WE CAN'T STOP NOW!

As of August 28, 2018, only 15 new polio cases have been reported this year.

"We are this close" to eliminating polio in the world - **99.9%** of the way there. Now is the time to put the PolioPlus program into high gear. Make sure there will never be another child crippled by this debilitating disease.

From the launch of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988, more than 17.4 million people, mainly in the developing world, who would otherwise have been paralyzed, are walking because they have been immunized against polio. More than 650,000 paralytic cases of polio are now prevented every year.

We can't stop now! If polio is not eradicated, within 10 years, as many as 200,000 children could be paralyzed each year. A polio-free world will be a safer world for children everywhere.

How are the funds we continue to raise used?

Rotary provides grant funding to WHO and UNICEF for the following activities:

- Technical assistance including salaries for technical advisors
- Operational support to ensure the vaccine reaches all children; including stipends for the millions of volunteers who administer the vaccine and perform house-to-house follow up visits
- Surveillance for disease detection, including the polio laboratory network
- Social mobilization to raise awareness of the vaccination campaigns and the benefits of immunization
- Research into new products and approaches to facilitate eradication
- Transition planning to ensure the orderly transition of polio immunization activities to routine immunization following the eradication of polio.

With your continued support children around the world will be able to walk and play as healthy individuals.

A Triple Crown Donor?



District Triple Crown Chair Phil Dean Tells You How

During the 2017-2018 Rotary Year, 19 Rotarians in District 5170 became Triple Crown Donors. They did this by accomplishing three goals:

- 1. Be a Major Donor.
- 2. Be a Bequest Society Member.
- 3. Be a Grand Donor by donating at least \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation during the current year.

Many Rotarians are close to attaining the three goals. There are currently 229 Major Donors in District 5170. There are 39 Bequest Society members, 28 of whom are also Major Donors. There are 200 Rotarians who are Major Donors but not Bequest Society members. At the beginning of a Rotary Year, there are no Grand Donors. Thus, we will be pointing out to certain members what they will need to do to become Triple Crown Donors:

200 Major Donors need to become Bequest Society members;

11 Bequest Society members need to become Major Donors;

All need to become Grand Donors this year.

BEQUEST SOCIETY

Becoming a Bequest Society member can be quite straightforward. It requires that members make a commitment in their estate plan of at least \$10,000 to The Rotary Foundation Endowment. This award is made at several levels, from 1 (\$10,000) to 10 (\$10,000,000). There are several ways to join the Society. Here are some examples:

- 1. For a general gift of a certain percentage or portion of your estate: "I give to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International one-fourth of my estate."
- 2. For a gift of a specific asset: "I give 500 shares of [name] stock to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International."
- 3. For a contingent bequest, which takes effect only when certain conditions are met: "In the event my spouse does not survive me, I give to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International the remainder of my estate."
- 4. For a residual bequest, which directs the disposition of all or a portion of whatever remains after all other required amounts are paid: "I give the rest, residue, and remainder of my estate to The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International."

In addition:

- 5. Anyone can name The Rotary Foundation as the beneficiary of any life insurance policy, other than a term life policy, at any age, for any amount.
- 6. Make The Rotary Foundation a retirement plan beneficiary.
- 7. Establish a Donor Advised Fund.

MAJOR DONOR

To become a Major Donor one must donate a total of at least \$10,000 in cash to The Rotary Foundation over any period of time. Recognition Points do not count toward this award, which has levels from 1 to 4 (\$10,000 to \$100,000).

GRAND DONOR

To become a Grand Donor, one must donate a minimum of \$1,000 cash to The Rotary Foundation within the current Rotary Year. Recognition Points do not count.

To find out where you stand regarding donations to The Rotary Foundation, you can do one of three things:

- 1. Log onto your MyRotary account, select Profile in the top right of the page, then select Donor History Report on the following page.
- 2. Call the Rotary Support Center at 866-976-8279 and ask for the report

An Eye-Opening Rotary Project – Sight Now! by Margaret Thornberry, Rotary Club of Niles-Fremont

If you had been in South India near the sacred city of Kanchi this past August, you may have seen two gleaming white buses roll into a rural area and noticed the Rotary insignia displayed on the sides. You might have wondered what was going on, particularly when you saw the tables, chairs and shade canopies set up, and the many people gathered there. These buses are here to bring top quality eye care to the rural people of Tamil Nadu through the Sight Now project.

Dr. Geeta Kadambi is a native of India with a PhD in clinical biochemistry, and with a lifelong concern for the treatment of preventable blindness. This is a severe problem in rural India, due to malnutrition, strong UV rays, and little eye protection being worn. Older people with cataracts are unable to contribute to the well-being of the family; instead, becoming a burden, and as she says, "When children are unable to see well, they drop out of school. If there is no education, poverty lingers."

Her home club of Niles Fremont Rotary of California has partnered with India's Rotary Club of Guindy and the Mobile Eye Surgical Unit of Sankara Nethralaya Eye Hospital of Chennai, and thanks to Dr. Kambadi's enthusiastic rallying of support and fund-raising talent, the mobile eye care buses are now equipped with a Topcon refractor, used to accurately make critical measurements such as eye curvature and astigmatism, and an ophthalmic microscope to carefully monitor progress at a microscopic level during surgery. The first bus is set up as a prep bus, where cataract patients are prepared for their surgery, and the second bus, entered through a kind of 'air lock' between the two, is the operating room, which is carefully cleaned and sterilized after each drive on India's dusty roads. Coordinating with local leaders, a central area near several villages is set up as an 'eye camp', where patients gather, the buses roll in and are set up for the week, patients are evaluated, prescription glasses made and cataract surgery performed on the spot, with a goal of changing 800 lives each year.

Now, due to Dr. Geeta Kambadi's efforts, the sponsorship of Niles Rotary, coordination with Area 3 WCSC, and the cooperation of the Rotary Club of Guindy, a sizeable grant has been awarded for this project by the International Rotary Foundation, providing enough funding for five Sight Now eye camps this year!

Here are some housekeeping items for clubs wishing to do District Grants in 2018-2019 and/or need to close District Grants that they did in 2017/2018:

- Final reports for 2017-2018 District Grants are due by October 31st. Please do our wonderful grants team a favor and complete/submit your final reports as soon as possible, so they don't have a crunch in the last week of October.
- District Grant Applications for both local and international projects for 2018-2019 are due by October 31st. Your club must be in compliance in order to receive funding for your 2018-2019 projects. This means:

2017-2018 District Grant final reports are submitted and accepted

All club financial obligations are current

Reports for any Global Grants are current

You club has registered its Foundation giving and Membership Goals

You or a club representative have completed the online District Grants Training (see notes below)*

Your club submitted a club MOU signed by both your 2018-2019 Club President and your 2019-20120 President-Elect

All grant forms and resources (both for District and Global

Grants) are available at www.rotarydistrict5170.org. Hover over the "Rotary Foundation" tab and choose "Grants" at the bottom of the dropdown menu.

*Training for purposes of qualifying to do District Grants consists of reviewing a series of short power point presentations, followed by completing a brief questionnaire for each section. It is "open book". Submit your responses to your Grants Resource Leader. You must complete all parts for your club to be qualified.

What's New in Global Grants?

New Requirement: Community Assessment for all applications submitted in 2018-2019

Community Assessment Tool and Form are on District 5170 web site.

Global grants training is separate from district grants training. At least one of the Global Grant Committee members will be required to take the training when it is available. We are using Rotary International's e-Learning platform and there have been some delays. We'll let you know as soon as the training is available.




