### Governor's Letter

Wow! The old adage, time flies, could not be truer. Induction was just yesterday, I mean 30 days ago.

While I feel I have been working toward this for a long time, it was over a month ago it all officially began. Lots of induction ceremonies, started my club visits and many other meetings. But what great fun!

Ray Klingensmith has challenged us to be Bigger, Better, and Bolder. To do that, goals need to be established, defined, explored, and implemented. In the next few months I hope to share some thoughts on the District's goals with all of you. I would like to have you embrace those goals and make them unique to your club.

August is membership month for all of Rotary around the world. Club members are our most important asset. They are the force that allows Rotary to carry out its many humanitarian efforts and achieve its

mission. There is more on membership in an article later in the newsletter.

It is early in the year, but I want to put a lot of emphasis on the Rotary Foundation and Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY). It is important that we all participate, no matter how much we can give. We need to improve our percentage of members in the District who give to the Rotary Foundation. For the last fiscal year, only 22% of the members

in District # 6630 were donors to the Rotary Foundation. The Foundation gives back to so many of the programs that involve the District and the Clubs that it becomes very important that the District supports the Foundation.

Some updated data through June 30, 2010 for the Foundation: Zone 29 Totals (19 Districts)... Members 32,953; 2009-10 Annual Fund \$2,350,948; Polio Plus \$1,143,961; Per Capita \$71.39. District 6630... Members 2,308; 2009-10 Annual Fund \$126,545; Polio Plus \$105,414; Per Capita \$54.83

In addition, Rotarians' End Polio Now campaign has almost accomplished its goal. The incidence of polio cases have dropped from 350,000 infections in 1985 to 342 cases for the first half of 2010. This

Was accomplished through the financial support of Rotarians, plus their willingness to travel to foreign lands to pour the two drops of vaccine in to the mouths of children during the countries National Immunization Days (NID).

Christmas in July was great fun at the Tall Ships Festival. There were 250 in attendance at the fund raiser auction for Polio Plus. Pretty warm, but the fresh air off of Lake Erie made it a nice evening. The final numbers are not complete, but we will have that for you by next month. Thanks to all of those individu-

als who helped make the event a success. We especially want to thank all of the donors of the great live and silent auction items that made it all happen.

A special thanks to the Rotarians and partners that were there when we needed them: setting up, ticket sales, registration, check out, item pick up, phone calls and especially bailing out the 1100 gallons of water that filled the tent during the morning.

This year, the GSE team will be going to Amsterdam, Netherlands for the month of March, 2011. Selection of the team and the team leader has to be completed by September 25, 2010. If you know any young professionals or business leaders who are currently employed and wish to take advantage of this opportunity to learn about the culture in Amsterdam, have them make application before September

17, 2010. See the District website or call Stan Socha at 330-225-4170.

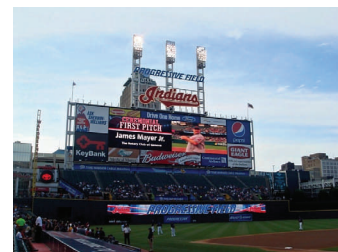

## Rotary/Shelter Box/BSA Jamboree

District 6630 PDG Jack A. Young represented Rotary and the Board of Directors of Shelter Box USA at the 100th anniversary of Scouting at the 10 day National Scouting Jamboree in Fort A. P. Hill, Virginia. During the Jamboree there were over 50,000 Boy Scouts and troop leaders attending the 100 year celebration. At the opening session this number combined with the day visitors numbered over 90,000 persons.

Jack indicated it was so refreshing to meet so many young men who really embraced the values of Scouting and Rotary. During the Jamboree Shelter Box displayed their shelter tent and other items that are sent to disaster relief areas of the world to meet the basic needs of shelter.

In Haiti alone there are over 22,000 Shelter Boxes. In addition, over 400 boxes have been delivered to Pakistan flood victims this week. In all, Shelter Box Global has responded to 13 other disasters in the world just this year and has supplied housing to over 1 million people world wide in their 10 year history. District 6630 Rotary clubs and friends of Rotary has been a strong supporter of Shelter Box.

According to Young, who has been on the Shelter Box USA board starting his 4th year, Shelter Box USA is partnering with the Boy Scouts of America which is a natural for the SB Disaster Relief organization. SB, a Global Rotary Project, was founded 10 years ago in England by Rotarian and UK retired Navy Seal, Tom Henderson." According to Young, Shelter Box Global is already using USA disaster volunteers involving scouts in the US as response team members and utilizing scouts in disaster areas to help deliver the much needed shelters..

During the Jamboree, Young and other Shelter Box members met with Bob Mazzuca, Chief Scout Executive for the United States and a Rotarian to share ideas how scouts and Shelter Box USA could formulate a strong partnership. In addition, he met many Rotarians involved in scouting and individuals at all levels of our government including one of the directors of FEMA.

Along with this Young attended a special Ro-

tary meeting at the Jamboree which was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Rappahannock in Fredricksburg, Virginia in which Bob Mazzuci was the featured speaker. The event was coordinated by the Scouting Rotarians in which Jack is a member.

One of the key note speakers at the Jamboree was the Secretary of Defense, Robert M. Gates. In addition Mr. Clarence Hill, National Commander of the American Legion and Brigadier General Peter Deluca, the Commanding General of the North Atlantic Division of U. S Army Corps of Engineers was in attendance.

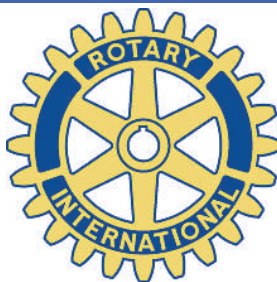
During the Jamboree, the new Jamboree site was announced. The Summit: Bechtel Family National Scout Reserve in West Virginia. The Summit is a 10,600 acre site in the New River Gorge Region of West Virginia. The development of the site was made possible by a 50 million dollar gift from the S.D. Bechtel Jr. Foundation, a program that supports elect non-profit organizations.

According to PDG Young, "The entire experience was extremely rewarding and he was impressed by the cooperation of scouts, scouting volunteers, the community and the military during the 100 year celebration."

## News From Burton Middlefield

At the regularly scheduled Wednesday evening meeting on 8/4/2010, the Rotary Club of Burton-Middlefield held a dedication ceremony for their recently completed club storage building located at the Geauga County Fairgrounds in Burton, OH. A delicious steak dinner was put on by club members Howard Bates and Marc Burr Jr. for Rotarians, the Fair Board and invited county administrators, including Commissioner Tracy Jemison and Sheriff Dan McClelland, both Rotary Club members, and county engineer Bob Phillips. A ceremonial "hanging of the Rotary sign" took place by project leader David Brigham and a transfer of the building keys from past president Dave Zmek to current president Dan McClelland. The 30ft. X 100ft. pole building has been in the works for the past 12 months and was built completely with volunteer help from club members and a few "construction specialists" from the local community. The building is split in half (2) 30ft. X 50ft. Rooms, with half used by the Geauga County Fair Board for equipment storage and the other half used by the Rotary club for their many supplies. How often have countless Rotary Club members everywhere looked for something they know their club possesses, but no one can recall who last had it or where it is. We in Burton-Middlefield have been no exception to this dilemma and hopefully now, we can have all club possessions in one place and easy to find (at least that's the theory). The next several months will be spent collecting and shelving all of our club "stuff" in our new building.

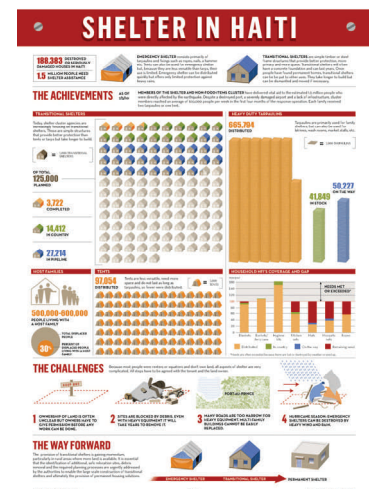
The structure was built as a cooperative effort between the Rotary Club and the Fair Board, with the Fair Board purchasing the building materials and the Rotary Club supplying the man power for the construction. Club members David Brigham and Jim Croup led the willing but not too experienced members in the construction with their knowledge and expertise. We have the added bonus of a tax-free building as the Fair Board actually owns it, and a 65 year lease on our side. It was truly a win-win for both groups. Also, during construction, the heating infrastructure was installed which will be hooked up when a gas well on the fairgrounds comes on line.

The Rotary Club of Burton-Middlefield best known for "pancakes in March" and numerous bridge and construction projects throughout the Geauga County community, is especially proud of the new building and will hopefully put it to good use for many years to come.
