I don't believe Rotary's founder, Paul P. Harris. or our own Arch C. Klumph. Father of The Rotary Foundation, had any idea at the time the true significance of their visions for "Service Above Self" and "Doing Good in the World" and the impact they would have on this world for generations to come, for all eternity.

Polio eradication, the largest global public health initiative in the world, contributes to peace each and every day. Bringing light into some of the furthest outreaches of the world, and yes, Rotary does stop wars to immunize its children.

Rotary's Peace Fellowships. In just over 10 years, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,200 fellows. Many of them now serve as leaders at international organizations or have started their own foundations. Our district was at the forefront of the formation of this program when 2000-2001 District Governor Jim Frame of the Rotary Club of Mantua stood on the stage at the RI Convention in San Antonio



FEBRUARY IS Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month

representing us as one of the few charter districts from around the Rotary world who supported the development of the World Peace Fellow Program.

Rotary Youth Exchange builds peace one young person at a time. The longterm exchanges represent a full academic year and the short-term program can take the form of several days up to three months. There is no better opportunity for our youth to experience another culture, learn a new language and develop life-long friendships all under the umbrella of the Family of Rotary.

Our community and university-based **Rotaractors** (ages 18-30) are part of a network of over 10,904 Rotaract Clubs representing over 250.000 Rotaractors in 189 countries and our Interactors (ages 12-18) are represented by over 20,372 Interact Clubs with 468,556 members in over 159 countries. When our Interactors reached out to the youth in hurricane-ravaged St. Thomas, with the help of

Rotary clubs throughout the district, they raised over three times their initial goal of \$10,000. This \$33,000 resulted in the development of a Global Grant worth \$141,000 sponsored on their behalf by the Rotary Club of Chesterland. It helped rebuild their library for their high school and the community. Just another example of reaching out with understanding and support make their "world" a better place.

Our Rotary Youth Exchange Students, our Rotary Peace Fellows and our Interactors and Rotaractors...**these are our peacemakers and they do change our world.**

Many of you may remember Mother Teresa has had a profound effect on my life and I wanted to share with you one of my favorite quotes and the significance of a world without peace.

If we have no peace, it is because we have forgotten that we belong to each other.

Special Agent to Speak at DisCon

Special Agent in Charge (SAC) Eric B. Smith was named SAC Cleveland by FBI Director Wray in December 2018.

SAC Smith graduated from the FBI Academy in 1999 and was assigned to the Wichita, Kansas Resident Agency (RA) where he worked multiple programs including Violent Crime,

Counterterrorism, and Counterintelligence. In October 2005. SAC Smith transferred to the FBI's Counterterrorism Division where, for the next three years, he held positions as a Supervisory

Special Agent Charge Cleveland and Unit Chief.

in the International Terrorism Operations Section. focusing on countering threats both domestically and internationally.

In 2008. SAC Smith was selected as the field supervisor for FBI Cleveland Division's Counterterrorism Squad and Joint Terrorism Task Force. In association with this role. he was chosen in 2010 to deploy to Bagram, Afghanistan and serve as the FBI's Senior Representative to the nation's elite Counterterrorism Joint Task Force.

In June 2013, SAC Smith was promoted to Assistant Special Agent in Charge in Cleveland where he had oversight for counterterrorism and cyber matters as well as multiple RAs. In April 2015, he joined the Senior Executive Service as the Chief of Staff to the FBI Deputy Director. In December 2016. SAC Smith transitioned to serve as the Executive Special Assistant to the FBI Direc-In this capacity, he tor. served both FBI Directors Comey and Wray.

From 1991 to 1999, SAC Smith served as an officer in the United States Army. primarily in airborne rapid

> deployment forces at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. He graduated from the U.S. Army Airborne School, the U.S. Army Ranger the School, Basic and Advanced Military Intelligence Courses. the Junale War-

fare School, the Advanced Airborne (Jumpmaster) Course, and the Combined Arms Services Staff School. SAC Smith served as a battalion intelligence officer, an airborne rifle platoon leader, a company executive officer, and company commander. SAC Smith's military awards and decorations include the U.S. Army Ranger Tab, the Senior Parachutist Badge, the Royal Australian Parachutist Badge, and the German Schutzenschnur (shooting badge).

SAC Smith received his Master's Degree in Homeland Security Studies from the Naval Postgraduate School's Center for Homeland Defense and Security in Monterey, California in 2009. He graduated from Eastern Kentucky University in 1991.



Rotary Centennial Bell Visited TRC Cleveland

Many, perhaps most, Rotary clubs begin and end their meetings by ringing a bell. For example, at the Rotary Club of Cleveland, the president opens and closes meetings by ringing a brass bell that was presented to the club in 1926 by long-time Cleveland Rotarian Fred C. Werk. So, an obvious question is, How did this tradition get its start among Rotary clubs?

The explanation is contained in the following article from an unidentified newspaper.

NEW YORK CITY, N. Y .- The spirit of International Rotary was dominant at a recent luncheon of the New York club when Immediate Past President Arthur Chadwick of London Rotary presented to the New York club the bell which acknowledged the victory in an attendance contest between the two cities. The bell has an interesting history, for during the World War it was used on the auxiliary warship Patrol No. 20. It is mounted on a frame made from the oak of Nelson's famous battleship the "Victory." In a speech notable for kindly humor and dignified sincerity Rotarian Chadwick described the contest and its helpful effect on attendance. From 28 per cent in 1920 the London attendance rose to 48 per cent in 1921 and 51 pe cent during the period of the contest. Removing the British colors which draped the trophy, Rotarian Chadwick expressed the hope that in its new field the bell might ever sound a clear ringing note of goodwill, and symbolize to New York Rotary the friendship, fraternity, and loving affection of their brother Rotarians in London. In responding for New York Rotary, Past-President Raymond Knoeppel said that "Each league of the bell's progress on its last ocean voyage was cheered with the soft tinkling of its new message of the true brotherhood of Rotary."

Soon after the Rotary Club of New York received the special bell mentioned in the article, other clubs began to acquire bells to use in their meetings. Much like it does on a ship, a bell represents order, discipline, and the passage of time. The gavel is a symbol of the authority invested in the president of the club, and the outgoing president hits the bell one last time before turning the gavel over to the incoming president, thereby transferring the authority of the office of president to his or her successor.

While the bells used by individual Rotary clubs are important, we know that there are two other significant Rotary Bells. One is the Centennial Bell that was made by the Marinelli family foundry in Agnone, Italy, in time for the 2003 RI Convention in Brisbane, Australia. At that convention, it was announced that the Rotary Centennial Bell would travel to the "First 100" clubs and then end up in Chicago in time for the 2005 RI Convention. When it was chartered in 1911, the Rotary Club of Cleveland became the 18th Rotary club to be founded. Thus, the Rotary Centennial Bell visited the Rotary Club of Cleveland on October 28, 2004, as part of the tour to the First 100 clubs (see photo below left).



In 2017, the Marinellis cast another Centennial Bell to commemorate the 100th anniversary of The Rotary Foundation. This special 110-pound bell (see photo above right) is embellished with a selection of images, logos, and words which tell the story of the Rotary Foundation over the past 100 years. The bell arrived in Atlanta, Georgia, in time to be used in the opening ceremony of the 2017 Rotary International Convention.

He was named field supervisor for the FBI Cleveland Division's Counterterrorism Squad and Joint Terrorism Task Force in 2008. He subsequently was deployed to Afghanistan in a similar role. He is an Army veteran, where he served as a company commander and intelli-

The principles and goals of both organizations closely are allied. .Character-building; service to country, to others and to self, teaching leadership skill; and becoming aware of the world around us-these all incorporated into the programs and activities of each organization.

The values expressed in Rotaries International's motto and the Four Way Test greatly parallel hose articulated in the Scout Oath, Law motto and slogan. Rotarians have long served as role models, demonstrating leadership, character and the value of selfless service to the community and Rotary Clubs Rotary Clubs in the United States charter nearly 1,300 scouting units.





Resources For Club Membership Chairs

[Dear District Leaders,

Greetings from a wintry Evanston! I hope the New Year has started well for you. As we ramp up for PETS, I have information to share on passport clubs, as well as updates on Membership Leads and membership reporting. Everyone who receives this message is noted at the top of the email, but don't hesitate to forward this message to anyone you think should be aware of this information (including club membership chairs, assistant governors, and other key membership leaders in your district).

What's the deal with passport clubs?

The goal of a passport club is to create a positive Rotary experience for new and transferring Rotarians, former Rotaractors and Rotarians, and prospective members. This is a great option for those trying to determine if a traditional club in the area makes sense for them, or if they are looking for a more flexible club environment for the long term. Passport clubs are designed to be a low-cost club model that is more accessible and in tune with the needs of its members.

Just like traditional clubs, passport clubs meet at least twice a month and focus on providing a variety of ways for members to engage, like socials, volunteer projects, web content or online discussions, and networking events, as well as opportunities to attend the meetings of and support the service projects and fundraising activities of other clubs.

Here are a few examples of how districts around the Rotary world have structured their passport clubs:

Greater Lauceston Rotary Passport Club, which is in the process of chartering, promotes themselves as "the Rotary club for busy people" and provides details about their membership options and costs on their website.

Rotary Passport Club of West Chester lists their service projects on their website, as well as a calendar that details upcoming events for the month Rotary Passport Club of Southeastern PA focuses on attracting new and returning members to that have difficulty attending weekly meetings, and also posts upcoming events that you can sign up for directly on their website.

Membership Leads report

Membership leads submitted through rotary.org/join are first sent to the district leadership team. That's why it's beneficial to have an established process for quickly and effectively managing leads and connecting these prospective members with the right club. I've attached the Membership Leads Progress Analysis report, run from 1 July 2018 to 31 December for each district. It's important that districts and clubs use My Rotary to update the status of candidates, because that data then populates the report so district leaders can see:

• How far leads have gotten since they were assigned to your district

• What percentage of leads haven't been followed up on

• What percentage of leads are no longer interested in membership How many leads have been admitted to a club

News from the Ohio districts

PDG Sieglinde Warren is the new club development chair in District 6650. She and other districts leaders were trying to start a new club in Green, Ohio, when a new lead arrived on her district's Manage Membership Leads page. The inquiry was from Kristen Lewis, who was interested in getting involved with Rotary because the organization had meant a lot to her recently deceased father. Seeing a great opportunity, PDG Warren followed up, inviting Lewis and her husband to informational meetings to gauge their interest in forming a club. Both of them became instrumental in launching the Rotary Club of Green, chartered this past May. Warren says this and other experiences proves the value of the membership leads tool. "It definitely works," she said. Has your district or club visited the Manage Membership

Leads page and fully utilized the tool? Learn how to manage membership leads for your <u>district</u> or <u>club</u>.

Cleveland, he has overseen the 2016 celebration of the museum's centennial, as well as the conclusion of the \$320 million campaign that made possible its recent renovation and expansion. In 2016, Dr. Griswold led a strategic-planning initiative that will guide the museum as it begins a second century of growth and public service.

Prior to his tenure at the Cleveland Museum of Art, Dr. Griswold was di-

"With Open Access, the museum makes its collection of art from all periods and parts of the world easier to access and more relevant to the public. As a global leader among museums, CMA is committed to transparency and universal access.

Dr. Griswold joins a distinguished past recipients of the International Service Award who include Ronald B. Richard, The Cleveland Foundation; Franz Welser-Most, The Cleveland Orchestra; Christopher M. Connor, The Sherwin-Williams Co.; Dr. Toby Cosgrove, The Cleveland Clinic; and Mayor Frank G. Jackson, City of Cleveland among others.

The award will be presented on Thursday, March 21 at Windows on the River, 2000 Sycamore Street, Cleveland, OH. 

It doesn't take millions of dollars. One of the most transformational projects I've been a part of involved providing a Jeep to a group of midwives in Haiti. We had asked the midwives what we could do for them, and they told us they needed a way to reach expectant mothers in a remote part of the country. We supplied a Jeep, painted it pink, and put the Rotary logo on it. Three years later, we went back to see how they were doing. They were excited by the outcomes: They told us that the mortality rate for mothers and infants in that region had dropped by 50 percent.

That's what I call transformational service.

But Jeeps don't last forever, and after eight years on the road, that vehicle was on its last legs. So we bought a pink Land Cruiser. It's still on the road, allowing the midwives to provide prenatal care to women in that remote region.

What makes a project transformational? It doesn't have to involve a lot of money, but it has to reach people and have a major impact in the community. That is the key, and that is where careful planning and thorough research come in. So do your research. Leverage your resources. Seek partnerships that can increase your impact. And then take action.

Of course, service is only part of what a strong club must offer. It must also have good speakers, provide leadership development, involve Rotaract and Interact, and bring value to its members and reasons to participate in Rotary events.

If your club is transformational and well-organized, everything else will follow. Members will be engaged, and new members will be eager to join you. Fundraising will be easier: People love to give when they see how their money is making a difference and when they know the organization is accountable. Your club will be vibrant, relevant, and alive — and it will *Be the Inspiration* to those within its ranks as well as to the community it serves.

Attached is a brief report from Dr. Alexandra Noisette, Haiti's first pediatric cardiologist. She is the Haitian pediatrician Gift of Life Northeast Ohio helped support and train along with our partners Gift of Life International and the Haiti Cardiac Alliance. She is back home in Haiti from her final year of training at Necker Children's Hospital in Paris and working again at St. Damien's Children's. We are beginning the planning process of our next activities to help Dr. Noisette establish her work within St. Damien's in a sustainable way. We will be discussing next steps to make a Cath Lab and children's cardiac services a self-sustaining part of St. Damien's service to the children of Haiti. Equipment improvements and appropriate ongoing training in partnership with Akron Children's Hospital are priorities under consideration. Thanks to so many of you that have supported Gift of Life NEO over the vears. We can all take great pride in the accomplishments of Dr. Noissette and her commitment to serve the children of her home country. Without your support this could not have happened.

my job at St Damien hospital. Every day I see new patients and those already following for heart disease. And all this is organized with the help and the good collaboration of Shelda Simon the nurse who works with me and HCA.

I am enjoying doing this job and the parents of the patients are very happy to have Haitian doctor explaining the heart disease in creole.

However, there is a lot to do to organize better this clinic.

My objectives:

- Improving the care of children with heart disease
- Increase the screening rate of congenital heart disease and rheumatic heart disease (I plan to see 150-200 patients monthly)
- Develop the pediatric cardiologic in Haiti.
- In order to attain these objectives, different actions are envisaged:
- Participate in the training of the physicians (Teaching, Echo fast for the intensivist doctors)
- Structure the reference network of children with heart disease
- Write policy to better guide physicians on reference criteria

Have the different materials and inputs required for the operation of this clinic (pending adequate space, ekg machine, defibrillator, some drugs like milrinone).

My issues:

A problem with the echo machine that is constantly low on space. I really need an external drive for my daily backup

No available EKG machine sometimes I have to send the patients to another hospital to do it (usually the paper is inadequate)

I really hope in the next six months that the functioning of the cardiology clinic at St. Damien will be optimized.
