



This "star studded celebration" was held at The Blackhawk Museum in Danville, and featured our current RI President (Barry Rassin) along with five Past Rotary International Presidents--Gary C.K. Huang (2014-15), Frank Devlyn (2000-01), Cliff Dochterman (1992-93), M.A.T. Caparas (1986-87) and of course our own Rick King (2001-02).

The 500 guests enjoyed the beautiful cars at The Blackhawk Museum while listening to music provided by the Fremont Christian High School Jazz Band, and sipping wine at the reception held prior to the dinner. The RI President and his entourage made a spectacular entrance as they walked into the room led by the Fremont Christian High School Jazz Band. There were many highlights during the evening including: special recognition given to our newest Arch Klumph Society Members (PDG Ron & Cindy Sekkel); the presentation of the District 5170 Richard D. King Award to Event Chair Richard Flanders from Pleasanton North; the speeches by RI President Barry Rassin and the other Past RI Presidents in attendance, but it was our own Richard D. King who brought the house down with his remarks entitled My First Fifty Years in Rotary.

It was a spectacular evening that raised over \$200,000 for the Richard D. King Endowed Fund for Rotary Peace Centers, and an event that we shall long remember. Special recognition to Richard Flanders and his Committee who worked on this event for an entire year--it was worth the wait!!

Santa Marta Water Filter Project

During a tour of Colombia, South America, in connection with a Project Fair, members of the Rotary Club of Oakland's World Community Service committee visited Club Rotario Santa Marta. The members of that club asked us to support a project they were developing with the assistance of the Calgary South Rotary Club: to provide water filters to rural families with no access to clean water (other than bottled water, which they could not afford).

The technology was simple, and was based on concrete boxes filled with sand of various grit sizes. With time, an organic algal and bacterial "mat" develops and the water passes through it, thereby cleaning it of fecal bacteria to a high degree. The Rotary Club of Oakland provided some cash and DDF to Global Grant 1640166.

On a tour of two villages in November 2017, we reviewed the outcome of the project. Our visit to the village of Tigrera produced our first surprise. Two filters were side by side at the Antonio Escobar Camargo School. The students used to take water directly from the adjacent river. The principal told us that since installation, students were much healthier. The reduced incidence of diarrhea has also improved attendance, in part because there is only one bathroom for the 180 students. Students are in charge of refilling and caring for the filters as well as treating the filtered water with chlorine to reduce post filter contamination and make the bacterial count zero.

After visiting the school, we went to a nearby home and spoke to a villager named Sara. Sara told us her baby was much healthier, with rare diarrhea now. She told us she uses chlorine. She also reported that the family saves 60,000 pesos (USD \$20) per month not buying bottled water, money that can be used for essentials like food and school fees. We had not anticipated these savings, but in retrospect it's obvious because these folks know that wealthier city folk only drink bottled water. Now they trust the filters and chlorine. Later that day, we visited a second school using the filters, the Agroindustrial School in Minca.

The second day, we visited the village of Jolonura a short distance up a muddy, extremely rough road, our driver picking his way through. There, we were met by Yolanda, who is clearly a forceful leader in the community, and William. Then, we visited Cindy's home and colorful garden with Yolanda.

Cindy reported similar outcomes. She was very thankful to Rotary as her baby and family were much healthier with a lot fewer occurrences of diarrhea. She showed us her chlorine and stated she used it.

Yolanda told us that she had coordinated the delivery of 60 filters, many a long way up the hillside. Yolanda told us there were many community members who did not get filters and who want them. She said she could easily distribute another 60.

We are very pleased with this project. 450 filters were produced, and about 425 have been distributed so far. Acceptance by the beneficiaries is high and demand exists for at least another 450 filters in the same communities. The water safety training seems to have been effective, and community members such as William and Yolanda are among those whose commitment and experience will make a future similar project successful.

A Message from Our Annual Giving Chair

November is Rotary Foundation Month. For many Clubs in the Rotary world, November is the month to focus their energy and efforts toward the TRF Annual Giving Campaign. From Iowa to India and from Kenya to Jamaica, Rotary Clubs around the world declare November as Rotary Foundation Month. I did a Google search for “November is Rotary Foundation Month” and got almost 8 million results from all around the globe! In District 5170, we generally focus our fundraising on the Annual SHARE Fund for the first half of the year, then put our attention more toward Polio Plus starting in February. Many 5170 Clubs currently hold their annual giving campaign in November. It may be something your Club might consider if not currently doing so.

This month, I will share some words from Ron D. Burton, a Rotarian since 1979, past RI President and the current Chair of The Rotary Foundation. Earlier this year, as Ron prepared for his role as TRF Chair, he wrote about the cornerstone priorities of the Foundation. Following is a partial excerpt from that document:

“Our fourth priority is one that is near and dear to my heart. It’s something I’ve been promoting for almost 30 years since I found out that our permanent endowment fund was only \$2 million. We have made tremendous progress in those ensuing years, but we have so much potential if we will only tell our story. Very simply, it is to build our Rotary Foundation to \$2,025 million by 2025, and we are well on track to do just that. Our Endowment today stands at just over \$1.1 billion, with \$421 million in hand and \$767 million in commitments. Just imagine the good we will be able to do with a \$2 billion Endowment!

In order for us to reach this goal, we not only need to increase our membership, but we also need to increase the number of Rotarians and others supporting our Foundation — we need to expand our donor base. True philanthropy is not measured by the size of one’s gift but rather by the gift in relation to one’s financial ability. Rotarians should be encouraged to make our Foundation their Foundation — and, if not their charity of choice, at least one of their charities of choice.

We believe in our Foundation, and we both want our commitment to Rotary to be in perpetuity — in other words, we want to be Rotarians forever. Like those who plant trees today under which they will never sit, we want to ensure a funding source for Rotary that will allow Rotary to always be able to address the needs of the world. We invite you and Rotarians everywhere to join us in sharing that awesome but necessary responsibility. Rotary’s promise to future generations can be your legacy, too! To put it very simply: your legacy, Rotary’s promise!”



Rotary's Inspiration in Eradicating Polio

THE NEED

Although it currently circulates in only a few countries, polio is highly infectious and spreads rapidly. The disease, which afflicts mainly children, is transmitted via contaminated water and food supplies. Five to 10 percent of cases are fatal. As long as polio threatens even one child anywhere in the world, children everywhere are at risk. **Only the global eradication of polio will ensure that no child ever again suffers its devastating effects.**

WHERE WE ARE TODAY

- Since Rotary launched PolioPlus in 1985, polio has decreased by 99.9 percent.
- Rotary and its partners have reduced the number of polio cases from 350,000 in 1985 to 27 so far this year.
- Only three countries continue to record low-level transmission of the wild poliovirus: Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria.
- Wild poliovirus type 1 continues to cause cases of paralysis. Type 2 was certified as eradicated in September 2015 and no new cases of Type 3 have been reported since November 2012.

ROTARYS ROLE

Rotary had the vision "to immunize all of the world's children against polio" with the creation of PolioPlus in 1985. The goal expanded to eradicating the disease in 1988 when the World Health Assembly (WHO) resolved to end polio. Toward that goal, Rotary helped assemble the partnerships with WHO, UNICEF and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that established the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI). Rotary is a leading partner in the GPEI, which also includes the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Rotarians raise funds, secure support from governments, nongovernmental organizations, corporations and the public, immunize children and promote awareness in their communities. Rotary has helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio, contributed over \$1.7 billion to global polio eradication efforts and helped secure more than \$8 billion from donor governments. **While Rotarians around the world have done a GREAT job so far, we cannot stop until every child has been inoculated and the world is declared polio free.**

Look forward to the "Flash Campaign" which will run from March 1 - April 30.



We're Number One!



District 5170 has a long history of support for the Rotary Foundation. But last year we hit it out of the ball park, leading all 13 Districts in Rotary Zone 26 for Total Contributions to the Annual Fund. We will be recognized for this effort at the Rotary Zone Institute in November. Last year's Annual Fund total also set a record for the District coming in at 117% of our goal. We also had a great year for Polio Plus giving us a Total Giving record of \$1.22 Million.

This was achieved by the great work of the District TRF team, led by Russ Hobbs, with exceptional efforts by Deb Knowles and Dwight Perry, Annual Giving and Polio Plus chairs, and of course all the Club Presidents and Foundation chairs.

The good news is that we are on track to have another banner year, with all your strong support.

Rotary makes high-quality health care available to vulnerable mothers and children so they can live longer and grow stronger.

We expand access to quality care, so mothers and children everywhere can have the same opportunities for a healthy future. An estimated 5.9 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation — all of which can be prevented.



TRIPLE CROWN DONOR UPDATE*

The District contains 230 Major Donors, ranging from Levels 1 to 4. There are 42 Bequest Society Members, ranging from Level 1 to Level 8. There are currently 95 Grand Donors. A Triple Crown Donor will be a member of all three groups. At this time there are only 5 Triple Crown Donors in the District, due to the Grand Donor requirement. That will change as we approach the holiday season. Last year, with no announcement of the recognition until late in the year, there were 19 Triple Crown Donors. As more District Rotarians learn about the recognition program, and what they have to do to attain it, I expect the number to increase considerably.

There are several opportunities to increase the number of Triple Crown Donors.

- Only 29 of our 42 Bequest Society members are also Major donors, and only six of them have donated \$1,000 so far this year.
- Only 42 of our Major donors are also Grand Donors so far this year. This will change a lot as the end of the year approaches.

Our goal now is to make sure that all District Rotarians know about the Triple Crown Donor recognition, and what they personally need to do to achieve it.

UPDATE: PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY/ GRAND DONORS

At this time 95 District 5170 Rotarians have donated \$1,000 each to the Rotary Foundation; they are our Grand Donors. This is comparable to last year when at this time, 84 members had made the donation, out of 318 for the year. The best month for donors is December, when 75 Rotarians made the donation last year. Including November, we expect that more than half of the total for last year will be received by the end of December.

34 of the 95 Grand Donors are members of the Paul Harris Society. There are currently 133 Paul Harris Society members, a gain of 15 since 1 July. We hope to increase the number even more during the remainder of the year, and to get more of them to make the donation every year.

PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT IS THE PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY?

The Paul Harris Society recognizes Rotary members and friends of The Rotary Foundation who contribute \$1,000 or more each Rotary year to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus Fund, or approved Foundation grants.



Paul Harris Society recognition was administered by districts until it became an official Rotary Foundation recognition program in July 2013. Its purpose is to identify, engage, and thank members who have the ability and desire to make substantial annual gifts to help communities around the world.

HOW CAN I JOIN THE PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY?

You can join the Paul Harris Society by doing any of the following:

- Complete the [online sign-up form](#). Go to the Paul Harris Society page (www.rotary.org/paulharrissociety) and choose **Join Today**.
- Email or call Rotary's Support Center (rotarysupportcenter@rotary.org, +1-866-9-ROTARY) or the Rotary International office that serves your area.
- Mail a completed Paul Harris Society [sign-up form](#) to The Rotary Foundation. You can also fax the form to Rotary's Support Center (+1-847-328-4101).

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN A PAUL HARRIS FELLOW AND PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY MEMBER?

Anyone who cumulatively contributes \$1,000 during any time period becomes a [Paul Harris Fellow](#). A person can also be named a fellow if someone else uses 1,000 Foundation recognition points to honor him or her as such. A member of the Paul Harris Society contributes at least \$1,000 *each year* to the Annual Fund, PolioPlus Fund, or approved Foundation grants.

AM I REQUIRED TO GIVE \$1,000 BEFORE JOINING THE PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY?

No, an immediate \$1,000 contribution is not required at the time of enrollment. You can fulfill your Paul Harris Society commitment gradually during the Rotary year.

WHAT IS A PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY COORDINATOR?

A district Paul Harris Society coordinator is appointed by the district governor to honor new society members and promote engagement in the society. These coordinators can use giving and recognition reports from My Rotary to identify new and potential society members. To honor new members, they can order recognition chevrons at no cost by emailing annualfund@rotary.org or contacting the Rotary International office that serves the area.

HOW ARE SOCIETY MEMBERS RECOGNIZED FOR THEIR CONTRIBUTIONS?

New society members are presented a certificate and chevron at a district or club event in a way that is culturally appropriate and comfortable for the member. Paul Harris Society coordinators visit the club or district to honor new members themselves or make sure that another Rotary officer makes arrangements to do so.

DO MEMORIAL AND TRIBUTE GIFTS COUNT TOWARD PAUL HARRIS SOCIETY COMMITMENTS?

Donors who direct memorial and tribute gifts to one of the approved funds receive credit toward their own Paul Harris Society commitment. The recipients of tribute gifts do not receive Paul Harris Society credit.

WHAT DOES “PHS ELIGIBLE” ON THE DONOR HISTORY REPORT MEAN?

“PHS eligible” identifies those who have given \$1,000 or more during a Rotary year. However, these supporters become society members only when they indicate their intent to repeat such a gift annually by joining the society using one of the methods above.

District Paul Harris Society coordinators can build society membership by contacting PHS-eligible donors and learn about their interests in supporting Rotary.

Want to Become A Triple Crown Donor?

District Triple Crown Chair Phil Dean Tells You How

During the 2017-2018 Rotary Year, 19 Rotarians in District 5170 became Triple Crown Donors. They did this by accomplishing three goals:

1. Be a Major Donor.
2. Be a Bequest Society Member.
3. Be a Grand Donor by donating at least \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation during the current year.

Many Rotarians are close to attaining the three goals. There are currently 229 Major Donors in District 5170. There are 39 Bequest Society members, 28 of whom are also Major Donors. There are 200 Rotarians who are Major Donors but not Bequest Society members. At the beginning of a Rotary Year, there are no Grand Donors. Thus, we will be pointing out to certain members what they will need to do to become Triple Crown Donors:

- 200 Major Donors need to become Bequest Society members;
- 11 Bequest Society members need to become Major Donors;
- All need to become Grand Donors this year.

BEQUEST SOCIETY

Becoming a Bequest Society member can be quite straightforward. It requires that members make a commitment in their estate plan of at least \$10,000 to The Rotary Foundation Endowment. This award is made at several levels, from 1 (\$10,000) to 10 (\$10,000,000). There are several ways to join the Society. Here are some examples:

1. For a general gift of a certain percentage or portion of your estate: "I give to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International one-fourth of my estate."
2. For a gift of a specific asset: "I give 500 shares of [name] stock to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International."
3. For a contingent bequest, which takes effect only when certain conditions are met: "In the event my spouse does not survive me, I give to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International the remainder of my estate."
4. For a residual bequest, which directs the disposition of all or a portion of whatever remains after all other required amounts are paid: "I give the rest, residue, and remainder of my estate to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International."

In addition:

5. Anyone can name The Rotary Foundation as the beneficiary of any life insurance policy, other than a term life policy, at any age, for any amount.
6. Make The Rotary Foundation a retirement plan beneficiary.
7. Establish a Donor Advised Fund.

As always, remember to consult independent tax and legal advisers before making any charitable gift.

MAJOR DONOR

To become a Major Donor one must donate a total of at least \$10,000 in cash to The Rotary Foundation over any period of time. Recognition Points do not count toward this award, which has levels from 1 to 4 (\$10,000 to \$100,000).

GRAND DONOR

To become a Grand Donor, one must donate a minimum of \$1,000 cash to The Rotary Foundation within the current Rotary Year. Recognition Points do not count.

To find out where you stand regarding donations to The Rotary Foundation, you can do one of three things:


1. Log onto your MyRotary account, select Profile in the top right of the page, then select Donor History Report on the following page.


