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Governor's Letter

February 2014

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Enough of the long-winded Governor's messages. Just some reminders of upcoming events and club responsibilities during this busy transition period when we begin to wind up this year and gear up for next year.

LEADERSHIP 6630 - Our new leadership development program rolled out with their first organizational meeting in the middle of February. This new class is charged with attending district committee meetings, fund raiser and other district level activities to gain a greater exposure and knowledge of district operations. They will have a monthly debriefing meeting where they will have an opportunity for district committee chairs and district officers to explain specific programs in more detail. The goal of the program is to develop a pool of talented Rotarians that have an in-depth knowledge of most, if not all, district programs. In the future this pool of candidates will be used to fill committee and district level positions as they come open.

ALL OHIO PETS - As its name implies this is a training opportunity for all presidents elect in the five districts in Ohio to attend training sessions to prepare them for their year as club president and to get to know the other 260 or so Ohio PEs. This event is held at the Renaissance Hotel in downtown Columbus on March 14 and 15. The PEs will be officially commissioned into their new position at this

time. We are nearing the deadline for registration, so if any PE out there has not registered, we suggest you do so immediately at: allohiopets.org. You must register for both the event and also your hotel accommodations separately. It is suggested that the cost of this training be funded by the individual clubs as this is geared to the club and the club president having a more productive year together. Spouse/ Partners of PEs are included also with a separate program for them.

DISTRICT TRAINING AS-**SEMBLY** - This event replaces the old District Assembly. It will be held this year at the Doubletree Independence off Rockside Rd. near I-77. March 29 is the date with the Assembly held in the morning and a Grant Management Seminar in the afternoon for club's wishing to participate in the matching grant program next year. Registration is on-line at rotarydistrict6630.org This Leadership 6630 class of 2014 will be present.

100 YEAR CELEBRATION OF THE ROTARY CLUB OF AKRON - This is a very special celebration for the RC of Akron. Only the second club in the district after Cleveland to mark this milestone. Event will be held an April 5th at the Hilton Akron/ Fairlawn. Info: www.AkronRotary.org or 330-644-4512

DISTRICT CONFERENCE -The District Conference (Dis Con) will be held on April 25 and 26 at Ouail Hollow Inn and Conference Center at I-90 and Rt. 44 in Concord Township. Many exciting speakers, training topics, great food, a weekly Rotary meeting for the week of 4/21to 4/25 on Friday at noon, entertainment and lots more for your enjoyment. Join us for a great time with all your fellow Rotarians!

EREY - Time to start making sure your club is on target to achieve the prestigious Every Rotarian Every Year club award. To be a recipient, your club must have given at least \$100. per member (on average) and every member must have contributed some amount. Last year we had 11 recipients. This year I know we can do better because there were at least 5 clubs that came with a few dollars or 1 or 2 members of achievement, but failed to go over the top. I will be contacting each club that was very close to earning the award last year, but fell slightly short and make sure they are aware of how little they have to do to get there. EREY is one of the key builders of the Rotary Foundation's Annual Fund, of which half comes back to us every year from funds donated three years ago, and is the source of funding for our fantastic District and Global grant projects. I am suggesting that each club appoint an organized and tenacious member to run EREY and make sure the club achieves the proper giving to receive the award every year. Speaking from experience, it is

not very difficult if someone is in charge and makes sure it gets done.

DEADLINE FOR SUBMIS-SION OF PLANS FOR DIS-TRICT MATCHING GRANT PROJECTS - This year's deadline for submission of District (local) matching grant project ideas to be done in the 2014/2015 Rotary year is May 15th. 2014. At that point projects submitted before that date will be reviewed by the Grants Committee and a budget for the viable projects (the Spending Plan) will be sent to RI for funding approval. Projects can then start after July 1, 2014. No project expenditures can be incurred before that date or the start of the project. Don't forget the \$25./per capita foundation giving requirement for your club or the Grant Management Seminars and qualification forms that must be part of the process. Address any questions or concerns to Dist. Foundation Chair Jim Lechko or Dist. Exec. Secretary Rick Pollak.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR PO-LIO CHALLENGE – On Oct. 24, World Polio Day, I issued a challenge to all clubs to collect and amount of \$26.50/per member to donate to the polio fund of the RI Foundation. The amount was based on the original donation by Arch Klumpf to the Rotary Foundation in 1917. We need to continue our fight to rid the world of polio once and for all.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION – SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA – If you have ever had a desire as I have to visit Australia or New Zealand, here is an excellent opportunity to join other Rotarians from around the world at a grand event. The Aussies have been planning this event for a couple years so it should be monumental! Event coordinator for District 6630 is DGE Mike Davanzo. Contact him if interested but time for reservations is running short.

A. Z. BAKER AWARD – At the beginning of the year a copy of last year's A.Z.B. award was sent to each club president with the request that they sit down with their club officers and review their club plan for the year and determine if they would qualify for the A.Z.B. award at year's end. In January I sent the revised A.Z.B. application for 2013/2014 to the clubs and asked that they begin to total their points and see what adjustments needed to be made to qualify for this year's award. By now I hope that all clubs are working toward achieving the A. Z. Baker Award. This is a prestigious recognition of all clubs that are active and dynamic in doing Rotary's work in District 6630. Any clubs currently doing work in all five of the avenues of service should accumulate enough points to receive the award. If you submit your application by April 1, your club will be recognized at the District Conference on April 25-26. If we receive the application after that you will be recognized at a later event. Contact Dist. Exec. Secretary Rick Pollak or DG Bob Johnson to submit.

Interact at District Conference

Shoe Boxes for the Children of the Dump

Plans have started for this year's Club support to the 2014 Shoe Box program. In order to make the preliminary arrangements for the number of Shoe Boxes that will be available for this Christmas to the children living in the garbage dump in Chinandega, we will need to know the names of those clubs who are willing to help with this International Project.

In December 2013, our district had eight individuals from North East Ohio (5 Rotarians and 3 friends of Rotary) take the trip to Nicaragua to visit the children of the dump, trade school and other schools in and around Chinandega. Over the past 7 years this has been a collaborative effort among Rotary Districts from Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Iowa and Texas. Our district during this time has supported approximately 3,000 shoe boxes to children. This year's team was joined by our Rotary Zone 28-29 Director Mary Beth Growney Salene.

In order to make sure we meet the needs of these children, it is important that we know approximately how many clubs will help support this effort for the children. I number of clubs have indicated they will once again step forward for 2014.

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Shelter Box Update

PDG Jack Young has been confirmed to serve his eight year (2014) as a Board Member of Shelter Box USA, the International Disaster Relief organization. Shelter Box USA was started by one Rotarian in Cornwall, England in 2000 and was picked up as a club project of the Rotary Club Lakewood Ranch in Florida. It has now expanded to affiliates in over 18 countries worldwide.

With the main offices are located in England, Shelter Box staff and volunteers respond to disasters throughout the world when invited into that country. They also partner with other disaster relief organizations to provide shelter, warmth and dignity to those who have lost everything.

Shelter Box is currently responding to needs in the Philippines where they have provided over 1,686 boxes, 4,607 tents and 1,516 midi tents. Almost 8,000 families have been helped with aid still being received by the Philippines from Shelter Box. In addition Shelter Box has been helping the displaced women and children in Syria and Lebanon. Along with this Shelter Box has been supporting the families of Indonesia following a volcanic eruption. In addition the operations team of Shelter Box has been monitoring the floods in Bolivia where more than 35,000 families have be affected by the recent rains and extreme flooding in the northeastern area of Beni.

With these and other disasters occurring throughout the world, Shelter Box requests your continual support to our efforts. It should be noted that Rotary Clubs and Rotarians account for about 45 per cent of the funding while private funding sources, private foundations, corporations and friends of Rotary account for the remainder.

PDG Young is also a member of the Governance Committee and the chair of the Rotary Relations Committee of Shelter Box which support Rotary Clubs and Shelter Box Ambassadors in providing information to Rotary clubs throughout the United States. DEPLOYMENT BRIEF...

When you support the efforts of Shelter Box, YOU are making an incredible difference in the lives of families who have lost everything following a disaster.

SYRIAN CRISIS:

Shelter box continues to provide aid in and around Syria, aiming to assist thousands more families in need this winter. There continue to be thousands of families fleeing conflict in and around Syria. With the region suffering one of its harshest winters in over a century, the conditions Syrian refugees face are more perilous than ever.

To help vulnerable families survive this crisis, we have been providing a winterized shelter solution, including thermally-lined tents, warm blankets and groundsheets to protect subzero temperatures and winter storms. You can still help in bringing families in from the cold and harsh temperatures.

PHILIPPINES:

From Typhoon Halyan, response teams continue distributing tented shelter, water filters and other supplies to the most vulnerable families affected.

Through the generosity of our supporters, we have been able to assist more than 4,500 families displaced by Typhoon Halyan. Nearly three months since it swept through the Philippines, Shelter box continues to identify families who have been left with nothing and are in need of tented shelter and other vital supplies.

Many of these families are in hard-to-reach areas around Tacioban, one of the worst hit cities, as well as Bantayan Island. While rebuilding will likely take years, Shelter Box will continue to help the most vulnerable. INDONESIA:

With the flooding in this country, a response team is working to identify needs and the most vulnerable people affected.

Tens of thousands of people are displaced by monsoon rains that have caused flooding in the capital, Jakarta, as well as landslides in North Sulawesi providence.

More than 30,000 people have been forced to evacuate in Jakarta, leaving their homes, possessions and livelihoods as the capital becomes more and more inundated from heavy rains. A Shelter box Team has arrived and is working to identify the most vulnerable families impacted.

Sole Power

Sport has the power to change the world. It has the power to inspire. It has the power to unite people in a way that little else does. Sport can awaken hope where there was previously only despair - Nelson Mandela

The power of sports and fitness is truly astonishing and life-changing. We're not talking about the obvious benefits such as increased metabolic rate or cardiovascular fitness. The kind of power being referred to here goes way beyond those things- relegating them as the proverbial "icing on the cake."

We're talking about the feeling you get when you cross the Finish Line. The empowerment of reaching any physical goal you once viewed as unattainable.

It's the pride and sense of accomplishment, no matter your sport. Imagine if we could bottle that sense of pride, selfesteem, self-confidence and joy - and give it to girls in need of a "sporting chance" in our community.

A 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization called Girls With Sole (founded in 2009) is doing just that with a sports bottle full of water and a variety of fitness and wellness programs free of charge for girls who have experienced abuse of any kind, or who are at-risk. Activities include yoga, dance, running and traditional team sports so they can learn firsthand what athletics and fitness can do for the mind, body and soul.

Founder and Executive Director, Liz Ferro, was a foster child until she was adopted at age two. She personally experienced sexual abuse as a young child and credits athletics and fitness for giving her the selfesteem and inner strength to overcome difficult times and to view her body as purposeful and important. The goal of Girls With Sole is to bring this same result to girls who are need of an outlet for their emotions, a boost to their self-

confidence, a place to foster a sense of belonging, and a learning tool to cope with adversity in a healthy manner.

Girls With Sole programming is a community collaborative effort, partnering with social service agen-

cies, schools, hospitals, juvenile attention facilities and residential treatment centers, in order to bring free fitness and wellness programs to the girls where they are. Liz Ferro brings the one hour program sessions to the girls once per week at each of the locations Girls With Sole serves. A few of their program partners include Cleveland Rape Crisis Center, The Intergenerational School, MetroHealth, Bellefaire JCB, Lorain County Urban League, and the Multi-County Juvenile Attention System. In addition to weekly programs, each girl receives a free pair of running shoes, sports bra, fitness journal, water bottle, and free entry into road races.

Abuse takes many forms and includes bullying, neglect, emotional abuse, dating violence, physical abuse, the witnessing of violent acts, and others. The percentage of girls ages 9 - 18 who report some type of abuse is staggering. Girls With Sole introduces girls to the power that only fitness and wellness can bring. Focusing on healthy living, good nutrition, exercise and wellness will help girls make

healthier choices in other areas of their lives, making a positive impact on our community as a whole.

Girls With Sole looks forward to c o n t i n u e d growth and outreach - and to someday provide programs to girls from coast to

coast so they may also "Lace Up for a Lifetime of Achievement." In her efforts to reach this goal, and to raise funds and awareness for Girls With Sole, Ferro has initiated a campaign called 50 States for Sole that will have her crossing a 26.2 mile finish line in every state of America. She also penned a book about her journey from foster care to founder of Girls With Sole called "Finish Line Feeling." Proceeds from the book benefit Girls With Sole programming and you can find the book on Amazon or girlswithsole.org. Liz Ferro is the author of the

book, Finish Line Feeling. To date Liz has crossed many finish lines. She has completed 23 marathons (2 of them 50K Ultras), 5 Ironman triathlons and countless road races and triathlons. The empowerment gained from sports led her to found the non-profit organization Girls With Sole. Recently, Liz launched the "50 States for Sole" campaign, and will be running a marathon in all 50 states to raise money and awareness for Girls With Sole. She is the recipient of the 2011 Classic Woman Award from Traditional Home Magazine; the 2011 American Red Cross of Greater Cleveland Hero Award; the 2012 Longines Women Who Make a Difference Award from Town & Country Magazine; and Girls With Sole was chosen Best New Charity of the Midwest Region by the CLASSY Awards in 2012.

Rotary exchange student connects via Skype

Eventually, Zach said, after college, he'd like to do "something internationally." No specifics as of yet.

Kristina Mueller, the German exchange student studying at Berea-Midpark, was ill and unable to attend the session. "I'm sorry she isn't here," Zach said, "but she'd probably laugh at my German."
