So far in 2017 Shelter Box has responded to 4 disasters in the world. They have deployed aide in Haiti, Niger, Cameroon and Syria/Iraq. In addition, Shelter Box Operations are monitor wild fires in Chili and flooding in Peru.

> HOUR. Since Shelter 2012. Box has been serving the refugees and disinternally placed people from the Syria Refugee Crisis. Millions of families have been affected

in multiple countries, fleeing the sustained and terrible aftermath of conflict.

In the past 5 years, Shelter Box has helped over 9,000 families with emergency shelter and winterized gear and sent 4.8 million dollars in aid. The need is ever present as families continue to be affected and the conflict has no end in the foreseeable future. Shelter Box and its distribution partners. Hand in Hand for Syria and Relief Aide remained committed in supporting any families in need. It

is all about helping families in their most desperate hour.

DID YOU KNOW??? Following the earthquake in Haiti in 2010, Shelter Box supplied 1/3 of the tended shelter provided to the 1 million Haitians made homeless by the catastrophic 7.0 earth quake.

In addition, we have also what is called a Shelter box Kit. Our Shelter Box Kit contains a selection of materials, including tool kits, ropes, fixings and heavy tarpaulins, that can be used to make emergency shelters. repair damaged buildings and create the foundation for new homes. The deployment of the kit is made after the assessment of our SRT members once we are in a country. As for the Shelter Box and contents, we are continually in need of your support. The cost of each box, shipping and deployment of our Response Team Members remains at \$ 1,000 dollars. This cost has gone unchanged for the 11 years I have involved with Shelter Box USA.

District Rotarians Donate Fork Lift



The Rotary Club of Hudson Learns of the Partnership for Arts and Culture

Tom Schorgl, President & CEO of the Community Partnership for Arts & Culture located in Cleveland, recently detailed for the Rotary Club of Hudson his organization's comprehensive strategy and goals for Northeast Ohio. CPAC is a nonprofit service organization offering competencies in public policy, business development and research. CPAC provides business training and support to individual artists as well as business assessment and diagnostic services to nonprofit arts and cultural organizations.

The CPAC objective of integrating arts with community led to a planning process to

- Provide public access to arts and culture
- Promote lifelong learning partnerships
- Encourage charitable organizations to work together
- Develop resources for the arts and culture community

The initial focus of the Partnership was to determine the economic impact of arts and culture on the community, including the effect on suppliers to cultural groups.

The strategy developed for the Partnership addressed capacity building



and public policy leading to an Arts Entrepreneurs program and City Government Issue 31 for public sector funding. The City pledged \$250,000 and the Partnership raised \$750,000. And, a proposed tobacco excise tax in Cuyahoga County to establish an arts and culture issue recently received a 75% voter approval. The excise tax generates \$15 million annually.

Schorgl holds BFA and MA degrees from the University of Iowa and an MFA from Miami University in Ohio. He is the recipient of the Indiana Governor's Arts Award, the Cleveland Arts Prize's Robert P. Bergman Award and the Ohio Citizens for the Arts' William R. Joseph, Ohio Arts Advocacy Medal.





How Flexible are Your Membership Options?

Do you know Rotaractors who could bring new perspectives, ideas, and energy to your club? Have your members asked for a more flexible attendance policy or different membership types? Here are five ways to implement the new options for membership flexibility approved during the 2016 Council on Legislation.

- Change your meeting schedule you can change the day and time your club meets, as long as your club meets at least twice a month.
- Vary the meeting format you can meet in person or online, or have a combination of both. Read how the Rotary Club of New York is teaming with the UN to host monthly breakfast meetings online.
- **Relax attendance requirements** while attendance is important, you can encourage members to give their time in different ways.
- Offer different membership types alternative types include family, junior, or corporate memberships. These members will only be considered active and counted toward your membership total if they pay RI dues.
- Invite Rotaractors to be members of your club you can reduce fees or relax the attendance policy for these members, as long as your bylaws reflect this.

A Blast From the Past

While doing some remodeling in our house, we stumbled upon a lot of old newspapers that were used as a sort of underlayment under some old linoleum. These papers were all from around 1946. This article was on the editorial page of the Cleveland Press on July 20, 1946. Given Rotary's interest in Polio, this might be of interest for your newsletter.

Cleveland's Polio Cases

It is impossible to draw any conclusions from the fact that six of the first nine cases of infantile paralysis reported in Greater Cleveland had visited the North Chagrin Reservation of the Cleveland Metropolitan Park System during the June 15-16 week-end.

The reason for this is because medical science does not yet know how the virus of polio is carried or spread. There is evidence that flies become contaminated with the virus from sewage but there is no evidence to prove that any person was ever infected with the virus of polio by flies.

As Dr. Harold J. Knapp, city health commissioner, points out, the visits to the park may have just been a coincidence.

In the outbreak of polio in Cleveland in the summer of 1941, it turned out that seven of the first 15 victims had been swimming at the White City Beach. This led Dr. Knapp to close the beach at the time as a possible source of infection. But this was never established with certainty.

At the moment there are 28 cases of polio in Greater Cleveland. The situation is obviously serious but there is no reason for panic. Sensible rules of health should be observed. One should not drink water or milk that is of doubtful sources and one should not eat raw fruits or vegetables without washing them.

Meanwhile residents should be as careful as possible with their children, and call the doctor at once if a child gets sick. But real preventive measures are still up to intensive research along lines conducted by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, for which the nation is spending its money with increasing hope of decisive results.

Interact Service Project: Shoes for the Sole!

Only two months left to collect!

The Interact and Rotaract Clubs of Rotary District 6630 chose their service project for the District Conference in April of this year. Their project is named "Shoes for the Sole". They are collecting children and adult

shoes that will be sent to Africa for a non-profit group called YES! Incorporated.

Yes was founded in 2005 and has collected over 150,000

pairs of shoes to be sent to Senegal, West Africa. Shoes are a rarity in Africa, as children use crushed plastic water bottle tied to their feet to protect them from parasitic diseases like Hookworm and strongyloidiasis that plagues million sand is common in undeveloped countries.

Each Interact club is going to collect new and gently used but still serviceable tennis shoes, cleats, and recreation shoes. Once the bags or boxes are filled, the can either be picked up or brought to the district conference in April. The Interact and Rotaract clubs are asking their sponsoring clubs to donate \$1 per pair of shoes to help Yes! with the shipping costs from Atlanta to Senegal. Shipping costs for

the shoes to be shipped to Atlanta have already been donated.

Would your Rotary Club like to help collect? We can use all the help we can get. Please contact Bob

Oborn at boborn@kentelastomer.com or 330-689-0485 and he will get you donation boxes to collect, or better yet, just bring the shoes in a bag or box to the district conference. Last years' service project was collecting books to be used at battered women's and homeless shelters with over 6,000 books to be collected. We need help to make just as big of an impact this year as we did last year.
