BEQUEST SOCIETY UPDATE - As of December 31, 2009, there were 7,074 Bequest Society commitments worldwide with an expected value of US\$307.9 million. These commitments represent a significant percentage of the expectancies to the Permanent Fund and an increase of 58 new bequests valued at more than US\$4.5 million since November. MATCHING GRANT AMOUNT INCREASED - At their January meeting, the Trustees increased the maximum Matching Grant award from US\$150,000 to \$200,000, effective July 1, 2010. Health, Hunger, and Humanity (3-H) Grants were phased out effective 2009-10, due to the decrease in available World Funds. In the absence of 3-H grants, increasing the maximum Matching Grant award now allows clubs and districts to undertake larger projects than previously possible with Matching Grants. Matching Grant materials are currently being updated to reflect the change and will be available soon at www.rotary.org.

NEW CHILDRENS NOVEL WITH POLIO THEME - Author Lain Lawrence has crafted a wonderful story of friendship and imagination. "The Giant Slayer" is set in the 1950s. The picture the novel offers of the ravages of polio is quite uncompromising, especially given Lawrence's intended audience. The descriptions of children in iron lungs are honest, although gently offered, and the toll the disease took is never downplayed. <u>This book would be a very appropriate</u> gift from Rotary clubs to their local public and school libraries. It is for children age 8 to 12 but older children and adults will enjoy the story and learn a lesson about polio.
