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weekend...or the whole thing for one bargain all-inclusive price. I'm very much looking forward to seeing a record turnout for this very special District Conference!

The Recent College Admissions Bribery Scandal shows Rotary's Emphasis on Ethical Business Practices Matters

Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? These questions suggest an ethic based in what is right and

what is honest and what should motivate people's decision making... rather than, say, the question of "What's in it for me?"

Some of our youth are now interacting within our society who were students (high school or college) back in 2012. The Josephson Institute, which promotes a *Character Counts* program with emphasis on ethical behavior, made a regular survey of randomly chosen U.S. high school students with the following results (below)... but it is still somewhat alarming what the statistics/ results tell us.

The Ethics of American Youth: 2012

FOR THE FIRST TIME IN A DECADE, LYING, CHEATING AND STEALING AMONG AMERICAN STUDENTS DROPS. Biennial Report Card on American Youth by Josephson Institute of Ethics Finds Evidence That Young People Are Cheating, Lying and Stealing Less (See also: Report on youth violence, bullying and high-risk behavior.)

LOS ANGELES, CA (November 20, 2012) -- A continual parade of headline-grabbing incidents of dishonest and unethical behavior from political leaders, business executives and prominent

athletes suggests that we are in a moral recession. But a new report — the 2012 *Report Card on the Ethics of American Youth* — suggests that a robust recovery is underway. The survey of 23,000 high school students, which was conducted by the Los Angeles-based Josephson Institute of Ethics, reveals that for the first time in a decade *students are cheating, lying and stealing less than in previous years*. The Institute conducts the <u>national survey</u> every two years.

CHEATING: In 2010, 59 percent of students admitted they had cheated on an exam in the past year; in 2012 that rate dropped to 51 percent. Students who copied an Internet document for a classroom assignment dropped 2 percent, from 34 percent in 2010 to 32 percent in 2012.

Other good news:

LYING: Students who said they lied to a teacher in the past year about something significant dropped from 61 percent in 2010 to 55 percent in 2012. Those who lied to their parents about something significant also dropped from 80 percent to 76 percent. In 2012, 38 percent of the students said they sometimes lie to save money; that is a drop of 3 percent from 2010.

STEALING: In 2010, 27 percent of the students said they had stolen something from a store in the past year. In 2012 that number dropped to 20 percent. In 2010, 17 percent said they stole something from a friend in the past year compared to 14 percent in 2012. The percentage

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who said they stole something from a parent or other relative in the past year (2012) also decreased (from 21 to 18 percent).

"It's a small ray of sunshine shining through lots of dark clouds," said Michael Josephson, founder and president of the Josephson Institute of Ethics and a nationally-noted commentator on behavior. "Changes in children's behavior of this magnitude suggest a major shift in parenting and school involvement in issues of honesty and character. The number of schools adopting our CHARACTER COUNTS! program, and parents who visit our website, suggests that adults interacting with young people are more concerned with teaching kids that honesty really is important." (Could Rotary also be an influence?) Josephson added, "Though there is still far too much cheating, lying and stealing, I think we have turned the corner." Josephson's theory is supported by survey results showing that 93 percent of students said their parents or guardians always want them to do the ethically right thing, no matter the cost. Eightyfive percent said most adults in their life consistently set a good example in terms of ethics and character.

Other important findings:

Young people believe ethics and character are important, and they think highly of their own ethics despite very high rates of dishonesty and other unethical conduct.

- 99 percent agree that "it is important for me to be a person with good character."
- 93 percent say they are satisfied with their own ethics and character.
- 81 percent believe that when it comes to doing what is right, they are better than most people they know.

Boys are much more likely to harbor negative attitudes and engage in dishonest conduct than girls.

- Almost one-quarter of the boys (23 percent) admitted stealing from a store in the past year, compared to 17 percent of the girls.
- Boys were almost twice as likely to steal from a friend as girls (19 percent compared to 10 percent). Boys were 6 percent more likely to steal from a parent or other relative (21 percent versus 15 percent).
- Nearly half of the boys (45 percent) believe that "a person has to lie and cheat at least occasionally in order to succeed." Twenty-eight percent of girls surveyed possess this cynical belief.
- Boys are twice as likely as girls (20 percent versus 10 percent) to believe "it is not cheating if everyone is doing it."
- While 95 percent of the girls agree that "being good is more important than being rich," only 86 percent of the boys have this belief.
- One in five (19 percent) of the boys disagreed with the statement: "It's not worth it to cheat because it hurts your character." One in ten girls did not agree with the statement.

The purpose of reminding us of this recent news is not to beat a dead horse, but to have us all become more aware of how lying, cheating, stealing or bribing hurts all of us in that it isn't truthful and it isn't fair to others.

Rotary and Rotarians can help make a difference not only now, but in the near future. The questions would be: 1) what can your Rotary Club do to help establish high ethical business practices in your community, and, 2) how do we teach ethics, in a meaningful way, to our youth? I believe that your Club's *Vocational Services* can help other Avenues of Service mentor youth,

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provide Job Shadowing exercises, invite Senior Citizens and retired folks to meet with youngsters to encourage ethical behavior, and work with your Chamber of Commerce to offer a course: The Positive Benefits Business Ethics to the bottom line and to the business reputation.
