Gina Growden (PDG Harold Sharp)

Gina was invited to join the Rotary Club of Lane Cove in 1998 shortly after she commenced as the Chief Executive of the Prostate Cancer Foundation, an organisation established by the Lane Cove Club and strongly supported by it. The following year was the Club's Vocational Service Director and Bulletin editor and so began her involvement in and passion for Rotary. Her husband, Harold Sharp, a member of the Crows Nest Club, was Governor in 2002-03 which was a truly exciting and rewarding time for both of them.

In 2004 Harold and Gina relocated to the Central Coast and Gina transferred her Rotary membership to the Terrigal Club. Retirement from full-time work at that stage meant Gina then had more time to devote to Rotary. Her District Rotary experience began in 2004 when she was invited to join District 9680's Scholarships Committee; she served on that committee for the next eight years, the last three as its chair.

In 2008 Gina was selected to lead a Group Study Exchange team to Brazil and in 2010 later chaired the GSE District Committee, organising an exchange with Germany, and with Harold, a Wheelchair Group Study Exchange with Arizona – the first such exchange in Rotary anywhere in the world. Both were extremely successful resulting in a Rotary Foundation District Service Award presented to each of them that year. Gina became the first female President of Terrigal club in 2008-9 and served again in 2012-13. She has also held most board positions since joining Terrigal. DG George Papallo invited Gina to become an Assistant Governor in 2010-11 and since then has held the role of District Secretary.

Gina is a multiple Paul Harris Fellow, a Centurion and a Benefactor of The Rotary Foundation. Harold & Gina have been married for 20 years. Harold has three married children and seven grandchildren ranging in age from 16 to three. Gina enjoys tennis, swimming, the gym, reading and entertaining, and is an avid Central Coast Mariners supporter.



Guest Speaker : Why I'm still a Rotarian

Michael McQueen

Michael McQueen is an Australian-born speaker, social researcher and bestselling author.

Coming from a background in marketing and research, in 2004 Michael founded a consultancy which specialized in demographic shifts and social trends called The Nexgen Group.

Michael's first book *The 'New' Rules of Engagement* was the culmination of a 3-year study of the key drivers of youth culture around the world. With an emphasis on the values and attitudes of Generation Y, this 2007 release was designed to help business leaders, educators and parents to better engage younger generations.

In 2009 and 2010, Michael went on to release a range of gift books called *Memento* and *Wisdom* which were designed to bridge the generation gap in families by helping parents pass on their stories and life lessons to the next generation.

Michael's most recent book *Winning the Battle for Relevance* is a landmark title that explores why even the greatest businesses and institutions become obsolete and how others can avoid their fate. Drawing on research looking at over 500 of the world's most iconic brands and organizations, Michael explores what distinguishes the enduring from the endangered and offers a game plan for staying ahead of the curve and the competition as times change.

Having spoken to over 150,000 people across 5 continents since 2004, Michael is known for his engaging, entertaining and practical conference presentations. He has shared the stage with some of the biggest names in the business and has been recognized as a Certified Speaking Professional – an honour held by only the top 1% of speakers worldwide.

Rob grew up in Castlecove in Sydney's north. After completing degrees in Economics and Business Administration, he spent 25 years as an executive in the IT industry.

Subsequently, he had a 'tree change' and moved to Grafton on the NSW North Coast where, for ten years, he ran a successful online business and bred rare horses.

In early 2011, he sold his horses, property and business with a view to riding his bicycle throughout Australia to raise funds and awareness for Rotary's End Polio Now program. He rode solo almost 5,000km, from Grafton to Cairns and then to Melbourne and, in bicycle tourer parlance, 'travelled heavy' (no backup crew).

So far, he's spoken to thousands of people at hundreds of Rotary Clubs and community groups, been interviewed by scores of journalists from newspapers, radio and TV and he has raised over \$80,000.

In 2012, Rob moved back to Sydney's North Shore, joined the Rotary Club of Turramurra and is now the District 9685 Polio Chair. He lives in Turramurra with his partner, Ulli.

Rob is 62 and has three adult children.

7. Take a Stand - Stop Bullying

For generations, society often considered bullying as an acceptable technique to toughen up a person. We were told to “be a man”, ignore it, don’t complain. We believed that only the weak, the fat, and nerds were bullied. It was an acceptable behaviour in our society.

We now know better and although it has taken many years and many destroyed lives, bullying is no longer an accepted norm; in fact, it is illegal.

We will explore types of bullying, signs of bullying, and why bullying occurs. Finally we will discuss your role and your obligations as a bystander.

Why it is important to you and to your club? Rotary’s aim is to build understanding and peace. Bullying destroys understanding and peace and can, in the extreme, promote violence and destruction of humanity.

The several roles she has served in include:

One of the Eminent Australians on the Committee to review the Australian Citizenship Test; Board Member of the Institute for Cultural Diversity; Four time Chair of the Australian National Committee on Refugee Women; Sitting member of the Nepean / Blacktown Regional Advisory Council of the Community Relations Commission (CRC) of NSW; Past member for the NSW Police Commissioner's Committee on Responsive Policing and the FECCA Women's Steering Committee and the National Steering Committee of the Family Court of Australia / Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC) Living In Harmony Partnership Project; First ever women's representative of the African Communities Council of NSW and the initiator of the African Workers Network in Sydney; Coordinator of the NSW Education Program on Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) run through Western Sydney Area Health Services from 1996 to 2005.

She is still actively involved in a range of other activities supporting African communities and refugees in Australia. Juliana managed the work of Centrelink's African Liaison Unit in 2006, and led two nationwide consultations into issues affecting refugees and migrants from African countries and managing the highly successful African Women's Advocacy Unit.

In 1961 Councillor R. Dougherty secured funding for the band through Willoughby Council and the Band changed its name to the Willoughby Municipal Band. In 1971 Peter Walmsley OAM took over as musical director of Willoughby Municipal Band.

Willoughby City Band was the leading Senior and Junior A Grade combination in NSW for over 25 years. In the NSW contesting field, the Senior Band has won the Championship 19 times and been second on four occasions, and the Juniors have been victors at 23 contests and runners up thrice. At a national level, the Senior Band has won four titles with numerous second places, while the Juniors have won 22 times.

As well as attending every major competition in Australia, the band has competed with distinction in New Zealand on three occasions, being runners-up in 1990, and in 2001, the Junior Band won New Zealand's Open C Grade Championship.

In 1992 Willoughby City Band travelled to Tokyo, Japan, on a highly successful concert tour as part of the Willoughby Council 'Sister City' cultural exchange.

Since 1973, the Willoughby Band has had a successful concert series, and performs regularly at civic functions and corporate events. The band has also recorded on numerous occasions and has been featured often on ABC radio.
