

From the desk of District Governor Tim Lundell

As the calendar turns to October we celebrate perhaps the least understood of the five Avenues of Service:
Vocational Service.
Of course, the very foundational principles of Rotary

emphasize our vocations. The Second Object of Rotary calls for every Rotarian to embrace "high ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society". Putting these principles into action at the club level requires some creativity. On my visits to the Clubs this year, I have seen just that: in one Club, high school seniors are matched with two Rotarian mentors, who provide guidance on college and career selection. Another Club organizes an annual career fair for the Interactors they sponsor, in which Rotarians provide in-depth information about their occupations and present opportunities for internship or employment. Still other clubs provide vocational advice from member to member, for those who are at a time in life for transition to new careers. Jim Gibson, our District Vocational Service Chair, will be highlighting these and other Vocational Service ideas at the Avenues of Service

event next Thursday, October 4th, at the Biltmore Hotel in Santa Clara.

Last month I commented on the Rotarian thirst for leadership training, as evidenced by the tremendous response to our new 2018-19 Leadership Academy program. I am happy to confirm that there is still more to come, as we will be presenting an outstanding one-day seminar on what we are calling "Pure Leadership", presented by leadership training expert John Lipp, the author of the widely-read The Complete Idiot's Guide to Recruiting and Managing Volunteers. The program will be presented on Saturday, December 15th, from 8:30 to 3:00 p.m. at the Los Gatos Lodge in Los Gatos. The cost for attending, which will include a light breakfast and lunch, is \$20. Registration will open on the District's website within the next few weeks.

Finally, an important reminder to the many District members who are excited about the 2019 Rotary International Convention in Hamburg, Germany next June. In Toronto last June, I forecasted that there would be great interest in the Hamburg Convention, and reserved a block of 55 hotel rooms at the Ameron Hotel Speicherstadt, located on the canal in Hamburg, for our District

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members. The reservation window has been open for the past few weeks on our District website, but here's the catch: we must claim or release the rooms no later than October 1, 2018, which means that any rooms not reserved by the end of this week will be released. The reason for the early deadline is that rooms will be in high demand for the estimated 35,000 Rotarians expected to gather in Hamburg, which is all the more reason to reserve your room NOW! 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DUBLIN CLUB GOES GREEN AT LUNCH

No. We are not a club of vegetarians. ("Not that there is anything wrong with that." <u>The</u> Outing, Jerry Seinfeld).

The Dublin Rotary Club, though, has taken positive steps to reduce plastic pollution by eliminating all plastic utensils, cups, plates and straws from its luncheons. In their place, the club now uses paper plates, biodegradable cutlery, paper cups, and wood stirrers.

Nowhere in sight are beverages in single-use plastic bottles. And gone are the trash cans and blue recycle bins. In their place, a single compost bin stands. All waste is returned to the land, not landfill!

Change from the norm was easier than one would think. Recently, we simply asked our

caterer, Teto's Catering, if all of the plastic on the table could be replaced with earth-friendly alternatives, and the next week, it was done!

The actions of the club pale in comparison to what is being done elsewhere. Last year, the New Delhi State in India banned the use of all plastic bags, cups and cutlery. And France became the first country to do the same.

Reducing plastic pollution is a global issue. But the solution begins with the actions of each us.

So, whether you are hosting a club meeting or district event, it may be easier than you think to reduce plastic pollution.

SINGLE USE PLASTICS FACT SHEET

FACT #1	In 2016, world plastics production totaled around 335 million metric tons. [1] Roughly half of annual plastic production is destined for a single-use product. [2]
FACT #2	Humans buy about 1,000,000 plastic bottles per minute in total.[3] Only about 23% of plastic bottles are recycled within the U.S.[4]
FACT #3	Americans purchase about 50 billion water bottles per year, averaging about 13 bottles per month for every person in the U.S.! That means by using a reusable water bottle, you could save an average of 156 plastic bottles annually.[5]

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FACT #4	It is estimated that 4 trillion plastic bags are used worldwide annually. On-
	ly 1% of plastic bags are returned for recycling.[6] Americans throw away
	100 billion plastic bags annually. That's about 307 bags per person! All
	that waste can be eliminated by switching to reusable shopping bags.[7]
FACT #5	Half a million straws are used in the world every day.[8] Refusing straws
	is becoming a trending practice!
FACT #6	500 billion disposable cups are consumed every year. [9] Americans alone
	throw away 25 billion Styrofoam coffee cups every year. Styrofoam can-
	not be completely recycled. Most of the Styrofoam disposed of today will
	still be present in landfills 500 years from now. [10]
FACT #7	The main cause for the increase in plastic production is plastic packaging.
	Plastic packaging was 42% of all non-fiber plastic produced in 2015, and it
	also made up 52% of plastics thrown away.[1]
FACT #8	Single-use-plastics frequently do not make it to a landfill or are recycled.
	[11] A full 32% of the 78 million tons of plastic packaging produced annu-
	ally is left to flow into our oceans; the equivalent of pouring one garbage
	truck of plastic into the ocean every minute. This is expected to increase
	to two per minute by 2030 and four per minute by 2050. By 2050, this
	could mean there will be more plastic than fish in the world's oceans. [12]
	Choosing to buy products with less packaging or no packaging altogether
	makes a big difference.
FACT #9	Even when single-use plastics are sent to landfills (there are 3,091 active
	landfills in the U.S. alone), they aren't harmless. Landfill liners can leak
	harmful pollutants into the watershed and plastics on the tops of landfills
	can be carried away by the wind. [13] The best way to curb single-use plas-
	tic pollution is to reduce your personal plastic consumption! [3]
