
Global Grants can fund large scale projects and activities that:

- Align with one of the Areas of Focus
- Respond to a need the benefiting community has identified
- Include the active participation of the benefiting community
- Are designed to enable the community to help itself after the Rotary Club or District has concluded its work. (examples)
- Have measurable results





Understanding the Global Grant Model:

- Global Grants are a different model than Matching Grants
- Supply alone is not sufficient for a Global Grant.
- Supply must be coupled with suitable training and ongoing maintenance systems (examples)
- Supply can also create local employment
- Applications must include the processes for measuring sustainability.
- Allowances must be made in the budget to cover monitoring and evaluation over at least 3 years.



AREAS OF FOCUS

Projects that receive Global Grant funds from The Rotary Foundation should fall under at least one of the following:



Peace and conflict prevention/resolution



Disease prevention and treatment



Water and sanitation



Maternal and child health




Basic education and literacy



Economic and community development





Participants in the Project Grant:


- A Rotary club in this district is the Primary Sponsor and that club must be qualified, and they apply online
- Other clubs, individuals and organisation can participate
- There must be host Rotary club in the country of the project
- The Host club and District must be qualified
- The Host club does not have to contribute, but often their district will contribute DDF.
- The host Club must not have more than 10 Global Grants open



Financing from Clubs and others:

- At least 30% should come from the Primary Sponsor club, or it's sponsors
- Club funds and other sponsor funds are matched 50% by the TRF
- Funds from the benefiting community are best held separately for future maintenance and such like
- Tax deductibility and PHF credits can also be incorporated in most grant porjects . Refer the TRF Parramatta office and
- RAWCS






Financing from Districts:

- Approximately 25% of funding can come from District Designated Funds (DDF)
- DDF usually comes from two or more districts with our District contributing the larger amount- up to \$10,000
- DDF is matched 100% by the TRF
- When the project is approved, the DDF is paid directly from the TRF into the project bank account.





Vocational Training Teams VTTs:

- A team of professionals who travel to another country to give vocational training to a benefiting community,
- Can also be teams coming to Australia for training
- Teams must have at least two members (Rotarian or non Rotarians), with at least two years experience in the designated areas of focus
- The team must contain at Rotarian leader with experience in the area of focus
- Applications, budgets, sustainability and terms and conditions are the same as for any other Global Grant




A typical budget for a small Global Grant

Club		TRF

\$10,000		\$5,000	\$15,000
	\$10,000	\$10,000	\$20,000
Total		\$15,000	\$35,000

- The minimum TRF match is \$15,000
- The \$10,000 DDF might be \$7,000 D9685 and \$3,000 other District
- All figures must be in US\$

Summary


A Global Grant is not easy, and it will take patients and good planning. But once completed, it will be something that will really make a difference, and something that ultimately you and your club will be very proud of.


