I have thoroughly enjoyed the club visits Kathi and I have made to date. We have visited more than 30, and each club has a personality of its own. We have been well-received and wonderfully treated. Thanks to all of you.

One of the best received parts of the visits has been our version of the Governor's Gift. In the past, this has been a gift that clubs purchase and is handed off to the Governor to be taken to the next club and auctioned off. Last year, Governor Marley changed the nature of the gift to a favorite project outlined by a club which he took to share at the next club he visited.

When I asked Kathi to accompany me on club visits, she said she would if she could have her own project. Her project had to do with her love of babies and all things related to babies. The project involves clubs providing newborn receiving blankets to us in whatever number they choose. In some cases, clubs ask Kathi to do the purchasing; and in other cases, members purchase them and hand them to us during the visit.

The provisions of the project are when we complete visits to one of the district's 9 areas, the Presidents and the Assistant Governor from that area decide what regional hospital, clinic, or other location where the blankets can be used. On a date Kathi and the Presidents decide, the receiving blankets we collected from that area are presented to an agency in the name of the clubs. It becomes an opportunity for the local clubs to be recognized for their donation. The response by clubs has been overwhelming, and the first presentation will take place in Area 4, Pleasanton/Dublin/Livermore on October 8.

Improved Hearing for Rotary Meetings.

A significant number of Rotary members are hearing impaired. Most of them don't know it or do nothing about it. A National Health Interview Survey reported that 15% of adults 45 - 64 years old and 27% of adults 65-74 years old have significant hearing loss. I have been told that 40% of Rotarians have some hearing loss issues.

Hearing loss is not limited to the "elderly." It also comes from exposure to loud noises: rock concerts, jack hammers, sirens. In my case, it was racing cars & tuning dual carb engines. I had two aids at age 30 and am now deaf in one ear.

Hearing involves both hearing the sound and understanding it.

People with even minimal hearing loss cannot understand a speaker at a meeting or a noisy environment. They need more clarity, not more volume, so a PA system does not help.

A surprisingly economical solution for members and guests with hearing loss is an "assisted listening system."

How many clubs have admitted hard of hearing or deaf members? Very few. Why? Maybe they were frustrated with the sound system and either drifted away when it became impossible or never joined in the first place. An assisted listening system will allow clubs to retain members as they lose their hearing and attract new members who already have hearing issues.

We would like to hear from clubs that have installed or are considering an assisted listening system.

The main problem a technophobe has is a fear of the perceived to be incomprehensible nature of anything technological. This goes back to the days of programming VCR's and the crazy blinking 12:00PM (if you are under 40, ask your parents what a VCR is). You probably think, "I couldn't even make a clock work so I could record movies....How can I use a computer?"

Okay, now that I have your attention, take heart. This year the Communication Technologies in District 5170 is making the user interface to the district website more user friendly. As an example, if you look at the HOME page (www.rotarydistrict5170.org), you will see all types of icons representing a concept. An example is the new section for AWARDS available to clubs and individuals. The AWARDS come from both D5170 and RI. Go to the HOME page and click on the text link below the picture of the loving cup award. The next page you see will be an overview of the AWARDS concept. The links on the left hand side of the page will take you to the descriptions of the AWARDS. At the Avenues of Service, October 25, 2012, the Communication Technologies committee will have a booth in the Project Fair. There will be several laptops and a projector. During the Project Fair, we will give quick 10-15 minute presentations on various topics related to technology. Since we will have Internet access, the topics to be discussed using live demos are a basic overview of navigating around Club Runner websites and tools to assist you, video conferencing allowing up to 10 people to be connected and have visual contact with each of the participants during the session, social media (eg. what is that Facebook thing anyway?), and what it takes to use the Internet for club and district PR. The goal is to see what topics people want to explore more deeply. These will be made into full length tutorial/seminar presentations in a few months.
