

### MARCH TRF NEWSLETTER

When you raised your right hand and became a member of a Rotary Club, you also became a member of Rotary International. Your Rotary Pin, in fact, says Rotary International, and the way we support our obligation to Rotary International is by giving to The Rotary Foundation. Our District has historically been one of the top ten giving Districts in the Rotary World, because we understand that the PROJECTS we do through The Rotary Foundation change lives.

I thought it might be of interest to you this month to focus our attention on just a few of these projects, and the Clubs that are sponsoring them.

- The Gilroy Sunrise Club has a \$35,000 Global Grant Project to purchase an anesthesia machine and surgical kits for the cleft lip and palate project in Barranabermiga, Columbia.
- The Dublin Club has a \$32,000 Water storage project for four schools in Nicaragua.
- Castro Valley has a \$370,000 Global Grant Project in Ethiopia to purchase and install an oxygen generating plant at Nejo Hospital. This project will save 5,000 lives per year.
- Los Altos has a \$40,000 project in Nepal to improve economic development and community status for women and children. Their project is to create awareness on renewable alternatives and sustainable technology through solar cooking, smokeless cook stoves and biomass waste.
- Cupertino Rotary is working on a \$45,000 Global Grant Project in Romania for acquisition and installation of an ultrasound unit which can diagnosis symptoms resulting from hemophiliac.

These are but a few of the projects that the clubs in our District are working on, and the funds for these projects all come from our donations to The Rotary Foundation--the more we give, the more funds that we have to do, as Past Rotary International President Rick Kings likes to say, "Gods work on Earth".

# Why Your PolioPlus Flash Campaign Donation is More Important than Ever!

This year marks 33 years since Rotary launched Polio Plus, its campaign to rid the world of polio. Beginning on Rotary's anniversary, February 23, 1985, Rotary members worldwide have joined together to eliminate this crippling disease. Since its inception Rotary and its partners have helped reduce the number of cases from 350,000 annually to fewer than two cases so far this year. Rotarians remain committed to the program until the disease is eradicated. Rotary has contributed more than \$1.5 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect more than 2.5 billion children worldwide. In addition, Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by donor governments to contribute over \$10 billion to the effort.

Until we end polio forever, every child is at risk. Within 10 years we could see as many at 200,000 new cases EACH YEAR, all over the world. Unless we reach every child with the vaccine, no child ANYWHERE is safe! This is a frightening scenario that keeps Rotarians worldwide committed to the promise to END POLIO NOW. In order to say polio has been eradicated, the world must go **3 YEARS without any cases.** We can help STOP this disease—only the second time in history that a disease has been eradicated. (Smallpox was the first.) **What an amazing feat that would be for the world!** 

The fight is not over and your help is needed now. District 5170 is conducting a "Flash Campaign" (60 days) which started March 1 and will run until April 30. We are asking each Rotarian in our district to "**join the team"** and contribute a one-time \$50.00 donation to The Rotary Foundation, in support of the End Polio Now campaign. Your \$50.00 donation will be matched 2 to 1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation thus bringing your contribution to \$150. For those who have not yet contributed a total of \$1,000 to become a Paul Harris Fellow, our district will match any contribution you make with recognition points to help you achieve that recognition level.

## MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH

More than 6 million children under the age of 5 die each year from disease, malnutrition, lack of access to health care, and inadequate sanitation. Although both maternal and child death rates have decreased by almost half in the past two decades, continued support is needed to sustain progress.

#### **ROTARY'S ROLE IN RESPONSE**

Rotary carries out sustainable projects – a goal of our <u>strategic plan</u> – to bring positive, lasting change to communities locally and globally. One of our <u>areas of focus</u> is working with communities to support maternal, newborn, and child health.

We provide immunizations and antibiotics to babies, improve access to essential medical services, and support trained health care providers for mothers and their children. Through Rotary-supported programs, women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breastfeed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease. Our projects empower the local community to take ownership of health care training programs. Rotary is committed to the <u>UN</u> <u>Sustainable Development Goals</u> in this area that prioritize projects to further reduce maternal death rates and target lifesaving interventions for newborns aged 0-30 days.

#### **ROTARY AT WORK**

- **Sri Lanka** Rotarians in Sri Lanka and Germany, aided by a Rotary grant and the Helmut Kohl Foundation, jointly funded a maternity hospital in Sri Lanka. Since 2012, more than 150,000 children and 2.2 million women have benefited from medical equipment provided by Rotarians in the two countries.
- **Liberia** Through a global grant project, the Rotary clubs of Los Altos, California, USA, and Sinkor, Liberia, are helping Liberian women receive HIV testing early in their pregnancy and appropriate prenatal and postnatal care. The risk of HIV transmission to unborn children is low, if women get this testing and treatment. The project's goal is to reduce the number of new HIV infections in Liberian children by 95 percent over two years in more than 20 clinics.
- India Two vocational teams provided doctor and midwife training in the Calmed program (Collaborative Action in Lowering Maternity Encountered Deaths) in Gujarat and Sikkim, India. Although nearly 20 percent of all maternal deaths worldwide occur in India, most are preventable. Training recipients have since trained hundreds of their colleagues in the practical management of childbirth emergencies. In Sikkim alone, the maternal mortality rate decreased by half in a little over one year.

**Nigeria** — Rotarians in Nigeria and Germany helped reduce maternal mortality in 10 hospitals in northern Nigeria by 60 percent and neonatal mortality by 15 percent by upgrading the quality of care and facilities, and maintaining these new standards. The grant-funded project has expanded to 10 more hospitals in an effort to help Nigeria, which accounts for 14 percent of all maternal deaths worldwide, continue to achieve improvements in maternal and child health.
