Guatemala Mission PINCC and Rotary working together to Fight Cervical Cancer

From September 17-21, 2018, Rotary Clubs in Rotary District 5170's Area 3 - Niles, Fremont Warm Springs Sunrise, Mission San Jose, Fremont, Newark, F.U.N. Sunset, plus Rotaract of Greater Fremont - supported PINCC (Prevention International of Cervical Cancer) in its efforts to prevent cervical cancer globally. During that period, PINCC held its first training program at District Hospitals Melchor de Mencos and San Benito, located in the tourist friendly Peten, Guatemala. I joined a team of 9 healthcare workers, including three Gynecologists and we saw 540 patients over 4 days. Members of Rotary Flores/Peten played a huge role in contacting and registering patients and supporting every part of the mission, including meals. The Rotary Club of Belize helped with the medical support of gynecologist Dr. Marcel Coyi. I have worked intermittently in Guatemala for eighteen years as a General Surgeon and was greatly impressed by the enthusiasm and energy of the Rotarian effort.

District 5170 Area 3, under the leadership of Niles Rotary, had a primary role in the Guatemala mission in raising money to help support the connections for the health care provision. Four Niles Rotarians volunteered in the screening by interviewing patients and preparing a visitor center with new paint and furniture. By helping the two hospitals involved with equipment and building capacity there was a ready acceptance of the larger goal of working to prevent cervical cancer. This allowed us to reach out to the local and more rural population and to bring in public health workers for their training with VIA (Visual Inspection with Acetic Acid).

VIA requires only a strong headlamp, acetic acid solution, and a speculum in order to identify the HPV virus and the occasional malignant changes the virus causes. We saw an approximate 6% positive rate for the virus with most diagnoses in the CIN1 category (cervical intraepithelial neoplasia), a pre-malignant development. This condition was treated with thermocoagulation on inspection, rendering it non-invasive. One malignant diagnosis was made and the patient will be referred to the Government hospital in Guatemala City. All data was analyzed and added to PINCC's database.

PINCC has been in action for over ten years and now is guided by Executive Director Dr. Melissa Miskell, who does as many as four or five missions a year, reaching out to East Africa, Cambodia, India, South America, and now Guatemala. The modus operandi of PINCC is to schedule 3 visits at intervals of 6 months and verify that receiving health care teams have the skill and capacity to carry on. Diagnostic and treatment equipment is left with the teams that are competent to continue screening and treating and verification of professional care is a key element of PINCC's training – "train the trainers".

The next visit should take place in April of 2019 and should provide sufficient numbers of VIA positive patients to also train the Guatemalan doctors to do thermocoagulation of appropriate lesions. Because Cervical cancer is the most common malignancy of women in Central America, it is anticipated that screening will continue to identify early and more advanced conditions and save lives. Of interest, PINCC has been active in Kenya for several years. I will be in Kenya on Sunday working in General Surgery for a few weeks in the Western region. My role in PINCC includes trying to introduce early detection of breast cancer, the more common cancer among women, which can be diagnosed with a fairly simple FNA.







Rotarians are "People of Action"

The eradication of polio is one of Rotary's longest standing and most significant efforts. Along with our partners the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, World Health Organization, U.S. Center for Disease Control and Prevention and UNICEF, we have helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio in 122 countries. We have reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent worldwide and we won't stop until we end the disease for good.

Now in our final push to eradicate polio in the world we must be "People of Action". We need to have social, political and global action to make polio the second human disease in history to be wiped from earth. Polio eradication requires high immunization coverage everywhere, worldwide, to block transmission of this extremely contagious virus. Unfortunately, children are still missing out on vaccination for various reasons including lack of infrastructure, remote locations, population movement, conflict and insecurity and resistance to vaccination.

Failure to eradicate polio from Afghanistan and Pakistan "the last two remaining strongholds" could result in a resurgence of the disease. Without 100 percent eradication we could see as many as 200,000 new cases worldwide every year within 10 years.

"Flash Campaign"

"People of Action" are needed now. District 5170 is conducting a "Flash Campaign" (60 days) which will start on March 1 and run until April 30. Each Rotarian in our district is being asked to take action and contribute a one-time \$50.00 donation to The Rotary Foundation, in support of the End Polio Now campaign. Your \$50.00 donation will be matched 2 to 1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation thus bringing your contribution to \$150.

Your HELP is needed today...The Children of the World are counting on you!







To be recognized as one of the District's new Triple Crown Donors, one must accomplish three objectives:

- Be a **Major Donor** When your cash donations to the Foundation total at least \$10,000. There are 233 Major Donors in the District, Levels 1 to 4.
- Be a member of the **Bequest Society** When you commit a total of \$10,000 or more to the Permanent Fund of the Foundation via your Estate Plan. There are 43 Bequest Society Members in the District, Levels 1 to 7.
- Be a **Grand Donor** When your cash donations to the Foundation during the current Rotary year reach \$1,000. There were 318 Grand Donors in the District in 2017-2018.

At the 2018 District Conference, 19 District Rotarians were recognized as Triple Crown Donors.

Who are likely to become Triple Crown Donors this year? There are many District Rotarians who have accomplished two of the three objectives. We are hoping that they will complete the third objective and become Triple Crown Donors during this Rotary Year.

Please note that a person is recognized as a Triple Crown Donor only for the year in which they meet all three criteria. That means that there are no Triple Crown Donors at the beginning of July. The recognition has to be earned each year. Today there are 6.

ROTARY GLOBAL GRANT SCHOLARSHIP

Dear Scholar Applicant,

Thank you for your interest in the Rotary International District 5170 Rotary Global Scholarship Program.

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is the advancement of world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

As part of that mission, The Rotary Foundation, a not-for-profit organization, through Rotary International's Member Rotary Clubs, has maintained one of the largest and lucrative scholarship programs of its kind since 1947. The candidates must comply with the rules of The Rotary Foundation as to eligibility.

We are looking for scholars who are focusing their careers in one of Rotary Foundation's Six Areas of Focus: 1) Peace and Conflict Resolution, 2) Disease Prevention and Treatment, 3) Water and Sanitation, 4) Maternal and Child Health, 5) Basic Education and Literacy, and 6) Economic and Community Development. The scholars' interest in and course of study is directed toward fulfilling the mission of The Rotary Foundation and lends itself to the Rotary International credo, which is "Service Above Self," and fostering international understanding and relations among people of different nations.

Before applying for your scholarship, please consider the following guidelines and requirements:

- The scholarship is awarded in 2019-2020 school year. The scholar should have been accepted
 by the study institution outside of the United States at the time of the interview. Appropriate
 adjustments of deadline would be made for scholars whose admission deadline is different from
 the norm.
- We require that you utilize the funds and make both an interim and a final report of your use of the funds and your scholarship activities.
- 3. Your scholarship will be funded in two installments 50% at the time your scholarship is approved and 50% at the end of the first term.
- 4. You must provide an interim report, including copies of receipts for your expenses to date, by January 31, 2020 or after the first half of your school year. You may complete and provide it sooner, if appropriate. Your second scholarship installment will be funded upon the timely receipt of this interim report. If you do not report in a timely fashion, the second installment of your scholarship may be cancelled.
- 5. You must also provide a final report, including copies of receipts for your expenses no later than June 30, 2020. Again, you may do so earlier, if you wish.
- 6. Failure to complete an acceptable interim or final report by the dates specified in #3 and #4 above could result in us requesting that you return part or all of the grant funds to District 5170. We will provide the appropriate forms to make the reporting task easier.
- 7. We prefer that your course of study involve some type of humanitarian emphasis, i.e., the Six Areas of Focus of Rotary Foundation. If the scholarship funds are to be used to conduct a humanitarian project in connection with your course of study, please describe the project in your application and include the costs of conducting the project in your proposed budget.

- Rotary Foundation Global Grants are not to be used for personal travel, other than travel to or
 from the institution of study (if outside the US) or the humanitarian project. Travel and related
 expenses will be closely scrutinized by the scholarship committee to determine that they are
 necessary.
- Grant funds may not be used in any way to support active military efforts in any humanitarian project.

10. Key Dates:

February 3, 2019 Deadline to submit applications to your local Rotary Clubs.

March 3, 2019 Clubs' sponsored applications sent to Committee for review.

Selected candidates to be interviewed at place to be determined (preferably in person).

May 1, 2019 Deadline to submit Global Grant application with Rotary Foundation.

Required orientation for successful scholars*

January 31, 2020 Interim Report due.

June 30, 2020 Final report due.

- 11. In addition to the above, you must make a personal visit to at least five Rotary Clubs in your country of study outside the United States during the term of your scholarship, as well as five clubs within District 5170. The District 5170 visits can take place any time after your scholar year.
- 12. Scholarship applications submitted after February 3, 2019, will not be considered for funding.
- As a condition of accepting your scholarship funds, you will be asked to sign an agreement which entails the requirements set forth herein and details your responsibilities to Rotary International and Rotary District 5170.




