SUCCESSFUL LEADERSHIP TRANSITION = CLUB SUSTAINABILITY

This is a complex time in our Rotary year. Our year is at the mid-point but we must continue to plan, lead and also shape a successful transition for those who will follow us on July 1, 2016.

As one runner finishes his/her leg of the race, they can't slow down or stumble... they

need to keep going strong while the next runner gets up to speed before they pass the baton. The first runner will continue to run a few paces with the new runner before slowing down. In the same fashion, our Rotary leaders need to finish strong and make certain the next runner is at full speed before handing over the baton.



You and your teams have all worked hard — strategic succession planning builds organizational continuity and stability moving forward. Make the transition successful for those who will follow by planning, mentoring and communicating often. This applies not only to the Club President, but to all those who are in positions that will have a successor July 1st.

Leadership transitions can be a time of uncertainty in organizations. Communications play a key role in navigating the process and fundamental shifts that occur. There is no one size fits all approach, each of you will have different situations, just as the character, profile and working practices of each leader are different. However, by making sure your entire outgoing and incoming teams are on the same page, you must engage with one another to put your club in a strong position for long-term sustainability.

Aurora Welcomes K-9

AURORA WELCOMES K9 OFFICER NERO

Aurora, Ohio, January 8, 2016: Aurora Police recently welcomed its newest member to the department. Canine "Nero," a two year old German shepherd, became state certified and is now teamed up with his handler, Officer Dale Riley. Riley is a nine year veteran of the department and expressed interest in becoming a canine handler when the opportunity arose. Nero was born in Slovakia before being brought to the U.S. in March 2014. Officer Riley and Nero underwent six weeks of intense training by Excel K9 in Hiram before completing their state certifications.

Nero is trained in the following areas: narcotics, obedience, tracking, evidence search, area/building search and handler protection. He will reside with Officer Riley and his family on his off time and patrol the streets of Aurora during the afternoons.

This new Aurora program was fully funded with donations from a variety of



sources. Those sources include the Rotary Club of Aurora which held a raffle, raising a substantial portion of the funding. In addition to the Rotary funding, a \$5,000 grant was received from the Ben Roethlisberger Foundation which was announced in late December. The Aurora Vet Clinic has agreed to provide veterinary services to Nero free of charge while Pet Supplies Plus of Streetsboro will provide food free of charge. Several Aurora residents also provided donations to the program. Sutton Insurance has provided liability insurance on Nero as well.

"Aurora is very fortunate to have such an addition to its Police Department," Mayor Womer Benjamin said. "We are grateful to the donors who made the program possible. We hope you join us in welcoming Nero."

Berea Rotary presents checks to 3 pantries

The Rotary Club of Berea showed its ongoing support of local food pantries on Tuesday, Jan. 12 by presenting checks totaling \$1,500 to SCAN, Church Street Ministries and Berea Community Outreach. The funds were Berea Rotary's portion of the proceeds from Strongsville Rotary's Taste in Strongsville.

Lona Gruber of SCAN said her pantry began 15 years ago as an adjunct of Southwest General. It is now an independent agency, serving clients from Berea, Brook Park, Middleburg Heights, Strongsville, Olmsted Falls and Columbia Station.

"We serve the working poor," Gruber said. Over the holidays, SCAN provided groceries for 150 families in November and 157 in December.

Daune Jaynes is the new director of Berea Community Outreach, which is sponsored by the City of Berea. She said donations and support from organizations such as Rotary "make a huge difference." She said clients "need so much more than food." Often it's emotional support and advice on where to find a warm place to sleep. Berea Community Outreach serves 109 Berea families.

Rev. Charles Brown, interim executive director of Church Street Ministries, said his agency served 391 households from the Greater Cleveland area in December. Those families included more than 1,000 seniors, adults and children. "There is a significant need," Brown said. "Certainly all that you do with volunteering and food donations makes a difference. Your generosity is appreciated."

GIVE TO END POLIO

Membership Research and Programs

Dear Club Presidents, Club Secretaries and Club Membership Chairs,

Effective 1 April 2016, distribution of the pins and backers created for the New Member Sponsor Recognition Program to honor Rotarians who sponsor (admit) new members will be discontinued. Sponsor-ship activities will continue to be tracked. Sponsor names reported by club officers will continue to be recorded in the RI database, and clubs and districts are encouraged to continue recognizing the sponsor-ship of new members.

RECOGNITION LEVELS AND PINS:

After 29 February 2016, recognition levels such as blue, bronze, silver and gold will no longer be recorded. Distribution of recognition items will stop after all the pins and backers achieved on or before 29 February are processed. Club officers are encouraged to report sponsor information by 29 February in order to claim recognition items.

FUTURE OF SPONSORSHIP:

Responding to feedback from many Rotarians, here are some exciting changes that we are exploring:

- Referring a new member admitted to another club may be considered "sponsorship" *
- Recruiting new members to charter a new club may be considered

"sponsorship" *

- · Recruiting transferring or returning members will continue to be considered "sponsorship"
- · Honorary members may be sponsors
- · More than one sponsor may be recorded for each new member by club officers
- * Officers of the clubs where new members join will be asked to report their sponsors

FUTURE OF SPONSOR RECOGNITION:

Clubs are encouraged to present recognition items to sponsors on their own and no longer need to wait for the shipment from RI. Please contact your local licensed vendor for options: https://www.rotary.org/myrotary/en/member-center/licensed-vendors

Membership Development Award and Presidential Citations will continue to include new member sponsorship activities as achievements eligible for certificate recognition. End Polio night this year will be Friday July 29, 2016. Should be another fun time like last year. Mark your calendar!!!



Theitings Jol,

. Hillcrest can be justly proud of its achievement of excellence in attendance. We have helped create some healthy competition which has already improved the district average. Until recently, 95% would nearly always put a club in first place. In January, a 95% club was in fourth place. The number one club had 99.5% - with only one absence during the month. We were in second place with 97% in a photo finish with Burton-Middlefield at 96.5. We had five absences.

Some month soon it will require 100% to be in first place or to be tied. Since five of our members were responsible for our five absences, it is obvious that all of our members are personally committed to perfection in attendance. Some personal circumstance caused five of them to miss one meeting in January.

The single most important thing that our club can do to improve district attendance is to set an example by having 100% in March. The next most important thing to be done is to continue with 100% in April, May and June. What effect do you suppose that will have on a number of clubs that are now seriously in competition to be in first place? We now have the opportunity to take the leadership in putting our district in first place in our country as the district having the greatest improvement in attendance.

Our members are committed to perfect attendance because they have come to understand the major personal benefits which result. They understand the personal loss which they sustain when a week passes without attendance at some Rotary meeting. We are hearing more and more about the committment to teamwork in Japan which makes them tough competitors. It is significant that 15% of the Japanese clubs have 100% attendance for the entire year. No district will have a single club in first place for the year. Instead, there will be about seven clubs tied for first place in a district the size of ours.

We will easily achieve the goal suggested if we practice teamwork with our buddy. Do a little planning with your buddy to head off any personal circumstance that might cause an absence. Suppose that the only time available for Rotary attendance some week is an evening but there is a desire and responsibility to be with the wife. You could team up with another member and take the wives with you to an evening Rotary meeting. They could either attend the entire meeting or else dine by themselves and then come in for the program. Incidentally, the Heights club meets Wednesday at 6 P.M. in Diamonds at Severance Mall.

The five minute talks by our members makes all of us reluctant to miss the weekly meeting of our own club. I have regularly been attending Chardon Rotary about half of the time. Now I am strongly motivated to try to be at Hillcrest each week so that I don't miss the five minute feature of maximum interest.

Mr. Jeff Wilhite, Executive Director of Family Promise Homeless Shelter of Summit County, met with students in the Woodridge Interact Club and FCCLA Club on January 12th to discuss plans for their upcoming fundraiser, The Empty Bowl Dinner. The dinner will be held on January 29th from 5:00-7:00 pm at Woodridge High School, and proceeds will benefit Family Promise, which provides whole families that are homeless with a positive path forward. Tickets for a ceramic bowl and dinner are \$25 and tickets for dinner only are \$10. Family Promise has helped homeless families in Summit County since 2003, and last year they helped 39 families get back on track by providing shelter and classes in nutrition and financial literacy as well

as assisting with job searches. Family Promise operates entirely on private donations and volunteer support. Woodridge Interact Club and FCCLA Club members will prepare and serve the dinner on January 29th. Tickets will be sold at the door. Mr. Wilhite called these Woodridge students Ambassadors for Family Promise and their community.

News From TRC Bedford

Bedford Rotarians were entertained with a musical historic tour of Rotary through the years at their 90th Anniversary celebration, January 12, 2016, at Catered Elegance Bedford. The Rotary Club of Bedford was organized November 20, 1925 and issued a charter by Rotary International on January 12, 1926. Then, the event was celebrated with a dinner in the cafeteria of the McMyler-Interstate Company, where the Charter was presented to the Club's first president, Jasper P. Hendershot. Originally a men's service club, it is the third oldest in Cuyahoga County.

The program narrated by Dan Sutherin with musical interludes by the Marshall Griffith Trio and vocalist Barbara Knight, reviewed the decades with vignettes of the times and the Club's history. Highlights included the 1920's Crippled Children Program; the Bedford Plan – a program designed for the Industrial Arts Department of Bedford High School lat-

er successfully copied by other school districts. Community projects such as the \$10,000 construction of "Miller's Court" at Bedford High School; college scholarships to High School students, hosting foreign exchange students, Safety Town and the Dictionary Project example the many educational endeavors.

Accumulated donations of \$30,000 were given to Bedford Hospital now known as University Hospital Bedford Medical Center. The challenge of raising funds for the Polioplus program was met by over-subscribing the assigned goal by 160%. They rebuilt the deck of the historic Train Depot (Abraham Lincoln spoke here). The Club provided park benches and a new sound system for Bedford Commons and made financial contributions to the YMCA, Meals-On-Wheels, and bought equipment for the Boy Scouts.

In addition to funding local projects,

the Club continues to support Rotary International and can boast 41 Paul Harris Fellows and two District Governors: Ralph W. Bell and Steven P. Radecky.

The Rotary Club of Bedford has left a huge imprint on the community's quality of life and a legacy of many more commitments to the future. The Club continues as a viable organization supporting its many local projects as well as those of Rotary International – truly a "Gift to the World".

This year's focus is to aggressively help to reduce family instability and parent mobility in the local communities and to encourage job creation working with local businesses, school and church organizations.

Headlines:

This week India marks five years without reporting a single case of wild polio, a remarkable achievement. Today, lessons learned in India and Nigeria are being used to drive progress in the last two polio-endemic countries: Pakistan and Afghanistan.

There are three months to go until the globally synchronized switch from the trivalent to bivalent oral polio vaccine. This will be an important milestone in achieving a polio-free world.

Afghanistan No new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases were reported in the past week. The most recent case had onset of paralysis in Kunar on 19 November. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2015 remains 19, compared to 28 reported in the country in 2014.

Pakistan: One new wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) case was reported in the past week, with onset of paralysis on 2 December 2015 in Punjab province. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2015 is now 52, compared to 296 reported for 2014 by this time last year. A total of 306 cases occurred in Pakistan in 2014.

ROTARY CELEBRATES ITS BIRTHDAY FEBRUARY 23RD!

111 YEARS STRONG

Paul P. Harris, an attorney, wanted to create a professional group with the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. On 23 February 1905, Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey gathered at Loehr's office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. This was the first Rotary club meeting. They decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

Within five years clubs had formed across the country, from San Francisco to New York.

In August 1910, Rotarians held their first convention in Chicago. The 16 clubs that existed at that time united to form the National Association of Rotary Clubs.

In 1912, the name changed to International Association of Rotary Clubs to reflect the addition of clubs in other countries. The name Rotary International was adopted in 1922.

By July 1925, Rotary had grown to more than 2,000 clubs and an estimated 108,000 members on six continents.

Rotary's reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers, and a host of other luminaries to its ranks — among them author Thomas Mann, diplomat Carlos P. Romulo, and composer Jean Sibelius.

As Rotary grew, members pooled their resources and used their talents to serve their communities. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.
