DISTRICT OPIOID TASK FORCE:

Rotary - Partnering with Lions and Elks on Addiction Initiative

District 7890 – thank you for your patience as this committee plans it's kick off meeting to introduce our collective plan on how to address this issue!!!! Please see the committee report below:

With 130 people dying daily from drug overdoses, the addiction epidemic has become the crisis of our time. To help combat the crisis, District Governor Kate Sims has joined with Lions District Governor Harry Schuh and Elks Exalted Ruler Cindy Szabo to raise public awareness of the resources available to help.



A joint addiction task force has focused on resources in the home, the workplace and in the community. Rollout is expected this spring

with a call to every Rotary club in District 7890 to get the word out. Rotarians will be joined by Lions in District 23B and Torrington Elks.

Initiatives aimed at the home include education for everyone about the dangers of unused medications. Options for disposal of unused drugs – either at police facilities or using specially designed deactivation pouches – will be presented.

In the workplace, the task force has partnered with the law firm Pullman & Comley for employer education. The goal is to guide employers to resources who can help untangle the legal issues involved when an employee admits or is discovered to be struggling with addiction. Another initiative, Shatterproof, aims to reduce the stigma associated with addiction.

Until recently, addiction has been viewed as a moral failure rather than the disease it really is. This shift in philosophy is behind Rotary's community program called H.O.P.E. (Heroin/Opioid Prevention & <u>Education</u>) where police direct addicted people to treatment rather than jail if they agree to give up their drugs and drug paraphernalia.

ESTEEM is another community program aimed at raising awareness in children as young as 10 about the importance of making good choices about drugs, bullying and other areas of their lives. More information will be available in the coming weeks. Rotarians should be proud to roll up our sleeves and work on controlling this epidemic. It touches us all. Now it's time to put service above self.

AMPUTEE CARE IN PERU

With your help we were able to support District 7980 with their Global Grant for Sustainable Amputee care in Peru!!!

The Need: There is a prevalence of approximately 190,000 amputations in Peru mainly related to Motor vehicle accidents, gunshot wounds and land mine injuries. The development and manufacture of medical devices in Peru including prosthetic limbs is hampered by the lack of experts in the field. Local Hospital data indicates that there are 10 prosthetics in Lima and One prosthetic Lab. There is no formalized training for Prosthetics and Orthotics in Peru. The underserved and uninsured do not have access to a prosthesis in their lifetime. Providing prosthesis to these individuals would enhance function, individual family and community ability to enhance their socio economic status. Hospital Nacional Daniel Alcides Carrion (www. hndac.gob.pe) established in 1941 is multispecialty 462-bed hospital and is dedicated to public health and welfare of the underserved and uninsured. The Hospital, the rehabilitation community led by local physician leaders has asked for support for training and implementation of an independent, sustainable amputee program.

The Goal: The goal of the project is to educate, train, assist in infrastructure build and establish a collaborative interdisciplinary amputee care program at Hospital Nacional Daniel Alcides Carrion, which can serve as a model for local and national health care systems. This will lead to improvement in access and quality of care to the underserved and uninsured in Peru and enhance the socioeconomic status of individuals, families and communities.

ROTARY AMBASSADOR PAYS IT FORWARD

Roseanne Sapula is a name that many in South Windsor residents are familiar with, and her acts of kindness have impacted many.

The Rotary Club of South Windsor recognized her good works last summer when she was awarded

the "Be the Inspiration" Award.

The award is given to "quiet achievers" who inspire others through their community service while keeping with the Rotary's motto "Service Above Self."

Sapula had no clue she'd received the honor at the annual Rotary picnic and embarked on a special

journey to recognize others.

"I wanted to hand pick people I've worked with in the community throughout the years that haven't seemed recognition, either. The reaction from everyone I got was kindness and everyone with love," the longtime Monday Night Social Club volunteer said.

Sapula received a Rotary backpack filled with more than \$1,200 in gifts - including gift cards from

Dairy Queen, Subway, Olive Garden, Dunkin' Donuts, BJ's Wholesale Club, Panera Bread, Battison's Fabric Care, and numerous others. The bag also included six decks of playing cards, a set of UNO game cards, Hartford Yard Goats tickets, and 24 "Be the Inspiration" pins. She also included gift cards of her own to give to those who inspire her.

Her duty was to use the contents of the backpack to reward, encourage, comfort, and inspire others as she saw fit. She fulfilled her mission in six

months.

Loved ones, community members, friends, members of the Monday Night Social Club, volunteers, mentors, families, children diagnosed with illnesses, charities, and many others all benefited from Sapula's kindness.

"One woman said, 'When we opened the door we thought it was just another candidate campaigning but we opened the door and it was a ray of sunshine: South Windsor's own Roseanne Sapula," Sapula said.

Sapula created a special binder documenting her journey shining light in people's lives. Each entry has a picture of the recipient with an explanation of why they were chosen and a thank you message from the recipient.

One of the first recipients chosen was 8-year-old Gabby. Gabby was diagnosed with lymphoma at age six, but recently went into remission while being treated at Connecticut Children's Medical Center. She received a Dairy Queen gift card.

Gabby's mother said that she was "thankful, happy, joyful, and just felt so excited that [Roseanne Sapula]

and Rotary chose her.' "That's the kind of stuff that matters. When you reach somebody's heart and a child. It's not a pity

party," Sapula said.

Bruce Maneeley, owner of Maneeley's Banquet & Catering, also reaped the benefits of the "Be the

Inspiration" honor. Maneeley often donates food to charities and events without many knowing.

"On Christmas Day, he showed the true meaning of the holiday for those in need by providing food for the Gary Craig 'We are the Children' event with 600 children in 2018. He has done this for many years behind the scenes in the kitchen," Sapula said.

Sapula's final recipient was The Bridge in South Windsor. The Bride is a nonprofit organization that provides clients in need with food, clothing, and community resource coaching. Sapula donated almost \$200 worth of gift cards to the organization to benefit its clients.



She learned about The Bridge from volunteer and case manager Jim Mangan, a patient of South Windsor Dental where Sapula works. She knew giving to the organization would be the perfect finale.

"Thank you so much for concluding your mission with The Bridge. We are profoundly grateful and assure you that the gift cards will bring joy to our clients," Mangan wrote in a thank you statement. SENIORS JOB BANK GETS FINANCIAL BOOST FROM ROTARY CLUB OF WEST HARTFORD

The Seniors Job Bank has received a \$1,500 grant from the Rotary Club of West Hartford. According to Sheila Diamond, Seniors Job Bank executive director, "This very welcome donation has been earmarked to support enhancements to our website."

The Seniors Job Bank, now in its 40th year, is a volunteer-driven community service organization that connects men and women over age 50, seeking work, with businesses, government agencies, nonprofits, and households that have work to be done. From its West Hartford headquarters, SJB serves the entire Greater Hartford region.

Eileen Rau, West Hartford Rotary Foundation chair, noted that the award "signals a longstanding shared commitment of our local Rotary club and the Seniors Job Bank for us both to deliver value to our community."

Dennis Carrithers, president of the Seniors Job Bank pointed out that, "Linking our job seeking service providers with the clients that hire them is free; we charge no referral fee to either party. So we depend on contributions from individuals, philanthropies and hometown supporters like Rotary to maintain our no-cost policy."

Describing how the Seniors Job Bank operates, Diamond said that when a client with a job to fill calls SJB, its request is matched against a database of approximately 700 service providers, representing about 150 distinct skills and talents, blue- and white collar.

The potential employer, a company, other entity or household, receives contact information for several service providers qualified to handle the task at hand. The client then decides which service providers to interview and hire. Negotiating the specifics of the assignment: exactly what's to be done, hours, compensation, etc., is between client and service provider. The Seniors Job Bank merely facilitates the introduction.



"While our service providers are over 50, the clients for which they work may be of any age," Diamond added.

Some of the Seniors Job Bank's domestic clients need help with one-time repairs and chores. Others engage an SJB service provider for ongoing home and yard maintenance programs or personal assistance such as with grocery shopping. Similarly, commercial clients look for aid on a regular, part-time schedule as well as for one-off assignments. These jobs may involve office, transportation, retail, industrial and many other types of work.

A BIG NIGHT FOR WETHERSFIELD/ROCKY HILL ROTARY


On Monday, December 10, 2018 The Wethersfield/Rocky Hill Rotary Club provided many honors.





The proceeds from the event benefit the multitude of Rotary Club charities. Newington Rotary is comprised of dedicated business professionals and retirees whose annual fundraising projects include collecting food and monetary donations to support the town's food pantry, providing backpacks and school supplies for needy children, distributing dictionaries at local elementary schools, supporting new programs implemented by the town's fire and police departments and hosting an annual golf tournament that benefits its signature charity - the Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation - a Rotary project that in seven years has raised more than \$150,000 to combat pediatric cancer.

NEWINGTON ROTARY LAUNCHES ANTI-HUMAN TRAFFICKING INITIATIVE

A new committee has formed in town, with a mission to tackle the modern-day slavery known as human trafficking. The group is hosting its first Public Forum on Human Trafficking on Tuesday, March 5 from 6-8 p.m. inside the auditorium at John Wallace Middle School, 71 Halleran Dr. Speakers will address the issue itself, how it affects youth locally and warning signs to prevent it and report it.



The Stop the Traffik! Committee is Newington Rotary Club's 2018-19 community service project, launched by President David Tedeschi. The committee is comprised of not only Rotarians, but also community members like Newington Police Chief Stephen Clark and former State Rep. Gary Byron.

Committee member Patricia Young spent three months volunteering in Miami, Florida at a safe house for victims. Volunteers would like to start up a similar project here in Connecticut, where sex-trafficking has largely remained hidden in a black market. "Everything always starts at the local level," Young said. "The more you find out about this unfortunate evil the more you realize it's happening everywhere."

Tedeschi and several others were first introduced to human trafficking at a Rotary International convention in Atlanta, Georgia. As they learned, a trafficker uses force, fraud or coercion to control another person for the purpose of engaging in commercial sex acts or soliciting labor or services against his or her will. "We had no idea how prevalent it was in the United States," Tedeschi said. "My heart sank when I learned this stuff was going on, not just in Thailand or Africa but right here in our backyards."

The Berlin Turnpike, a known hot-spot for prostitution and drug transactions, has also been the site of several human trafficking cases. One of the most high-profile of these is detailed in the book, "The Berlin Turnpike: A True Story of Human Trafficking in America." The U.S. Dept. of Homeland Security's Blue Campaign, the Human Anti-Trafficking Response Team (HART) and CT Department of Children and Families' Trafficking in Persons Council (TIP) are working to combat this issue. Still, TIP's 2017 Annual Report estimated there were 2,000 buyers of child sex in our state over the course of one year.

Stop the Traffik!'s first order of business is raising awareness in the upcoming forum. Freedom United CEO Joe Schmidt will be a special guest speaker. The second goal is educating youth. School curriculum on hu-

man trafficking has only been implemented in public schools in California. Committee members plan to reach out to local youth community groups to spread the word.

CT Rotary District 7890 awarded Newington's club a \$2400 grant to start working on this new initiative. "As Rotarians we feel we can be advocates for change, but we can't do it alone," Tedeschi said. Past President LeeAnn Johnson's main goal is to raise awareness in schools. "Children need to understand what the dangers are," she explained. "Often times they aren't even aware they're being preyed upon and they are trafficked before they even know they're in danger." Trafficking criminals tend to



seek out vulnerable and naïve teen girls in places like shopping malls or movie theatres. They get hooked with compliments, gifts or even legitimate employment offers. "It's heinous," Johnson added. "And it deserves more attention than it's getting. Any light we can shed on it, any awareness we can raise, is time well spent."

Public Act 17-32, An Act Concerning Human Trafficking, requires the operators of certain businesses to post notices concerning services available to trafficking victims. However, there is currently no agency monitoring compliance. Stop the Traffik! plans to distribute posters to local motels, salons and other common trafficking sites. "We want to make sure any business identified in that public act has a flyer posted," Tedeschi said. "We also want to make their accountability addressed by the law. The more we understand and recognize the signs of human trafficking, the closer we come to freeing those enslaved."






