As you can see above we had an extremely busy schedule in Hartford. We started off by visiting all Hartford Health's hospitals and other associated institutions. The main goal of these visits was to learn about Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome and what they have implemented to deal with the epidemic in America currently.

We met with various professionals and they presented their findings to us. It was interesting to see how many in the health field have started implementing similar programs without ever corresponding with one another. However as they find out of one another they shared their experience with one another and adapted accordingly.

WHAT I LEARNED

It has become clear that a lot of professionals over the years have looked at most substance abuse problems incorrectly and have dealt incorrectly with the mother that has the substance abuse problems. For many years in especially NAS mothers have been separated and kept away from their babies and the babies were given more drugs to overcome their withdrawal symptoms. However the last 5 years they have started to realise that the mother is integral part of the health of her child and vice versa.

The babies stay in hospital have come down 4 times since they started keeping them together and research has shown that mothers with substance abuse problems have 60% less chance of relapsing within the first year, thus motherhood has given them a meaning and a reason to stay sober.

Thus it has made me think that a lot of time we are also just looking at the mother with programmes that we have implemented. It is not always possible to look holistically, because most fathers are not involved and we have a lot of women headed households in South Africa. But I do think there needs to be a bigger drive to include men and other family members.

IMPACT OF THE TRIP

I have believe I have made life time acquaintances and friends on the trip. The host family I stayed with were people that think out of the box and that push the envelope and challenges themselves even at the age of 70. It has made me more driven and goal-directed personally and realise how easily we get comfortable in our profession and environment and that we must always push the envelope and challenge ourselves.

I am also definitely thinking of joining my local Rotary club as I do believe I can make an impact there. It was also inspiring the speech that the previous Rotary International president gave about how organisation should also inspire to change and evolve with change of the world. How young people (that include myself) does not feel connected with the 'old ways' of things being done. How we require flexibility. He spoke about if Rotary does not change they will end up with the same fate as Kodak, Block Buster Videos etc., technology has made it possible to do things remotely.

HOW I WILL USE WHAT I HAVE LEARNED PROFESSIONALLY

The trip is not finished for myself yet as the delegates of America is coming to us as well. However one thing is certain, our problems are not much different than America's problems. However we do not have the same resources to implement interventions like the USA. Thus I think we have to explore different ways of getting funds for example Social Impact Bonds. I have shared this knowledge with my CEO. More and more funders are looking at impact and we are moving in the direction were they would like to see impact before they fund a programme thus it is important to be ahead of time and look into it.

In USA they have a programme called "One Question". It have spoken to Kim if it is possible to look at a webinar were our staff, especially the Community Workers receive training on this programme. It will increase their own capabilities and expertise and give them exposure to international training.

We also need to look at our customers more holistically and get the fathers, mothers and other people in their immediate surrounding involved. However this will take time as we will need to revisit our programmes.

For me it was very interesting how they spoke about changing the prejudices of the nurses in the hospitals. This is something that needs to be explored as well. We also offer training to nurses. One of the women made a point where they told the nurses that they are not only judging the mothers but they are discriminating against them. They aimed at putting the nurses in the shoes of the mothers, mentioning to them that a lot of these women were abused when they were children, sexually or physically.

CONCLUSION

As you can see it has been exceptional trip and life time changing experience. However the experience is not done yet. Hopefully FARR and Rotary can have more correspondence in the future and another opportunity like this will come along for some of my other colleagues to experience.
