It was an odd feeling when I looked at my July 1 District 5170 Fundraising Analysis, because all of our numbers went back to zero. I was used to checking the report several times a week, and each time seeing our Annual Giving/Total Giving numbers steadily rise. We had a record-breaking year in 2017-18 with Annual giving reaching \$819,047 and Total Giving \$1,211,040. We improved the lives of thousands of people last year--that's what Rotarians do. With the money that was raised, our Clubs got Humanitarian Projects funded to: (1) inoculate more children of the world against polio; (2) provide clean drinking water to countries that desperately needed it; (3) help the blind to see; (4) help the lame to walk; and (5) provide life-saving medical equipment to hospitals around the world just to name a few. But this is a new Rotary Year, and there is more work to do. It would be easy to sit back and say--What difference can we possibly make? I'm reminded of the "starfish" story where two little boys were walking down the beach and one of the boys kept throwing back into the water a starfish that had washed up on the shore. The other boy said, "what difference can this make--you can't save them all!! The other boy replied, "it made a difference to that one". We Rotarians are like that little boy, so once again we will roll up our sleeves and get busy doing the work that is so familiar to us. And I'm confident when we get to this point next year we will again say "Wow, another record-breaking year."

A Message From Our New Annual Giving Chair

Real News

Recently 12 boys from a Thai soccer team and their coach were trapped in a cave by swiftly rising flood waters. Rescuers worked furiously to find a way to get them out before they perished. As this drama unfolded, the world was watching. Thai Navy Seals worked around the clock to find a solution. The Pentagon dispatched a special operations team. Elon Musk arrived to offer his mini sub if needed. Every major media organization ran multiple headline reports over several days. A Google search of “soccer team rescue from cave” produces over 400,000,000 results. Sadly, one of the Seals lost their life, yet thankfully the entire team and coach escaped, with no time to spare.

Recently, a Tsunami hit a community and killed 2,195 people, mostly babies and children. Thousands more are suffering injuries and disease. 14,000 more are expected to die in the next week, mostly babies and children. Ultimately the death toll is expected to hit 800,000 this year. It is a human tragedy of epic proportions.

Many may be familiar with the first story, but not the second; yet they are both real news...except the “Tsunami” is really called diarrhea. A Google search of “childhood diarrhea deaths” produces 10,000,000 results, 2.5% as compared to the soccer team story.

According the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, 2,195 children die daily of diarrhea, accounting for 1 in 9 child deaths worldwide. It is entirely preventable not only through rotavirus vaccination and breastfeeding, but prevention through clean water and improved sanitation is essential to put an end to this tragedy.

As Rotarians, we understand the importance of clean water and sanitation. It is one of our primary areas of focus. At any given time, there are many projects being undertaken around the world by Rotarians to bring clean water and sanitation to underserved communities to prevent diarrhea and other disease. Rotary is not the only NGO taking this on; but we are one of the best at doing it. Here’s why: We learned years ago that simply dropping into a community, building a well and leaving results in about a 33% success rate. Today, Rotary *partners* with the community being served. We have “boots on the ground” in the form of a local partner Rotary Club and work side by side with the local citizens to take action. Rotary meticulously reviews each grant to ensure sustainability; so that when we go back to visit the project site a few years later, the clean water is still flowing, and the community is healthy. Rotary clean water projects are primarily funded by the contribution each Rotarian makes to the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. It is estimated that every dollar invested in clean water gets a \$25 return. The return on reduced mortality, disease and human suffering is priceless.

In the coming weeks our District Governor, Tim Lundell, will visit your Club and ask you to make a pledge to TRF. With your help, we can reach new heights and really make a dent in solving world problems such as diarrhea. For those who make an annual donation to TRF, thank you so much; you are truly helping to make the world a better place for thousands, if not millions, of human beings. For those who are considering contributing this year, please know that *any* donation will make a difference and be appreciated, no matter the amount.

2018-2019 Paul Harris Society Plans for District 5170

During 2018-2019, we look forward to building on the outstanding work Phil Dean has accomplished as District 5170 Paul Harris Society (PHS) coordinator during the past ten years. Our plans for 2018-2019 include:

- (A) Develop communications at Club and District level to heighten Rotarian awareness about membership in the Paul Harris Society.
- (B) Encourage Club Foundation Chairs to promote PHS membership and consult with District leadership to identify several specific weeks during 2018-2019 when PHS membership is especially promoted.
- (C) Promote Club-level recognition of District 5170 Rotarians who have donated \$1,000 to TRF during 2018-2019, by mailing District 5170 Grand Donor Certificates to Club Presidents for presentation by Club President and Club Foundation Chair at a Club meeting.
- (D) Promote District-level recognition of District 5170 Rotarians who during the 2018-2018 Rotary Year: (i) donated \$1,000 to TRF; (ii) are Major Donors or members of the Bequest Society; or (iii) are Triple Crown Donors, by inviting those Rotarians to attend an exclusive reception that honors their generous giving during the District's 2019 Annual Conference in Alameda aboard the USS Hornet.
- (E) Develop opportunities for District Rotarians who are PHS Members to connect with our District's or Zone leaders in the areas of Major Gifts and Legacy Giving and also learn about becoming a Triple Crown Donor.

We look forward to building on the Paul Harris Society Membership achievements that our District attained in 2017-2018, as we begin the new 2018-2019 Rotary Year.

**DISTRICT 5170 Major Giving to The Rotary
Foundation Summary Report for 2017-2018**

District 5170 made several substantial gains in its member's giving to The Rotary Foundation during the 2017-2018 Rotary Year. Two measures of the gains include giving through Paul Harris Society members and in the Grand Donor Program. Members of the Paul Harris Society are those Rotarians who agree to make annual donations of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation. To be a Grand Donor, one must donate \$1,000 in the current Rotary year.

In the last year, the number of Paul Harris Society (PHS) members increased from 103 in July to 118 at the end of the year, a gain of 15 members (15%). Of the 118 PHS members, 83 made the \$1,000 donation during the year. Also in the 2017-2018 year, a total of 318 District Rotarians made a \$1,000 donation, an increase of 51 donors (19%) over the previous year. I believe this to be the largest one-year increase ever for the District, and the largest total number of donors.

The District is also heavily involved in a project to increase its number of Major Donors. A Major Donor at Level 1 is a Rotarian who has donated a minimum of \$10,000 in cash to The Rotary Foundation over any time period. The District currently has 271 Level 1 Major Donors, an increase of 44 (19%) over the previous year. The District includes Major Donors at Level 1 to Level 4; the latter require a minimum donation of \$100,000. It also includes two Arch Klumpf Society members; \$250,000 minimum donation.

The District has 69 Bequest Society members ranging from Level 1 (\$10,000) to Level 8 (\$2.5 Million). To join this Society requires a commitment to the Rotary Foundation's Permanent Fund. This can be done through a number of methods that will be covered in another report. In the 2017-2018 year, there were only two new Bequest Society members, something the District hopes to improve upon this year.

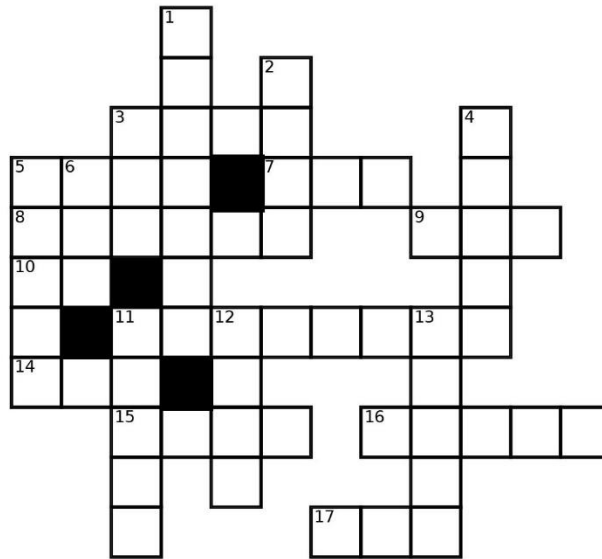

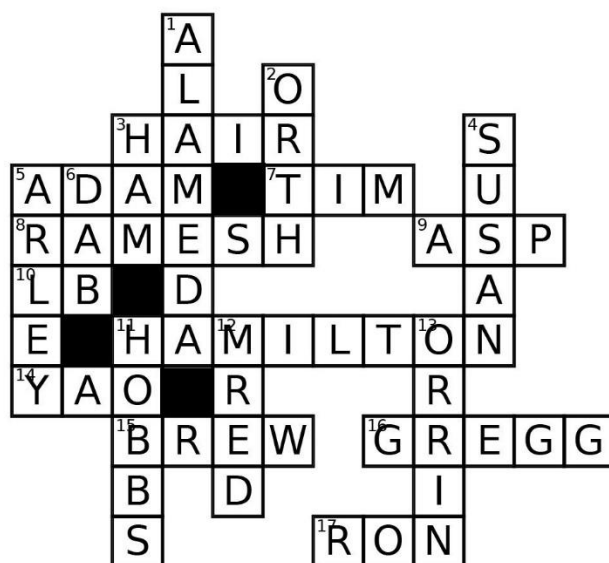
