The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisors Wants You!

"Your <u>what</u> wants you?", you ask. A good question.

Very few Rotarians are aware that The Rotary Foundation (TRF) has a group of Technical Advisors, who conduct site reviews and financial audits of District and Global Grants for The Rotary Foundation. These are volunteers who have grant experience and educational or technical skills useful in evaluating open and closed projects for good stewardship, sustainability and other qualities.

As grants become larger, both in number and in financing amount, The Rotary Foundation needs members with skills in any of the six Areas of Focus to help them evaluate projects funded through Rotary Foundation Grants. The six areas of focus are:

Peace and Conflict Resolution

Maternal and Child Health

Disease Prevention and Treatment

Basic Education and Literacy

Water and Sanitation

Economic and Community Development

The Foundation also needs volunteers who have financial audit skills – CPAs, EAs, corporate auditors, etc. You might be a perfect candidate and you are hiding among us!

Technical Advisors conduct both desk reviews and site reviews of (usually) randomly selected grants. If you are assigned a desk review, you conduct that review in your jammies, in the comfort of your own home, at the computer. If you are assigned a site review, TRF sends you to one of the garden spots of the world to conduct the review and report within two weeks of returning. The cost of the travel is at the expense of The Rotary Foundation.

You must indicate the language(s) you speak. They will not send you to Thailand if you speak only English and Spanish (though most Thai Rotarians do speak English, I've found!) The Cadre is especially seeking Spanish-speakers, though there are many other language-speakers needed.

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The Rotary and Rotaract Relationship

Any great relationship is one where both parties respect each other and help each other be the best versions of themselves. On a club-to-club or individual-to-individual level, Rotaractors and Rotarians can bring a wide variety of skill sets. While it is everyone's responsibility to discover what those

specific skills are and how to use them to achieve each clubs' goals, this article will discuss the value that Rotary and Rotaract bring to each other in general.

Rotary's Value to Rotaract:

- Professional Development & Mentorship: We want to know what you know. To Rotaractors, the biggest value a Rotarian can bring is their experience.
- **Networking:** In an area where who you know is generally more important than what you know, interacting with Rotarians offers Rotaractors access to a group of people they may not otherwise encounter.
- **Jobs & Careers:** At this point in our lives, we are discovering what we want to do with the rest of it. Rotarians can help Rotaractors kick start the rest of their lives by helping them find their place in the working world.
- **The Rotary Brand:** While not very many people have heard about Rotaract when we ask them about it, we'll generally get a positive answer when we ask them if they have heard about Rotary. To explain what Rotaract is, we tend to use their knowledge of Rotary to shape their understanding of who we are.
- **Service Opportunities:** One of the reasons why people join Rotaract is the sense of purpose they get when they help out at service events. Whenever Rotarians reach out to us with a need for volunteers, we gladly put those events on our calendar and share the information with our members.

Rotaract's Value to Rotary:

• **Potential Members:** Like I mentioned in my last article, a relationship with Rotaract may result in a new member joining Rotary when they are ready and able to do so.

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 Understanding of the Next Generation: Rotaractors, representing the hard-working and driven Millennials Rotary wants to attract in the younger generation, are their best resource to gain an understanding of how they think and what they value.

- **New Ideas & Skills:** Rotaractors can bring a fresh perspective to an event or concept Rotarians have been working with for years, as well as new skill sets, particularly around technology and social media. Want to learn more about how to use hashtags to promote an event? Ask a Rotaractor.
- **Energy:** I've been told by Rotarians that Rotaractors, through their new ideas or by simply participating in an event for the first time, bring renewed excitement to some of the things Rotarians have been doing for years.
- **Manpower:** Whether it's helping people register, check out, or manning the bar at your silent auction, assembling Christmas bags for underprivileged children or lunches for the hungry, or building a house or solar powered oven, Rotaractors are happy to help.

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Vocational Service

Vocational Services. What does *that* mean? Do we, as Rotarians, teach people *how* to do a job? Or, do we, as Rotarians, provide some kind of *help or assistance* to those doing their jobs? Or do we, as Rotarians, *give* people jobs? Or, do we, as Rotarians, *promote our work* to each other and to the community?

Well, starting at the most basic point, it helps to know that the word "vocation" comes from the Latin for "calling." In an ideal world, we each would pursue the activity which "calls to us", excites us and makes us happy doing it. It could be anything from farming, or being an artist, or problem solving, or fixing things, or entertaining people in drama or song, or "serving people" in ministry or business or police services, or leading a team of people to accomplish some important objective... or any of a number of many worthwhile "callings." However, a "practical Rotarian" may realize that our environment can interfere with our following our "calling" by society's need for...engineers or doctors or teachers or business people... thereby pushing one onto a path of becoming a professional that can make them a lot of money and allow them to "provide well for their family." Nothing wrong with being a success at a job you hadn't planned for, unless you aren't happy doing it. Louis Binstock once said, "Success without happiness is the worst kind of failure." So, what do we Rotarians do with this Avenue of Service? What is expected of us?

Firstly, generally, we all "work." Not just here, but around the world. Survival calls for mankind to "labor" to overcome nature's many challenges to our species, and then, we labor to serve and support our clan and our community. Human beings "do" things. But all work and no play grates on the human spirit and we may not become all we could become. If we "kill ourselves" working, we may have missed something of life. Socrates said, "Beware the barrenness of a busy life."

In Rotary's *Vocational Services*, we have the opportunity to be of service to others by using our skills and talents and training and experience:

- Doing business with fellow Rotarians who follow ethical business practices.
- Finding Rotarians to fill our needs by using the District Yellow Pages.
- Using our own "vocational gifts" on local projects to help them be successful.
- Becoming a "mentor" to a youngster (high school student or college student) to help

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guide them toward the career you are involved in.

Recognizing local businesses in a public way for their ethics and quality of work.

- Acknowledging and publicly recognizing a teacher or business person in your community that does their job with excellence while treating people fairly and with respect.
- Recognizing that anyone doing an good job, even if it is a temporary job (sweeping streets...washing dishes...), deserves respect and appreciation for their work.

Vocational Services is an *Avenue of Service* that can "tap" a Rotarian's calling, and in doing so, we hope, they will love to be of service to others as they do what they enjoy. As Tom Brokaw said, "It's easy to make a buck. It's a lot tougher to make a difference."

Get the contacts of your:

Local paper Web sites (events)

Radio station TV station

Get the names, addresses, emails, work and other phone numbers of the key media people. Chances are, there will be less than ten.

Call, email or phone. Introduce yourself and let them know you will be sending information on your club and its good work to them for their use. Find out if they prefer email, phone, or how they want information sent to them.

Ask if they prefer a Fact Sheet or a press release.

Remember that you are doing them a favor by giving them story material.




