From District Governor Angie Hassler

Imagine not being able to read road signs, warning information on a medical prescription, or a note sent home by your child's teacher. As a person who can read, I really don't know what this would be like.

My frame of reference for this experience was the first time I traveled to the Far East in 1970. Not even an alphabet that I recognized or the familiarity of the language. Thank heavens the train signs in Japan were in color so I knew which line to take!



As Rotarians, we provide dictionaries to 3rd or 4th grade students to provide a way to share love of language. In fact, in the news recently the regional bay area spelling bee winner says she has begun reading her dictionary to prepare for the finals that will be held in Washington DC later this year. Clubs in our District are very responsive and creative in addressing needs of children in our communities. Our Rotary Literacy projects often focus on children. We are proud, and rightfully so, of our impactful Rotary literacy projects. The Los Gatos Morning club has even been recognized at the White House for its "Lighting for Literacy" project that now is in more and more countries. Oakland #3 has distributed thousands and thousands of books to the school children of Oakland. Many of our clubs offer a book in their speakers name to a local library or school library. And would we be able to have our wonderful Richard D. King speech contest each year if it were not for literacy?

As we learned at the last cabinet meeting, 700-900 million adults are functionally illiterate: 1 in 5! Of which two thirds are women and girls have a higher illiteracy rate than boys. 98% of illiterate people are in 3 areas: South and West Asia, Sub-Saharan Africa and Arab States.

Literacy is one of our 6 Areas of Focus...ways that Rotarians impact our community and the world. Literacy spans each of our Avenues of Service, showing up in Youth Service; International Service; Vocational Service; Club; and Community Service.

My challenge to you is to expand your view of Literacy to include not only young people, but also to include adults who may be in need of our support to maximize their potential. Adults who exist in our own society, who struggle because they cannot read road signs, warnings on a medical prescription, or a note sent home by their child's teacher. Remember this year we are Engaging Rotary, Changing Lives.

Lori's years of service with Oakland Rotary were celebrated and Oakland Mayor Jean Quan proclaimed Thursday, February 20, 2014 as Lori Sinclair Cloutier Day in the City of Oakland. Lori was also made an honorary member of Oakland #3. Lori and her husband Mike have moved to Poulsbo, Washington.

International Service

Twenty four Rotarians and friends, mostly from District 5170 recently returned from Uniendo America Project Fair and a hands on service project in Uspantan, Quiche, Guatemala. We were fortunate to have District Governor Angie Hassler and PDGs Roger Hassler, Joe Hamilton and Dave Gallagher with us on this trip. This is the second year of a two year grant to provide health education to 500 students in rural schools in the area surrounding Uspantan. In the first year, in addition to the health fair, over \$80,000 in equipment was donated to a hospital near Guatemala City that serves the Mayan population.



The seven clubs of Area 7 (Santa Cruz County) joined together to work with a local family and provide

education in the areas of nutrition, sanitation, dental care, first aid, and respiration, and the wise use of properly ventilated wood stoves. To date, 45 fuel efficient and healthy wood stoves have been contributed to needy families. This year, two optometrists joined the group and distributed over 40 eye glasses.

Letters were received from youth expressing their gratitude for support from the Hernandez fami-

ly for the school supplies also provided by this grant. To learn more about this project, arrange

supplies such as stoves, blankets, water filters and other tools to families who lose their homes and possessions following a disaster such as earthquake, volcano, flood, hurricane, cyclone, tsunami or conflict.

In response to Typhoon Haiyan (known locally as Yolanda), which struck the Philippines on Nov. 8, ShelterBox continues to provide aid to families in the worst hit areas of Leyte and the Bantayan islands.

After Gary C. K. Huang, President-elect of Rotary International, spoke at the Far West President Elects Training Seminar (PETS) in San Jose, he extended his stay for two other events at the request of Past RI President Richard D. King, a member of the Niles (Fremont) Rotary Club. Huang served as vice president for King when King was Rotary International President in 2001-2002 and they formed a lasting friendship.

Sunday evening, March 9, District Rotarians and several Asian organizations honored Huang and his wife, Corrina Yao, with a reception at the Culture Center of T.E.C.O. in Sunnyvale. Delighted by seeing so many friends, Huang spoke to them in the Taiwanese dialect, encouraging them to become Rotarians.



Huang was born in southern China and grew up in Taiwan. He and his wife have three children. His book

"Finding Solutions, Not Excuses," tells about his business and Rotary experiences.

On Monday, March 10, the Huang's were honored guests at a luncheon hosted by the six Rotary clubs of Area 3. He said he spent many years working toward his goal of becoming the first Chi-

nese president of Rotary International. Membership growth is a top priority because with more members Rotary can do more good in the world.

With warmth and humor President-elect Huang captivated his audience. He taught them his trademark "Happy Clap" and a few lines of his specially created song for Rotary next year, in his native language.

"He is an inspiration to all of us," said David Sheen, a Fremont Rotarian and president of the Asian Business Alliance. "His middle initials are for his Chinese name, Chi Kuang, which means 'unique or special light.' I think he is truly going to 'Light up Rotary'."

Linkages Promote Literacy

Rotarian Maria Daane had

no idea that her passion for books would involve her in an annual book distribution that would impact 600 to 900 low income students in the Santa Clara area. A non-profit



manager, Maria heads the Santa Clara Library Foundation. "When the Rotary Club of Santa Clara adopted its *Steps for Success Program*," explains Club President Lou Ann Alexander, "we decided to give each child a new book along with a new pair of shoes. The tie-in with the Santa Clara Unified School District and partnership with the Santa Clara City Library facilitated our mission to bring the tools of literacy to youngsters who rarely owned a book of their own."

"The education of our youth is very important," says Maria. As the current head of the Club's Scholarship Committee, she helps to select deserving high school seniors who will receive financial aid to complete at least two years of community college or trade school and can be renewed for up to four years of schooling. Most years, 7 to 10 scholars are funded from Santa Clara for \$2,000 each. "Need and motivation trump academic GPAs," says Maria. Recently, the Club continued financial support for one of their recipients to continue on to complete her degree at a university.

The RC of Santa Clara also donates a library book, signed by the weekly guest speaker, to the Santa Clara City Library. "We target an age group—tweens, adults, elementary-aged students—with selections that are current and in demand. It is another way that we put the printed word into the hands of those who will benefit most from the books."

Maria Daane joined Rotary in May 2008. "I was new to the area and wanted to be part of the group that helps our community." She majored in Hospitality Administration at Cornell University and earned her MBA at Michigan State. Previous to her current position as Manager of the Santa Clara Library Foundation, she worked for the United Way in Lansing, Michigan and the YMCA in Oakland, CA. She and her husband, Chi Dang, have two children.

The Fellowship of Literacy Providers

The idea for the *Fellowship of Literacy Providers* was developed by PDG Harold C. Shipley of District 5180 (Sacramento Valley). Hal had been the District Chair of the Literacy Committee since 1998 and was very interested in finding ways to improve the literacy level in his district. He contacted like-minded PDGs from around the world and applied to RI for approval of the Fellowship (granted November 2004).



The Fellowship started with 18 members from five different countries and three different states. It has now increased in size to include members from 34 different countries and 35 different states.

Rotary Fellowships Appeal to all Interests

Rotary Fellowships are independent groups of Rotarians, their spouses, and Rotaractors who share a common passion. Being part of a fellowship is a fun way to make friends from around the world. Fellowship activities vary widely. Members come together around hobbies or interests such as cricket or jazz, or vocations such as writing or medicine. Some groups are purely social while others use their fellowship for service projects.

Rotary Fellowships began informally in 1928 when Rotarians with a shared interest in the language Esperanto joined together. In 1947, a group of Rotarian boating enthusiasts began flying the Rotary flag from their crafts, calling themselves the *International Yachting Fellowship of Rotarians;* this fellowship now boasts the longest continuous existence. The scope of Rotary Fellowships has changed much over the years, but today their purpose is still to unite Rotarians in friendship and provide venues for enjoying their favorite recreational or professional activities. If you attended the December 2013 Cabinet Meeting in San Jose, you were treated to musical repertoire of keyboard master Don Lewis (RC of Pleasanton) and the drums of David Scharff



(RC of Oakland #3). Both are members of the International Fellowship of Rotarian Musicians (IFRM) whose purpose it is to promote music literacy around the Rotary world through IFRM Foundation grants, encourage singing in the clubs and support community musical activities with their talent and expertise. This Fellowship collected and published the songs in the blue Rotary Song Book that most clubs use. Their members also form the Rotary World Choir that sings during the Interfaith Service at each RI Convention

The Fellowship attracts the newbie Rotarian who has just taken up (or is considering taking up) the service of Bulletin Editor/publisher for his club and the veteran Bulletin Editors and Publishers with years of experience.

Topics of interest are showcased. For example, members can <u>download and view a Video</u> on Bulletin Creation which describes how to create a newsletter with the help of MSOffice 2007. Members are encouraged to share their knowledge, skills and materials to the broader Fellowship community. Specifically, IFREP's goals are to:

- Provide an easy method to contribute, distribute, and search for ideas and information for bulletin editors.;
- Encourage more club members to accept the opportunity to be bulletin editor;
- Improve retention of current bulletin editors; and
- Improve club member's knowledge of Rotary.
