



How can Social Inclusion be understood? (from Whiteford & Pereira 2012)

- As poverty reduction
- As citizenship
- As solidarity





Also as:

- Recognition
- Connectedness
- Opportunity
- Capability





Capabilities are, for people, the

"ability to **do** the things that they would choose to do and has **reason to choose to do**" (Sen, 2001).

A capability approach is therefore "linked with substantive freedom" (Sen, 2009: The Idea of Justice)

See also Nussbaum, 2003 (capabilities as fundamental entitlements)



Social Inclusion as a set of rights

...all people have a right to full participation in the social, cultural, political and economic aspects of life. They also have a right to be involved in decision making at individual, group, organizational, community and societal levels (p.196).





Social Inclusion named and framed

Being socially included means that people have the resources, opportunities and capabilities they need to **learn** (education and training) **work** (paid or unpaid, voluntary), **engage** (connect with others, participate in civic space) and **have a voice** (Australian Social Inclusion Board, 2010)

"Social inclusion is about participation...It is about increasing opportunities for people, especially the most disadvantaged people, to engage in all aspects of community life" (SA Gov't 2009)



Social Cohesion

- Social cohesion is the capacity of a society to ensure the well-being of all its members, minimising disparities and avoiding marginalisation (Council of Europe, 2008).
- High levels of social cohesion are a by-product of high levels of inclusion through economic, social and civic engagement





Australia's multicultural policy aligns with the government's social inclusion agenda where Australians of all backgrounds can feel valued and can participate in society (Feb 2011)





What do we DO? Ensure the opportunities for participation begin as early as possible to address disadvantage...







Ensure that diverse identities are affirmed and supported, eg. media mentoring, Elder in Residence program, Ally Program

Take home messages:


- 1. Frame inclusion as a right mandate action
- 2. Ensure that individual and cultural identity can be asserted through diverse forms of participation
- 3. In Higher Education, commit to long term change to representation of all equity groups
- 4. Serve society through the enactment of civic leadership




