



From the desk of District Governor Susan Valenta

July 2015



Since 2000, the Wheelchair Foundation has distributed 1 million wheelchairs to people throughout the world with the gift of mobility. In March 2015, I joined a group of Rotarians from our District and Midland, TX, and distributed wheelchairs in Monterrey, Mexico. The smiles on the faces of mothers as children sat in their shiny, new wheelchair, filled me with pride knowing that Rotary was making a difference in the lives of others. With an estimated 100 million more people needing this gift of mobility, Rotary District 5170 is joining together to fill one container – 280 wheelchairs – for another distribution in Spring 2016 to Mexico and beyond.

The progress has been amazing. With this Rotary year just starting, 125 wheelchairs are already committed. We are already one-half of the way to our goal! The wheelchairs are \$150, but with a generous matching grant from the Silicon Valley Foundation and District Designated Funds, every \$100 donation by a club or individual receives a \$50 match to purchase one wheelchair.

A huge note of appreciation is extended to Josh Burroughs (RC of San Jose) for securing matching grants and assisting the District with managing this District

We channel our commitment to service at home and abroad through five Avenues of Service, which are the "foundation of club activity". That is the key phrase. The clubs do the work of Rotary and the Avenues of Service divide the work into 5 areas: Club, Vocational, Community, International, and Youth Service.

Rotary clubs should think broadly about how they and their members could contribute within each avenue.

To support the clubs in developing their Avenues of Service programs, we have five District Avenues of Service Chairs:

Rotary Youth Exchange is for high school aged students who are interested in living



- Our returned students call it "The best year of my life."







Fellowship Membership Categories Expanded

The Board of Rotary International, at its June 2015 meeting in Brazil, has expanded membership eligibility in Rotary Fellowships to include family members of Rotarians (not just spouses) as well as anyone who has ever participated in a Rotary or Foundation program.

This broader category includes Rotaractors as well as participants and alumni of all other Rotary and Foundation programs, past and present, including (but not limited to): Interact, Rotaract, Rotary Youth Exchange, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), Rotary Peace Fellowships, Global Grant Scholarships, Vocational training teams (members and leaders), District Grant scholarships, New Generations Service Exchange, and Rotary Foundation awards to individuals in former TRF programs, such as: Ambassadorial Scholarships, Grants for University Teachers, Group Study Exchange, and Rotary Volunteers.



It is at the discretion of the individual fellowships whether to include these new categories in their Fellowship. Also, Fellowships are still bound by the laws and regulations of the states and countries where they function. For example, the *Rotarians Wine Appreciation Fellowship* or *Beer Fellowship* cannot accept Interactors as members because they are young people ages 13-18 and in many countries legal drinking age is not until 21.

Additionally, by passing this policy, the Board does not dictate that the *Singles Fellowship* accept married Rotarians as members. Therefore, it is at the discretion of the individual fellowships to decide whom to accept from the eligible categories.

The broadening of membership categories for Fellowships is another indicator that Rotary International is encouraging inclusion and engagement in its service to others.

Rotaract

“You’re from Rotaract? Which high school do you go to?”

This is a question I’m asked a lot. And while I’ll openly blame being mistaken for a teenager on my amazing genetics, the question reminds me that there is still a lot for Rotaract to do within our own family. I hope these monthly articles will shed some light on this section of your Rotary world.

So, what is Rotaract?

Rotaract is Rotary’s “mini-me”. We use the same concepts, such as the Four Way Test and community service, to develop university students and young professionals into society’s future leaders and change makers. For many of us, our ultimate goal is to become a Rotarian.

If our goal is to become a Rotarian, why don’t we just immediately join Rotary?

If you ask any Rotaractor this question, we typically have a few standard responses. However, the underlying factor in all of our responses is stability or, more accurately, the lack of it. (Author’s Note: I understand that “stability” may not be the best term to use in this case, since life, in general, is hardly ever “stable”.) We’re at a stage in our lives where we can’t guarantee that we’ll be living in the same city this time next year. This volatility is present in many aspects of our lives – our career paths, economic status, and relationships. Rotaract allows us to be a part of an organization we respect, but can’t commit the time and resources it deserves from us.

The common thread of having such a variable life also allows us to focus our efforts on addressing just that. Our professional development resources are used to help us create more stable lives – finding a job that puts us on a career path we want to build, which increases our likelihood of staying in one area longer and leading financially independent lives. We see Rotarians as a valuable group of individuals who have not only survived what we’re just beginning to experience, but have also thrived. There is a lot to learn from your wisdom, but Rotary’s programs and resources don’t always cater to addressing this need. So, while there are a lot of benefits to us joining Rotary

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sooner, rather than later, we ask that you be patient with us as we learn how to navigate through adulthood.

How can Rotarians help Rotaractors become Rotarians faster?

Essentially, establishing a general sense of stability in our lives would have us looking more towards Rotary as a better fit for us. Helping Rotaractors gain the skills, and providing them with resources they could use, to establish their careers is the most effective way to help Rotaractors become Rotarians. And with a personal connection to the Rotaractors, the likelihood of them joining your club, specifically, increases tenfold.

District Visioning Team at Work

The Rotary Club of Santa Cruz Sunrise held a district-led visioning session in 2010 at the Dream Inn in Santa Cruz. I had only been in the club for 3 years at that time and was interested in the visioning process, but did not really think I would take a large role in it as I was so new – and what did I know?



I was very encouraged to attend and so signed up. When I got there I was still planning on doing more listening and learning, but when the session started, it was run so well that I was completely empowered to find my voice and fully take part.

That event was one of the most powerful events for me in my Rotary history; not only did I learn how to speak up, it allowed me to see a side of the club I had not really seen before. It unleashed the passions of the members and allowed me to see that I had way more in common with these people than I had previously thought. I knew we all valued service and the kids and our community, but when I found out our club was also really into conservation, ecology, ocean stewardship, and biodiversity, my commitment to the club was completely cemented.

The visioning session really gives Rotarians the opportunity to share ideas and come away with a starting point to take action. At that visioning session we made a goal of raising \$50,000 for the Rotary Classroom at the Monterey Bay Marine Sanctuary Exploration Center, and we accomplished it.

Since that visioning session I became a much more vocal member of the club. I served on the board, took part in all the projects, and am now Club President, 5 years later. Knowing what a great tool this was for the club, I decided to hold another session before starting my year. I knew we had many new passionate members that were staying quiet and waiting to be asked about their ideas. I knew a visioning session would empower them just as it had done for me 5 years ago. Sure enough, we were able to get them talking and dreaming alongside seasoned club members, and we came up with some really creative ideas. The session invigorated everyone who attended. It was a great way to exchange ideas and build on fellowship.

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As the incoming club president it was extremely valuable for me to see what the membership wants. I feel completely empowered to run with my dreams and goals for the year because I know for sure these are the dreams and goals of the membership.

I feel this process strengthened us as a club and tightened our focus. It definitely helped to ensure that all our members have the opportunity to get involved and I know it will improve the success of our club for years to come.

The new club joins the ranks of 34,000 clubs – including a handful of eclubs – that make up Rotary International, the world’s largest global humanitarian service organization. The club’s leaders plan to perform traditional service such as food distributions, as well as technology-enabled volunteering such as remote mentoring. Like other Rotary clubs, it will lead cultural exchanges and grants for development and humanitarian programs.

“We’re proud to start the Rotary eClub of Silicon Valley,” says Rushton Hurley, president. “And we’re eager to tap the talents and community service experience of our members in Canada, South Africa, and the United States,” he says. “The inspiring contributions of Rotarians have helped create a healthier, more productive, and more peaceful world. We plan to harness the power of the Internet to build on that great work and to see how technology can serve the business of service.”

Men and women worldwide can join the eClub of Silicon Valley. And Rotarians who belong to other clubs may “make up” weekly meetings there. 
