The Rotary Foundation – District Local Grants

District grants are block grants available annually that enable clubs and districts to address immediate needs in their communities. Districts manage and disburse these funds to support district and club-sponsored activities.

- Matching grant \$1 for \$1 with club.
- ✤ Up to \$2500 contribution from the District.
- Require active Rotarian participation i.e. a Club Project
- Club or a Rotarian cannot benefit from a Grant
- Payment on approval
- Report required as well as copies of invoices

The Rotary Foundation – District International Grants

Districts may request up to 50 percent of their District Designated Fund for one grant annually. Districts manage and disburse these funds to support district and club-sponsored activities, including vocational training teams, scholarships, humanitarian service projects, and cultural exchanges that align with the Foundation's mission.

- Are for International projects that do not qualify for a global grant.
- Require an international partner that can be a Rotary District, a Rotary Club or an approved third party.
- The District contributes up to \$6,000 matching 50c to each \$1 provided by the Club
- Activity should fit with Areas of Focus
- May be a prelude to a Global Grant
- Identify beneficiaries, sustainability and measures of success
- Club accountable for funds management in line with Memorandum of Understanding.
- Up to 50% may be paid in advance.

The Rotary Foundation – Global Grants

Global grants offer clubs and districts opportunities to participate in strategically focused, high-impact activities. These grants fund largescale, international humanitarian projects, vocational training teams, and graduate and postgraduate scholarships that have sustainable, measurable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. Activities may be carried out individually or in combination — for example, one grant may support a vocational training team and a related humanitarian project.

- Global grant projects must have a minimum total budget of \$30,000.
- TRF matches the Club's 50% and District Designated Fund 80%
- These grants require a needs assessment
- All global grants must be sponsored by two clubs or districts: a host sponsor in the country where the activity takes place and an international sponsor outside that country.
- Club contributes \$10,000

DDF contributes \$7,500 TRF contributes \$10,000

Rotary Australia World Community Service Ltd. (RAWCS) is a limited company formed to support Australian Rotarians and Rotary Clubs in assisting disadvantaged communities and individuals with humanitarian aid projects.

- Rotary Overseas Aid Fund
- Donations In Kind
- Rotarians Against Malaria
- Developed Country Disaster Fund
- Rotary Australia Benevolent Society









Humanitarian Service - RAWCS

RAWCS provides

- Tax deductibility for Rotary projects
- Information about overseas Projects
- Assistance for planning Projects

All RAWCS projects must be sponsored by a Club and where possible endorsed by an overseas Club or District

- Rotarians Against Malaria
- Rotary Australia Benevolent Society

Tax deductibility for an Australian project that has benevolent relief and must be provided to people in need.





Humanitarian Service – Donations in Kind

- Receives donations of excess, out of date and unwanted equipment and materials in good condition.
- Provides clubs with materials and equipment for overseas projects
- Assists with sending containers overseas
- Assists with equipment for local projects:
 - Disability aids
 - Furniture
 - Books Blankets
- Is a great place to volunteer or hold a meeting
