The only thing that could top the AOS was the Interact Fall Leadership Conference (FLC), held a few days later on October 8<sup>th</sup>. Once again almost 4000 Interactors came together to kick of their year and announce their key Community and International Service projects. It is an event not to be missed.



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Of course the bad news is the incredible series of disasters that have occurred in a very short time period. There is the strong desire from the Rotarians in District 5170 to reach out and support relief efforts in each affected community. Here is the current list of some of the ways to directly support Rotarians in these areas.

All areas- American Red Cross The Red Cross is the premier first responder for any of the recent disasters. Last Saturday, I had the opportunity to visit the Red Cross disaster Centers in Santa Rosa. We visited the kitchen set up in Petaluma, where hot meals were prepared and delivered by Red Cross ERVs (Emergency Response Vehicles) brought from all over the country. Then we visited the Central Disaster response office quickly established for the event, and finally the supplies warehouse also established just for this event. All in all, I was impressed with the organizational structure, but even more with the level of volunteers that were here from all over the country, many on their second or third disaster this year.

Houston and Puerto Rico-Disaster Aid USA Disaster Aid USA (DA USA) is a Rotarian operated project and a 501(c)(3) non-profit charity, incorporated in the District of Columbia. 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## Puerto Rico Disaster Relief

## **Opportunity to Provide Immediate, Direct Assistance**



One would have to be living under a rock not to know that we are being pummeled by mother nature, in the form of unprecedented natural disasters.

At the request of many members, our first effort to address some of these in a direct way, where every penny will go directly to those affected in Puerto Rico, there is an opportunity for clubs, Rotarians and non-Rotarian friends to participate in a District Grant.

## Goal: \$20,000 by November 1<sup>st</sup>

<u>Georgie Hildebrand</u>, who was our District Grants Chair for two years (2014-2016) relocated to Puerto Rico and joined the Rotary Club of San Juan, where she continues to do good in her adopted home. She and her club have offered to host a District grant, to provide the most basic of needs in the poorest communities on the island, where people have lost everything and do not have access to clean water and food. They are



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communities that are not receiving relief through the normal channels, because they are often immigrants of questionable legal status.

The statistics are grim:

- 80% of the island is without electricity and it is unlikely to be restored before the first months of 2018.
- Over 20 preventable deaths have occurred from leptospirosis, because 40% of the population is deriving drinking water from polluted water sources. More are sure to follow.
- In the poorest communities, people lost everything clothes, beds and basic household necessities. They
  have no financial means to replace those things, so they are sleeping on the floor or moldy mattresses, if
  they got them to dry out. Homes in the poorest communities have dirt floors. In a tropical environment
  such as Puerto Rico's, vermin of all types abound and the devastation from the hurricane provides a
  perfect environment for them to proliferate, further endangering the health of vulnerable populations.

Georgie and her club have assembled a team to go into the poorest villages, door-to-door, to interview the residents and determine the greatest needs that can be provided in the short term. So far, those needs include: Beds, clothing, water filters, small generators, diapers and formula for infants, small solar panels for cell phone chargers/providing light ...and much more....

## What can your club do?

For clubs which have District DDF that they would like to contribute to this grant, each dollar of that DDF will be exchanged for \$1.25 through our "Max the Match" program.

### Sustainable Rotary Club Project Report

Since July, all district governors and district membership chairs have talked to clubs about an opportunity to participate in RID John Matthews' signature initiative, the Sustainable Rotary

Club Project. The goal of this project is to encourage clubs to commit to sustained membership growth year over year for three years. RID John asked for 100 clubs to commit to taking a non-prescriptive, organic and customer service approach for sustaining club growth. At this time, 102 clubs have committed and 10 more clubs have indicated current interest.

In two weeks, the DG line from both zones will meet to develop action plan for their districts. All should come with an open mind and a willingness to develop a sustainable plan for growth in their districts.

The Sustainable Rotary Club project manager, PDG Deniel Banks, says that "part of the initiative is to determine sustainable processes used by clubs that can be shared throughout both zones." ## Santa Cruz Sunrise Rotary Raises \$100,000 for LEO's Haven

The Rotary Club of Santa Cruz Sunrise finished a 3 day, 200 mile bike ride Saturday, September 30, 2017, and raised over \$100,000 for LEO's Haven, Santa Cruz County's first inclusive playground! This "Epic Bike Ride", known affectionately as *Jon and Ken's Most Excellent Adventure,* celebrated its 20th anniversary this year with a rousing send off by none other than Supervisor Bruce McPherson, who has been "sending off the riders" for each of the last 20 years.

As the very tired 3-Day riders rode into the finish line party located at Lighthouse Bank, they were met by a similarly tired group of riders, on various adapted bikes customized to suit their individual needs. These many riders, most of them children, had ridden on a One Day Ride on the River Levee. The two groups of riders meet with smiles and tears as they all enjoyed the incredible feeling one gets from a major accomplishment.



The adaptive ride was coordinated with Bay Area Outreach & Recreation Program (BORP) who provided the adaptive bikes. For some of the kids who came out on Saturday it was the first time on a bike!

Nearly every member of the Santa Cruz Sunrise Rotary Club participated in the event, with many members working for months to make it a success! The funds were raised through generous sponsorship from many community members and businesses, and the finish line party included auctions and a raffle.

#### A great time was had by all!



Not only was this a record-breaking fundraiser, but it helped to raise awareness of the need for inclusive playgrounds for all children, showcased adaptive bikes, and allowed families to enjoy a magical Saturday afternoon.

"This was the first time my family has been able to join in one of these rides," said Tricia Potts, whose 7 year old son, Oliver, uses a wheelchair and participated in the ride using a hand cycle. "It was so wonderful to be with our Rotary friends, feeling like we belonged." Potts is the founder of the Santa Cruz Playground Project, an all volunteer group in the last stretch of a 2year campaign to raise \$1.9 million dollars to build LEO's Haven at Chanticleer Park.
