From Rotary International's Convention Insider, June 2, 2014:

We reached out to Rotarians to hear what they thought of today's plenary speakers: Jack Sim, founder of the World Toilet Organization (WTO); Professor Martin Silink, president of the International Diabetes Federation; Tommy Spaulding, a former Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar and leadership expert; and Brett Lee, Australian cricket star.

"As a new club officer I really appreciated what the speaker on leadership [Spaulding] said. He gave me some ideas on how to recruit younger people in Rotary, which is crucial for not only my club but Rotary as a whole. Each one did something for me in terms of understanding the expansion of what Rotary does. Today taught me about Rotary being a caring organization...I'm the only one in my club here, but I wish I had other members sitting next to me. I was imagining turning to them and saying 'Yeah, yeah, we can do something like that.' We are interested in literacy and being here I feel like I can connect with an international club." — *Betty McEady, president-elect of the Rotary Club of Oakland Sunrise, California.*

RI Pilot Programs Recruit and Retain Members

The RI Board of Directors agreed to extend the pilot programs for the Associate Membership, Corporate Membership, Innovative and Flexible Club, and Satellite Club Membership pilot projects for a second three-year term, ending 30 June 2017. For the past three years, 800 Rotary clubs have participated in these pilot projects to test new membership types and innovations. Three clubs in District 5170 were approved for designated pilot programs: RC of Livermore, RC of Cupertino and the RC of Alameda.

RC of Livermore

RC of Livermore club president **Phil Dean** explained how his club initiated an exchange of service hours for club meeting attendance under the *Innovative and Flexible Club Pilot Program*. "We just wanted to do something different to help our members see Rotary as more than just attending a weekly meeting," said Phil. Engagement in Rotary Service worked for Livermore as the club brought in 16 new members over the past three years. "We are now looking for

other ways to attract and retain members," continued Phil. "A really exciting program that we started is called *Friends of the Rotary Club of Livermore*. Interested community members can attend our meetings and participate in our service projects even though they are not Rotarians. We even give them a special badge to wear. They do not pay club dues nor have attendance requirements. Some of these people ask if they can become Rotarians...you can't get much better than that!" mused Phil.

RC of Cupertino

"Under the Satellite Club Pilot, we provided an alternative weekly early morning meeting for our Rotarians who worked during the day and couldn't make our luncheon meetings," reported RC of Cupertino club president **Savita Vaidhyanathan**. "Our targeted audience, the day workers, were not the ones who attended the morning meetings. From that perspective, the pilot program was not a success and the Board will



not continue it for next year. We did, though, recruit two new members who enjoyed the early morning meetings," explained Savita. "Our club is quite diverse and truly reflects the community in which we serve. Recruitment and retention of Rotarians continue to be based on engagement in service activities, whether international projects or local community activities."

RC of Alameda

"We are a fairly small club and we saw opportunity by participating in the Corporate Membership Pilot Program," stated RC of Alameda club president **John King**. "Under this Program, companies and corporations sign up as Club Members. They pay the dues to the club and designate three or four persons who will attend meetings and engage in community service activities. "We now have the City of Alameda, the





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Oakland Raiders, a local winery and other companies registered as Corporate Members," said John. "This has been very beneficial for our club. For example, we just conducted our major fundraiser and, with the support and publicity generated through corporate involvement, we exceeded our fundraising

goal this year. This is a win-win for our college scholarship program and grant giving to our local non-profits that our club supports," exclaimed John. "I can't say that we have increased the number of members significantly through this program, however. It just basically comes down to engagement and commitment of individuals. Rotarians who give service receive the benefit of giving that comes with engagement. That's the foundation of Rotary membership retention," remarked John.



New Policies on Attendance

Rotary International approved new policies in which engagement rather than meeting attendance was approved for Rotary Club members. The approved legislation provides that:

- A member must attend at least 50 percent of club regular meetings or engage in club projects, other events and activities for at least 12 hours in each half of the year, or a proportionate combination of both.
- A member must attend at least 30 percent of this club's regular meetings or engage in club projects, other events and activities in each half of the year

Additionally, the former "Rule of 85" was reinstated. Members whose chronological age combined with number of years in Rotary equals or exceeds 85 years are excused from required meeting attendance. Many District clubs have amended their Bylaws to reflect these changes in RI Policy.

New Member Sponsor Recognition Program

Rotary International's Board of Directors approved a new way to recognize Rotarians who sponsor new members. All sponsors of members admitted to Rotary on or after 1 July 2013 are eligible to receive a specially designed membership pin and colored pin backer from Rotary in recognition of their commitment to the organization's membership growth. A current member who sponsors one new member will receive a recognition pin with a blue backer. As additional members are sponsored, new colored backers will be awarded to signify the number of new members sponsored.

The levels of achievement are based on the num-

ber of new members sponsored:

1 memberBlue backer2-3 membersBronze backer4-5 membersSilver backer6+Gold backer



Sponsors will also have opportunities to be acknowledged in the Membership Recognition Gallery that will soon appear on www.rotary.org, as well as in regional magazines and other Rotary publications. This year, RI President Ron Burton recognized Rotary members who sponsored six or more new members since July 2013 at this year's RI Convention in Sydney, Australia. Goldlevel sponsors were invited to a special reception where they were applauded for their efforts and commitment to Rotary's membership growth.




