District Four Way Test Speech Contest 2016

ANNOUNCEMENT: The planning for Rotary District 6630 annual 4 Way Test Speech competition 2016 is now underway! The event is one of the most popular Rotary events of the year. Each year, approximately 30 participants compete for cash prizes by composing a four to seven minute speech using our 4 Way Test. All contestants must be accompanied by at

least one Rotarian from the sponsoring club to be eligible to win. No exception!

DATES, TIME and LOCA-

TION: The date has been set for Saturday April 2nd 2016. The event will be held at the

Aurora High School in Aurora, Ohio. All current information can be found on the district's web site under the 4 Way Test icon at the top of the home page. The event generally ends by 1:30 p.m. (see registration info below). Parking for the event will be in the front of the school. There will be signage to help direct you from the street into the school parking lot.

ELIGIBILITY: This event is open to all high school aged students freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors. Please note that the event also includes all home schooled students and extra effort must be made to include these students.

Also, on a separate note all speeches must be original in content! There will be no exceptions to this rule and any speeches that have been copied from previous years will be disqualified immediately. Specific topics sometimes seem to reoccur but this is different from a speech that is copied word for word or has similar content and structure.

WHO: Each club should have a committee or person designated to run the Four-Way Test Speech Contest. Please forward this information to the appropriate person

in your club. If you do not currently have a local contest, more detailed information, suggestions and rules will be available. The District Chair of District 6630 will assist you in setting up a local contest, if needed.

PARTICIPANTS: High School students are eligible to participate. Those participating in the Ethics seminar or Interact Clubs are ideal candidates. The Four-Way Test Speech contest is an ideal way to increase your community's positive view of Rotary and introduce the young people of your community to Rotary.

REGISTRATION: The doors to the school will open at 8 a.m. However, registration will begin at 8:10 a.m. Registration forms will be handed out at the doors upon entry. There will be several tables available for the students to fill out the forms. Two lines will be designated for the students A-M and N-Z. All students and their Rotarian chaperones will complete the registration process and each Rotarian will be responsible to pay for their student as well as themselves and any other Rotarians from their respective clubs. All family members and friends will have to pay for themselves at full price.

PRIZES As in the past we have a total of five cash prizes to award to the top contestants. 1st Place will receive \$750.00, 2nd place \$650.00 and 3rd place \$550.00. Two honorable mention awards will each receive

\$250.00 dollars.

Today is my official 100th day in Belgium! I can't believe I've already lived a third of my exchange. Time is passing so quickly!

This month was quite interesting with the terrorist attacks. At the beginning of the



month I traveled to Paris with one of Rotary's organized trips and not even two weeks later I came home one day to find there had been a series of terrorist attacks on the city, some in areas not far from where we'd toured. Soon Brussels was put on the highest alert for an attack and all underground public transportation was closed. Even school was closed for a few days. It sounds very ominous in words, but in actuality, life generally commenced as normal. Aside from the presence of military personal around Centre Ville and some metro/train stations (not to mention all of the news vans), it was impossible to tell that the city was in "lockdown." There's still some higher security, but everything is generally back to normal now and thank goodness everyone stayed safe.

Even still, I was able to travel a lot this month. I went to London with Rotary and, this past weekend, I was lucky enough to go to Paris again with my friend's Rotary Club to do some volun-

teering. But there was plenty of time to tour the city as well and it was amazing! One of the members of her Rotary club gave us an amazing walking tour of Paris. I loved it almost better than my first time because this time we actually walked around the streets and saw more of the Parisian life. Paris is so beautiful, I am absolutely in love with the city!



Around this time of the year, a lot of the "oldies" (exchange students who arrived in January) are leaving. I know I still have over half my exchange left, but I can't help but see the time when I leave and I already feel sad for it. I am so in love with Brussels and Belgium and Europe and I can't imagine having to leave it all behind sometime.

Next week I have exams for school and then it's winter break!! They have three weeks of break here rather than just two and I'm super duper excited!! I hope to travel all around Belgium and see all of the Christmas joy! Many cities arrange cute winter wonderlands (we ran into one in Paris last weekend actually, it was right on the Champs-Elysees and it was so cute) and I'd love to see them! Also, quick side note, it's generally 55°F right now which is really throwing me off. I'm used to very cold Decembers and here I am going to school in a basic Spring jacket!



Two Service Organizations join together to celebrate the Holiday Season



Shredding = Recycling

In May, Berea Rotary conducted its annual Shred Fest with a new vendor – All Ohio Secure Shred, which shredded 9,815 pounds of documents. All that paper was recycled into paper towels, napkins and tissues, said Kevin Moore, CEO of All Ohio Secure Shred.

Moore told Berea Rotarians on Tuesday, Dec. 8 that his mobile units can shred around 5,000 pounds of paper per hour. The trucks hold 10,000 pounds, so the Rotary Shred Fest was pretty much at capacity. There is a small TV screen on the side of the truck where the process can be monitored. The paper, including magazines, newspapers, documents, fliers, etc., is shredded, baled and then sold to paper mills in Wisconsin and Kentucky. Moore said his company also can shred hard drives.

The shredding industry began in Toronto, Ont., Canada, and most of the mobile shredding vehicles are manufactured there, Moore said. It is a rapidly growing industry with more than 2,400 shredding companies in the U.S. Most, like All Ohio Secure Shred, are locally owned. Moore's company is based in Richfield and services companies and organizations throughout Ohio.

Secure Shred is NAID certified, which means employees undergo background checks and random drug tests and the plant and equipment is inspected and approved.

Shredding is important on two levels, Moore said. It keeps waste out of landfills and it can prevent identity theft.

The next Berea Rotary Shred Fest is set for May 21, 2016.

Jack Frost Festival

Fighting Polio & Terrorists in Nigeria

For Aisha Mustapha fighting polio in her home country of Nigeria isn't just about finding volunteers or trekking to remote areas to administer the vaccine to children; it's about dealing with Boko Haram, an extreme band of Muslim terrorists that plague the northern part of the country.

Last year, 100 Polio Plus volunteers were murdered in Nigeria. So far this year, the total is zero, thanks Aisha says to a new national government determined to eradicate polio and to end the terrorists' reign.

In fact, President Buhari administered the polio vaccine to his own granddaughter. "He gained the trust of the people," Aisha said.

Aisha, a first-year medical student at Case Western Reserve University, is studying with Dr. Ed White, a Berea Rotarian. Aisha's father, a physician, is a Rotarian and vice chair of the Polio Plus campaign in Nigeria. He works closely with Tunji

Funsho, the chair, who was featured in the November issue of the Rotarian magazine. The Nigerian Polio Plus office provided information for the power-point Aisha presented to Berea Rotary on Tuesday, Dec. 1.

Nigeria has had no new cases of polio for a year, Aisha said. The challenge is to reach those portions of northern Nigeria where most polio cases are found and where Boko Haram is a threat, Aisha said. One of the main factors in the success of the polio program is the establishment of Emergency Operations Centers, she said. These are well-organized units throughout the country that supervise volunteers and the vaccination programs locally. Another factor has been educating the population about the importance of vaccination. Especially in the north, "there is a cultural misconception about western medicine," Aisha said.

The EOCs have worked so well, so quickly that Aisha says she hopes the format will be adopted in Pakistan and Afghanistan, the only remaining countries where polio is still endemic. "This is not a sprint; it's a marathon," Aisha said. Eradicating polio now is just one hurdle. The country must continue to vaccinate so that the disease does not reappear.

Nigeria has a history of attacking health issues head-on. When the ebola outbreak hit in 2014, Nigeria was the first country to effectively control Cont'd on pg. 12

and eliminate it.

With a 182 million people, Nigeria is the most populous country in Africa. Its economy is also the most robust. With the support of the national government, making sure Nigeria remains polio-free is a reality, Aisha said.

At the same time, "Nothing would have been possible without Rotary," she said. "They raised funds, offered volunteers and publicized awareness."

One of those volunteers was Stan Socha of Brunswick Rotary, who has made two trips to Nigeria to help distribute the vaccine. The father of Berea Rotarian Ann Socha, Stan also has made trips to India,

"The whole world is only a plane ride away from polio," Aisha said. With the interconnectedness of countries and people, it takes but one person with an active polio virus to bring the disease to another location. Such was the case with the recent ebola outbreak.

"We must continue to immunize," Aisha

Her personal goal is to complete her medical education here and then bring those skills back home to Nigeria. "I want to make my country a better place," she said.

Local Rotarians Return From Chinandega, Nicaragua

On December 2nd, 3 Rotarians left to help distribute Shoe Boxes to the children living in and around the garbage Dump in Chinandega, Nicaragua. Rotarians from District 6630 included Bob Calsin of the RC of Lakewood/Rocky River Sunrise, Stan Socha of the RC of Bdrunswick and PDG Jack Young of the RC of Conneaut spent this past week in Nicaragua to complete the process of Distributing Shoe Boxes that were supported by Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and Friends of Rotary in District 6630.



This annual trip included 22 Rotarians and Friends from Ohio, Michigan, Iowa, North Carolina and Texas. In addition we presented Shoe Boxes to several schools in the area along with a small village name Rotary Village. Jack indicated we have come a long way since his first trip to Nicaragua in December of 2006, but still have a long way to go to eliminate the extreme poverty and educating the children to obtain a higher level of education.



This entire process was started by the Rotarians in Texas headed by Frank Huezo and Jim Kite who met Father Marco Dessey of Chinandega. Over the years, Rotary has supported the schools in and around the Dump with a Christmas Box for the Children, started a trade School in

Chinandega. The school offers skills in Woodwork, metal working, sewing, hospitality service, making candy and cojuputer/photography. Therefore, the Betania Trade School offers hope to the children to provide an opportunity to live a better and productive life.



In addition, from the children of the Dump, we now have over 20 children who are in or who graduated from college. One of the first children who was found on the Dump by Father Dessey is Maria Jose who within the past month has received her MBA degree in Nicaragua.

In addition to the Shoe Boxes and school supplies that our district we have been responsible over the past nine years: medical items, a fire truck, several ambulances, welding equipment, jaws of life, fire



fighting equipment, medial supplies and equipment, school supplies, jaws of life, fire fighting equipment and many other usable good items that we just discard in the U. S. This has amounted to over \$650,000 of valued items. According to Jack, we are looking a how used heart pacemakers can be used to extend the lives of people in Nicaragua. (More information on this project will follow.)

Jack, who is on the Board of Directors for the International American Nicaragua

Hope and Relief Foundation indicates that there will be modifications to the timing of the actual trip next year to meet the challenges of the shipping challenges



in getting the items to Nicaragua. More information will follow regarding the timing of obtaining items, etc. and will be communicated to all Rotary Clubs. Special thank you to those going on the trip this year and to those who



support this effort in making the lives of these children a little more meaningful during the holiday season. (A special

On Saturday morning over 75 Rotarians gathered at Rockefeller Plaza for The Today Show. There is no better way to meet Rotarians than standing outside at 6AM waiting in line to find a prime location on the plaza. Wearing aprons featuring Rotary's End Polio Campaign, we did get a few minutes on-air to highlight this year's achievement.

Then off to United Nations Plaza for outstanding presentations from, K.R. Ravindran, Rotary International President; Lakshmi Puri Asst Secretary and acting head, deputy executive director, UN Women; and Joseph Laureni, Rotary representative to the UN. Jeffrey Kluger, Time magazine Editor-at-large, wrote the book Jonas Salk and the Conquest of Polio. With his long time interest in our campaign, he shared today's numbers of Polio being in only two countries.

The Rotary Global Women of Action for 2015 stories each were interesting and I am in awe of how one person, backed by the Rotary force can make such a difference.

I realized I had a lot to discover about our

history with the United Nations. I presented to the Strongsville Rotary Club how awesome it was to meet all these great people and learn of their individual and club achievements. Many people shared how their clubs are challenged with similar obstacles: growing membership, volume or lack of volume of club activities, and finding host families for exchange students. Here is some history-

The UN charter is written very similarly to the 4 way test. The Charter is divided into 2 sets 4 statements:

CHARTER OF THE UNITED NATIONS

WE THE PEOPLES OF THE UNITED NATIONS DETERMINED

to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind, and

to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men and women and of nations large and small, and

to establish conditions under which justice and respect for the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of international law can be maintained, and

to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom,

AND FOR THESE ENDS

to practice tolerance and live together in peace with one another as good neighbors, and

to unite our strength to maintain international peace and security, and

to ensure, by the acceptance of principles and the institution of methods, that armed force shall not be used, save in the common interest, and

to employ international machinery for the promotion of the economic and social advancement of all peoples,

HAVE RESOLVED TO COMBINE OUR EFFORTSTO ACCOMPLISH

THESE AIMS.

Rotary's relationship with the United Nations dates back to 1945 when 49 Rotary members acted as delegates, advisors and consultants at the United Nations Charter Conference.

Delegations of Rotary members helped draft the UN Charter in San Francisco in 1945 and gave the organization strong support during its early years, until the Cold War turned it into an ideological battleground. Rotary's participation decreased over the following decades in keeping with its policy against political involvement.

The spark that restored Rotary's interest in the UN was the launch of the campaign to eradicate polio in 1985, and the ensuing partnership with the World Health Organization and UNICEF. Rotary and the UN have been close partners ever since, a relationship that's apparent through PolioPlus and work with UN agencies.

Rotary's Board of Directors has gradually expanded the representative network to include UN specialized agencies head-quartered in Geneva, Vienna, and Paris.

Representatives are also linked to other major international groups, including the World Food Program, the Organization of African Unity, and the Commonwealth of Nations. The network today includes 30 Rotary leaders, appointed by the RI president, who communicate Rotary's priorities on a regular basis to these various bodies.

In 2013, the Board added two youth representatives to the UN, and appointed former Rotary General Secretary Ed Futa to serve as dean, in charge of setting the direction and strategy for Rotary's outreach in the international community.

Headlines:

In 2015, wild poliovirus transmission is at the lowest levels ever, with fewer cases reported from fewer areas of fewer countries than ever before. In 2015, 57 wild poliovirus cases have been reported from two countries (Pakistan and Afghanistan), compared to 305 cases from nine countries during the same period in 2014.

On November 27 – 29, heads of governments, staff and experts from 53 commonwealth nations will gather in Malta to discuss shared global priorities at the biennial Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM). Commonwealth leadership on polio has brought the disease within touching distance of eradication. Now is the time to reaffirm support and wipe the disease off the face of the earth. Sustained political and financial commitment from all countries remain critical to finishing the job to eradicate polio for good.

Afghanistan: No new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases were reported in the past week. The most recent case had onset of paralysis on 27 October, from Nangarhar. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2015 remains 16.

Pakistan: One new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) case was reported in the past week, with onset of paralysis on 1 November. It is the most recent WPV1 case in the country, from Kamari town, Karachi, Sindh. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2015 is now 41.
