

Club statements must be submitted or confirmed by the club's president and district statements must be submitted or confirmed by the governor.

Statements may be in support of, in opposition to, or as a comment on an item of legislation. The deadline for submitting statements is **14 February 2019** and they may not exceed 2000 characters. A separate form should be used for each statement. Please note that substantially similar statements will be merged, with each submitter being listed on one statement.

Statements will be distributed electronically to all representatives before the Council.

We are 99% of the way towards eradicating one of the worst diseases known to mankind through our polio challenge. Through our water project, headed by Rick Lawrence and funded by 23 local clubs and Global Grants, the lives of hundreds of people in Guatemala have been improved. Through our Vocational Training Teams we are teaching specific groups to develop sustainable processes taught by the VTT and implemented on a local basis around the world.

So, in closing, our sincere thanks for your thoughtfulness and generosity as we continue to carry out our Mission. Please give some thought to using Rotary Month as a springboard to action! 


Franklin County Festive of Trees

It was an amazing experience—not only sharing our excitement and enthusiasm for polio eradication with so many strong supporters, but knowing that our event was just one of the 3,300 registered World Polio Day events taking place around the world on that day. Every one helped raise awareness of our work; every one brought eradication that much closer.

Rotary's work to eradicate polio continues, as does our work to promote literacy, economic development, better health, clean water, and peace throughout the world—all of it supported by our Rotary Foundation. In its 101st year, our Foundation continues to be the engine that drives the Rotary machine, allowing Rotary clubs and districts to aspire to larger, more ambitious projects with transformative, sustainable impact.

If your club is thinking about taking on a more ambitious project, remember that Rotary Action Groups (RAGs) are great resources. Some of the largest RAGs serve as leaders in Rotary's areas of focus and help clubs take on large-scale global grant pro-

jects: RAG for Population and Development, Water and Sanitation RAG, RAG for Family Health and AIDs Prevention, Microfinance and Community Development RAG, and RAG for Peace. Connect directly with a RAG for assistance with a project, district, or global grant, at any stage of planning.

You can end Foundation Month on a charitable note by participating in Giving Tuesday, 27 November. Rotary will be joining thousands of other organizations worldwide for a global day of giving. Our new online giving platform has made it easier than ever to give to the Foundation, and you can easily notify someone of a gift made in their honor via email or by printing and delivering a customized notification yourself.

THANK YOU PLAINFIELD ROTARY FROM ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE



East Longmeadow raises Polio Awareness

The Rotary Club of East Longmeadow made strides to raise awareness of Polio Eradication efforts that started in 1988 and Rotary International's involvement. The Rotarians used wooden and metal splints crafted at Shriner's Hospital for Children in Springfield Massachusetts and a scavenger hunt highlighting the Five Facts about Polio from ENDPOLIONOW.ORG on October 20, 2018 at their community Celebrate EL event. With the contributions of multiple community organizations and businesses, the club was able to educate ~250 children and their families about Polio just a few days before World Polio Day (October 24th). In addition to the bounce houses, pumpkin patch, tractor rides and great concessions, three dance companies performed on the club's bandshell stage for "Showcase your talent". The East Longmeadow Children's Library Director was on hand to announce the club and Rotary District 7890 contributions to the library's Launchpad program. Eight high school students completed a total of 41.5 community service hours toward graduation. 19 Rotarians and their family members were on hand throughout the day to set-up/break-down the event, serve concessions, manage the fun and games, and provide information about Rotary and how we serve our communities.



Putnam Rotary helps refresh Rotary Park bandstand

PUTNAM --- The crown of Rotary Park, the bandstand, was looking a little tarnished.

The number of events and performances that had taken place on the bandstand stage extension over the last 14 years had taken its toll.

The deck was made of simple plywood and after 14 years, there was warping, rotting and some wear and tear, said Parks and Recreation Director Willie Bousquet. "It was losing integrity," he added.

When the bandstand was first used, Bousquet said, the town realized that an extension was needed.

The stage extension has "just enhanced performances in the park," said Bousquet. But it needed replacing after so many years of service.

The Putnam Rotary Club joined with the town to get the stage extension decking replaced. Karen Osbrey, the club's project chair, applied for a Rotary District 7890 grant. The club won a grant for \$1,750 and added \$2,000 from the Putnam Rotary Club's budget. That covered the materials, according to Bousquet. The town kicked in the labor to install the decking.

Osbrey, in her application for the Rotary grant, said the project would benefit the community because it would expose everyone to the arts --- free. Over the years, she said, the facility has hosted "both amateur and professional performances ... everything from high school band and choral concerts, dance recitals, martial arts demonstra-

tions, acrobats and magicians to professional symphonies, opera performances, military bands and Shakespeare in the Park" and more.

The decking, which measures 32 by 16 feet, was replaced with Trex. "It's a nice decking that will last for a long long time," Bousquet said.

"We'll continue to have the ability to accommodate large groups and the ability to accommodate performers," he added.

Hurricane Florence Relief Donations

Many have asked how to help with hurricane relief efforts. District 7730 has been contacted and provided information on ways to help:

"There is still a long way to go in terms of recovery. The greatest need is housing as many of the homes were inundated with water as Hurricane Florence dumped 36 inches of rain over a three day period. Electrical power was lost in the initial hours of the storm and in some instances took 7-10 days to restore. Black mold spread throughout the waterlogged homes and businesses in the humid heat of eastern North Carolina. Subsequently, they have been gutted and must be rebuilt. Our District has a emergency fund and opened a grant program to individuals, businesses and non profits who need assistance. We received 56 applications totaling \$736K. Our fund contains only 10% of the amount requested. Any amount donated is appreciated and needed. The outpouring of support from Rotary clubs across the country has been tremendous. Your interest in our district demonstrates the awe-some power of Rotary and the embodiment of our motto, "service above self."

For those who want to contribute, we recommend using the Donor Advisor Fund, (DAF). The advantages of using this fund are:

- 1) It is already established and ready to receive funds, NOW.
- 2) Payments can be made online to the Rotary Foundation for relief efforts.

Donations received online cannot be earmarked specifically for District 7730. However, any checks made to this DAF can be allocated for 7730 as long as it indicated on the check. As a reminder contributions to this DAF are tax deductible.
