



Our exchange students have arrived. Be sure to include them in your meetings and activities too.



Recruitment through Club Mixers—by Lee Denlinger

Last year I had the opportunity to speak to many club presidents and club membership chairs about membership recruitment. Club mixers were invariably mentioned as an excellent networking strategy to meet new folks in the community and to inform them about Rotary. Based on the experience of many clubs, here's some useful ideas that have worked.



The Invitation

- ⇒ Decide who you are going to invite to your mixer.
- ⇒ Have each member make a list of people who they could invite. This list includes friends, neighbors, doctors, dentists, clients, etc.
- ⇒ Design a nifty card to send out or practice "the invite" speech.
- ⇒ Post an article in the local newspaper, on-line at your website, and/or link with other organizations (such as Chamber of Commerce mixers).



The Theme

This is a great time of the year to have the mixer focused around a theme. By having a theme, there will be a focal point for decorations, food and drinks. It could be:

- ⇒ Holiday theme
- ⇒ Sports theme
- ⇒ Seasonal theme
- ⇒ Topical theme (arts, music, etc.)
- ⇒ Club projects

The Venue

- ⇒ What works best with the theme? If it is a sports theme, consider having it outside and "tailgate" or even participate in a "pick up" game.
- ⇒ Mixers do not have to be formal. Informality usually results in a relaxed atmosphere where people tend to talk and move around more.
- ⇒ If the mixer is indoors use small tables (with few chairs) encouraging people to mill around and interact with one another.

The Inform

- ⇒ Display your club banner, have members wear their name tags, welcome people as they arrive, give them name tags and encourage them to take a club brochure.
- ⇒ Share the benefits of being a Rotarian: Community and International projects; Identity with a global organization that fosters peace and international understanding; Opportunities to network with community business people who share high ethical principles and standards; Develop a network of new friends
- ⇒ Display project boards, invite a Scholar to share experiences, or have a club member talk about Rotary and answer questions.

The Follow Up

⇒ The most important step of recruitment is following up with a personal note or phone call. This is an opportunity to say a thank you for attending the mixer as well as to continue the discussion regarding Rotary by inviting them to a club meeting or participate in an upcoming community project.

Has your club set a recruitment goal this year? Have you developed a timeline of whom will do what and when? Try including a social mixer as one of your events!

Talking about...Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar Holger Klinge-by Brian Schott, Past President Hayward

When I was asked to host a German Student coming to Cal State East Bay for a year, I thought, "just what I need - baby sitting a student while starting my second year as Club President". I immediately called our Club's Foundation VP (now President Elect), Debby DeAngelis and said yes, but you have to split the baby sitting duties with me since he will be attending your school. (Debby recently retired from CSUEB as the Athletic Director which CSUEB acknowledge by blowing up the 13 story Warren Hall Building in her honor.)



I picked Holger up at SFO, surprised that he traveled with less

stuff than I do for a weekend getaway. He was very pleasant and impressed me with his English skills. Holger stayed with Debby and her husband David while awaiting the opening of the dorms then later an apartment where Debby promptly began to spoil him. It went downhill from there. She let him out of her sight on campus and let him wander the mean streets of San Francisco alone with other new-found friends who were also international students. They attended an Oktoberfest Celebration in The City and it was there that he met Ms. Hadi Labarang who was then a CSUEB Senior. Hadi was born in France but her family is from Cameroon. Her father is the Ambassador from Cameroon to Egypt, having also served in Saudi Arabia and France. Holger is way out of his league being around Hadi but apparently she too believes in "Service Above Self". Holger spent a year at CSUEB studying International Business and will be completing his Masters Degree in Stuttgart Germany starting later this month. He recently returned to the Bay Area to spend his last few weeks of vacation with Hadi and to visit his other student and Rotarian friends.



The five Rotaract Clubs in District 5170, under the leadership of 2013-2014 District Governor Paul Mosso, selected Child AIDS Prevention (CAP) as their District-wide international project for the second year in a row. Yvonne Kwan will spotlight it at the Rotaract Big West Conference Oct. 12-13 at UCB.

Under the leadership of Rotaract Chairman Donn Wadley of Sunnyvale Sunrise Rotary and 2012-13 Rotaract District Governor Eakta Malik, the clubs made great strides in fundraising and service. Tri-Valley Rotaract was chartered June 30, 2013.

The first CAP fundraiser was the sale of raffle tickets for a bottle of fine wine donated by Donn Wadley. In February 2013, under the leadership of co-presidents Angelique Aspacio and Eric Silva, the Santa Cruz Rotaracters sold chocolate on the UCSC campus for Valentine's Day. In April President Yvonne Kwan's Greater Fremont Club sponsored "Night CAP", a cocktail evening and raffle. In May the Central Alameda Club finished painting the Boys and Girls Club in time to host their supper and raffle event. Led by Marianna Moles, the Silicon Valley Club worked online using a crowd funding platform to attract donations. A fundraising night at Woodstock Pizza completed the Rotaracters' very successful events. In total Rotaract raised \$5,500 for CAP in 2012-2013.

Rotaract is a Rotary-sponsored program connecting 18 - 30 year old students and young professionals for leadership, friendship and international community service. For more information find Rotaract 5170 on Facebook.

ACT NOW! The months of September, October and November are when the students for the 2014 exchange year must be selected and endorsed by their local Rotary Clubs.

Short term exchange students travel during the summer months. Long term exchange students live in their host country for about 10 months (a school year). The financial commitment to clubs for participation ranges from under \$100 for a short term exchange to approximately \$2,000 for a long term school year exchange.

STUDENT APPLICATIONS FOR THE 2014 EXCHANGE PROGRAMS ARE DUE BY MID-NOVEMBER. If your club wants to endorse a student from your local community for a foreign exchange program, now is the time to contact Evonne Hopkins (Evonne@


