

RYLA *plus* organizers partner with Easterseals Colorado to host this unique RYLA program at an ADA-compliant camp facility with trained medical and counselor staffing to support campers' special needs. Their parents often ask, "What did you do to my child in one week?" and then beam with pride over the positive changes they now see in their teenagers."



Accountability and inclusion webinar: Building Strong Intergenerational Relationships

Generational diversity is one of Rotary's competitive advantages. Few organizations span generations and build personal connections the way we do. Yet we also can find ourselves segmented by age groups and unable or unwilling to challenge our biases about people of other ages. According to a study by consulting network Deloitte, 70% of survey respondents from around the world say that leading multigenerational organizations is important or very important for their success over the next 12 to 18 months, but only 10% say they're very ready to do so.





Explore Rotary's role in the 2,000-year history of vaccination

From 430 B.C. to the present day, people's growing understanding of vaccination has changed the world. Today, vaccines protect against diseases such as diphtheria, cholera, tuberculosis, measles, polio, and more. Smallpox was declared eradicated in 1980. And in 1985, Rotary members who were inspired to add a second disease to the list of those eradicated launched the PolioPlus program to stop the spread of polio through strategic global immunization efforts. Thanks to the commitment of Rotary and our partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, wild poliovirus cases worldwide have been reduced by 99.9% since 1988, with only two countries still reporting cases — Afghanistan and Pakistan. This year, Rotary clubs and districts are leveraging their experience fighting polio and mobilizing volunteers to support COVID-19 vaccination efforts, while continuing to ensure that children around the world are vaccinated against polio. **Read more** about the history of vaccinations, including the polio vaccine.

World Immunization Week is happening now!

With World Immunization Week being celebrated 24-30 April, now is the time to remind people that #VaccinesWork. **Use Rotary's toolkit** with graphics and social media posts to raise awareness of the power that vaccines have to save lives, as shown by our progress eradicating wild poliovirus in all but two countries.

Introduce your community to a new video resource — "Rotary Inspires Leaders in Global Health" — in which global health experts discuss Rotary's achievements and leadership in the fight to end polio. **Download** and **share** the video to promote our polio eradication efforts and the importance of staying committed until all children are safe from

the disease.

Rotary International president discusses global polio situation

In a special interview with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative's PolioNews, Rotary International President Holger Knaack provides an overview of our global polio eradication efforts and the lessons that we've learned in the past year as Rotary has responded to the COVID-19 pandemic. Knaack says that strengthening health systems and advancing scientific knowledge are important factors in fighting disease. Rotary members have learned this through decades of work toward eradicating polio and are now using that knowledge to address the COVID-19 crisis. Knaack emphasizes that we are at a critical point in our goal to rid the world of polio — and it's time to fight harder than ever.

He **outlines strategies to increase public acceptance** of COVID-19 vaccination programs by correcting misinformation and countering misconceptions. For this, Kapur draws on the success of nationwide immunization campaigns that helped India become polio-free seven years ago.

You can support mothers and children

Rotary makes health care available to vulnerable mothers and children so they can live longer and grow stronger.

During Maternal and Child Health Month in April, you can get involved in these ways:

- Join the Rotary Action Group for Reproductive, Maternal and Child Health, which supports Rotary clubs and districts in planning, implementing, and co-funding projects that support maternal and child health.
- Join the Rotary Action Group for Clubfoot to support the Ponseti Method, which is an
 effective, nonsurgical treatment for children born with clubfoot.
- Look on Rotary Showcase to find out how Rotary and Rotaract clubs are bringing health care to mothers and children. You can post your club's success story or find international projects that your club can support.
- Find detailed project planning guidance for a club or district project to help mothers and children.

The 2021 Virtual Convention: Rotary Opens Opportunities is being held 12-16 June and will feature general sessions with inspiring speakers, a virtual House of Friendship, and practical breakout sessions.

Two-day preconventions will take place 10-11 June and will focus on Rotary Youth Exchange Officers, Rotaract, and intercountry committees. The theme of this year's intercountry committees preconvention is how to open opportunities for peace.



You can protect the environment

The environment will be Rotary's newest area of focus. You can get involved in these ways:

- Join the Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group or the Rotary Action Group for Endangered Species.
- Ask for help from consultants at Ashoka, a Rotary service partner, if your club or district is considering a project focused on the environment.
- Join the Environment Fellowship of Rotarians or Rotary Fellowship of Wildlifers for Conservation.
- Help The Rotary Foundation support more global grants by giving to the Environment Area of Focus Fund.
- After 1 July, apply for a grant from The Rotary Foundation to support your club or district's sustainable projects to support the environment.
