Will 2018 Be the Year?

This is a critical year for the polio eradication program. Coming off the lowest count in history in 2017 with 22 cases, we begin the New Year with

the momentum to make polio eradication a reality in Pakistan and Afghanistan. The Pakistan polio program is focused on reaching a critical group of high-risk, mobile children with polio vaccines. Protecting these children—many of whom live in nomadic displaced or refugee communities, and are often beyond the reach of traditional health systems—is key to ending the spread of the virus. This is also true across the border in Afghanistan where these communities sometimes travel.

THE VACCINATORS: In a small room in Lake Marwat City, 40 health workers are conducting a polio refresher training. They also learn interpersonal communication skills they need to speak with mothers about the importance of the polio vaccine and to specifically seek out visiting guest children for vaccination. As one health worker states, "We know how to search for every child and we DO search for every child in the backs of trucks or rickshaws or carts. If I even see a child on the back of a motorbike passing through my area, I stop them to give the vaccination."

There are 89 Permanent Transit Points vaccinating children on the move in this province, with 5 located in Lake Marwat and an additional 5 temporary points to enable vaccination of children during the current seasonal movement.

In all there are 56 Afghan Refugee settlements across this province—4 in Lake Marwat, with a total target population of 1834 children under 5. With polio moving freely between Pakistan and Afghanistan, mostly in the bellies of Afghan children passing back and forth across the border, making these populations the key focus. In just one of these Afghan settlements there are 373 children under 5 and they are documented to be vaccinated in every campaign.

It's easy to see with these latest updates that the pressure is on and the funding is going towards immunizing every last child in these last two countries. We are going to eradicate this disease. END POLIO NOW!

The Unrestricted Annual Giving to the Rotary Foundation drive will be going on until the end of the Rotary Year, even though the "Official Drive" ended on January 31, 2018. So how are we doing (you might ask) in relation to our Goal of \$701,250 (\$668,916) and how does that compare to the rest of the Districts in our Zone 25/26?, and Rotary World? There are 22 Districts, 1,200 Clubs, and 60,000 Rotarians which make up our Rotary Zone 25/26, which includes: British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, Arizona, Nevada, California and Hawaii. Thanks to the generosity of the Rotarians in our District, we are FIRST in the Zone in UNRESTRICTED GIVING to The Rotary Foundation, and Fourth in the World (there are three Districts out of over 500 that were slightly higher than ours. Unrestricted Giving is the account that funds all our Global and District Grants. RESTRICTED GIVING funds our Polio Plus giving, and we are now shiftnig our emphasis for the remainder of the Rotary year on RESTRICTED GIVING.

Time Magazine's December 18, 2017 issue posed the question, "Is 2018 the Year for Polio's Extinction? They lay out their case by going back into history--"As recently as 1988, there were 350,000 cases of polio each year, and the disease was endemic in 125 countries." "In 2017 there have been only 16 cases, in just two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan." "With a case count so low, the question now is a straightforward one: Will 2018 be the year we get to zero"? Today 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated worldwide at a cost of \$15 billion. That would not be possible without the help of UNICEF, the World Health Organization, the Centers for Disease Control, and of course since 2007 the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Wouldn't it be exciting to see the end of Polio? If it is, it would join smallpox as the only other human disease to be "driven over the cliff to extinction".



February News from the Grants Corner

For those of us in Grant-Land, February is the kick-off of the coming Rotary year. The Annual Fund campaign has ended and we have what we need to prepare and issue your club's DDF allocations for the 2018-2019 Rotary year. These will be distributed to your Presidents-Elect at PETS on March 3rd and the yearly effort to plan club projects and apply for grants begins. We will change our committee structure in the coming year, adding at least on additional Resource Leader for District Grants and at least one Resource Leader for Global Grants. Last year, we gravitated to online training to make it easier for clubs to complete the training requirement for Club Qualification (required by The Rotary Foundation), sort of. It was online for District Grants but not for Global Grants. Rotary International has granted access to its online training platform, which will be open for business in March, so our Global Grants training will go online there. So stay tuned...
