# From District Governor Angie Hassler

December is designated as the Family of Rotary Month. As we approach the holidays we are more conscious of a focus on family and family reunions. # Community Service With Rebuilding Together - by Henry Buffalow, Cupertino

Cupertino Rotary has had the pleasure of working with <u>Rebuilding Together</u> the past six years. During this time they have completed two projects each year. Rebuilding Together is a national nonprof-

it that rehabilitates the homes of low income homeowners so that they may live in warmth, safety and independence, and repair nonprofit facilities so they are better able to serve our community. The two dates are set nationally and everyone works on those days. Cupertino Rotary is a sustaining sponsor of Rebuilding to-

gether. They have partnered with Sunnyvale Sunrise Rotary, InnerWheel, the Cupertino LDS Church and St. Jude's Church. Milpitas Rotary and Santa Clara Rotary have also been involved as sponsor and/or done a project. Several Rotarians have served on RT board. The question then, is why aren't other clubs involved? Each Club searches for deserving community projects. Rebuilding Together not only identifies such projects, they provide a playbook and tools to help newbies

> through the complete project. If we (District 5170) could be a collaborative team of at least ten clubs we could have enormous impact in the Silicon Valley Community and gain SIGNIFICANT recognition of how Rotary helps the local community. We could possibly do projects in 4 or 5 cities all on the same day. Not all clubs are as big as Cupertino but

major dollars aren't needed from all clubs. If we combined resources the volunteer hours would be tremendous and we might have enough networking to bring in a fair amount of donated material and/or special trades skills.



# International Service Projects

**Members of The Rotary Club of Livermore Valley** recently traveled to Morelia, Mexico to help establish a new stove factory, in conjunction with Stove Team International. The factory will produce, affordable, safe cookstoves as well as employment for local residents.





The Rotary Club of Santa Cruz presented Redwood City Rotarian Jon Kaufman with a donation of \$5,700 for H20penDoors. H20penDoors is a project born in a small club in District 5150, but intended to be replicated by Rotary clubs worldwide. As the name suggests, there are two elements: providing water purification technology to third world villages and schools, while promoting opportunity for the women's water councils to sell the surplus capacity for the benefit of their communities. In addition, H2OpenDoors integrates local high school students in the study of these villages and their water issues, and brings the best performers to the country on an installation expedition.

Two SunSpring systems were installed last February into two hill tribe villages suffering from water contamination, resulting in a dramatic reduction in incidents of diarrhea among thousands of residents. In December, 3 Sunsprings will be installed in the Philippines' hardest hit areas from the typhoon. And in April or May of 2015, a couple systems will be installed in Colima State, Mexico. The Mexican expedition will include 12 high school students and a weeklong leadership academy conducted by former President Vicente Fox and his staff at CentroFox. An expedition to Myanmar is also planned for late 2014.

H2OpenDoors is currently focusing on the SunSpring system, as it is the only WQA-certified solution given the Gold Seal for purifying water to the standards of the US EPA. It doesn't require fuel or electricity, enabling installation in the harshest of conditions. It's design life of ten years, and daily output capacity of over 5000 gallons per day of pure, safe water from any contaminated water source make this an ideal, field-tested solution to meet the goals of the project. #### A Focus on Early Literacy with Krishen Laetsch - by Lee Denlinger, F.U.N. Sunset



When Krishen Arvind Laetsch joined the Rotary Club of Oakland #3 in 2006, he quickly discovered his niche: educa-

tion with an emphasis on literacy and fostering active Rotarian participation. In 2007, Krishen chaired his Club's Education Committee, changing its name to Youth and Education Committee. "We changed the Club's focus from involvement in a variety of miniprojects to the implementation of one city-wide program," explained Krishen. The new focus led to the Oakland Reads Program (see article on next page).

As staff to an assemblywoman in 2006, Krishen supported her passion for implementing universal pre-school. In 2010, the California legislature approved and funded the Kindergarten Readiness Act. A section of the law created a new kindergarten school year called Transitional Kindergarten. Members of Oakland #3 refer to this year as '*Kinder Prep*'. "Our Committee saw opportunity in supporting the pre-K children in the Oakland Public Schools," said Krishen. "While the law provides for teachers' salaries, it does not fund materials or field trips. We coalesced the resources and funding from other local non-profits, banks and businesses and provided books, materials and field trips for all the students. "

Krishen earned his Bachelor's degree in History from the University of California at Berkeley, and his Master of Arts in Education at Mills College, Oakland. As Senior Program Consultant for Education for the San Francisco Foundation, Program Officer at the East Bay Community Foundation and currently Vice-President of Strategic Planning and Development for *UniversityNow,* Krishen stays connected to education. His background in fund development, meeting facilitation and organizational management are definite pluses in leading the literacy implementation efforts and active involvement of Club Rotarians.

Krishen's wife Jenny and step-son, Charlie, share his interest in travel. Krishen is a tour leader to Bhutan and India, a vintner and a commercial walnut grower, with his father. His broad experience and background, combined with his zeal to support educational efforts, at all levels, marks Krishen as a Rotarian who has worked with many others to make a difference in the lives of students, particularly those with challenging life circumstances. Krishen credits his drive to help others, not from his formal education but from his parents and both sets of grandparents who are altruistic in their own ways.

#### Breaking Barriers and Building Bridges -by Lee Denlinger, F.U.N. Sunset

Krishen Arvind Laetsch, a Vice President at UniversityNow, Inc. and an active member of the Rotary Club of Oakland #3, spearheaded his Club's involvement in the creation and implementation of Oakland Reads and KinderPrep, although he is the first to stress, "no one does it all or can accomplish anything alone."

Five years ago, the Club launched *Oakland Reads*, donating some \$45,000 each year for four years to provide culturally appropriate books, selected by librarians, teachers and other literacy profession-

als, to more than 4,000 thirdgraders, in over 80 classrooms in traditional and charter schools in Emeryville and Oakland. Rotarians have purchased, packed, boxed and delivered some 50,000 books in the past four years and have spent time in the classroom to foster the joys of reading.

The program broke socio-

economic barriers by connecting hundreds of Rotarians with school staff and children. After distributing books to the schools, many Rotarians returned to the classrooms to provide more student support. One member decided to give each student a book bag... each year for every third grader in traditional and charter schools! Another decided to volunteer time in the classroom each week, and yet another became a school librarian! "Each year more than 100 of the Club's Rotarians participate in book distribution and classroom reading activities," said Krishen. "Matching Rotarians with childhood literacy programs was a natural," continued Laetsch. In 2011, Oakland Reads transitioned into Family Reading Nights. In this program, Oakland Rotarians created a direct opportunity to improve literacy that involved parents as well. They brought books to schools in the evenings and read with students, provided dinners, literacy activities for families, and the students were given books to take home. 'It was a celebration of reading.'

The adoption of the Transitional Kindergarten (TK) classes was a natural evolution and is perhaps the most meaningful collaboration with the Oakland

School District in recent memory. "Breaking barriers and building bridges is among the best ways to add value to any effort, and few do this better than Rotarians," stated Krishen. "It is in our DNA. Rotarians understand that the educational community is broader than teachers and principals working with students. School communities need businesses, non-profit organizations, and retired citizens involved for

far-reaching and lasting academic advancements to be realized."

A program that has captured the interests of Rotarians and educators is Oakland #3's *Transitional Kindergarten (TK)* program. "Ninety-seven Club Rotarians were directly involved in these activities last year. It was so popular, serving 220 four-year olds in twelve classrooms, that this academic year (2013-2014) we are serving some 500 children in twenty-six classrooms with books, money for toys and equipment, and field trips," explained Krishen. "Not bad for a bunch of people with little formal connection to these children."

Rotary Club Central is a relatively new online goal setting tool that helps clubs set goals and keep track of their progress and achievements throughout the year. In support of this new initiative, I'm asking you to join me in encouraging all clubs to use this tool as part of their strategic planning.

Ask your assistant governors to talk to clubs about Rotary Club Central during their visits and highlight why clubs should use the tool:

**One-stop shop:** Provides access to data previously available in several reports. **Eliminates paper:** Replaces membership and Rotary Foundation goal forms and the Planning Guide for Effective Rotary Clubs.

- **Fosters continuity:** Allows club leadership the ability to see a history of goals and achievements as they change annually.
- **Enables clubs to track progress:** Helps club leaders determine whether goals they've set are realistic and make changes if needed.
- **Creates transparency:** All club members can see club goals. The incoming and current club president, secretary, executive secretary, treasurer, Foundation chair, and membership chair can add and edit goals and achievements for their club.

Showcases important work Rotary clubs do worldwide: Allows Rotarians a vehicle to document details of the millions of service projects they undertake, including number of volunteers and volunteer hours, a list of in-kind donations, and cash contributions.

Sign up today for your own member profile on rotary.org/myrotary and encourage your clubs to do the same. By logging in to My Rotary and clicking on My Club Snapshot, any club member can see how many Rotary Club Central goals the club has already set.

Every club that sets at least 15 goals or more in Rotary Club Central by 15 March 2014 will receive an award. Actual certificates for all award winning clubs will be printed and sent to District Governors in early May. You are then asked to distribute these to the clubs in your district in recognition of their achievement and promotion of Rotary Club Central.

For more information on Rotary Club Central, visit learn.rotary.org and take the Rotary Club Central Resources course. This is a terrific resource for self-learners. You can also reach out to your Club and District Support team to work with assistant governors or clubs in your district who may need more personalized assistance.

We have developed a new streamlined (and *simple*) process which allows you to complete your Rotary Youth Services Volunteer Affidavit and Interview in a secured online environment (rather than filling out forms and meeting with your club YPO).

You just select 'Online Youth Services Volunteer Affidavit' from the **Links** section on the District Youth Protection webpage, select your Club and name from the lists, then click on 'Send YSVA link'. (If your name doesn't appear just email <u>Mike Cloutier</u> with your Name and Club and he'll add you to the database and send you the link

When you have completed the online Volunteer affidavit, you will also have provided email addresses for your 3 personal references. Please alert these individuals to be looking for their personal email link from the system as they will be able to simply answer the questions in a secure online environment (about 8 questions - so not a lengthy ordeal for references).



That's it! All three required forms (YSVA, Interview and Reference Checks) are completed online. The process is streamlined, guick and easy.

If by January 12, 2014, no additional candidate has been proposed, it will be announced that Jeff Orth is to be the District Governor Nominee Designate.

Any club wishing to propose an additional candidate must do so in accordance with Article 13 of the Bylaws of Rotary International and in the 2008 edition of the Manual of Procedure, and the Bylaws of Rotary District 5170.

We trust you will support the recommendation of the Nominating Committee in selecting Jeff Orth as our 2016-2017 District Governor.
