Fund Development

A couple of reminders:

ALL clubs need to set a goal for Annual Fund contributions and Polio. As of August 22, TWENTY-EIGHT
clubs have not registered their goals for either campaign. The Resource Leader for your area will be in
contact, to assist you in doing this. In the September Fund Development training, we will talk how to set

The district has set an official goal of \$800,000 in Annual Fund contributions this year and \$200,000 in PolioPlus contributions, so we plan to help the clubs raise their goals to equal those amounts.

Here are some housekeeping items for clubs wishing to do District Grants in 2016-2017 and/or need to close District Grants that they did in 2015-2016:

- <u>Final reports for 2015-2016 District Grants are due by October 31st.</u> Please do our wonderful grants team a favor and complete/submit your final reports as soon as possible, so they don't have a crunch in the last week of October.
- <u>District Grant Applications for both local and international projects are due by October 31st.</u> Your club must be in compliance in order to receive funding for your 2015-2016 projects. This means:
 - 1) 2015-2016 District Grant final reports are submitted and accepted
 - 2) All club financial obligations are current
 - 3) No overdue reports for any Global Grants
 - 4) Your club representative attended the grants training on August 20
 - 5) Your club submitted a club MOU signed by both your 2016-2017 Club President and your 2017-2018 President-Elect

PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY REPORT

The Paul Harris Society is a recognition program designed for Rotarians and others who wish to support the Foundation in a more substantial way each year. It recognizes Rotarians and friends of The Rotary Foundation who annually contribute \$1,000 or more to the Annual Programs Fund, PolioPlus, and approved grant activities.

Joining the Paul Harris Society is a major commitment, and not every Rotarian can donate at this level. However, we ask that each Rotarian who is able to, to consider joining the Society. The financial support will be of immense value to the Foundation in its mission to provide service to others, to promote high ethical standards, and to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through its fellowship of business, professional and community leaders.

There were 88 Paul Harris Society members in District 5170 in the 2015-2016 Rotary Year. This is 19 more than in the 2014-2015 year. However, it is far fewer than the 291 District Rotarians who donated at least \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation during the year, thereby qualifying for membership in the Society. A goal of the District is to have all of these donors join the Society.

The leading clubs in this effort included the Rotary Club of Cupertino with 41 of these donors. This is a record for the District and is a substantial increase over the club's 25 for the 2014-2015 year. Second in this effort was the Rotary Club of Livermore which had 25, tying its previous year's record of 25. In third place was the Rotary Club of Oakland with 23.

Goals for the 2016-2017 Rotary Year are to increase the number of these donors to over 300 and to increase the number of Paul Harris Society members to more than 100. Although both of these goals are achievable, the latter should not be too difficult since all it requires is that the donors pledge to make the donation each year when they are financially able to do so. They are not required to make the donation every year.



District 5170 Membership Development August 2016 Report

The final membership data are in for the 2015-2016 Rotary year. During the year, 32 clubs in District 5170 lost a total of 159 members. Fortunately, 14 clubs gained 55 new

members holding the loss for the year to 104 members. This is very disappointing, especially since the District gained 101 in the previous year. This makes it clear that the District has a lot to do in membership development.

The data for the month of July 2016 have been released. Seven clubs lost one member each. Thirteen clubs gained a total of 18 new members producing a gain for the month of 11. This is very good but needs to be even greater to recover last year's loss and produce a significant increase in membership.

The membership data for the period 1 July 2010 to 30 June 2015, a period of 5 years, were examined for trends. During this time there were a total of 2,375 membership terminations and the District had 3,806 members at the end. Many of the new members did not remain in the clubs for very long. An average of 21% left with less that 1 year of service and 46% left within 2 years. What would the District look like now if we had retained only half of those terminated? It would have over 5,000 members. Think about how much more the clubs in the District could have achieved. There is a problem here, and I believe these data show that it is retention. We have got to do a better job of retaining new members. The Membership Committee will be discussing this problem in more detail in future meetings.

The data discussed show that the District clubs have a big challenge to even maintain the currently District membership, let alone grow. The Membership Workshop scheduled for the 27th of August is designed to provide help for the clubs. As we all know, the actual work is done in the clubs. Consequently, it is imperative that the clubs send their Membership Chairs to the workshop. The Club Presidents, President-Elects and the Club Service Chairs are also strongly urged to attend. We need to get the right people there. Clearly something is being done wrong when the clubs continue to lose members. Here is an opportunity to learn the newest tricks of the trade.

On another front the District is doing well. The formation of two new Rotary clubs is well underway. One is composed primarily of members of the India Community Center in Milpitas. It is working toward attaining the number of charter members (20) required to form a new club. The second effort is to form what is being called a "Passport" club, with very flexible policies in attendance and participation. This effort has already attained the minimum of 20 members and has named its first President, Ramesh Hariharan of the Rotary Club of East Palo Alto Bayshore. A group is now at work on creating the new club policies and procedures. In addition to these two clubs, efforts are underway to form two additional clubs, one based on young professionals and the other on the retirement community. More information on these two developments will be provided next month.

Rotary is Saving Lives

Project Share Life is a district-wide project for our Rotary District 5170 and District 5130 in Northern California. It has also been adopted by several other individual clubs of Rotary. Project Share Life began in the early 90s in District 5130, spearheaded by Nyle Henderson, a member of the Southwest Eureka Rotary Club, after the death of his son who was diagnosed with Hodgkin's disease at age 25.

Project Share Life was spearheaded at The Rotary Club of Gilroy by former members Gary Bowe & Lee Niesh, as a result of one of our own members, Pastor Malcolm McPhail, being diagnosed with Leukemia. In a recent interview, Pastor McPhail had this to say ..." One of the things I like to say to people is 'the doctors couldn't save my life; but you could!' I was amazed seeing the look on people's faces when I would tell them I was a survivor. I could see the panic in the eyes of people who had just recently heard that a relative had been diagnosed with a blood disease and may need a transplant; they literally made a bee line to the (bone marrow) tent."

Gilroy Rotary's mission in the Project Share Life is to both raise the awareness of the National Marrow Donor Program and to add potential donors to the registry. For the Rotary Club of Gilroy, this includes an annual drive at the Gilroy Garlic Festival.

WHAT IS A TRANSPLANT? A marrow or cord blood transplant replaces a patient's unhealthy blood-forming cells with healthy ones. The cells used in transplants come from three sources: marrow, peripheral blood stem cells (PBSC) and umbilical cord blood.

FACTS:

- Every three minutes, someone is diagnosed with a blood cancer.
- Seventy percent of patients do not have a fully

- matched donor in their family.
- Be The Match facilitated nearly 6,400 transplants in 2015, for a total of 74,000 transplants since 1987.
- About 1 in every 430 donors go on to donate to a patient.
- The best transplant outcomes happen when a patient's human leukocyte antigen (HLA, or tissue type) and the HLA of a registry member or cord blood unit closely match. Patients are most like to match the tissue type of someone who shares their ethnic background.
- More young people of diverse racial and ethnic heritage are needed now to help patients searching for a match. People between the ages of 18 and 44 are most urgently needed since they are requested by transplant doctors more than 95% of the time. Research shows that these donors provide the greatest chance for transplant success.

The Rotary Club of Gilroy just completed their Bone Marrow drive for 2016 at the Gilroy Garlic Festival. The drives chairman, Rotarian Paul Vanni, stated that in a good year our club would be able to sign up as many as 200 individuals. This year we were able to sign up 289 potential donors. We are proud of that ...and we are ROTARY SERVING HUMANITY.
