A Founding Principle of Rotary

They say you can look it up as it's true. What I am reminding Rotarians is one of the reasons Paul Harris and his friends met was to exchange ideas of what each member does for a living, and possibly work together. Some how that practice has been questioned and to many, talking about one's vocation is deemed to be being pushy and un-Rotarian. However; if done discreetly and in an informative educational way it's something to be encouraged

In the Westlake Bay Village club, members make such talks as part of a regular meeting as a change of pace from outside speakers. The speaker chairs counsel how this is to be done. So, members get to know their fellow members more intimately. Their topic could be on their firm and what they do, or something in a personal vein such as details on an outside activity, hobby, or interest they have.

Often this encourages members to consider a fellow Rotarian in handling their area of expertise. If a Rotarian abides by the Rotary Four Way Test why shouldn't they be someone to consider? Yes indeed! If your membership has not done this why not consider implementing it in your club?

Some clubs have had members sponsor a meeting or allow tasteful paid

advertisements in bulletins and newsletters. It's a win- win for all.

Another way to encourage members to get to know each other is what we call a three minute talk by a member that the member follows an outline given to them to cover in a brief manner in three minutes or less. In such a format members who are reluctant to public speaking find this a way to ease into a speaking role.

Here are examples of speaking points:

- Name
- residence address
- marital status, spouse's name, children, pets
- personal interests/hobbies
- favorite vacation spot & why?
- education major & college
- briefly why they chose to become a Rotarian
- What they enjoy most about Rotary and fellow Rotarians
- Firm name /location
- Nature of the business
- What you do there?
- Responsibilities
- Other community activities you are involved in

As we make plans for a change in our club administrations and look forward to another successful year of leadership and service in Rotary, it seems like a good time to provide an update on the Medina Sunrise's Rotaract Club in Ecuador and Dr. Andres Bello.

Dr. Andres received the surprising news, on

his return from his visit with us in Medina this spring, that he was being assigned by the government of Ecuador to a remote hospital in the Amazon Jungle. He was given just six days to prepare.

Packing the medical supplies we obtained from Med-

Wish in Cleveland, (thanks to Jack Young and Tish Dahlby) he took a flight on a small airplane to the Marco Vinicio Porvincial Hospital which located on the border between Ecuador and Columbia.

He was excited and happy as he spoke of his work there, much of which is with serious trauma, tropical disease, and debilitating birth defects. He enjoys being a doctor to the poor Indians who are native to this remote area.

There is a small church by the hospital but, sadly, the government has kept it locked up. He told me that he would like help with safely getting a priest to visit there.

A second-hand ambulance was donated

recently so he can make mobile medical visits. He took a picture of some snow he saw when travelling on a mountain road and said that it reminded him of Ohio when he was a Youth Exchange Student in 1999.

His medical assignment in

the Amazon is for one year but he will be allowed a 10-day break in 6 months. Andres is already planning to return to Ohio in the fall with stories of his work and some ideas for another joint project with Rotaract and the Medina Sunrise Rotary Club. He sends his best wishes to all and is grateful for our support, friendship and prayers.

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TRC Burton-Middlefield "Project Patagonia"

In keeping with our club's strong tradition of International Service, The Rotary Club of Burton-Middlefield is proud to announce the completion of our third "Project Patagonia" project in Argentina. These projects, done over a span of three years and in conjunction with former Rotary Ambassadorial Scholars to Argentina and the Rotary Club of Nahuel Huapi in Bariloche Argentina, have provided enhanced educational infrastructure and supplies to a group of 25 (seven, eight or nine per year) very rural schools in the Patagonia region. These schools that are often hundreds of miles apart on dirt roads and operated on generator electricity and solar power only, have stepped into the modern world with the installation of computers and state of the art educational supplies.

Former Ambassadorial Scholars Kimberly Berls, Tanner Wells, Emily Pierce, and Christopher Tepper created "Project Patagonia" in 2006, shortly after completion of their Rotary studies in Argentina. A chance encounter between their group and our club led to our teaming up for three very successful \$25,000 international projects over a three year time span. The scholars' connection with members of the Rotary Club of Nahuel Huapi for administrative and purchasing support on the first project and generous financial

support with the second and third projects greatly increased the efficiency and success of this work. Roberto Wallace, Arturo Kolliker and Rodolfo Weifling, all members of the Nahuel Huapi Club were the driving force for the success of these projects. Their thorough and efficient purchasing of equipment and supplies, organizing and logistics, timely and accurate completion of paper work and things like providing housing for the Project Patagonia members and reserving rental cars and transportation made them the key players in the success of all three projects.

Burton-Middlefield members Bob Johnson and Jim Eldridge who provided the application, funding and logistics of the projects at this end hope to someday meet these very dedicated Rotarians from Argentina. Nahuel Huapi Rotarian, Arturo Kolliker said he would like to express "the deep gratitude our club and District feel for the effort the Rotarians of the Burton-Middlefield RC and District 6630 as well as Kimberly, Tanner and the collaborators from the Project Patagonia have done to make the dreams of the students of these distant rural schools become a magnificent reality. He also would like "to express to any Rotarian or Rotarians from District 6630 who would like to visit Bariloche and the rural schools they have helped so dearly to consider themselves our very

special guests, anytime they come."

As we all know, it is one thing for Rotary to swoop in and do an expensive and high visibility project, but another to do follow up. Project Patagonia has been able to provide follow up visits to some of these remote locations to update soft ware and repair computers and other educational tools and to do further training. This has given these projects continuity and longevity. Many community members have been trained to use the equipment after school hours which have further increased the impact on everyone in these remote villages.

Kimberly Berls and Tanner Wells are scheduled to present a program on this last Project Patagonia III on Wednesday evening, June 15th during Burton-Middlefield's regular meeting at Punderson State Park Manor House on Route 87 in Newbury, OH at 7:00PM. We sometimes over-simplify new member recruitment with the statement "get your ask in gear"! There's no doubt that a successful membership sale requires "asking for the order" or closing the deal. A useful first step, however, may well be an analysis of what your club has to sell.

For instance, do you have a pleasant place to meet, one where a variety of good food is provided? Do your meetings START and FINISH on time and do your members have a good experience at the meeting? Is that experience full of fun and camaraderie and do all members, new and old alike, experience the feeling of being included? In short, does your club provide a meeting place and meeting experience that helps sell your club to new member prospects?

An obvious selling point is the service your club provides to the local and international community. What you do reflects your commitment to the ideal of service. Are your projects and programs well planned, well executed and well publicized? Can your members point to these projects/programs with pride when asked "what does Rotary do?" If members can do this, non-members will be easily approached; in fact, some of them may come to you!

If you're serious about boosting membership, consider the points previously mentioned. Any careful and thorough analysis of your meetings, meeting place, attendee meeting experience, and project track record will unearth at least a few things your club could improve. Making these improvements is a solid start for attracting and retaining new members.

Students Participate in Cultural Fair

Eighth-graders at Highland Middle School put their heads together recently to address international problems faced by the United Nations - and found the experience delightful.

The Model United Nations program at HMS has been around for three years but this is the first year all eighthgraders participated, according to Kelly D'Annolfo, eighthgrade language arts teacher.

D'Annolfo said Kim Clendaniel, a former middle school gifted teacher, approached her about starting the program. The national program is designed for high school and college students, but Clendaniel and D'Annolfo tweaked the program to accommodate middle school participants.

"We kind of do a baby-step version," said D'Annolfo. "The students are assigned countries to research. They act like delegates from those countries to research and resolve world issues. This is part of our curriculum here at Highland."

This year 274 students repre-

sented 72 countries in an allday event at the school. In the morning the students gave speeches and PowerPoint presentations about against actual issues facing the UN right now. They engaged in debates, then prepared for a cultural fair in the gym. The students had to present information about their country and get information on others. "They learn how to ask for exactly what they want and how to phrase it in such a way that others can support you," said D'Annolfo. "It becomes an exercise in diplomacy and creative and persuasive writing. They have cross-curricular questions they have to answer. They're learning geography, government, religion - it incorporates all areas."

Students were given awards for best artifacts, best outfit from their country and best display. They also had special visitors. Mike Fry, a competitive jumproper, travels to places such as Tanzania and Kenya to teach jump-roping to impoverished kids, came to talk to the students as well as Rotary International high school exchange students.

They were all impressed with what the students presented.

"We had a lot of fun," said Franziska Erwentrout, 16, of Germany who is staying in Medina. "They asked me a lot of questions. It's interesting." "I think it's great," said Fiona Sigmund, 17, of Austria who is staying in Medina. "They are so young. Even if they don't get to know all the countries, at least the one they researched they will know about.

Victoria Marques, 16 of Brazil who is staying in Akron, agreed.

I like it."

Eleven Pencils

Several years ago in the mountainous Honduran countryside, my husband and I found 24 abandoned teenage boys. That hot afternoon, we were amazed by their three greatest wishes in life - food, shoes and eleven pencils. Though the desire for pencils puzzled us, their other needs were achingly clear: they were shoeless and hadn't eaten in four days. How could we afford not to help forgotten children living in desperate poverty when a mere \$60 will feed two children for one month?



In today's world, there are millions of forgotten children. They are the poorest and the most vulnerable, the exploited and the abused. They are ignored by laws, budgets, programs, and by a society that fails to protect them. They are deprived of education, healthcare, and other basic needs and services. Extreme poverty causes them to become invisible to their communities and to miss out on childhood. If they survive, they face exclusion in adulthood. In desperation, more often than not, teenage boys migrate to cities in search of a better future. There, unemployment, hunger, disease, drugs, and gangs await them.

In 2004, the Flor Azul Boys Community was founded in response to this extreme poverty, lack of opportunities and labor exploitation. Located just 2 hours from the Honduran capital, Tegucigalpa, the project is currently home to over 100 rescued boys. We provide each boy with food, clothing, shelter, health care, and an education. We

have recently established a youth training center to teach skills and provide opportunities for future home based enterprises. Above all, we provide the boys with the opportunity to work and hope for a better future. We believe it is essential to build a strong foundation with what is basic to all of us...a sense of self worth, love and security.



And those eleven pencils? What we learned on that very first trip was that each day those 24 boys separated into two groups of twelve – a work group and a study group that switched roles at midday. They were teaching one another everything they knew, but it was difficult, as they only had only one pencil to share among all of them. Our hearts were immediately stolen. We realized we had a responsibility to fulfill to each of these boys, and so began our commitment to providing a strong, caring environment wherein no child is invisible or excluded.

The Honduran children have taught us that before we are a race, a religion or an occupation, we are human family. Together with the children and the support of many, we have moved many mountains. We have built a small village, fish farms, greenhouses, created micro-enterprises and provided scholarships for each boy. We are committed to making a difference and ask for Rotarian support. Our goal is to purchase a mini bus to transport the boys to school. Indeed our needs are overwhelming, yet there is nothing more rewarding than knowing that "To the world you might be one person, but to one person...vou just might be the world." It is your generous support that keeps us believing in miracles and for which we are, Forever grateful, Karen Donovan-Godt, Executive Director
