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TRC of Stow-Munroe Falls Presents Life-Saving Vests

On November 5th. The Rotary Club of Stow-Munroe Falls was honored to present protective ballistic vests to Mingo and Ryot, the newest canine members of the Stow and Munroe Falls police departments. The formal presentation occurred at the Stow-Munroe Falls High School Stadium. The ballistic vests were obtained through a District 6630 matching grant. These life-saving vest help protect the police doas from aun shots, stabbings, explosives, and blunt force trauma. These vests will keep the K9s safe while keeping our communities safe.



During the presentation, Rotarian, Christina Gary, explained the idea behind obtaining theses vests. After hearing about another police K9 who passed away from injuries sustained during an apprehension, she wondered whether the Stow and Munroe Falls police departments had protective vests for their K9 officers. She assisted the help of fellow Rotarian,



and Stow Police Chief, Jeff Film, to research the need for both departments. It was discovered that Mingo from the Stow department, and Ryot from the Munroe Falls department, did not have protective vests yet. The idea was formed that the club could apply for a District 6630 matching grant to purchase these vests. Because the club services both Stow and Munroe Falls, it was a great way to provide lifesaving equipment to both communities. After months of paperwork, phone calls, and emails, Christina's idea became a reality.



Following the presentation, Mingo and Ryot, both female Belgian Malinois canines, demonstrated their narcotic detection abilities. The Rotarians, community members, and civic leaders in attendance had the opportunity to ask questions and interact with the canines and their partners in a safe and fun atmosphere. It was a great way to enjoy the sunny afternoon while making a difference in their local communities.

Interact's mission is to bring students together to initiate change, and that's exactly what District 6630's Interact clubs did at this year's Interaction. 120 volunteers united -- balloons at the ready -- on November 5th to exchange ideas, successes, and advice from one club to the next. They "Interacted."



Interaction, the annual gathering of the Interact clubs within District 6630, provided the students with the incredible opportunity to listen to several captivating speakers, brainstorm ideas, and collectively decide on a district service project. Keynote speaker Roger Cram, founder of the Secret Society of Serendipitous Service to Hal (SSSSH), inspired even Bob Oborn, District 6630 Interact Co-Chair, with his heartwarming discussion of his organization and the good it brings to the world through anonymous acts of kindness. Roger aided Chelsea Talty, advisor of the West Geauga Interact Club and planner of the event, in creating the Rotaract club at Hiram College, and graciously shared his successes with both Rotary and SSSSH.

Expanding beyond just District 6630, the Interact members gained international perspectives from ten Rotary Youth Exchange students in attendance, generating interest amongst several students to participate in both the short-term and long-term programs available. Bob Huge, Bob Heydorn, Pat Kelley, and Judy Stull delivered an incredible presentation, including a letter written by a Rotary Youth Exchange student describing the life changing nature of the experience.

While the speakers provided great context for the students and the work they are doing, the main objective of the event was to come up with a district project for the clubs to participate in and concluding at the District Conference in April. Last year, the Interact clubs successfully delivered over (#) books to inner city schools in need. This year, "Shoes for the Soul" was the overwhelming favorite of the projects suggested by the students, in which each club will collect new and lightly used shoes to bring to the District Conference and donate them to a charity. Although it is not finalized, the clubs are hoping to send this collection to children in need in a different country.

Most notable of the event was the mosh pit filled with confusion and animal noises as the students participated in a balloon activity. Each participant received a balloon and a notecard and was instructed to write a question pertaining to Interact on the notecard and to stick it in their balloon. Then, the students blew up the balloons and gathered in the middle as they played a giant game of "Don't let the Balloon Hit the Ground."

After about a minute or so, the students each popped a balloon and began to belt out the pre-written animal noise on the opposite side of the notecard in an attempt to find other students chanting the same animal noise. The students successfully found their groups and discussed the questions on the cards.



Speaking of balloons, West Geauga's Lindsey Kulp was announced as the winner of the district logo contest for the District Conference with her balloon design, winning \$100, all of which she will use to buy cans for West Geauga's food drive, we're sure.



We received amazing feedback as the event "Could not have gone better," and the Interact students are excited to touch base at the District Conference and complete this year's service project, "Shoes for the Soul." See you there!

Remembering 9/11 at the Pentagon

There are those moments in life when you will always remember where you were and what you were doing when they happened, said retired Air Force Lt. Col. Angelo Nuzzo. For one generation, it was Pearl Harbor. For another, it was the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. On Sept. 11, 2001, it was the terrorists' attack on the Twin Towers in New York City, the crashed airliner in Pennsylvania and the plane that rammed into the Pentagon, killing 184 people. Nuzzo was there.

"I was just doing my job like the 23,000 other people in the building," Nuzzo said. "It was one of the brightest, bluest skies I've ever seen. I thought 'we should be golfing."

TVs in the office were turned on as his staff saw the hijacked jetliners fly into the Twin Towers. "These things usually happen in threes," someone commented. About 20 minutes later, Nuzzo and his staff heard the explosion. The airliner had crashed into the Pentagon about 300 yards from Nuzzo's office. They hurriedly destroyed classified documents and then tried to exit the building. It wasn't easy. Normal routes were blocked and thousands of people were trying to leave at the same time. He and his staff did make it out safely. Other government workers were trapped.

The 60-year-old building had been updated with reinforced windows and doors. When fires broke out, the workers couldn't break the windows to escape.

One image will always stay with Nuzzo – the sight of the huge black plume of smoke rising from the wreckage. "I'll never forget that black cloud and the smell of jet fuel," Nuzzo said.

He and his staff went to work the very next day. "There was a war on," he said. "We had to prepare." Walking the Pentagon grounds was like walking through snow, he said. The soot was so thick. And the smell remained.

Back in 1941, the Pentagon took 16 months to build at a cost of \$13 million. In 2002, it took less than a year to fix the damage at cost of more than \$500 million.

A lasting reminder is the Pentagon memorial to those who lost their lives that day. The memorial is a series of bench-like markers. For those on the plane, the markers are pointed toward the building. For those in the Pentagon, the markers point outward. Nuzzo has visited the site in remembrance of a colleague who lost his life there. His remains were never found. Nuzzo said sitting on the bench that bears the Army major's name was comforting but like all survivors he wonders about the what if's.

Scams target older adults & young people

Sheryl Harris, director of the Cuyahoga County Department of Consumer Affairs, told Berea Rotarians on

Tuesday, Nov. 1 that most telephone and internet scams target older adults and young people in their 20s.

By far, the most scammed group is younger adults, she said. "They don't have a lot of life experience," she noted and don't know how to deal with a scam or even recognize one, especially those posted on social media. They do, however, recover comparatively quickly.

Older adults, however, are often taken for larger amounts of money and have a tougher time bouncing back, said Harris, who previously wrote the "Plain Dealing" column in the PD.

One of the most common scams is the "Grandparent Scam." A young person will call crying and claiming to be a grandchild needing money for an emergency. The grandparent is asked to by iTunes gift cards or wire money. "Some older adults have lost more than \$8,000 in such scams," Harris said.

Another common scam is a fake FBI or IRS agent calling to threaten arrest if "back taxes" aren't paid.

If the caller makes you nervous or threatens, hang up, Harris advises. One of the jobs of her office is to investigate these types of scams. In a pilot program, Harris' office is posting warning signs at Giant Eagle and Dave's Supermarkets that iTunes cards should not be purchased to pay off debts or in response to a phone call asking for funds.



ShelterBox Update

Information by Area:

Mosul: Mosul has been a strong hold of ISIS since June 2014. A coalition of Kurdish and Iraqi forces, along with support from western forces launched an offensive on October 17th. According to the UN, the offensive to re-capture the city will potentially displace an estimated 1 million people. UNHCR is planning to have 11 camps open in Iraq that can support a total of 120,000 displaced people.

Team of two in Iraqi-Kurdistan

ACTED Partnership

600 locally procured shelter kits prepositioned for distribution to new arrivals in camps;

1,000 locally procured shelter kits being purchased for distribution to new arrivals 'off-camp';

480 AMG tents to be prepositioned in Tel Afar;

1,500 AMG tents in transit for prepositioning (127 additional in Dohuk);

People in Need

250 AMG tents and Non Food Items for off-camp.

399 UN Tents with BRHA (Kurd Government)

Haiti: Hurricane Matthew Aftermath Overview: Currently 6 SRT members in country. Tents for home sites are not an option, as the government has asked us not to distribute tents to civilians, because of amount of people still living in tents following 2010 quake.

Distributing aid in partnership with Handicap International and 410 Bridge. Distributing 3000 Shelterkits (and building material if needed) to households in need of shelter.

Syria: Overview: It has been over four years since conflict broke out. More than 10 million people, almost half of Syria's population have been forced to leave their homes. Since 2011, 6.5 million people have been displaced inside Syria, an additional 4.6 million people have been forced to flee Syria.

Prepositioning 500 kits, to be distributed to displaced in far east Syria

Planning winter shelter kits for distribution in northern Syria by end of November

Partner Agency: 2000 shelter kits sent (16k+ winter packs) now in storage in Syria.

Distributions to collective centres, camps for tent replacements etc.

Cameroon and Niger: Nigerian Refugee Crisis

Overview: ShelterBox is continuing to respond to the protracted crisis in Niger & Cameroon.

Niger:

Final total 2000 boxes have now been distributed in Niger completing the initial MoU.

Further 344 boxes cleared customs in Dosso Niger for staging to Diffa. Awaiting security situation.

202 boxes from Sri Lanka have arrived in UNHRD Accra.

Cameroon:

People displaced by the Boko Haram conflict are arriving daily in Minawao camp. In order to meet the growing need for Shelter, we will have provided 1,044 tents to Minawao camp by the end of November. Additionally 223 tents are being provided to internally displaced people in Tourou.

A ShelterBox team is due to arrive in Cameroon on the 27th November to meet with our affiliates.
