During one of my club visits, club members were telling me about one of their projects distributing dictionaries to all the third graders in their school district. As they described how excited

students were when they received a new, hard-cover dictionary, several Rotarians noted that past recipients of the dictionaries – who were now young adults – still kept them on their shelf for reference.

The stories of how Rotary touches the lives of others has no end. And how precious the legacy we leave, knowing that improving the lives of others is a gift that benefits both the giver and us, as Rotarians.

month, but truly, The Rotary Foundation (TRF) always needs our support anytime of the year. When I look at the 2015/2016 projects that our District clubs are planning, and the dollars that are being put back into the clubs through TRF, it underscores the unique nature of this Foundation.

When Rotarians give to TRF, a portion of the money comes back so that the club can decide on how they want to allocate the funds – locally or internationally. There are no Foundations that give such a powerful spending discretion to their donors like TRF.

Just a snapshot of projects that clubs in our District will be doing this year include: Coaniquem, which treats children suffering from severe burns in, Chile; Faces of Hope cleft palate surgeries in Guatemala; school supplies for children; local park renovations; lunch with Santa for underserved children; Stop Hunger Now packages food for humanitarian aid; a new water tank for an orphanage in Brazil; feeding the homeless; afterschool reading programs; access to healthcare for underserved communities in El Salvador. And this is just a portion of all the projects our 53 clubs are planning – with significant underwriting from your contributions to TRF.

This month, make it a point to invite a speaker from the <u>Rotary District 5170</u> <u>cadre of TRF speakers</u>. I have made TRF my Foundation of choice. It has a 4-star rating by Charity Navigator (their highest), a 5-star rating by GuideStar, it gives an excellent return on investment (ROI) to clubs, it has payment options, it has alternative ways for Planned Giving, and it has a clear mission – to do good in the

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world. A huge note of appreciation is extended to our District Chair of The Rotary Foundation, Cecelia Babkirk, and her entire team: Jim LeBlanc (Annual Fund Chair); Phil Dean (Major Donors and Paul Harris Society); Ninna Chugh (PolioPlus Chair) Georgie Hildebrand (Grants Chair); Dwight Perry (Financial Review Committee); Robyn Young (Rotary Peace Fellows); Grants Resource Leaders, Bob Dolci (Areas 1 – 3); Jon Winston (Areas 4 – 6); Gerri Hussey (Areas 7 – 9); Marie Sikora (Scholarship Chair); Lorena Tuohey (Stewardship Chair); Arlene Greenberg (Ombudsperson); Carolyn Schuetz (Special Advisor; Kennedy Richardson (Legal Advisor); and Jerra Rowland (TRF News). In 2014/2015, Rotarians in our District were #1 in Zone 26 with \$754,248 and #2 in Zone 26 for total contributions of \$994,741 – almost \$1 million! Please join me in raising the bar another notch to make Rotary District 5170 #1 in both Annual Fund and total contributions this year!

Fellow Rotarians,

District Grants using District Designated Funds from the Rotary Foundation are being funded! The Grant Resource Leaders, Gerri Hussey from Fremont Warm Springs Sunrise, Jon Winston from Santa Cruz Sunrise and Bob Dolce from Almaden Valley, are processing District Grants at record speed and, to date, more than \$65,000 has been transferred to Club Grants Accounts to fund projects. This year, rather than mailing deposit to the Club Grants Account, we have been able to transfer funds using an ACH transfer, ensuring that all District Grants are funded promptly after approval. One of the marvels of Rotary is its organic nature. All the while, a small group of dedicated Rotarians volunteers their time and works in the background to make sure the machine is humming along smoothly and that YOUR contributions are not leaking out of projects. That group is called The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisors. We have only one Cadre member from District 5170, and that's me! It's lonely here!

The Rotary Foundation sends members like me to conduct site visits of large Rotary around the world. I happen to be qualified in the Economic and Community Development Area of Focus, so I get to review micro-finance projects (I didn't know there were so many varieties!), vocational training projects, sustainable agriculture projects and any other project in which Economic and Community Development is a component. WOW! I am so impressed with what I see Rotarians around the world doing.

I am also qualified for Financial Audit and have done some audits. What, you say? Audit?

I'll bet you didn't know that The Rotary Foundation actually audits a sampling of grants every year, just to make sure the money is going where it should. You should be proud that OUR Foundation, The Rotary Foundation, cares enough to devote part of its budget to good stewardship.

In a week, I leave to conduct three sustainability audits in Guatemala. This is a bit of a departure from the usual site visit and just another way that The Rotary Foundation improves the Grants program, to make sure that the money you contribute keeps on giving and the beneficiaries continue to benefit, long after we are no longer involved. *Continued on next page...*

Think About the Good Your Rotary Club Can Do

Vocational Services Connects Us to Our Roots

Every one of the 53 Rotary Clubs in District 5170 is unique and different. Some of those unique characteristics and differences include the size of a Club (anywhere from 10 to 450 members), where the community it is located in (rural or small town or large city), and the mix of differing occupations and careers each Rotarian practices (or practiced, for those who are retired). When Paul Harris allowed the concepts of a "Rotary Club" to unfold in his mind, he discovered that one of the most important features would be the camaraderie of men who, working in a bona fide trade or profession, could interact with each other both personally and professionally while promising to practice the ethics of good personal and professional behavior. With the application of this concept, Paul Harris saw the practical results...and huge success of the Rotary Club of Chicago...of how working men (Rotarians) started avoiding corrupt businesses and business people in favor of doing business with other Rotarians... because they told the truth and were fair. And that realization, of businessmen could be supportive of one another in an ethical way, generated such good and positive feelings among the members which led to the Club taking action collectively to help the needy and to use their skills and talents for projects that improved their community. Wow! Visiting businessmen from San Francisco saw what the Rotary was doing in Chicago and were so impressed and excited about what they observed and learned about the "Rotary Club," they decided to start the second Rotary Club in their city of St. Francis

The short message here is: let us, as Rotarians, support each other's businesses...and let us be aware of how our occupation (which uses our skills and talents) may be helpful to others and to our community. I think we all will find, no matter the size of our Club or its location, *we* can make a good and positive difference doing (ethical) business with each other, and then, together, using our skills and talents to serve others in our community. When we do such things, our hearts sing and our spirits rise...and there may be no nicer place for a soul to be.

Sometimes we human beings start at a good place (a project or activity so "good" that

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it seems like it will sustain itself), and over months and years and decades, we make adjustments to improve what we are trying to do. But then, for some reason, the quality or effectiveness of the project or activity diminishes some. Rotary is an organization of people-- good people-- but even good people can misconstrue objectives over time...so we too can unintentionally compromise the great purpose of Vocational Services that Paul Harris had envisioned. Let's just call it our human inclination to "explore." We Rotarians have, over the decades, allowed unwritten rules to sneak into our meetings where a Rotarian was discouraged (even "fined") from talking to other Rotarians about their vocation or their business, or they were very passive about learning about a Rotarian's occupation. But no one seemed to notice how we were losing one of Rotary's great attractions, and perhaps part of our soul. T.S. Eliot observed in his poem "Little Gidding" what we are beginning to realize today: "We shall not cease from exploration, and at the end of all our exploring...will be to arrive where we started and know the place for the first time." By looking back and adopting our "Founding Father's" original purpose in highlighting member's occupations and encouraging ethical business interactions between themselves, all benefit. Then, prospective new members come and knock on your Club's door...and membership increases...and more hands make community projects more feasible...and your community gets even better, and so does the business activity of your Club members. Brilliant!

Here are five simple ideas any Rotary Club can get started with:

- encourage your Rotarians' participation in the <u>District Yellow Pages</u> (its free)
- have one "vocational talk" (say... 5-minutes max) at each meeting or 2X a month
- ask for Vocational Service suggestions from your members
- create a "Business Needs Board" where notes can be tacked
- take 10-minutes (or more if needed) and have each Rotarian give their "job title," company and what they do (this gives more useful information than just reciting their "Classification")

From Rotary International:


On 21 November, Rotary General Secretary John Hewko and a team of staffers will join Rotary members to bike up to 104 miles in El Tour de Tucson to raise funds for polio eradication. The event is one of the top cycling events in the U.S., attracting more than 9,000 cyclists each year. John and the Rotary team aim to raise \$3.4 million, which will be tripled by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for a total of more than \$10 million, for the fight to end polio. Polio Eradication Update: To date, there have only been 51 cases of polio in 2015; 13 in Afghanistan, and 38 in Pakistan. What is remarkable, is that the last recorded case of a wild polio virus transmission was September 16 in Pakistan. While we are about to enter into the high season for the transmission of the polio virus, it is encouraging to note that we have gone almost two months without a single case being transmitted.


