# How to watch Rotary's World Polio Day Event on October 24

You don't have to travel to Philadelphia to take part in Rotary's World Polio Day event on 24 October. You can watch a livestream of the proceedings from your computer or smartphone starting at 18:30 Philadelphia time (UTC-4). A recording will be available shortly after the event on endpolio.org.

Rotary will also stream the event in French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, and Spanish.

This year's event will be livestreamed from the College of Physicians of Philadelphia, known as the birthplace of American medicine. It is one of the oldest professional medical organizations in the United States.

Global health experts and Rotary's celebrity polio ambassadors will discuss our remarkable progress toward a polio-free world. Patience Asiimwe, the protagonist of Rotary's upcoming virtual reality film "Two Drops of Patience," will introduce the movie. A sneak peek from Rotary's documentary "Drop to Zero" will also be featured. Jeffrey Kluger, senior editor for Time magazine, will discuss his experience traveling to Nigeria with Rotary to report on polio eradication. And we'll celebrate the 30th anniversary of the founding of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

### Rotary Direct Frequently Asked Questions

### **How can I sign up for Rotary Direct?**

There are three ways to enroll in Rotary Direct, The Rotary Foundation's recurring giving program:

- At www.rotary.org/give: Enrolling online is the easiest and most secure way to support Rotary with a recurring gift. Rotary members and friends can set up Rotary Direct accounts by clicking on the Give button from any part of Rotary's website, then choosing how to direct their donations. Rotary's online system can accept one-time or recurring contributions in a number of currencies. For a recurring gift, in Step 2 of the donation process, under Frequency, chose a monthly, quarterly or annual gift.
- By mail: Donors may enroll using one of the Foundation's various contribution forms, such as The Rotary Foundation Contribution Form or the Rotary Direct enrollment form.
- By phone: Enroll in Rotary Direct by calling 1-866-976-8279.

#### Is there a minimum contribution?

Because we pay processing fees for credit card contributions, we ask for a minimum of \$10 per transaction (i.e., \$10 per month, \$10 per quarter, or \$10 per year).

### Can I have my donation debited directly from my checking account?

Direct debit using a checking account number is not an option for Rotary Direct. Donors can, however, donate using a credit card or a debit card that is associated with a personal checking account. Which card types can be used depends on the donor's country and currency.

### Can a club Treasurer establish recurring gifts for an entire club online?

No. Club leaders can make one-time contributions on behalf of the club or individual club members online, but they can't enroll their members in recurring giving. Each donor must enroll in Rotary Direct with his or her own credit or debit card.

### What frequency options are available for Rotary Direct gifts?

You can choose to make your gift every month, quarter or year. Monthly gifts are charged on the first day of the month. Quarterly gifts are charged July 1, October 1, January 1, and April 1. For annual gifts, you choose the month, and your card is charged on the first of that month.

### How do I change or stop my Rotary Direct contributions?

To change the amount or frequency of your gift, or your method of payment, or to stop your contributions, contact the Rotary International office that serves your area or Rotary's Support Center at 1-866-976-8279. For security reasons, do not send credit card information by email.

### Will The Rotary Foundation contact me if my credit card expires?

Yes, Rotary staff will contact you approximately two weeks before your credit card expires, first by email and later, if necessary, by phone.

# Will The Rotary Foundation contact me if my card if rejected and I miss a scheduled contribution?

Yes, TRF will notify you by email if a scheduled transaction fails. If we are unable to reach you by email, we will attempt to notify you by phone and then by mail. If you miss a scheduled contribution, we can arrange a one-time make-up gift to help you meet your annual contribution goal.

# My credit card is about to expire or has expired. What information do you need in order to update my account?

To update your account, we need your complete credit card number, expiration date, and the three or four digit security number. Remember not to send credit card information by email; instead, call the Rotary International office that serves your area or Rotary's Support Center at 1-866-976-8279.

### Do I have to notify Rotary if I transfer to a different Rotary club?

Yes, please do. Notifying the Foundation of your transfer allows your new club to receive credit for your contributions.

### Do I have to be a Rotary member to enroll in Rotary Direct?

No, you do not need to be a Rotarian to give through Rotary Direct. Anyone who wishes to support the Foundation's mission is welcome to do so with a recurring contribution.

### How will my Rotary Direct contributions be acknowledged?

Upon enrollment, new Rotary Direct participants will receive an acknowledgement letter confirming the amount and frequency of their contributions. Gifts made to The Rotary Foundation via Rotary Direct will be receipted individually at the time of contribution. Each scheduled contribution will be credited to a donor's individual account, Rotary club and district and will be used wisely on quality Rotary projects.



### Rotary Foundation Fun Facts


PROGRAMS (All figures are as of 30 June 2017 and in U.S. dollars.)

PolioPlus. Since 1985, Rotary members have helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio. As of June 2017, Rotary had committed more than \$1.6 billion to global polio eradication, seeking to eliminate the virus in the last three countries where it remains endemic and to ensure that it does not return elsewhere. In 2016-17, program awards, including PolioPlus Partners grants, totaled \$108.3 million.

Rotary Peace Centers. Each year, the Foundation supports the training of peace fellows at six Rotary Peace Centers, where they earn master's degrees or professional development certificates. Since 2002-03, 1,177 fellows from more than 120 countries have participated. In 2016-17, 95 fellows from 41 countries began their studies at the Rotary Peace Centers, and program awards for the fellows and centers totaled \$4.6 million.

District grants. District grants support small-scale, short-term projects related to the Foundation's mission. In 2016-17, the Foundation approved 494 district grants, and project awards totaled \$25.8 million.

Global grants. Global grants fund large-scale international activities with sustainable, measurable results that support Rotary's six areas of focus. Activities include humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. In 2016-17, the Foundation approved 1,260 global grants, and program awards totaled \$72.9 million.








### 2016-17 TOTAL CONTRIBUTIONS (in millions) \$304.4 million

### Polio Eradication Update

Rotary's crusade against polio is probably the longest concerted effort to eradicate any disease by any organization. Our accomplishments have been phenomenal but, until we cross the '0' line, we need to keep the fight going. As of the end of September there are 17 cases of wild polio virus cases, 4 in Pakistan and 13 in Afghanistan. Nigeria continues their '0' wild polio virus cases status since August 2016.

There is an increase in circulating vaccine derived polio virus cases (cVDPV) in the African continent led by DRC with 15 and Papua New Guinea with 14 for a total of 50 compared to 48 last year. The live oral vaccine (OPV) is being steadily replaced with inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) to combat the occurrence of cVDPV. Nationwide mass immunizations continue in all endemic countries and also in the neighboring countries.


Steady flow of donations and other financial supports continue to reinforce the eradication initiatives led by Rotary. The Gates Foundation continues to match on a 2:1 basis all Rotary contributions. The END-GAME is getting nearer and nearer with the solid support from Rotarians around the world and our partners like Gates Foundation, CDC and the UNICEF.

# Rotarians partner with the Elks to create a television program addressing the Opiate Addiction Crisis

The Rotary District 7890 Addiction Task Force partnered with the Elks to present an educational program at Manchester Community College Thursday 10/4/2018 on the Manchester community's response to the addiction crisis, and an explanation of how the disease of addiction takes hold of our brain and destroys the lives of addicts. In 2017 there were 72,000 deaths from drug overdoses in America, and nearly half of Americans have a family member or close friend who has been addicted to drugs. This epidemic cuts across all sex, race, age, educational levels and every socio-economic status. As Rotarians we have a responsibility to address this epidemic by doing what we do best: education, collaboration, and advocacy. The Rotary District 7890 Addiction Task Force has established three main areas of focus: CREATE AWARENESS of the crisis, INCREASE AND IMPROVE ACCESS to needed and successful services, and REDUCE THE STIGMA OF THIS DISEASE.

Manchester Rotarian and Police Chief Marc Montminy, the Rotary District 7890 Addiction Task Force Chair, and Sarah Howroyd, MSW Co-Founder of the Manchester, CT Hope Initiative described the shocking and rapid growth of the addiction crisis and overdose deaths in our country and our state.

They then went on to explain how the MANCHESTER, CT HOPE INITIATIVE has successfully linked law enforcement with treatment services to provide an alternative to arrest and incarceration, while creating a path to recovery for those afflicted with the disease of addiction.

Our second presentation was made possible by the Elks who brought in a nationally recognized speaker from California: Ray Lozano is a Prevention Specialist and Youth Speaker. Ray, described how the reward system used by our brain leads to an obsessive craving of mind and body that results in our pursuit and use of substances which then takes precedence over all other healthy activities and drives. When the video program becomes available, please share it with your local service clubs- Rotary, Elks, Lions and Kiwanis, local public access television, our schools, police, and other community organizations. Many thanks to those who are working to "Make A Difference" in their communities to address our Addiction Crises.

# A note on Council on Legislation and Resolutions from Sue Klock, your District 7890 delegate to the Council on Legislation and Council on Resolutions

The resolutions for the 2018 Council on Resolutions have been transmitted and published. To begin reviewing the proposed resolutions, please go to: my.rotary.org/cor/vote. Resolutions are available for all Rotarians to read. Representatives will begin voting on 15 October.

The voting period ends on 15 November 2018, midnight central standard time. Results should be made available by November 20th. I will share with you all a link to the results when they are available.

A resolution is a request to the RI Board or The Rotary Foundation Trustees to take an action that is outside the purview of the constitutional documents. Constitutional documents are The Rotary International Constitution, Bylaws and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. Ideally, a resolution should affect the Rotary world, rather than address local or administrative issues.

Recently, at the Zone Conference in Montreal, I attended a mandatory training session for Council representatives. We discussed procedures at the Council on Legislation to be held in Chicago April 2019. We had an opportunity to critique some of our peers who will be defending their proposals during the Council. I believe it was a valuable, learning experience for all of us.

# Rotary of Avon-Canton Mission in Uganda

Rotary of Avon-Canton became involved in the Masindi, Uganda program in 2014, when Guiding Light Orphans (GLO) held its first medical camp supported by staff from Masindi Hospital and the Masindi Rotary Club. The medical camp included vaccinations, education for pregnant women, HIV-Aids testing, cervical cancer testing, distribution of multi-vitamins and mosquito nets, and various health training and preventive education sessions. That first camp served more than 400 people, which at the time represented the outstanding results of an ambitious first program.

In 2015 GLO held its second medical camp with a second generous donation from Rotary of Avon-Canton. Leadership at the Club encouraged GLO to think not only of expansion but also sustainability. Long-term sustainability is one of the biggest challenges faced by missions of this nature; many experience initial success but do not continue past a few years. it would take time to establish a relationship with their community, church, and Ministry of Health. In 2016 the idea of building a permanent clinic structure was born. GLO expanded their fundraising circle but Rotary of Avon-Canton continued to be the cornerstone of their fundraising efforts. Rotary of Avon-Canton funded a clean water-tank system for the community and a shipping container "Clinic-in-a-Can" which GLO converted into three medical offices.

In 2017 Rotary of Avon-Canton provided important medical equipment to help the clinic's development. As GLO's reach and impact evolves, our Rotary Club stands side-by-side as an international partner. We recently initiated an International Committee, through which Jolly continues to share her expertise.

In 2018, continuing to push for long-term sustainability, Rotary of Avon-Canton helped to fund a GLO women's project that trained women to make menstruation kits for personal use and sale to other women. The project creates a woman-led industry that employs and supports the needs of women. Other initiatives in progress include a micro-economics program and a community garden.

Since the first mission in 2014, GLO has provided medical services to more than 24,000 people. The program continues this October with a mission trip including four medical staff and a member of our own Rotary of Avon-Canton and his wife, who wished to assist GLO in its latest mission trip!

The Rotary of Avon-Canton is immensely proud to support GLO and is humbled and inspired by the services that they provide to the Masindi community. Together we have learned, grown and served.

Can Rotary make a Difference? In more ways than you can ever imagine. Thank you so much to all Rotarians everywhere and a very special THANK YOU to the Rotary of Avon-Canton family, whose boundless passion and commitment truly exemplifies "Service above Self".

# Simsbury-Granby completes Global Grant

The Rotary Club of Simsbury-Granby successfully completed a \$35,000 grant from the Rotary Foundation in partnership with Club Rotario Riobamba in Ecuador. The grant was used to support the ophthalmology program at a Riobamba foundation and ambulatory surgical and health clinic that serves the poor throughout Ecuador. The clinic is called Clinico Quirurgico Ambulatorio Fibuspam and is located high in the Andes in Riobamba. The grant supported the purchase of two important and sophisticated instruments to support the diagnosis and treatment of eye disease. Eye disease such as cataracts and pterygium is widespread in the Ecuadorian Andes due to the high altitude and proximity to the sun and its radiation. The clubs together acquired a Topcon "Alladin" cataract workstation with corneal topography, a sophisticated instrument that allows for precise corneal measurement to support cataract and laser surgery. They also purchased a portable slit lamp to support the extensive work that Fibuspam does in remote communities throughout Ecuador. This allows more sophisticated examination and diagnosis in the field which could not be done before. Both of these instruments will improve the sight of thousands of Ecuadorians and particularly those who have no ability to pay or no access to health care. Fibuspam is immensely grateful and looks forward to changing more lives with this new equipment. Seventy percent of the population of their province, Chimborazo, is indigenous; A population that is extremely poor with historically little or no access to health care. As many as 4 million people (25% of Ecuador's current population) have fled the country seeking opportunity elsewhere and the majority is from this region. The members of the Simsbury-Granby club are thrilled to be able to improve health care delivery and sight for the poor of Chimborazo Province and beyond. The equipment was received at the clinic on September 5th and is now in full use helping to restore the sight of and provide hope for thousands of Ecuadorians. # Two Global Grants will provide Clean Water & Sanitation Facilities to Guatemalan Villages

Applications are in the process of being submitted to The Rotary Foundation (TRF) for two more Global Grants (GG) to support the funds necessary to purchase materials and supplies for sustainable clean water and sanitation facilities in the Mayan villages of Chajalajya and Simajulehu. As with the 22 previous projects sponsored by District 7890, all labor will be provided by the men and women in the communities. 765 families (approximately 4,743 people) will benefit from these improvements.

District Chair for Water & Sanitation Projects Rick Lawrence is gathering the required documents, MOU's, training templates, pro-forma cost estimates and other information that must accompany the GG Applications. This information is being obtained from the Cooperating Organization, ALDEA, and the Host Rotary Club in La Antigua, Guatemala.

District 7890 has been the leader by providing District Designated Funds (DDF) since GG's were initiated by TRF six years ago. Yearly, close to half the clubs in our District have assisted in the funding and this notice is intended to remind those clubs that their support has been so instrumental in achieving the required funding.

In March 2019 Rick and his wife, Elin, have scheduled their yearly visit to participate in the completion and dedication of the three villages funded by last RY's GG's – Pamezul, Vista Hermosa and San Vicente. Upon their return to New England in late April, they will once again offer to be the guest speaker at clubs in CT, MA and RI in order to show how these projects improve immeasurably the lives of these people.
