

The Rotarians in D-5170 once again come through...

A BIG THANK YOU goes out to each Rotarian in District 5170 for supporting the "Flash Campaign." The campaign raised approximately \$100,000! Add this to what has been collected since July 1, 2018 and we are over \$288,000 for the Rotary year. This will be matched 2/1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. That approaches nearly \$1,000,000 going into the eradication of this dreaded disease from our district.

2019-2023 Endgame Strategy

On April 30, 2019 the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) launched the "Polio Endgame Strategy 2019-2023", which will guide the program and its partners to overcome the final hurdles to eradication and move toward sustaining a polio-free future.

The new plan works on addressing today's most pressing obstacles to end poliovirus transmission at any moment, integrate polio program resources into health and development programs globally and to certify the world polio-free. The 2019-2023 Endgame Strategy also offers responsive and innovative solutions tailored to communitie's needs. These include establishing a regional hub in Amman, Jordan to enhance coordinated support to Afghanistan and Pakistan and creating permanent Rapid Response Teams to accelerate the program's response to outbreaks.

By the Numbers (June 2019 Rotarian)

Rotary and polio eradication...

2 - Countries where transmission of the wild poliovirus still occurs (Afghanistan and Pakistan).

18 million - People walking today who otherwise would have been paralyzed.

400 million - Children immunized by Rotary and its partners each year.

\$1.9 billion - Amount that Rotary has contributed to polio eradication

\$8 billion - Amount governments have contributed to polio eradication as a result of Rotary's advocacy work.
\$40 billion - Estimated health care costs that polio eradication will save by 2035.

\$3 - Cost of protecting a child from polio for life.

Faces of Hope By Jolene Bortz Rotary Club of Oakland Uptown



Over a decade ago, Faces of Hope was started by the several Rotary clubs in District 5170. At our basic core we attempt to provide what every



child deserves, a beautiful smile.

We receive donations from individuals and Rotary Clubs that allow us to help these children and families overcome stigma and help children to grow up with hope and confidence for their future. Untreated children born with clefts are subject to eating difficulties, ear infections/hearing loss, speech problems, and dental problems. Our patients come from great distances, by foot, bus and car to see us and receive our help.

Faces of Hope is a

Rotary District 5170 club-administered program, which means that it is run completely by volunteers. All of our funding goes to our mission. In addition, we offer clubs that donate an opportunity to send a club member to witness the project and participate with the doctors and patients. We have had volunteers from The Rotary Clubs of San Leandro, Cupertino, Sunnyvale,



Oakland, Oakland Uptown, San Jose, Scotts Valley, Los Gatos, Alameda, and Los Gatos Morning. The mission takes place each July in the colonial city of Antigua, Guatemala. We address the surgical and dental needs of 70-100 children each year during our 1 week trip. Non-medical Rotary volunteers do a variety of jobs including, record-keeping, photography, translation, entertainment for our little patients, as well as serving as assistants to the nurses and doctors.

What we do in Guatemala is a drop in an ocean of need. We cannot change the in-country medical system, but we can change the lives of our patients by providing a life-changing surgery. We can also share our knowledge with the local medical providers with whom we work with the hope that little by little institutional changes will take place.

We would never be able to do this work without the help of our volunteers and generous donors who choose to help a child smile.

Phillip Dean, Triple Crown and Major Donor Chair

ROTARY DISTRICT 5170

A t its 2018 Annual Conference, District 5170 introduced a new level of donor recognition, the Triple Crown Donor, designed to honor those individuals who have made very generous contributions to The Rotary Foundation. To qualify for this award, one must accomplish three objectives:

- Be a Major Donor When your cash donations to the Foundation total at least \$10,000. There are 315 Major Donors in the District.
- Be a member of the Bequest Society When you commit a total of \$10,000 or more to the Permanent Fund of the Foundation via your Estate Plan. There are 68 Bequest Society Members in the District.
- Be a Grand Donor When your cash donations to the Foundation during the current Rotary year reach \$1,000.

For the 2017-2018 year, 19 District Rotarians were recognized as Triple Crown Donors at the Major Donor Reception held at the District Conference in Santa Clara. The reception was held this year (2018-2019) at the District Conference on board the USS Hornet aircraft carrier. I am happy to report that 18 of last year's Triple Crown Donors repeated this year. Please note that a person is recognized as a Triple Crown Donor only for the year in which they meet all three criteria. That means that there are no Triple Crown Donors at the beginning of July. The recognition has to be earned each year. In addition to the 18 Rotarians who repeated the accomplishment, nine new Triple Crown Donors were recognized for the 2018-2019 Rotary year, for a total of 27.

There are many District Rotarians who have accomplished two of the three objectives needed to qualify. We are hoping that they will complete the third objective and become Triple Crown Donors during the 2019-2020 Rotary Year.

To become a Major Donor, one must donate at least \$10,000 to The Rotary Foundation, over any amount of time. Once a Major Donor, always a Major Donor. The levels of giving correspond to the amount donated:

Level 1	\$10,000 to \$24,999
Level 2	\$25,000 to 49,999
Level 3	\$50,000 to \$99,999
Level 4	\$100,000 to 249,999

The next major step in giving is \$250,000, which makes the Rotarian a member of the Arch Klumpf Society, which includes six levels of giving:

Level 1 (Trustees Circle) Level 2 (Chair's Circle) Level 3 (Foundation Circle) Level 4 (Platinum Trustees Circle) Level 5 (Platinum Chair's Circle) Level 6 (Platinum Foundation Circle) \$250,000 to \$499,999 \$500,000 to \$999,999 \$1,000,000 to \$2,499,999 \$2,500,000 to \$4,999,999 \$5,000,000 to \$9,999,999 \$10 million and above

District 5170 has 252 Major Donors, as shown below:

In 2017, the District began a major campaign to increase its number of Major Donors. This was done by informing members who were close to becoming Major Donors, how much they needed to donate to reach that level of giving. The effort was quite successful in that 48 of these members made the necessary donation and became Major Donors. In the 2018-2019 Rotary year, 19 members became Major Donors. This also reflects the success of the 2017-2018 effort. We will renew this effort in 2019-2020 and at a higher level, focusing on those members who are close to becoming Level 2 or Level 3 Major Donors. 




