## Use of Foundation Funds

As promised last month the following are the details of activities by your District Rotary Foundation committee for this Rotary year.

Each year we receive funds from Foundation amounting to 50% of our district's giving to The Annual Programmes Fund three years prior. In 2010/2011 we gave \$151,526 therefore we were allocated \$75,763 plus \$3,492 (earnings form the Endowment Fund)

We were able to claim \$39,032 for our Block Grant, from this we paid for our GSE team to travel to Ohio and represent our District Governor, District 9820 and our country. The cost of this project was \$10,473.

This left us with a balance of \$28,559, which was used to fund District Grants, for local projects, to 20 clubs that had applied. Unfortunately a small number of clubs were unable to complete their project within the Rotary year and these funds will be used to assist Rotary's Centenary House in their operations.

Other funds that are credited to our District sit in an account named District Designated Fund (DDF). These funds are used by your District to assist clubs in funding their applications for Global Grants. We have used these funds as much as possible, as we get a dollar for dollar match from Foundation for DDF funds, where club funds are only matched 50 cents for each dollar. We have encouraged clubs to contribute to the Annual Programmes Fund and have used DDF. In three years time 50% of the funds clubs give will come back to the District.

## What happens to the other half of our giving from 3 years ago?

These funds are used to match giving by clubs and Districts for Global Grants and to make a difference throughout the world promoting world peace and understanding. A good deal of these funds are credited back to projects undertaken as Global Grants.

\*DG Tim; DGE Charlie & DGN Merv have each agreed to put aside \$10,000 a year for the next three years to fund a scholarship.

The Rotary Foundation has matched our grants to the tune of \$32,455 and we are awaiting approval for a further \$28,335 and will receive a match of \$10,000 for our scholarship fund. This means that our district will be the recipient of \$70,790 for Global Grant matches and, add to this the \$79, 255 we received in our allocation from Foundation, we have achieved a total of \$150,045 back after giving \$151,526 in 2011/2012.

Fully Audited accounts will be available prior to the Rotary Foundation Seminar in November.

Clubs are to be congratulated for their past and future support of The (YOUR) Rotary Foundation. Your generosity has enabled support for local and international project that do make a difference.

Collections for Zone 7B and 8 Regional Magazine Subscriptions to Commence on July 2014 SAR Starting with the July 2014 Semi Annual Dues Invoice, Rotary International will be collecting subscription fees in behalf of the Regional Rotary Magazine, Rotary Down Under. This is on a pilot basis only through to July 2015.

As per Rotary International Bylaws Article 20.030.1 on Required Subscription: Each member of a club not located in the United States or Canada and each member of an e-club shall become a paid subscriber to the official magazine of RI or to a Rotary magazine

approved and prescribed for that club by the board. Two Rotarians residing at the same address have the option to subscribe jointly to the official magazine. The members shall maintain such subscriptions for the duration of their membership. Each member shall have the option to choose to receive either a printed copy by mail or an electronic copy via the internet where available.

Simply stated, Rotarians in Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands have the option of either subscribing to the International Rotary Magazine, The Rotarian which is priced at USD12 per member persemester or Rotary Down Under

For Australian clubs, the 10% Goods and Services Tax (GST) will be applied to the total outstanding amount and will be remitted by RI to the Australian Taxation Office.

Please make cheques payable to Rotary International and post together with the SAR worksheet for the Semi Annual Report Invoice to: P.O. Box 1415 Parramatta, NSW 2124 Australia. Please continue to use RDU's database to update subscription records. To ensure that your subscription information is updated and invoiced accurately in the July 2014 SAR, please update your member subscription with RDU by 26 May 2014. Beyond this date, whatever quantity showing on the invoice will be due and cannot be adjusted.

## District 9820 MODEL UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY

On the weekend of 2<sup>nd</sup> -4<sup>th</sup> May the Rotary Club of Traralgon with assistance from the Rotary Club of Casey and other Rotarians & Rotaractors held the 2014 MUNA at Forrest Edge Neerim East.

26 delegations representing member countries of the UN made up of 52 year 10 or 11 students from 22 Secondary Colleges took part. They were sponsored by 22clubs from our district.

Sergeant Rod Gardner from Dandenong Police District in charge of multi culture assimilation spoke to the delegates about Police work in this area. A number of Rotarians, parents and teachers visited during the weekend and watched the debating. District Governor Tim and Jane also visited and District Governor Tim presented the students with their certificates of participation and awards.

Seven current United Nations Assembly resolutions were debated by our students. These were: (1) Taking action against gender-related killing of women and girls, (2) Women in development (3) Standard minimum rules for the treatment of prisoners (4) Situation of Human Rights in the Syrian Arab Republic (4) Second United Nations decade for the eradication of poverty (6) protection of Human Rights and fundamental Freedoms while countering terrorism (7) The right of self-determination to the people of Crimea without outside interference. All Resolutions were vigorously debated and passed.



## Computers in Cambodia - A Successful Matching Grant project



"These kids need access to computers – but how can we help?" pondered Stevie, whilst in the midst of helping to build a Secondary School extension in Cambodia. Sponsorship for a 70 km walk around Phillip Island amassed a good sum of money and then came the idea to apply for a Matching Grant.

Stevie's Club Phillip Island & San Remo gained support of Wonthaggi, Koo Wee Rup/Lang Lang and Phnom Penh Rotary Clubs and with \$22,000 provided through DDF and TRF the project was achievable.

Things moved quickly following TRF approval and 17 solar powered computers, printer, projector, teacher desk and office furniture as well as students desks and chairs were delivered to the school. The obstacle of no electricity in the village had been overcome.

Fortuitously, Stevie along with local Gippsland Organisation "Brynsschool", was chaperoning an alternative schoolies group to Cambodia which became a RAWCS Project. How very fortunate! The group of very savvy computer experts introduced the eager Cambodian children to their new Computer Centre.

The grant provided for 2 years internet service but the service available was inadequate. The hiccup was overcome by the installation of poles to carry 5 – 6 kms of fibre optic cable. Problem solved!!

Stevie's Club will fund a computer teacher for 2 years and this person will also train existing school teachers so the whole school will be learning computer education.

## Matching Grant for Disadvantaged Girls in India

Matching Grant No 75271 has come to a very positive conclusion in spite of a number of delays over which we had no control. The total project had a budget of \$55,100.00 supported by six D9820 Clubs, District 9820 Designated Funds, District Designated Funds (DDF) from India, and the local Dharmavarum Midtown Club in India, all of which was matched by The Rotary Foundation.

The Rotary Club of Dharmavarum Midtown were our partner Club. This Club is a dynamic Club with many hard working Rotarians. PP and Past AG, Suresh Sunku oversaw the project from India and our communication with him and his Club was excellent.

PDG Ian Pickering, PP Steve Shutt, Rotarians Phillip McMillan (now President), and Lyn Pickering from the Rotary Club of Narre Warren visited India and were part of the distribution of school uniforms, and sports equipment to six schools, in rural locations. Just getting to the schools took some time because of the bad road conditions, however the visits were all worthwhile, just to see the pleasure in the girls eyes when receiving their school uniforms. We were pleased the school chosen were selected on the basis of need rather than convenient location. All the students were excited to have visitors at their school. We received wonderful receptions by the school community, as well as families who came in to see what was happening. All students were very pleased with the sports equipment. The computers, desks and a large number of school uniforms and sports equipment had been distributed prior to our visit.

The six D9820 Clubs supporting this impressive Matching Grant of \$55,100 with Club donations amounting to \$12,000 were -

## Hastings Westernport, Kooweerup Lang Lang, Mt. Martha, Narre Warren, Pakenham and Rosebud Rye

The breakdown of expenditure for the Matching Grant was as follows -

55% towards uniforms, books, fees, and lunch utensils for 1400 girls

15% desks

15% sports equipment

15% computers for the Vocational Training Centre for girls and young women

YES, the project had many positive outcomes for the students

YES, we had some frustrating times having this Matching Grant signed off by their District and the Delhi office.

YES, we had to build some bridges and get over them

YES, we made some great friendships

YES, we maintain ongoing friendship with members and families of the Rotary Club of Dharmavarum Midtown

YES, we would support further Matching Grants

The rules for Matching Grants have changed more recently, and it is necessary to speak with The Rotary Foundation team of D9820 who will give updated advice on how best to go about becoming involved in a life changing experience.
