

From the desk of District Governor Tim Lundell

November 2018



Within the next ten days I will have completed my visits to all 54 Clubs, and the experience has been amazing. Such unique personalities and cultures from Club to Club...but there is also a

constant: every Club I have visited has had questions and concerns about growing membership in Rotary. There are many theories and ideas about the "best" ways for Clubs to grow, and I shared many of those as I met with your Club Leaders. Many involve taking advantage of the new "flexibility" in Club structure and format encouraged by Rotary International. We have Clubs now that have created new member categories, new structures for dues, and variability in meeting times and locations. We have Clubs that have created special membership opportunities for Families (allowing a spouse or adult children to join the Club at reduced cost), for Businesses (allowing the owner or CEO to share membership rights with other senior employees), or for younger members (sometimes called Associate Members, with reduced cost for an introductory period). But I have also found that one of the obstacles to adopting these creative options is the question "How do we do it?" In other words, the concepts are out there, but the

practical implementation steps (the actual rules, dues structures, By-Law amendments, etc.) are not spelled out, and Clubs feel that they are on their own in having to create these elements from scratch. Well, I can only say: Worry no longer. Our District Membership Team will work closely with any Club to explore any of these avenues, and if there is serious interest, we will assist in providing all implementation materials and guidance. We make this offer and commitment because we have already seen that flexibility works. The early adopter Clubs are growing, and tapping into the very large population of people who want to serve and make friendships, but whose circumstances make traditional Rotary Club membership unworkable.

We are also exploring opportunities for establishing new clubs in the District, working with groups that have a common community interest or connection that will fit very nicely into the family of Rotary. New clubs, flex clubs, innovative ideas... these are all available for the asking. OK. A mid-year review to answer a frequent question coming from Rotarians and regular folks alike: What does Vocational Services do? What is your aim (mission)? Well, here is a "short" answer... Vocational Services provides innovative programs and services

that facilitate successful community building, promote linkages and networking opportunities in the business arena, assists job seekers, seeks to inform/mentor youth on career options, and fosters enriched friendships through national and international Fellowships and Rotary Action Groups. Additionally, Vocational Services recognizes the unique nature of each Rotarian's profession and believes that the Rotary 4-Way Test, which guides Rotarians in their daily work, can promote fair and ethical business practices throughout the greater community.

One area of activity for this Avenue of Service (which is much appreciated by many) is the sharing of what each Rotarian does for work, or a career, or a calling. However, we need to understand that all of us can't be doctors or lawyers or judges or professors or engineers... and so we need mechanics and electricians and street sweepers and grocery store workers and gas station attendants and bus drivers and cooks, not to mention members of our community that provide police and fire services. I believe we already know this, but every once in a while an "attitude" inadvertently creeps into conversations I've had with a few Rotarians. So, we know there

is *value* to the community if one does their job efficiently and effectively.

With this in mind, why not encourage a businessto-business activity in your Club? Some suggestions:

Have a table dedicated to "the sharing of vocations" where members can leave a business card and any interested member could take it for their reference

At your meeting, have one or two Rotarians speak briefly about their work:

who do they work for?
what do they do? (job title)
what is the best thing they like about
their job?

what is the most challenging thing about their job?

do they have any special needs right now (business-wise)?

This *Vocational Service* activity may be extremely valuable to a number of members and business-people as well as having members get to know each other more intimately.

PDG Denny Salutes Veterans

In salute to local veterans, members of the six branches of American military forces joined Los Altos Rotarians for a Nov. 9 commemorative program honoring their service. With American flags flying in the breeze, 45 additional visitors were welcomed with posters and boutonnieres for vets.

Ron Labetich, US Coast Guard veteran and Chair of Los Altos Rotary's Veterans Support Committee, announced that his committee has raised \$600,000 in six years to support Foothill College student veterans.

Tai Chi exercise classes for wheelchair-bound veterans held their October 9 commencement ceremony with Denny among the redwood trees near Shoup Park, Los Altos. The instructor from the Veterans Administration had filmed a video of their commencement, including some Rotary veterans in borrowed wheelchairs, to illustrate the close relationship between Rotary and veterans.

Gunnery Sergeant William "Denny" Weisgerber, US Marine Corps (retired) was the featured speaker of the day's program, as he reviewed his eventful life in the military. He is known for his gift of wit. At a very young age he had married his high school sweetheart who passed away just 17 months ago. Denny entertained us with stories of how he managed to find a justice of the peace to marry them in the middle of the night, just before he formally entered active military service. He also told the story of his retort when "the old man" warned soldiers they would be fined \$100 if they were caught in women's quarters after hours and \$200 if they were caught there a second time. Denny wise-cracked, "How much for a season pass?"

Denny loved military service, and after his 1949 enlistment in the Marine Corps, he was assigned to Radio Operators School. Later he changed to serve as Infantry troop handler at Camp Pendleton for incoming Marine Reservists bound for Korea.

As assistant Platoon Sergeant in outpost positions, Denny was severely wounded in combat and medically retired in 1953. When Chinese forces overran three nearby platoons, Denny had run back into battle to save one of his wounded men and carry him out to safety. But an oncoming explosion hit him en route and he was evacuated; as the last evacuee he was strapped outside a crowded military helicopter. Denny spent a long recuperation in military hospitals where his damaged leg was amputated at the age of 22. He received a prosthetic leg and later learned to make prosthetic limbs for wounded soldiers. Among his many military awards, Denny received the Navy Cross, the nation's second highest award for Valor in Combat. He remembers the chaos of the 1950-53 war in Korea where 4200 US Marines were killed in action, 42% of them killed in the last 15 months of military action.

Since his medical retirement in 1953, Denny has spent decades during the past 65 years working with veterans' organizations and hospitals as mentor to our country's wounded warriors. In recognition of his lifetime accomplishments, he was selected for honorary promotion to Gunnery Sergeant in the US Marine Corps in 2011.

Denny Weisgerber believes strongly in service above self, as demonstrated in his 55 years of membership in Rotary, including his 1999-2000 term as District 5160 Governor and 12 years on Milpitas City Council where he served three two-year terms as Mayor. He was warmly congratulated by the assembled Rotarians and guests at this commemorative Rotary meeting in Los Altos; they cheered him on!

Each year, Cupertino Rotary partners with Cupertino Safeway to provide over 100 preprepared Thanksgiving meals, which our members deliver Thanksgiving morning to recipient families that have been pre-selected by local community-based organizations as families that can definitely use this help.

Thanksgiving morning, Rotarians gather at the Safeway parking lot (De Anza and Homestead) at 8:30 am. Volunteers check in and are given the contact information with a map showing the directions to the house(s) of their recipient(s).

Shortly after 8:30 am, Safeway staff wheel out the prepared, pre-cooked meals. Each meal serves 6 to 8 people. Our Interact Club members and Boy Scouts from Troop 479 then assist in carrying the meals to the cars of the volunteers delivering them.



The volunteers deliver the meals between 9:30 am and 10:30 am and then return home to enjoy Thanksgiving with their families.

Last year, just over 60 Cupertino Rotarians volunteered to deliver meals Thanksgiving morning. This year looks to be even bigger!

Every year at this time, Cupertino Rotary Community Services hosts a special luncheon for seniors to kick off the Holidays.

30-35 Cupertino Rotarians will volunteer and pay for the sponsored seniors lunch.




