In an email from Rotary President Elect Burton, he indicated to Jack that he was appreciative to Jack and Shelter Box for their offer to help in this unfortunate situation.



### Rotary Shred Fest Collects Record Amount

Baldwin Wallace University students, left, helped Berea Rotary collect 25,000 pounds of paper, 110 pounds of prescription medicines and more than 200 pairs of eyeglasses during the Shred Fest on May 4. Rotarians also assembled 200 goody bags, which were given to Shred Fest donors. They were gone within 2 hours.

The Shred Fest co-sponsored by the City of Berea and the Rotary Club of Berea on May 4 collected more than 25,000 pounds of paper to be shredded and recycled by Cintas Corp. That sets a new record. Last year, Shred Fest collected 23,000 pounds of paper from local residents and businesses. The event also collected 110 pounds of outdated prescription medicines, which were disposed of by Southwest General Health Center. More than 200 pairs of eyeglasses were collected to be distributed by Lions International.

The annual Shred Fest was in the parking lot of Roehm Middle School and was free to residents. More than 400 cars went through the drive-up lines where Baldwin Wallace University students and Berea Rotarians unloaded the vehicles.

Next on the agenda is the computer and electronics roundup sponsored by the City of Berea and Berea Rotary 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on June 8 in the parking lot of Berea High School. No television sets will be accepted but other electronic equipment, such as computers, cameras and cell phones, can be dropped off to be recycled. Other electronics equipment that can be accepted includes speakers, stereo equipment, video games, microwaves, computer cables, CRT monitors, servers, printers, DVD players, CD players, Li-ion batteries, fax machines, any phone system, keyboards, copiers, floppy discs, power supply cords, mice, scanners, Palm equipment and AC adapters.

There is no charge for these recycling events, but donations are accepted to support Rotary projects.

ROTARACT AUCTION SUPPORTS SHELTER BOX: The Rotary Club of Berea attended the annual auction sponsored by the Rotaract Club of Baldwin Wallace University. This year, Rotaracters donated all the proceeds to Shelter Box USA. The students presented a multimedia program explaining Shelter Box and then conducted a silent auction and 50/50 raffle. Auction items included tickets to Lake Erie Captains baseball games, cat treats and a basketful of candy.

Neil Brennan of 3D Bakery printing company showed Berea Rotarians on April 30 how developing technology can produce 3D printing is the technology of the future not only prototypes of manufacturing products but usable products as well. The first 3D printer was developed in the 1980s, Brennan said. It is now at the same

level computers were in the 1970s. "They're neat but no one quite knows what to do with them," he said.

The future looks bright, however. It is possible that some time in years to come an entrepreneur will 3D print small houses. The machine can be fed concrete and in a day create the finished product. There also could be medical uses – creating skin and organs from stem cells, for example. By feeding the printer a digital design, children could make their own toys.

Right now, a 3D printer for the home costs between \$400 and \$5,000. A commercial printer runs several million dollars.

"The Terminator is coming," Brennan joked, referring to the Arnold Schwarzenegger film. "But we are at a turning point," he said. "It's going to explode soon."

As a businessman, his goal is to open a string of 3D printing stores.

Brennan earned a master's degree in public administration from the University of Akron in 2012 and is one of the cofounders of 3-D Bakery, which is based in Nova, Ohio. His father is a past president of the Lorain Rotary Club.

The 3D Bakery name, by the way, comes from the process a traditional bakery uses to make its goodies. It uses a recipe to mix flour, sugar, milk, eggs, etc., to create tasty treats. Brennan's 3D Bakery uses a recipe, too, to create its own unique products.

- willing to sign a waiver form
- willing to complete each shift, regardless of the weather (this is an outdoors, all-weather event).

- able to walk and/or stand during the entire shift; breaks will be provided
- able to do some light labor (e.g., moving/lifting of chairs)

Finally, for those who have always wanted to sail on a tall ship, daytime 90-minute sailaways are planned for each day of the festival for only \$55 per ticket (including your admission fee). ### Chagrin Valley Supports Relay

Martine Scheuermann served as CVRC Relay for Life Team Captain, and with a blend of humor and determination she led the Club in raising \$4,000, far exceeding our team goal of \$2,500. Pitching a small tent near the Kenston football field and track, she spent the night at the Relay, catching an occasional nap, and walking at least one lap on the track with each Rotarian team! Dedication to a great cause!

The goal for this 10th Annual event was \$40,000 and the community really came through as 29 teams participated and raised OVER \$82,700......an absolutely in credible outcome!

This was Chagrin Valley Rotary Club's first ever participation in Relay for Life as a club, but it has established the event as a cause we will continue to support in the future. This annual event, held in numerous cities across the U.S., creates an unforgettable night as all participants celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and fight back against the disease.

"This is the first year that a club will win the Frier Trophy, named after Jim Frier, a retired photographer and the longest serving member of Cleveland East" said McBee.

"Jim is our historian, photographer and a natural raconteur who often opens our meetings with a joke or limerick. On a serious note, Jim travels to Mexico yearly where his sister runs an elementary school. The school is one of the international projects that we support annually."




Any Rotarian who is enrolled or signs up for Rotary Direct, will be entered into a drawing to earn a Paul Harris.
