Rotary District 5170 has a lot of bragging rights with the world's largest population of Interactors – 7,000 young people from throughout the Bay Area! On October 11, the District 5170 Interact Fall

Leadership Conference convened with 4,300 Interactors at Independence High School in San Jose with a full day of inspiration, dedication, and action. The unveiling of their local and international projects was a highlight of the event and speaks volumes of the positive impact of these young leaders. Congratulations to Interact District Governor Stacy Phan, Lt. Governor Cara Nguyen and the Interact District Council on creating, organizing and leading a fantastic event. Thank you to Interact District Chair, Michelle Lewis, for her leadership and support to our Interact Clubs.

Credit also goes to Rotary Clubs in our District in the sponsorship and support of their Interact Clubs. Although, there are 113 Interact clubs in effect in our District, Rotary International records indicate that approximately 15% of the Interact Clubs do not have their charter registered with Rotary International. Your District leadership team is making every effort to contact Clubs that need assistance with the chartering process to ensure that their

Interact activities are covered by Rotary International insurance.

This month's newsletter has information on the next Camp RYLA. Please note that the date will be June 26 – July 1, 2016, so, the District will have experienced two RYLA camps in the 2015/16 Rotary year. To help defray the cost of tuition, the District is providing a \$70 credit per student for up to four students until November 30, 2015. The reservation system will open October 17, 2015 so be sure and reserve your RYLA spots on www.ryla5170.com/rotarians if your club is planning to sponsor RYLA students. After November 30, unused credits will be re-distributed.

Since July, I have visited 38 Rotary Clubs in our District – every visit leaves me with an even greater appreciation for what Rotarians do locally and internationally. Within communities, clubs are serving others at shelters, being mentors to at-risk teens, delivering dictionaries, reading to children, raising money to send young teens to RYLA, being Advisors to Interact Clubs, holding fundraisers to provide scholarships to graduating seniors, and giving financial support to local organizations. They are building and repairing parks, bandstands, fences, and benches. They are organizing back to

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school nights with BBQs – letting parents and teachers know that Rotary cares, they are making sure that families have gifts during the holidays, and that senior citizens have a safety net. Rotarians in our district go to Guatemala to repair the cleft palates of the neediest of the needy children, they bring toothbrushes to children in the Philippines, deliver wheelchairs, build hospitals and schools throughout our world. The scope of projects is absolutely amazing, and I am so proud of every one of our clubs and to be associated with such incredible individuals – Interactors, Rotaractors, and Rotarians of District 5170!

As you can tell, being a District Governor is a rewarding experience, and, it is a one-year term that ends way too soon.

November 1 marks the deadline for applications for the 2018/2019

District Governor term. There are many personal and professional advantages: one-on-one interaction with Rotarians in a four-county region; financial support from the District and Rotary International; staff support; a cadre of Past District Governors who provide support and guidance; training and support from Rotary International and the Zone; and, a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to serve as an officer of Rotary International. There are many individuals in our District who are more than qualified to serve as the

2018/2019 District Governor, so, take the leadership challenge by sending a completed nomination form to brittany.5170@gmail.com by November 1. Nominations forms can be found on the District website.

This message closes with a final request: Take time in the next few weeks to extend an invitation to a friend, family member, or colleague to join you at your next Rotary meeting. Introduce them to other community leaders, such as yourself, and consider asking them to join your club. Responding to Butte and Valley Fires

Rotarians in our Rotary District 5170 have requested information on ways to help the individuals, families, and fire fighters for both the Butte and Valley Fire. Many thanks to DG Glenn Fong of 5180 for providing most of the information. **Please note that cash donations are the best way to help.**

The **Red Cross** is actively helping victims of the Butte Fire in Amador and Calaveras counties and the Valley Fire in Lake and Napa counties. They are asking for cash donations at this time. People can help by donating to Red Cross Disaster Relief by visiting redcross.org, calling 1-800-RED CROSS, or texting the word REDCROSS to 90999 to make a \$10 donation. Donations to Disaster Relief will be used to prepare for, respond to and help people recover from disasters big and small.

Lakeport Rotary has established a fire relief fund for anyone wishing to donate to the Valley Fire Relief fund. Many Rotarians have opened their homes, and continue to do to help with those with immediate needs, but the days, weeks and months ahead are when some big challenges will unfold. With any funds donated, they will work closely with the other three Lake County Rotary clubs to determine how to best deploy those funds. You can mail your check to: Lakeport Rotary Valley Fire Relief Fund, PO Box 937, Lakeport, CA 95453.

The **Rotary Club of Calistoga** has created a Relief Fund for the victims of the Valley Fire. If you want to help, here is what you can do: Send a Gift Card (WalMart, Target etc.) or a prepaid VISA or Mastercard to: Rotary Club of Calistoga Valley Fire Relief Fund, P.O. Box 754, Calistoga, CA 94515. If sending a check, make it payable to the Calistoga Rotary Foundation so that it is tax deductible.

A formal press release is not always necessary

Don't worry about writing a press release. Many reporters prefer a Fact Sheet as long as it provides contact information so they can follow up.

Our August PR tip was to get the names of your reporters...those newspapers, radio and TV stations. Now that you have their contact info, send a Fact Sheet about your event or project.

Fact Sheets should contain:

Who

What

Where

Why

When

What community are you serving?

Is there an interesting twist?

Contact Person- name, phone and email and your connection to the story

Photo Op? When, What would that be?

Remember they are looking for good story material.

Does Vocational Services Deserve Our Attention?

If the Rotary Club you belong to is a "service organization," and "Service Above Self" is its motto, and it has members interested in making our community or state or country or world a better and more caring place, then we should take a closer look at how our personal work experience (and our skills that motivate us) can serve others. Now since all people are individuals and each one is "different" from all others, then each Rotarian has different interests and different skills and various talents at the disposal of their Rotary Club. Because of this fact, Rotary Club members can be a tremendous resource in Rotary International's effort to improve society and mankind, both locally and globally. Wouldn't you agree? And if so, Vocational Services does indeed deserve our attention.

So, how can our work, whatever our vocation be, allow us to serve our own Rotary Club? Let's look at a few brief examples:

- Our vocational expertise can be utilized by our Rotary Club to help on any of a number of projects. See what your Club Service Projects are and see if your professional skills and talents may assist the project.
- Our work or business can serve our fellow Rotarians as a source of a trustworthy business that uses ethical standards (*and* gets new customers). Perhaps arrange for a "Company Tour" for Rotarians interested in learning about a Rotarian's company/industry/technology.
- A Rotarian can help a student learn the challenges and rewards of a particular profession (business operations, librarian, city government, electrician, mechanic, sales, plumber, public safety, communications, marketing, engineering, teaching, managing, nursing, etc.) and could possibly become a "mentor." This idea can also be applied to our Veterans returning from service in the Middle East.
- Help save a youngster from joining gangs because they need to be acknowledged and appreciated (do they come from a single-parent family?). Help them find their "passion" hidden in their heart (art work? fixing things? playing on a sports team? building a house? detailing a car? learning how to sail? training an animal? selling something? starting a business?). Help them build self-confidence and self-esteem. As it was once said: "It is much easier to build a child than it is to repair an adult."

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- Using a Rotarian's personal or professional "network" is another way of helping others in a "vocational services" way. This idea also opens up the opportunity to interact with other nearby Rotary Clubs... connect people! (A Rotary Club is not an island!)
- Publicly recognize a local person doing an excellent job in their profession with something like an "Outstanding Work Award" reflecting the pursuit of excellence, ethics and fairness. The award comes from *your* Rotary Club.

There are many, many other ideas, so if you would like to have more ideas, please let me know. Many Vocational Services ideas/activities require little, if any, financial expense. There are some, like "Vocational Grants" for teachers or struggling college students, that need financing. The bottom line is that each Rotary Club is different: number of members...resources...location...enthusiasm...openness...awareness...personalities. In those things regarding Vocational Services in our Rotary Club, we just need to remember that we can't do everything, but we can do *something*.




Rotary News

From Rotary International:

Celebrate our remarkable progress toward a polio-free world with the Rotary World Polio Day event, streamed live from New York City on 23 October.

Co-hosted by UNICEF, the event will highlight recent milestones: In July, Nigeria marked one year without a case of polio caused by the wild poliovirus, and in August, the entire African continent celebrated one year without a

case. Jeffrey Kluger, health and science editor at Time magazine, will serve as moderator, joining other health experts, including UNICEF Executive Director Anthony Lake and polio ambassadors.



The event, which drew 23,000 viewers in 24 countries last year, will be available on social media and will be rebroadcast immediately on endpolio.org. Clubs can host their own activities to help raise awareness and funding for our final push to eradicate polio worldwide.

World Polio Day, which officially is observed on 24 October, was established by Rotary International more than 10 years ago. The timing in late October is in honor of the birthday of Dr. Jonas Salk, who led the team that developed the first polio vaccine.
