Governor's Letter

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I am writing this newsletter as Gary and I travel in Europe prior to attending the Rotary International Convention in Lisbon, Portugal. Our first stop was in Karlsruhe, Germany to visit recent Ambassadorial Scholar Alex Hoffmann whom many of you have met. We then traveled to Amsterdam where we visited with the 2011 Group Study Exchange team from the Netherlands: team leader Ellen, and team members Andre, Mark, Terrence, and Florian, who is now a Rotarian. They each send their greetings to all of you. And now we have had an opportunity to briefly experience their countries and their culture first hand as they experienced ours. These international friendships and the knowledge and understanding we each have gained are part of the strength of Rotary.

It has been an honor to serve as your District Governor. Although it has been a very busy year, the benefits have far outweighed the effort. As I have said numerous times, one of the rewards of being a District Governor is visiting all of our Rotary clubs. We have an incredible number of very dedicated Rotarians in our District who are doing wonderful work to improve the lives of others. At the same time they are forming friendships that will last a lifetime, both locally and internationally. I encourage all of you to take the time to visit other clubs - to meet their members, support their events, and perhaps gain some new ideas

that you can introduce in your club.

Both in our Clubs and at the District level we have worked hard to accomplish the goals we set. Our accomplishments are the result of the combined efforts of many. And so, I thank the Club Presidents who have led their clubs and with whom I have enjoyed working. I thank our District Committee Chairs and their Committee members for the time and resources they have provided this year. I thank all the Rotarians who in their individual and collective ways have made a difference in communities locally and around the world, through "hands on" efforts and their monetary support of their clubs and The Rotary Foundation. And last but certainly not least, I thank those who came before me in this role of District Governor for laying the groundwork that we built on this year and for the support that they and future District Governors have provided.

This year RI President Sakuji Tanaka asked us to build Peace Through Service. We have done that by doing good in our local communities and working on International projects; by helping people meet their basic needs and beyond. And we have tried to do so in a sustainable way, so that once our work is done, local people can maintain what we have initiated. In our District I asked you to focus on building Sustainable Rotary Communi-

ties. We do that by strengthening our membership; attracting younger members; having continuity of leadership, including strategic plans at the Club and District level; spreading the word about Rotary and the good work we are doing; supporting The Rotary Foundation; and having depth in leadership at the District.

So how have we done? As of mid June we are one below our beginning membership District-wide. I hope by the end of the month to at least pull even with our July 1st membership. At the same time 23 of our clubs, including several of our smallest clubs have successfully increased their membership. Congratulations! We are building our potential pool of future Rotarians by making sure we have strong New Generations programs: Interact, Rota-ract, Youth Exchange, RYLA and youth-focused club programs as well. At the District level our Interact clubs came together for sharing and team building at Interaction 2012 and fun and fundraising at the Dodge Ball Tournament. And we added a New Generations Conference during the District Conference, to which members of all our New Generations programs were invited.

At both the Club and District levels we worked to strengthen our continuity of leadership and to develop strategic plans. At the District, past, current, and future leadership worked together ex-

tremely well, both in documenting current practices, and identifying future needs. A District Strategic Plan, which included input from members at the club level, is in the final stages of development and will be shared with members in the near future.

Progress has been made in increasing our Public Image. Short videotapes, produced with funds from our 2011-2012 PR Grant from RI, featuring local Rotarians talking about what Rotary means to them were distributed to all clubs for promotional use as well as placed on the District website. This year's PR Grant from RI spread the word about Rotary locally through use of Humanity in Motion billboards featuring fellow Rotarians, targeted digital ads, and upgrading our District Facebook page. There were several opportunities for clubs to learn how they can strengthen their social media presence. And many clubs continued or strengthened their coverage in local newspapers with some regional coverage in newspapers, and on radio and TV as well.

As of mid June, our support of The Rotary Foundation, which provides matching grant monies for our international and local projects as well as funding educational programs, such as this year's Group Study Exchange with District 3640 in Seoul, South Korea and an Ambassadorial Scholar to Australia, has exceeded our goal with an average giving of just under \$80 per Rotarian. And we have 13 clubs above \$100 per capita. Thanks to the individuals and clubs for your generosity! Top giving

clubs will be recognized at the Foundation event on November 9th.

At the District level we are strengthening our continuity between leadership years and working to identify pools of future leaders. This year we brought in a new Treasurer and several new Assistant Governors, initiated an Assistant Treasurer position, have a new leader for Interact/Rotaract and began rebuilding our Youth Exchange team as several longstanding leaders moved on to other opportunities. We continue to look for future leaders for all aspects of the District, so please let Bob Johnson or your Assistant Governor know if you might be interested or want to learn more.

This year also saw extensive preparation for the implementation of Rotary's new Grants Model, currently known as Future Vision, which will be in place worldwide on July 1st.

An organization is only as good as the people who believe in it and support it. Rotary is able to "Do Good in the World" because of Rotarians who give of their time, their talent, and their treasure. Thank you for what you have done and are doing, and for the opportunity to serve as your District Governor. I look forward to our paths continuing to cross in the years to come. Beginning July 1st, the District will be in very capable hands of incoming District Governor Bob Johnson and his team of dedicated Rotarians and I will support them in any way I can. I know you will do the same.

Over the last nineteen months my committee and I have visited many of the clubs in our district to ask for your monetary assistance. Well they say pictures don't lie (Please see the enclosed pictures!) Thank you to the following clubs for making this dream into a reality.

I recently had the opportunity of attending the Tallmadge Rotary Club's weekly meeting to share with them my new vision. (What a great club!) They open their meeting with a prayer that reminded all of us that there are those who stand before us and those that stand behind us and that we should always be aware of those in need. It dawned on me that we Rotarians stand side by side; each of us are asked to help each other, communities and Rotary International, to help make dreams come true. The OMNI truck project is living proof of Rotary at its finest! First, we recognized the need; found out what monies were needed; put together a



strategy; and then made it happen.

I must also recognize the Rotary Club of Ndola, Africa and especially Rotarian Don Karunanandan, who went beyond the call of duty to accommodate our request. Remember that a large part of any international project is getting a good check and balance system in place; through Don and the Ndola Club we had a great one.

Where do we go from here? In reviewing, the need has now been fulfilled - they have the truck. But now I am asking us to make sure that this truck is able to fulfill its mission: *to improve and save lives*. I am asking you to join us in making sure that the insurance (approximately \$2900.00 a year) is covered and that there is always fuel in the gas tank (approximately \$3000.00 a year) totaling approximately \$5900.00 a year. Some maintenance may be needed; at this point we do not know.

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Taking Food Inventory at Providence House

On Saturday morning, June 15, four Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Hillcrest Sunrise, visited Providence House which is located on W 32 St. in Cleveland. With the guidance of Bobby Richards, Facilities Manager, Cindy Ginsburg, Joe Delibero, Fred Havlice and Tony Corrao took inventory on thousands of food items. They ranged from baby food to canned fruits and vegetables. Annual inventory is currently required and going forward, the non-profit will be taking inventory on a quarterly basis.



"Thank you Hillcrest Rotary! You saved us at least two days of work" said Bobby Richards. "You will always be welcome at Providence House".

Providence House was founded in 1981 and is Ohio's first licensed crisis nursery. It is a 501(c)

3 non-profit that provides emergency shelter and care to neglected children due to a family crisis. The children range in age from newborn to age 6. Currently, there are 11 children being cared for. SB 242 allows for the provision of residency at Providence House for up to 90 days. The average stay is approximately 32 days.

Their model goes beyond emergency shelter for children and includes a range of case management and supportive services for both children and their families. Their goal is to stabilize, strengthen and reunify each family. It receives its funding from individuals, foundations and corporations.

Rotarian Describes His Group Study Exchange to Korea

Dave Diffendal, a member of the Rotary Club of Cleveland and host of Rotary Radio on WELW, talked to Berea Rotary on June 18 about his recent trip to South Korea. Dave was team leader for a Rotary Group Study Exchange.

The group spent four weeks in South Korea, visiting the border of the Demilitarized Zone and experiencing the culture and lifestyle of the country. He said South Korea has about 3,500 Rotarians in 62 clubs. Rotary has been active there since 1954, shortly after the conclusion of the Korean War.

Dave said he found the Korean Rotarians to be kind and generous and very friendly. While Rotary Clubs in the U.S. might emphasize Service, he said Clubs in Korea listed Fellowship as their No. 1 priority. They host golf outings, luncheons and dinners to facilitate networking and camaraderie. Besides golf (Dave said there is screen golf equipment in almost every building), Koreans also love hiking and the Cleveland Indians. Although Shin Soo Choo, a native of Korea, is no longer with the Tribe, Dave said he spotted Indians gear throughout his visit.


