

Rotary Fellowships Promote Member Retention

How would you like to cycle through Europe with fellow Rotarians to raise money for *Polio Plus*, sponsor a national young musicians' competition or tour model railroad stations throughout the country? These are just a few of the fun activities that fellow Rotarians do as a member of one of the **Rotary Fellowships**. Fellowship membership is the "fun" part of Rotary and is, perhaps, one of the best ways to engage

and retain members in your club. Rotary Fellowships are groups of Rotary members who:

- Share a common interest in recreational activities, sports, hobbies, or professions,
- Further their vocational development with others in the same profession or field,
- Enhance their Rotary experience by exploring new opportunities and making connections around the world.

Each Fellowship functions independently of Rotary International, establishing its own rules, dues requirements, and administrative structure. Membership is open to Rotarians, spouses of Rotarians, and Rotaractors. Fellowships are international in scope and,



- Enable Rotarians to make lasting friendships outside their own club, district, or country;
- Contribute to the advancement of Rotary's public image and identity;
- Serve as an incentive for joining Rotary and for continuing as a member.

Quite a few of the Fellowships also have their own non-profit foundation and fund grants internationally. For example, the International Fellowship of Rotarian Musicians (IFRM) co-sponsored a Global Grant for a van that provided books, music and snacks for poor pre-schoolers in areas of Manila, Philippines. IFRM linked with Mr. Holland's



Opus to fund school bands in New Orleans and on an Indian Reservation in New Mexico. Most recently, IFRM provided instruments and musical instruction to young teens in Kenya. Locally, IFRM members Don Lewis (RC of Pleasanton) and David Scharf (RC of Oakland #3), on keyboard and drums respectively, led the Holiday Sing-Along at the pre-Cabinet meetings in both 2012 and 2013.

Rotary Fellowships began informally in 1928 when Rotarians with a shared interest in the language *Esperanto* joined together. In 1947, a group of Rotarian boating enthusiasts began flying the Rotary flag from their crafts, calling themselves the

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International Yachting Fellowship of Rotarians; this fellowship now boasts the longest continuous existence. The scope of Rotary Fellowships has changed much over the years, but today their purpose is still to unite Rotarians in friendship and provide venues for enjoying their favorite recreational or professional activities. There are currently 64 active Rotary Fellowships with a combined membership of over 33,000 Rotarians, spouses of Rotarians, and Rotaractors in 104 countries.

June is Rotary Fellowship Month. It would be the perfect time to have a program speaker from one of the Fellowships to come and speak to your club members. Rotary Clubs Celebrate 50 Years in Pleasanton



Pleasanton's three Rotary clubs collaborated on "50 Years of Rotary in Pleasanton," a celebration of their community service efforts coinciding with the 50th Anniversary of the Rotary Club of Pleasanton, the chapter that started it all with a charter from Rotary International in 1965.

Pleasanton North Rotary and Tri-Valley Evening Rotary Clubs, which received their charters in 1987 and 2002, respectively, contributed financial and volunteer support for well-attended events in April and May. All three clubs participated in the 25-member

steering committee, led by Pleasanton Rotarian Brad Hirst, for the two-year planning effort preceding the celebration.

The Pleasanton City Council, city government staff and the Museum on Main lent strong support. During April 30 ceremonies, Mayor Jerry Thorne cut a ribbon to open Rotary Park (see photo on right), a renovated 34-acre public

Numerous honors and citations include the city council's designation of May 4-10 as 50 Years of Rotary in Pleasanton Week and proclamations by the U.S. House of Representatives, and California State Assembly.

On May 6, a historical exhibit of "50 Years of Rotary in Pleasanton" was opened at the Museum on Main. The displays feature mementos of local Rotary club traditions, fund-raisers, and ambitious local and international projects. The exhibit continues until

August 2. In addition, the museum videotaped interviews with 45 former club presidents for an oral history of the three Rotary clubs in Pleasanton. Rotarians and Interact Club members prepared additional displays for the Pleasanton city hall and public library.

As their gift to the city, Interact Clubs at Pleasanton Foothill and Amador Valley high schools refurbished "Welcome to Pleasanton" signs that display the Rotary wheel and symbols of other community service organization serving the city.

On May 8, more than 280 members, former members, spouses and friends of Rotary attended the gala "50 Years of Rotary in Pleasanton" dinner-dance at Castlewood County Club, the same site of the inaugural Charter Night on June 15, 1965. Master of Ceremonies, Scott Raty, president of the Rotary Club of Pleasanton and CEO of the Pleasanton Chamber of Commerce, opened the Gala by chiming the same bell that sounded in the 1965 Charter Night. Scott Adams, creator of the syndicated newspaper cartoon strip Dilbert, was keynote speaker.

Special honors were presented to Don Roberts, a charter member of Rotary Club of Pleasanton who continues to serve as the club's photographer, and Jack Bras, who has been a member for two months short of the chapter's half century of service. The Rotary Club of Livermore was acknowledged for its sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Pleasanton leading to its charter.

Success toward a goal of attracting new members to Pleasanton's clubs is reflected in

12 new members recruited by Pleasanton North Rotary President Tom Hall in the past year.

RC of Watsonville's Vocational Day

On March 25, 2015, the Rotary Club of Watsonville hosted over 80 Watsonville High School students following a morning of job shadowing. Over 40 Rotarians offered this job shadowing experience to students from seven different California Partnership Academies at the high school. The professions were varied - Engineering, agriculture, business, marketing, law, law enforcement, college instructors and administrators and more.

The event included about 20 guests of Rotarians that also served as "shadowees". It gives the students a hands on experience of the career field they may be considering in their future. Students are surveyed, as are the adult shadowees, and the feedback is always positive. The experience for many of the students would not take place at age 16 or 17 if it were not for the volunteers from the Rotary Club of Watsonville.

The program for the day is designed to target the young people in the room. Watsonville Rotarian Renee Mello (District Vocational Service Chair) gave words of wisdom about making mistakes, the point being that it's what we do with our mistakes that helps us grow. Most of us are taught that mistakes are bad and should be avoided at all costs. Renee shared that it is through mistakes that we learn how to do things differently. The students were enthused and engaged, as well as the adults.






