November is Foundation month ...


As many of you will know from my visits to your Clubs, The Rotary Foundation is Rotary's only charity. It is the powerhouse that enables Rotary to 'do good in the world' on the International stage, as well as locally and nationally.

The Foundation provides the financial support for major International projects as well as providing support for those projects done by Clubs through District and Global Grants.

There are three funds in The Rotary Foundation: the Annual Fund, PolioPlus and the Endowment Fund.

Contributions to the Endowment Fund are invested in perpetuity and only the interest is used to fund ongoing operations. Donations we make to the Endowment Fund will continue to provide for Rotary projects long after we have gone. It is a great way to provide support for many years. You might like to consider supporting the Endowment Fund by leaving a bequest in your will. A bequest of USD1000 makes you a Benefactor, while bequests over this amount are recognised by membership of the Bequest Society.

Contributions to the PolioPlus Fund are used exclusively to support Rotary's fight to eradicate Polio from the World. There are no administration costs so every dollar donated finds its way to provide vaccinations for the children of the World. Currently every dollar donated to the Fund through The Foundation attracts two dollars from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation; a wonderful way to maximise your contribution.



Contributions to the Annual Fund allow Rotary to

support major humanitarian projects, in water and sanitation, maternal and child health, education to name just a few, as well as funding Districts to enable Clubs to do projects at the local and national levels. All of the funds donated are invested for a period of three years. Then, 50% is used to fund Rotary International projects, such as the Peace Fellows Program, and 50% comes back to the District to be used in District and Global Grant support. I wonder what other charity gives you back 50% of your donation to use in whatever way you think appropriate? The cost for administering The Annual Fund is currently only 2.3% per annum, comparing favourably with more than most other funds. For example, one of Australia's best performing charities is Care Australia where the cost of raising funds is 6%. Recently, Charity Navigator, one of the most respected charity evaluators in the United Sates, rated The Rotary Foundation with its maximum four-star rating. This is the seventh consecutive four-star rating for The Foundation; only 2% of charities rated by Charity Navigator have achieved this distinction. You can be confident your contributions to your Foundation – your charity – are well-managed and end up where you intend they should.

There are many ways you can support your Foundation.

Every Rotarian Every Year is a program encouraging Rotarians to contribute every year. It doesn't matter how much you donate; every dollar helps. Perhaps you could add a couple of dollars to your meeting fee and ask the Club Secretary to remit this on your behalf to The Foundation.

The Centurion Program recognises Rotarians who donate AUD100 each year, while the Sustaining Member recognises a contribution of USD100 each year. That's only about \$2 each week!

For less than the price of a good cup of coffee, Rotarians can become members of the Paul Harris Society where members contribute USD1000 each year. The contribution can be made as a lump sum, or in increments. Like many others, I have authorised \$100 to be deducted from my credit card each month. I hardly know it's gone!

While I know we live in difficult economic time, we are very fortunate in Australia to have been spared from many of the financial woes affecting other parts of the World. Perhaps we can provide support to those less fortunate than ourselves by contributing to The Rotary Foundation. All contributions over \$2 made through the Australian Rotary Foundation Trust are tax deductible.

About 150 Year 6 students from 15 Primary schools around Bairnsdale completed their Rotary Junior Community Award program in this the 18th year of the program. This prestigious program, designed by the late Rotarian David Hawkey, was started in Bairnsdale in 1997 and today is still alive and well – and even growing both in Australia and internationally. The Rotary Club of Mitchell River has been supporting and maintaining this program in our local schools and distributes more than a 1000 diaries a year to participating schools through a partnership with local Rotary clubs. The Award is presented to children who complete a range of activities during their final year at primary school in four areas – Community Service, Physical Recreation, Social Experience and Skills.

DIK – CHRISTMAS BIKES

It's Christmas and you have the opportunity to make a major difference in a child's life. This is the time of year when many organizations are looking for support, but we feel that this is a little special. In rural Timor Leste there is no public transport and primary schools have to be built within walking distance of the children. For many this means walking more than an hour which is a struggle for a young child who often has a meagre diet. Donations In Kind have been lucky enough to receive a donation of excellent children's bikes from a road safety school that closed. They are children's bikes ideal for 5-8 year olds and we have around 50 in stock. Because they are small they only cost \$25.00 (tax deductable) to ship and would make ideal Christmas Present. Santa helpers come in many



disguises and the ones in the Store would be happy to pack your present into a container that is leaving for Dili soon.

One of this year's Nobel Peace Prize winners, Kailash Satyarthi, Kailash has 'rescued' 70,000 Indian children from slavery. In a similar manner, DfG has helped tens of thousands of poor young girls get an education and live in dignity. We are right in there, in a direct practical way, helping girls

The Days for Girls project is all about giving poor girls an equal chance with boys in education, in countries where girls have no means to manage their period. Many make do with anything, like corn-husks and newspapers, in order to be able to leave the house and go to school. That leads to infections, even more schooling lost and leads to illiteracy, early marriage and large families. Knowledge of their 'mature' situation makes them 'available', these girls will have children before their bodies are ready for it!

It is pleasing to know that the D 9820's first Days for Girls packs will be distributed in Cambodia over the next couple of weeks by the 'Alternate Schoolies' young people who will be travelling with the RC of Frankston Long Island. Making a difference in a practical way!
