (2013 Manual of Procedure). These qualifications include:

1) Be a Rotarian in good standing of an active Club in our District

- Have served a full year as Club President or have served a full term (at least six months) as Charter President of a new Club from the date of charter to June 30.
- Be willing to fulfill the duties of and responsibilities of the office of Governor, demonstrating commitment and ability, both physical and otherwise.
- At the time of taking office as Governor, must have attended the International Assembly (to be held in January, 2016) and have been a member of one or more Rotary clubs for at least seven (7) years.

Any member of the 2013-2014 Nominating Committee is not eligible to be considered during this Rotary year.

The attached forms, signed by the candidate and club secretary must reach the Nominating Committee Chair, PDG Julie West, no later than February 15, 2014 via fax at 216-371-9233, or via mail at 2774 Euclid Heights Blvd., Cleveland Heights, OH 44106.

As provided in the Rotary International Bylaws campaigning for the office is not permitted. Brochures, litterature, letters or any form of communication promoting a candidate are not to be distributed or circulate by a candidate or others on the candidate's behalf. The bylaws further provide that under certain circumstances the Rotary International Board may disqualify a candidate from election who violates the provision prohibiting campaigning for the position.

The new Interact Club at Berea-Midpark High School has gotten off to a fast start with 18 members. Many of them attended Berea Rotary's meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 26 to tell us of their plans. President Matt Lombardi presented them with their pins and official certificates and administered the oaths of office to the officers.

Interact co-president is Marlon Robertson, one of our RYLA campers this summer. "I see Interact as a great opportunity to make a difference in the community," he said. "We've done a lot of brainstorming to make decisions on what we want to do." One of the advantages of Interact, he said, is that it is student-run.

Berea Rotary's short-term exchange student Claudia Sladick is Interact secretary. She said the club's first project is a Giving Tree to be placed in the school cafeteria. The tree will contain tags with gift suggestions for students at Guidestone, a residential counseling agency for troubled youth. BMHS students and staff are invited to donate the gifts, which will be delivered by Interact for Christmas. The club also plans a New Year's Resolution display where students can list what they'll do in 2014 to improve themselves or the community.

Korinna Mueller, our exchange student from Germany, serves as Interact treasurer. She is in charge of the international project, which will revolve around Valentine's Day. A bridge in Cologne, Germany, is decorated with more than 40,000 padlocks containing messages from visitors. The Berea-Midpark Interactors will work with the Interact Club in Cologne to sell the padlocks here and ship them to Germany. The locks can be engraved with names and short messages.

Co-President Monica Moody, also a RYLA camper, says Interact plans to work with other clubs at the school, including Key Club, to sponsor a Dodgeball Tournament. Proceeds would benefit the Eliminate Project, a campaign to fight maternal and neonatal tetanus.

The Interactors also will expand Berea Rotary's ink cartridge recycling program by placing a collection bin at the high school.

Berea Rotary President Matt Lombardi said there are 14,000 Interact Clubs in 139 countries. Their goal is to develop leadership skills while providing fun and meaningful service to the community.

Club faculty adviser is Chris Reynolds, who teaches French at the school. Matt Lombardi and Jeremy Rexroad are coadvisers.

### A Letter From an Inbound Youth Exchange Student

#### Dear Rotarians,

I want to start by saying Thank You. Without your help I wouldn't be where I am right now. Although I'm just 1 kid out of the hundreds you have assisted on sending abroad, you all will always be the people who helped change my life. I often think about how different my life would have been had I not left just 3 short months ago, and how happy I am that I left the States. Of course my trip has been bumpy, but I always knew you all would do your best to help me. Knowing I had the support of my new friends, family, and Rotarians meant a lot to me.

I remember my first day like it was yesterday. My journey started off with me almost missing my 1st airplane due to a mix up of gates. Thankfully I got to my plane on time and I made it to Chicago where I met up with other exchange students coming to South Korea too. I knew that by stepping on each airplane I was further giving up my version of "comfortable" and "normal" for the unknown. Nothing was a guarantee. I stepped on each airplane with my back straight and all the confidence I had. I spent the 14 hour plane ride talking with the other exchange students; we compared our different "correct" versions of saying each word, and sleeping. Once we arrived in Seoul we took a few extra minutes to say our goodbyes to each other, knowing once we walked out of the terminal we would be instantly separated. My host family treated me to a large feast at their daughter's favorite restaurant my first night. It all tasted delicious.

My first month was spent settling in. I started school on my 3rd day in Korea. The first day of school was such a rush. I barely left my desk because during each class break people would crowd around my desk to talk with me. Some of my teachers couldn't recognize that I was an exchange student. According to Koreans I have the perfect balance of Asian and Foreign facial features that makes my face the type of face people have plastic surgery for. I spent as much time as I could with my school friends so I wouldn't think about home, and it worked.

My Korean has improved immensely that by my 2nd month in Korea I could spit out a few sentences in Korean. By this time I finally got the opportunity to meet other exchange students in South Korea. It was so weird that after being in Korea for almost 2 months I met other people who felt exactly what I was feeling. Other people who I could talk with about the difficulties of this confusing culture, and try our best to "de-puzzle" the culture.

Now that I have hit 3 months in South Korea I can say I am proud of myself. I can feel myself changing and growing. I look forward to the rest of my exchange. I have been able to visit so many places in Seoul and experience the city. I feel like a native here, I have my favorite places and coffee shops to go to.

Though the thought of living in another country has never fully

hit me yet, I do sometimes get feelings of "what am I doing". I remind myself I am doing something important, I'm living. Living away from home, with another family. As much as I try to live as if I'm never leaving the thought of my inevitable return is always lodged in the back of my mind. I try my best to live in the moment and forget about the bad. I've made tons of memories with my new friends and made unbreakable bonds with many of them. I'm okay with the fact that I'm missing my American Senior Year, because I couldn't imagine a better Senior Year than this.

### Rotary District 6630 Gift of Life North East Ohio sponsors 2 surgical training teams in November... one to Kenya and one to Haiti

The Gift of Life North East Ohio sponsored medical team into Tenwek Hospital Kenya arrived in the first

week of November and completed their mission on November 10<sup>th</sup>. The children's heart surgery team was made up of members from Vanderbilt University, University of Mississippi, University of Maine, Mayo Clinic and was led by Knoxville pediatric cardiologist Dr. Michael Liske. The team performed 9 open heart surgeries and 6 catheter procedures. All surgeries were successful and each child was off ventilation within 12 hours.

The team focused on training the 15 person Kenyan surgical team on all aspects of Risk Categories 1 and 2 for children's open heart surgery with a goal to make the Tenwek team independent on future surgeries for kids as small as 25 kg.

12 year old lan pictured "thumbs up" is near the top of his class in school and wants to doctor when he grows up. Through Rotary District 6630's Gift of Life North East Ohio and this incredible training team, lan is on his way.



The second training team is still in Port au Prince, Haiti. Gift of Life NEO and Gift of life Manhasset Long Island have joined together for another surgical team into Haiti. This team is a result of a partnership



with Akron Children's hospital St. Damien's Children's Hospital in Haiti. Dr.'s Kempf and Bockoven from Akron have conducted Echo Screening of children at St. Damien's and the surgical team from New York have performed open heart surgery in nearby Clinique Lambert. So far 5 kids from St. Damien's screening list have received open heart surgery and are recovering. 12 year old Saviola and Gift of Life International Director Rob Raylman with his family just before his surgery. Two children are expected to return at the end of the month with Dr.'s Kemp and Bockoven for open heart surgeries at Akron Children's. More to come on this as we learn who is coming and when!

Rotary District 6630 Gift of life NEO is working with Port au Prince Rotary Kado Lavi (Gift of Life in Creole) to put together both District's first Rotary Vocational Training Team grant to bring 6 members of the St. Damien's Children's Hospital to Akron Children's hospital in the Spring of 2014 for 6 weeks of skill development. Our goal is establishing sustainable congenital heart health for Children in Haiti. More to come on Vocational Training Team and how your club can get involved as the grant develops.

## Suggestions For Presidents-Elect

Many Rotary Clubs spend a lot of time talking about member retention. This can be, and should be, well worth the time invested.

Jack Jacobs, past President of the Rotary Club of Ojai, in District 5240, recently authored an article on "Improving Your Club Programs". Most of us can agree that consistently excellent programs will improve meeting attendance and member retention. Take a minute to consider the plan he outlines.

Jack suggests that the path of least resistance is to obtain speakers from local acquaintances. He goes on to suggest that this practice restricts you to the easiest, not necessarily the best programs.

So how can we do better? The suggestion is to appoint your program

committee early in your planning year (about now would be good).

Three to five members, depending upon club size, is a good way to go. These people should have widely varying interests, be reliable,

and imaginative. The Committee's goal is to establish the Rotary year's program for 2014-2015 before June 30, 2014.

The key to success is 4-5 brain-storming sessions which the entire committee is expected to attend. Each committee member brings new ideas for program use. Record all suggestions, even the most bizarre! Although the suggestion of one member may not be realizable, the idea may trigger one that is attainable in the mind of another. The committee should come up with a list of 100 or so program ideas, from which you choose about 30. The " brain storming" sessions should expand the vision of possibilities for each member.

At the first meeting, have each committee member pick two different clubs from the District Directory and obtain a list of the best programs form that club's Program Chairs. Committee Chairs should watch for

program ideas in newspapers, in the programs sponsored by other clubs, and also in a questionnaire completed by club members. You, as President-Elect, should mark out all dates reserved for activities that will not involve a speaker. At the last brainstorming meeting, hopefully by the last week in April, make a listing of the top 50 potential programs. Appoint a Committee member to organize the contacts and assign specific contacts to each member. By making these contacts well in advance, you offer appearance date flexibility to the speaker and increase your chances of securing the program desired.

When all programs have been booked, and a list of short notice alternatives prepared (you probably have some new members who can provide bios on request or members who can talk with minimum notice), publish your programs to local and regional news media , near-by Rotary Clubs, the Chamber of Commerce, etc. Use the social networking outlets such as Facebook to showcase your programs. Make sure that the speaker's name is emphasized and the title of the program adds "sizzle" to your advertising.

A few dos and don'ts-

Do not be afraid to book controversial topics but make certain that they are handled correctly.

Have speakers from charitable organizations tell their story but caution them not to solicit donations.

Book programs supportive of the RI theme of the month. Schedule them for that month.

Be sure to follow up all presentations with written "thank you" notes.

A small gift for each speaker is also appropriate.

Arrange for media coverage for your speaker presentations and

summarize their remarks in the social media.

When you are able to accomplish the above, your year as President is on the road to being a successful one.

## District Strategic Plan Update

Beginning last Rotary year, a team of Rotarians led by Chair Bob Meyer (Fairlawn) has been working on a Strategic Plan for our District. Among the objectives of this process was to seek input of a sampling of Rotarians District-wide. That was accomplished by sending a survey to each of the Club Presidents and asking them to have one new member and one longerterm member complete the survey. The survey questions were grouped into four categories: the VALUE of Rotary to them and those it serves; the ASSETS that give life to the organization and how they can be reinforced; the TRENDS that will affect Rotary over the next 3 years; and their wishes for the FUTURE of our District.

The survey responses, as well as input from Committee members were used to develop four Areas of Focus for the Strategic Plan:

- Increasing Cooperation and Collaboration of Clubs and the District
- Energizing Membership Development and Retention
- Projecting a Refreshed Rotary Image
- Creating Greater Continuity for District Operations

The next step was to develop SMART (specific, measurable, attainable, realistic, and timely) goals for each of these areas of focus. ## District 6630 Loses 337 Members Over Last 10 Years

The July 1, 2013, club membership numbers are available. In 2004, our clubs reported 2456 members; in 2013, this number was 2119, a decline of 337 members or 13.7 per cent.

The District's 54 clubs are organized into 11 clusters, each with an assigned Assistant Governor. The members reported in the July 1, 2013 SARs, by cluster, are as follows:

The Cuyahoga County Southwest Cluster-Rotary Clubs of Berea, North Royalton-Broadview Heights, Parma and Strongsville- was the only one to achieve a net member increase over the 10 year measurement period. Nevertheless, the following individual clubs registered an increase in membership over the same 10 years-Aurora, plus 9 Chardon, plus 1 Chagrin Highlands, plus 2 Cleveland East, plus 1 Conneaut, plus 14 Kent, plus 4 Hudson Clocktower, plus 15 Mentor, plus 6 Shaker Heights, plus 3 Strongsville, plus 29 Tallmadge, plus 14 West Shore, plus 4

These 12 clubs are to be congratulated for fighting off the membership malaise affecting our District, and many other Districts in the USA.

Another worrisome aspect of the membership picture is the number of clubs with 20 or fewer members-15. A generally accepted maxim is that a Rotary club needs 20 or more members to function as an effective organization in Rotary's "Service Above Self" theme. If club membership is below 20, membership growth needs attention as a top priority.

Several months ago, a blueprint for membership growth was published in this newsletter. The plan was developed by the Rotary club of Conneaut, which grew from 38 members to 52 members over the past 10 years.

This growth was not luck, this growth was not achieved by ignoring the follow up needed to retain newly inducted members, nor did it occur without a lot of focus by club membership and leadership.

The "Conneaut success story" includes three key elements-the use of club Presidents, past, present, and "to be" to develop a membership growth strategy with continuity, not a one year "shot in the arm"; the identification of desirable future member prospects and the formulation of action plans to procure their membership applications; and attention to the nourishment and development of active involved new members. All too often, the last item is neglected by "shot in the arm "strategies.

Rotary's recent history in the USA features modest success in recruiting new members, and disturbing failure in retaining them. According to RI statistics, approximately 1/3 of new members coming in the front door walk through the back door in 3 years or less. Too many of these losses are our responsibility, not the result of death, transfer, new job, etc. The RC of Conneaut reviews the involvement of all members on a periodic basis. Members who are not active are identified and a Rotarian assigned to become involved with a non-active member. Since new members join for a variety of reasons, learning and catering to those reasons pays big dividends. In short, the shortcoming we casually assign to the new member may be a manifestation of our disinterest and follow up.

If our district is to reverse the membership loss of the last 10 years, we need to accept the fact that membership growth is not something that will "just happen" but something that requires a continuity to recruitment strategies, and a serious effort to identify new member prospects and develop a plan to recruit them. Once inducted, new members become a "precious commodity". Shower them with opportunities to learn about Rotary, to enjoy Rotary fellowship, and to become involved with worthwhile activities that appeal to their interests. Don't allow new inductees to get away because we aren't responsive their desires to make a difference.

- **Creates transparency:** All club members can see club goals. The incoming and current club president, secretary, executive secretary, treasurer, Foundation chair, and membership chair can add and edit goals and achievements for their club.
- Showcases important work Rotary clubs do worldwide: Allows Rotarians a vehicle to document details of the millions of service projects they undertake, including number of volunteers and volunteer hours, a list of in-kind donations, and cash contributions.

Sign up today for your own member profile on rotary.org/myrotary and encourage your clubs to do the same. By logging in to My Rotary and clicking on My Club Snapshot, any club member can see how many Rotary Club Central goals the club has already set.

Every club that sets at least 15 goals or more in Rotary Club Central by 15 March 2014 will receive an award. Actual certificates for all award winning clubs will be printed and sent to District Governors in early May. You are then asked to distribute these to the clubs in your district in recognition of their achievement and promotion of Rotary Club Central.
