

A snapshot of RI President John Germ:

John Germ is a successful businessman, a community advocate, and a leader in the Rotary world. The son of a stonemason, John grew up with a strong work ethic and a drive to succeed. When his parents could not afford college tuition, he attended vocational school and then earned his way through college by working in a machine shop and serving food in the dorm cafeteria.

After graduating college, he joined the U.S. Air Force and was the navigator on a 50-ton Douglas C-124 carrying soldiers to Vietnam. In 1965, his C-124 carried the Gemini IV space capsule to Cape Kennedy. Following a successful military career, John joined the engineering firm Campbell & Associates in his hometown. True to form, he aspired to – and eventually became -- chairman and CEO of the firm.



John has set fundraising records for Rotary and other organizations. He thinks 'outside the box' and, as a result, he helped spearhead fundraisers resulting in: a Blood Assurance program; the conversion of a run-down dairy to a recycling center to employ adults with developmental disabilities; a Miracle League field to ensure that every child has a chance to play sports; and First Family program to provide scholarships for students who cannot attend college otherwise — all a testament to this community leader's vision and determination. To this end, John looks to reaching a \$300 million goal for The Rotary Foundation's centennial.

The calendar year is nearly over and mid-year is here in the Rotary world! The push for the Annual Fund continues. Here is some housekeeping information:

GOALS: SEVENTEEN clubs have yet to set a goal for Annual Fund contributions and Polio. We will continue to work with the Foundation Chairs in each club to get the goals registered.

ANNUAL FUND: Our contributions to the Annual Fund were at \$313,209 – nearly 40% of the district's \$800,000 goal, as of November 29. Many clubs are still sending their contributions and we expect to see that number double or triple between now and January 31st, when we calculate the DDF allocations for next year.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION DRAWING: The drawing will take place next Wednesday, December 7, at the District Leadership meeting. There are 9 great prizes – one for each area in the district. Youth service programs are rolling along in District 5170! We have a wonderful team of dedicated Rotarians who are committed to delivering great programs and great experiences for the youth of our district. We are truly embracing this year's RI theme of Rotary Serving Humanity and the district theme of attract the young, have fun, and get more done by sharing our talents with the youth of our District.

Here are updates of what is going on across the district:

RYLA: Planning for 2017 RYLA is well underway! Camp will be from June 25-30, 2017 at Mission Springs in Scotts Valley.

The camper cost this year is \$575, and payment is due by January 31, 2017. Last year we tried something new with club reservations and it was successful--- 10 Rotary clubs who had not participated in the past sent students to RYLA! This year we will modify the allocation process, so each Rotary Club in the District is guaranteed 2 spots, plus an additional spot for every active Interact Club the given Rotary Club sponsors. Youth Exchange: In the current year, there are 6 Outbound students and 6 inbound students. Long-term outbound students recently departed

for Japan, France, Argentina, Brazil, Italy and Belgium. Long-term inbound students are being hosted by the Rotary clubs of San Jose, Pleasanton North, Santa Cruz Sunrise, Santa Cruz, and Scotts Valley.

Exchange year is on December 4, 2016. Now is the time for clubs to consider reaching out to their Interact Clubs and talking-up the long term youth exchange program. Each applicant is required to provide 3 potential hosts families. Be Creative! Partner with clubs in your area to share responsibilities and costs. One club provides the monthly stipend the other club provides the counselor role. Of the 53 Rotary Clubs in the District, only 6 participated last year---we don't want to turn away students who want to participate in this life experience!

Rotarians have three upcoming opportunities to utilize their background, experience and skills by judging competitive events at DECA

conferences in Silicon Valley, San Ramon and in Santa Clara. These conferences bring together high school youth throughout Northern California to attend leadership and business development forums as well as to compete in their selected area in front of judges. Students present their proposals in a brief presentation (usually 10 minutes) and the judges provide them on-the-spot feedback. Additionally, judges use a rubric to rate the presenters. A combination of the judges' rating scores and a written test score combine to identify student winners.

Judges are greatly needed in order to make this event successful for the 3,000 plus students who participate in the competitive events. Please go to www.CADECA.org/judge/index.php to sign up as a judge for:

November 2016 Report

New Club

Beginning with this report, data will now be presented for 54 District 5170 Rotary Clubs. The Rotary Club of Silicon Valley Passport was chartered by Rotary

International on 27 September 2016 as Club Number 88007 with 26 members. The club has already added three more members. Its President is Ramesh Hariharan, formerly of the Rotary Club of East Palo Alto Bayshore. The club takes full advantage of the new Rotary flexibility in setting attendance requirements. There will be only a few formal meetings of the club. Informal meetings will include club projects in which club members participate. At the moment the club plans no projects of its own but its members will be available to support projects throughout the District. President Hariharan will be providing more information about this new club.

New Member Sponsors

In 2014 Rotary International initiated a program to give special recognition to those Rotarians who sponsor new members. The recognition includes a colored Rotary pin backer. The color of the backer depends on the number of new members sponsored, ranging from blue for one member, bronze for 2 or 3 members, silver for 4 or 5 and gold for 6 or more new members. You may have seen some of these pins being worn by members of your club. As of 27 November this year and beginning the count on 1 July 2013, the Foundation has awarded 565 of these pins to members of District 5170. The leading clubs are:

Six more Rotarians have sponsored 6 new members. All but one club had at least one sponsor and there were an average of 10.5 sponsors per club.

Membership Change by Club

Membership data for November are not yet available. For October, the District clubs gained 34 new members. With the 29 members of the new Rotary Club of Silicon Valley Passport, the District has gained 89 new members since 1 July 2016. This very good and leads to the expectation that the District will make significant growth for the 2016-2017 Rotary year.

Robertson High School Interact Club Sponsors Halloween Party

Robertson High School Interact Club, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Niles (Fremont) began World Interact Week with a Nacho, Popcorn, and Cotton Candy Party supporting Bay Area Community Services for Marginal and Homeless Adults. Niles Rotarians in an effort to Keep Calm and Serve On (club motto), Serve Humanity (Rotary International motto) while Attracting the Young, Having Fun and Getting More DONE (District motto) donated funds to the Robertson Interactors and attended the event. Robertson Interactors have been working on their DDF Project for months. It began in early September with a visit to the Bay Area Community Services Wellness Center in Fremont to meet with the center clients to assess their basic needs for the upcoming winter. The clients come from various places, some are homeless (campers) and some are marginal adults. The kids, with the assistance of the Peer Counselor, held a meeting and requested the clients to fill out wish lists on small post its to be deposited in to a wish box created by the students.

The wish box was taken back to the school where as a part of their Interact club and Leadership Class they worked with their teacher and Interact advisor Paul Barry to develop a plan for purchase of the most needed items.

The students decided to create Winter Relief packets that would include reusable rain ponchos, head lamps and two pair of socks (good socks as requested by the clients). They were also able to obtain donations of toiletries from the traveling Rotarians, blanket, pillows and water bottles.

The Wellness Center had planned a Halloween Party for its clients on October 31, 2016. The Interactors

along with Niles Rotarians were invited to attend. The interactors volunteered to create and facilitate a list of games, assist with set up and attend the party with the distribution of the Winter Relief Packets ending the day.

Two of the goals of World Interact Week are to engage Interactors and to inspire creativity. Sixteen Interact students attended the event. They set up, cooked a meal, made a green frothy drink, served the clients and yes ran a host of games that had everyone smiling, laughing and cheering. This club has certainly accomplished the World Interact goals as they stepped out of their comfort zone to obtain additional donations to purchase sleeping bags or blankets for this challenged group of individuals. In their enthusiasm to meet the needs of the clients at the BACS Wellness Center, the students scoured the community for additional discounts or donations. They hit the jackpot at Kohl's in Fremont; Kohl's staff not only attended the event but will be making a donation that will allow the students to complete their mission and ensure that clients will be a little warmer and drier in the next few months. Congratulations Robertson High School Interactors for a job well done with heart and caring.


